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SUMMARY

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Located northeast of the downtown commercial area at 112 South Oak Street in Hermitage, Bradley County, Arkansas, the Hermitage City Hall & Jail, is a small rectangular building built out of large yellow brick. The building is fenestrated by three-over-one, double-hung, wood-frame windows in the front portion, while the rear portion has wood-frame window openings covered with iron bars. The building is crowned by a gable roof with a false front at the front.

ELABORATION

Located northeast of the downtown commercial area at 112 South Oak Street in Hermitage, Bradley County, Arkansas, the Hermitage City Hall & Jail, is a small rectangular building built out of large yellow brick. The building rests on a continuous brick foundation.

The building is fenestrated by three-over-one, double-hung, wood-frame windows in the front portion, which served as the city hall, while the rear portion, which was the jail, has wood-frame window openings covered 'th iron bars. The building is crowned by a gable roof with a false front at the front and exposed rafter tails ong the sides.

Front/East Façade

The front façade of the building is dominated by the entrance, which consists of a wood door with three horizontal recessed panels in the bottom half and three vertical window panes in the top half. A small projecting front porch with front-facing shed roof that is supported by two metal posts protects the entrance. A short concrete sidewalk leads to the entrance and a single concrete step is located in front of the entrance. Above the entrance, a rectangular opening with metal screen vents the attic space.

Although the building has a gable roof, the front of the roof is not visible due to the rectangular false front, which is built out of the oversized yellow brick like the rest of the building.

Side/South Façade

The south façade of the building is fenestrated by two three-over-one, double-hung, wood-frame windows that are located towards the front of the building. Both windows are covered with wire mesh. There is no fenestration on the south side for the jail portion of the building.

Rear/West Façade

The rear façade of the building is fenestrated by two wood-frame window openings covered with iron bars, one near each side. The gable portion of the building, rather than built out of brick, is covered in horizontal wood boards. In the center of the gable peak is a rectangular, louvered attic vent.

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Side/North Façade

Like the south façade, the north façade of the building is fenestrated by two three-over-one, double-hung, wood-frame windows that are located towards the front of the building. Both windows are covered with wire mesh. There is no fenestration on the south side for the jail portion of the building, although a PVC vent pipe is located on the façade near the west end of the building.

Integrity

The Hermitage City Hall & Jail has excellent integrity. The exterior of the building retains its original design and materials from the time that it was built c.1945. In addition, Hermitage has remained a small town, and the setting around the building still reflects the time of its construction.

SUMMARY

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The Hermitage City Hall & Jail, which is located at 112 South Oak Street, is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with local significance under Criterion C as an excellent intact example of a mid-twentieth-century jail and city hall building. Built c.1945, the Hermitage City Hall & Jail is a good example of a mid-twentieth-century small-town jail and city hall. The city hall and jail served the Hermitage community from c.1945 until c.2000, and is also being nominated to the National Register with local significance under Criterion A for its associations with governmental activities and law enforcement in Hermitage.

ELABORATION

Bradley County was named after Captain Hugh Bradley, who sailed up the Red River in 1818 on an exploration expedition. In the early 1820s, he reached Long Prairie in Lafayette County, but became dissatisfied with the area. He headed east along with his companions and arrived in Bradley County c.1825, st as other early settlers Isaac Pennington and Aaron Johnston were also settling in the area. The population of the area continued to increase throughout the 1830s, and by 1840 enough people existed in the area to establish a separate county.¹

Bradley County was formed on December 18, 1840, and at that time, encompassed much of the area that is now Ashley, Drew, Lincoln, Cleveland, Dallas and Calhoun counties. However, as the population in southeast Arkansas, parts of Bradley County were taken away to form other counties including Dallas County (January 1845), Drew County (November 1846), Ashley County (November 1846), Calhoun County (December 1850), Lincoln County (March 1871), and Cleveland County (April 1873), which brought the county to its present size.²

Little is known about the early history of the Hermitage area, although it is known that there was a post office in the area by 1854.³ However, by 1890, the post office was not listed in the list of thirteen post offices included in the *Biographical and Historical Memoirs of Southern Arkansas*, indicating that settlement in the area may have been sporadic in the early years.⁴ The community was named after Andrew Jackson's hometown in Tennessee.⁵ Although settlement in the area may have been sporadic in the nineteenth century, the community was healthy enough to incorporate in 1907.

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In the early years of the community's history, there apparently was no building dedicated as a city hall or jail. However, by the 1940s, the city had grown enough that they needed to construct a building to be used specifically as a city hall and jail. The building that was constructed was utilitarian in nature, and had one half dedicated for the city hall and the other half dedicated for the jail. It was built just to the east of the city's commercial core. Although the exact date of construction is not known, the use of three-over-one windows and the large yellow brick, a brick type found on other buildings in Warren, the county seat, built in the 1940s and 1950s, indicate that it was likely built c.1945.

The building on South Oak Street remained the community's city hall and jail until the city hall was relocated to the east of town on the bypass c.2000. However, the Hermitage City Hall & Jail remains as a reminder of the growth of the community's governmental growth in the mid-twentieth century. It also remains a good example of a small-town jail and city hall.

TATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Hermitage City Hall & Jail, which is located at 112 South Oak Street, is being nominated to the National Register of Historic Places with local significance under Criterion C as an excellent intact example of a mid-twentieth-century jail and city hall building. Built c.1945, the Hermitage City Hall & Jail is a good example of a mid-twentieth-century small-town jail and city hall. 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VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION

From the southwest corner of the E. Grand Avenue and S. Oak Street intersection, proceed southerly along the west side of S. Oak Street for 145 feet to the point of beginning. From the point of beginning, proceed westerly perpendicular to S. Oak Street for 125 feet, thence proceed southerly parallel to S. Oak Street for 85 feet, thence proceed easterly perpendicular to S. Oak Street for 125 feet, thence proceed northerly parallel to S. Oak Street for 85 feet, thence proceed northerly parallel to S. Oak Street for 85 feet to the point of beginning.

BOUNDARY JUTIFICATION

The boundary contains the land that is historically associated with the Hermitage City Hall & Jail.
