The world famous Lord's Cricket Ground, commonly referred to as The Home of Cricket, will welcome a new sport into its domain this summer. On 27 July 2012, Lord's will become The Home of Archery for the London Olympic Games. Much has changed in the archery family since the Beijing Olympic Games and participants from a record of 55 countries will compete for archery's four Olympic gold medals in what will be the most competitive field yet encountered.

THE HOME OF ARCHERY

LORD'S:

Archery's history is linked to Britain: the five colours on the target originated in the English Archery Rounds. Although we have since added more scoring rings, the target's size of 122cm has never changed. We are also coming to the home country of the former World Archery President, Mrs Inger K. FRITH. Mrs FRITH brought archery back to the Olympic Games in 1972. She would have likely been proud of her sport competing at Lord's, although she probably would have preferred the All Whites rule for uniforms that is maintained for Cricket Test Events.

The Paralympic Games originated in Stoke Mandeville. We look forward to hosting Paralympic Archery at the Royal Artillery Barracks. We are eagerly anticipating the Paralympic Games, which demonstrate the incredible level of competition that athletes who have disability are able to achieve.

In terms of the competition format, we will see the set system for the individual competition for the first time at the Olympics. It was successfully used in Singapore for the Youth Olympic Games and at all major competitions since 2010.

Lord's is a magical venue where sports history has already been made. It has been said that there was already an archery demonstration by the Sioux Indians that was organised by the venue's namesake, Thomas LORD, in the 19th century. Although the sport has changed considerably since those days, the heritage of our sport will be linked to the Pavilion, which is truly a fantastic place. Walking out of the Pavilion to go to the field of play is magic that will be experienced by all of the athletes at these Olympic Games.

We would like to wish good luck to all the athletes and we would like to thank really everyone involved in this archery competition at the London 2012 Olympic Games. We are looking forward to a memorable time at Lord's, where the historical field contrasts the state-of-the-art media centre. Just like archery-a modern sport with a strong heritage.



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Welcome to Lord's, Home of Archery for the London 2012 Olympic Games









London 2012 Olympic Games, 27 July - 12 August (Archery: 27 July - 3 August)

- Archery was a sport in the Olympic Games from 1900–1920. In 1972, archery became a permanent part of the Olympic programme.
- There are 64 men and 64 women competing in the recurve division, for individual and team events in London. There will be four new Olympic champions: Individual Men, Individual Women, Team Men, and Team Women.
- In the Ranking Round, the athletes shoot 72 arrows at a distance of 70 metres.
- In the Olympic Round (matches), the number
 1 individual qualifier (seed) shoots against
 number 64, and so on...
- Individual matches are best of five sets of three arrows. The athletes shoot in alternate format and have 20 seconds per arrow. The first archer to six set points is the winner. If after five sets the scores are tied at 5-5, the match goes to sudden death, where both archers shoot one arrow each (alternately). The arrow closest to the centre wins.
- Each nation that qualified three athletes of the same gender can also compete in the team competition.

- In the team matches, each team shoots 24 arrows—4 ends of 6 arrows. They have only 2 minutes in which to shoot 6 arrows. Each team member shoots 2 arrows per end, shooting only one arrow at a time. Teams alternate shooting after every 3 arrows.
- The archery competition will take place at the famous Lord's Cricket Ground.

PARALYMPIC GAMES London 2012 Paralympic Games, 29 August - 9 September (Archery: 30 August - 5 September)

There are 140 para-archers competing — 88 men and 52 women — in London.

The venue for archery will be the Royal Artillery Barracks.





Lord's is named after the Ground's original founder, Thomas LORD.

Lord's has long been seen as the Home of Cricket, the game's spiritual headquarters and perhaps the most important single place in world cricket. Its owner, Marylebone Cricket Club, has been based at Lord's since 1814, and is the owner and maker of the Laws of Cricket and guardian of the Spirit of Cricket. The venue hosts cricket at all levels of the game, from school and village fixtures to international Test. During the London 2012 Olympic Games, it will be the Home of Archery.



The Design and Build

In the London 2012 Olympic Archery Competition, archers will shoot from the front of the 19th century Pavilion—a historical and protected building in Great Britain and whose Long Room has hosted the highest dignitaries over the years—and across the hallowed cricket square towards the Media Centre. Commissioned for when Lord's hosted the 1999 Cricket World Cup, the Media Centre has won many awards for its modern, almost futuristic design.

COMPETITIONS

The road to London: qualifications of 64 men and 64 women

- Two teams of three athletes from the host country.
- The top 8 teams of three archers and eight individual archers per gender qualified based on 2011 World Championships.
- Thirteen athletes from various Continental Qualifications Tournaments held in 2011-12.
- Three teams of three archers from a Final Team Qualification Tournament (during World Cup Stage 3 in Ogden, USA, 18-24 June 2012).
- At least four individuals from a Final Individual Qualification Tournament (during World Cup Stage 3 in Ogden, USA, 18-24 June 2012).
- > Three invitation places.
- Any NOC that qualified three archers will present a team at the Olympic Games. All qualification places are earned by the NOC.
- All archers must meet Minimum Qualifications Standards (MQS): they are of 1230 points for men and women in a FITA Round and 625 points for men and 600 points for women at a 70m Round.
- Not more than two teams of three archers from one NOC team can compete. The NOCs could qualify either a team of three athletes or one archer per gender, so a maximum of six participants.

Changes from last Games

- Individual will play matches out of 5 sets of 3 arrows.
- Tie-breaks are played out of one arrow closest to centre for individuals.
- ➤ For teams, each team member will shoot a single extra arrow in a shoot-off. The team with the highest score will win. If the score is still tied, the team that has the arrow closest to the centre wins !
- Women's and men's matches will alternate during the 1/32 and 1/16 elimination rounds.



Scoring

➤ The target face has 10 concentric scoring rings (two per colour), scoring from 1 to 10 points. Hence the outside scoring ring is worth 1 point and the inside ring is worth 10 points. For all details please consult the Equipment section.

Competition Format

- Athletes shoot a 70m Round in qualifications, 12 ends of 6 arrows. The maximum number of points is 720.
- Archers are ranked based on the number of points.
- The top 64 archers are paired for the up-coming match-play (called the Olympic Round)
 —the No. 1 qualifier against No. 64, No. 2 against No. 63, etc.
- Out of the 12 teams participating, the top 4 in qualifications receive a bye for the 1/8 elimination round. The No. 5 will play against No. 12, No. 6 against No. 11, etc.



Individual Matches

- Athletes play matches out of 5 sets of 3 arrows.
- ➤ The winner of each set—the athlete who gets the highest cumulative score with his three arrows—gets 2 set points.
- > If the set is tied each athlete gets 1 set point.
- The winner of the match is determined by the number of set points won, not the score of the arrows.
- The match winner is the first to reach 6 set points.
- Here is an example of a recurve individual match

First set

Athlete A shoots : 10, 10, 9 = 29Athlete B shoots : 10, 9, 10 = 29

Both athlete A and B earn 1 set point. The score is tied at 1-1.

Second set

Athlete A shoots : 10, 10, 10 = 30 Athlete B shoots : 10, 5, 7 = 22

Athlete A earns the two points. He leads 3-1.

Third set

Athlete A shoots : 10, 10, 8, = 28 Athlete B shoots : 10, 10, 10 = 30

Athlete B earns the two points. He tied the match at 3-3.

Fourth set

 $\begin{array}{l} \mbox{Athlete A shoots: 10, 9, 8, = 27} \\ \mbox{Athlete B shoots: 10, 10, 10 = 30} \end{array}$

Athlete B takes the lead 5-3.

- The match will finish once the 6 set points is reached within the 5 sets.
- If the match is tied, a one-arrow (only!) shoot-off will be used to break the tie. The archer whose arrow is closest to the centre (if needed it will be measured) gets 1 extra point and wins.
- Athletes alternate to shoot each arrow and have 20 seconds per arrow.

Fifth set

Athlete A shoots : 10, 10, 9, = 29Athlete B shoots : 10, 10, 8 = 28

Athlete A earns the two points and ties the match at 5-5. A one-arrow shoot-off is required to break the tie (to earn the extra set point).

Shoot-off

Athlete A shoots : 10 Athlete B shoots : 10*

Let's measure that the arrow of the athlete B is the closest to centre and wins !

On the match chart results, the score would be shown as :

Athlete A: 5 (29, 30, 28, 27, 29; T10) Athlete B: 6 (29, 22, 30, 30, 28; T10*) *Closest to centre

Team Matches

- Each nation with 3 athletes of the same gender in the same division can also compete in team competition.
- In the team matches, each team shoots 24 arrows—4 ends of 6 arrows. They only have 2 minutes to shoot 6 arrows. Each team member shoots 2 arrows per end, shooting only one arrow at a time. Teams alternate shooting after every 3 arrows.
- The team with the highest score at the end wins the match.
- In case the two teams have a tied score, each team member will shoot a single extra arrow in a shoot-off. The team with the highest score will win. If the score is still tied, the team that has the arrow closest to the centre wins !
- Elimination and Final Matches are like an intense tennis tournament, sometimes in one day!
- The head-to-head competition combines simplicity, excitement and suspense.

Ranking

- There will be a gold medal and a bronze medal match (only one bronze medal is awarded).
- The quarterfinalists are ranked first based on their set points, and then in their total arrow points.
- For the other rounds, the retired athletes/ teams are all ranked in the same position, i.e. 9th, 17th and 33rd.

Penalties / Disqualification Rules

There are set penalties for infractions. The most common are: loss of the value of any arrow shot after the allocated time and having to return behind the waiting line in case of an incorrect relay in the team event.

Protests/Appeals

 A participant can appeal any unfair issue, with the exception of the value of a judged arrow.

Differences with World Championships and World Cup

- There are more participants in the World Archery Championships (more than 500 from about 80 countries) and at the World Cup (usually more than 300 from 50 countries)
- The archers shoot qualifications at 70 metres (70m Round) or over four distances (FITA Round: 90m, 70m, 50m and 30m for men and 70m, 60m, 50m and 30m for women).
- Other archery disciplines: Indoor, Field, Ski Archery, 3D Archery.

EQUIPMENT

Target

The target face at 70 metres is 122 cm in diameter. The target face is attached to the target butt.

The target face has 10 concentric scoring rings. Each ring is 6.1 cm in width. Hence, the inside scoring ring (the 10 ring) is 12.2 cm in diameter. The outside scoring ring is worth 1 point and the inside ring is worth 10 points.

There are five colours on the target — white for the two outside rings (1 and 2-point rings), then black (3 and 4), light blue (5 and 6), red (7 and 8), and gold (9 and 10). Should an arrow land on the line dividing two rings, it scores the higher score.

(For your information within the 10 ring is a smaller, lighter circle called the X10. It is only used as tie-breaker during qualifications on for world records. The very centre of the target is called the bull's eye.)

For the 50 m Round and the Compound Round, athletes shoot at a target face with 6 rings (scores of 10-5), 42 cm wide.





The target is positioned so that its centre is 130 cm above ground give or take 5 cm. A wind flag is positioned above the centre of each butt. This flag is essential to archers because wind affects their aim. A windsock is also visible on the Field of Play.



Bows

Two kinds of bows are used during archery events, the recurve and compound bows. During the Olympic Games, only the recurve bow is allowed. Its limbs curve away from the archer. It is also called a classic bow.

For information, the compound bow has pulleys and cables to make the holding weight less than half of the draw weight. It is a very precise and competitive bow that also provides exciting matches during World Championships and World Cups.

The bow is constructed of high-tech material. Modern risers (handles) are usually made of aluminium or carbon fibre; the limbs are laminated fibreglass, carbon fibre and a wood or synthetic core. The string is a high-strength, low-stretch material. Other features on a bow include a stabilizer, a sight, upper and lower limbs, a handle riser, a grip, a nock point, an arrow rest, a plunger button and a clicker.



Arrows

Arrows are usually made of a combination of aluminium and carbon fibre. The arrowhead or point is the part of the arrow that sticks into the target. The nock is the end of the arrow that fits onto the bow string. The feathers on an arrow are called the fletching or fletch.

Every arrow must be identified with an archer's name or initials.

Arrows can fly at more than 250 km/h.

OLYMPIC HISTORY

Archery Olympic History

Archery first appeared in the Olympic Games in 1900 and was contested again in 1904, 1908, and 1920. Women competed in the 1904 Olympics, making archery one of the first sports competitions to include women. In those four Games it was possible for an archer to compete in numerous events and win several medals. Hubert VAN INNIS from Belgium is the most decorated archer in Olympic history, winning six gold medals and three silvers in 1900 and 1920.


Archery was re-introduced to the Olympic program in 1972 with individual events for men and for women in which John WILLIAMS and Doreen WILBER, of the USA, captured the gold medals. In Seoul 1988, the team competition was added to the medal programme. Barcelona 1992 was the first time that archery featured exciting head-to-head competition and single elimination matches.

Atlanta 1996

The Atlanta 1996 Games marked a new milestone for the exposure of archery. Never before have so many spectators been able to watch archery live on television or in the stands as 54,680 spectators attended the competitions. The Atlanta archery coverage won the Golden Rings Award from the IOC for the best Olympic Sports coverage.

Sydney 2000

One change from the 1996 Olympics was that the team competition was held on two days rather than the one-day format used in Atlanta. This new format for the team competition allowed for the men and women to have their own full day of matches. This change enhanced the enjoyment of the spectators and the worldwide television audience. This will still be the case for Beijing 2008.





Athens 2004

In Athens, archery athletes had the unique chance of competing in the Panathinaiko Stadium where the first Olympic Games of the modern area took place in 1896. The Panathinaiko Stadium was built on the ruins of an ancient stadium built in 329 B.C.

«I think we had the best venue of them all!» said Jim EASTON. President of the International Archery Federation (now World Archery) in 2004. «The staging of our sport in such a historic place certainly added something very special. The Olympic Games in themselves are already a unique occasion for an athlete, so adding this extra dimension of being able to compete in this beautiful marble stadium where the first Games of the modern era took place--well, you could say it marks yet another place in history, one which I am sure each athlete treasured. And no doubt it was very special for the spectators, both on-site and watching on the TV networks around the world. I believe we were able to put on a show worthy of the venue--something which makes everyone very proud.»

Beijing 2008

Two dedicated archery stadiums and a revamped competition schedule (teams matches were played first and the 1/32 and 1/16 individual eliminations were held in succession) made archery very attractive for the fans and the TV stations worldwide. Some may remember the women's team finals under heavy rain (when every other outdoor sports stopped!). Then Italy posed a real challenge to Korea in the men's team final that went down to the last arrow! Individually, ZHANG Juan Juan (CHN) made history becoming the first woman to defeat three Korean athletes in a row to take the title. Finally, Viktor RUBAN (UKR) prevented one more time that Korean male won the individual gold!

WORLD ARCHERY FEDERATION

The World Archery Federation (WA) was founded under the name of International Archery Federation (FITA) in 1931 at a meeting in Lwow, Poland. Seven founding nations were present: France, Italy, Hungary, Poland, Sweden, the United States and the former Czechoslovakia. The head office for WA is in Lausanne, Switzerland. In 2005, Prof Dr Ugur ERDENER (TUR) was elected president. Dr ERDENER is also an IOC Member and the President of the National Olympic Committee in Turkey.

According to its Constitution, WA's main objective is "to promote and encourage archery throughout the world in conformity with the Olympic principles."

World Archery makes and interprets the Rules Book; supervises the organization of World Championships and other international competitions; and promotes archery through the media and sponsors.



Archery was part of the Olympic Movement from 1900–1920 and has been permanently a part of Olympic Games since 1972, when the IOC returned the elegant sport of archery to the Olympic program. Women competed in the 1904 Olympics, making archery one of the first sports competitions to include women. In 1961, WA became the first International Sports Federation to elect a woman president.

World Archery has held World Championships since 1931. Since 1991, WA has included eight disciplines. In 2006, WA started the Archery World Cup—staging intense competitions in spectacular places.

In 2009, the forward-focused World Archery brand was launched to represent the sport of archery to both sports enthusiasts and the worldwide market beyond the archery family, promoting archery at every level with passion.

In July 2011, a large majority of the Congress held in Turin, Italy, voted to change the name from FITA to World Archery Federation (WA).
