Unfortunately, we are starting the new year with a challenge. Missouri Botanical Garden (MoBot) has not been able to provide us with a consistent meeting schedule or space for 2012. If you check the calendar on page four you will see that our meetings bounce around some from month to month—we stick with Tuesdays, but sometimes the second Tuesday, sometimes the third and sometimes the fourth. You also will notice that most of our meetings will be at the Commerce Bank Center for Science Education, (CBEC) a separate facility of MoBot where we met for much of 2011. But a few move back to the Beaumont Room in the Ridgway Center. As always, *Water Word* will precede the meeting and will inform you of the time, place, and program. You will need to pay close attention so you won't miss anything.

I have tried to put together a list of quality presentations for SLWGS in 2012. There are still a few "to be determined" spaces in the calendar, but a lot is already set.

In January, Josh Bauer from Bauer Falls will give us a presentation on pond construction. In February, we will have a panel of experts who will discuss opening the pond in spring. On the program are Aaron Burchett of Pond Market on construction/mechanics, Steve Harris on plants, and Pat Tosie to talk about fish. Bill Ruppert, owner and manager of National Nursery Products and a member of the

Perennial Plant Association, will talk about plants. April and May are still being nailed down, but in June, back for a repeat performance will be Dr. Andy Goodwin to talk about fish diseases. In July we will have our fund-raising auction, and in August, our awards banquet held at the Jewel Box. Joe Summers has agreed to give a presentation about his Victoria Adventure that resulted in the hybridization of a new water lily. In September, we'll have our fall panel of experts. October is currently open, and in November it will be time for elections and our now annual pot luck.




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Two Ways to Get *Water Word*

watched me play in the shallow stream as they criss-crossed the creek.

Those of us who love the flow of water also get to learn the beauty of frozen falls and the excitement of the zillions of robins who fly south in waves of rusty breasted armor and stop to splash in the edges of our water gardens.

Movement....ahhhh, to see something traveling in what seems to be the stillness of winter is a great delight.

There under the icy water was a leopard frog cruising at quarter speed. I surrendered wet sleeves for the joy of catching and holding her and feeling her smooth skin in the cold breeze. This was a perfect day. The only thing missing was my camera. So the moral of this story is take a walk IN the wild side, don your rubber boots and play this winter IN your water garden, but please don't forget to bring your camera!

Pond Winter Care—Six Tips to Keep Your Pond Healthy

In the depths of winter, the last thing most of us want to do is perform maintenance chores on our ponds. However, keeping a few basics in mind will help you avoid major problems and will make your spring opening easier.

- 1. If your pond pumps and/or waterfall is running through the winter, check your filter at least weekly. Even though the fish are not eating and creating waste, your filter still will collect dirt and debris from the pond surface.
- 2. Check the pond water levels daily. It only takes a few hours for a broken pipe to empty a pond and under the ice, it is easy to overlook a drop in water level.
- 3. If topping off is necessary, pay attention to the water quality to avoid excessive chlorine buildup. If you are

adding new water from the house, add it slowly to avoid a sudden temperature change in the pond water. Drain and store the hose after use.

- 4. Make sure your bubblers, de-icers and warmers are working properly to keep a hole open in a frozen surface. Check especially when the temperature takes a drastic and sudden overnight dip.
- 5. If you have netted the pond for winter, make sure you remove the accumulated debris from it regularly so the net does not collapse into the pond.
- 6. If you have NOT netted the pond, look for a buildup of leaves and debris in the pond. Remove as much as you can with a net—or don rubber waders on one of the milder winter days and get the debris out.

The International Waterlily and Water Gardening Society (IWGS) has announced the winners of its 2011 waterlily competition. The lilies all were grown at the Sarah P. Duke Gardens in Durham, N. C., under the direction of horticulturist, Tamara Kilbane. The winners are shown here along with the developer names.

A panel of judges from various backgrounds and countries judged the contest in September. This year's judges include John Loggins of Lone

Star Aquatics, Farley See of Moore Water Gardens, Craig Presnell of Luster Aquatic Nurseries, Kit Knotts of Water Gardeners International, James Allison of Aquapic Consulting, Rich Sacher of American Aquatic Gardens, Tim Jennings of Longwood Gardens, Jim Purcell of Oregon Aquatics, Kelly Billing of Maryland Aquatic Nurseries, Stu Schuck of Charleston Aquatic Nurseries, Marc Hachadourian of New York Botanical Gardens, and Deb Spencer of Waters Edge.

Visitors to the garden and website viewers also voted to select Popular Choice winners.

The IWGS has recognized on its website the efforts of the Sarah P. Duke Gardens and the dedication of Kilbane on behalf of the 2011 water lily competition. Kilbane has nine years of experience in the water gardening industry, and is a freelance garden writer and photographer. Duke Gardens

is a public non-profit botanical garden that is affiliated with Duke University. It is supported by public donations and has no admission fees. The garden grows the Longwood Victoria and many other varieties of water lilies and marginal plants.

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Take a Walk IN the Wild Side

The dual incessant barking told me something needed attention. My Great Pyrenees/Anatolian shepherd dogs were doing their appointed task—watching over the land. "Good girls," I thought and proceeded to do dishes with the garden hose and my tall rubber boots outside the well house. Life is a little

the tangled bushes and fallen trees to see what the fuss was all about. Tucked under brush, growling defensively, was a coyote. The dogs were very proud of their work, and so was I. I called them off point. They gladly surrendered their predator and followed me back down the glade.
