


Regional Labor Market Profile

Northern Coastal Counties

In recent years, as local economies weathered the Great Recession, the quality and timelinesss of labor market information has become increasingly important. This is especially true for California Community Colleges. Whether it is aligning career technical education programs with local employer demand, providing career guidance to students, meeting funding requirements or writing grants, colleges rely on labor market data to inform their decision-making process.

To assist colleges serving the northern coastal communities of California (Del Norte, Humboldt, Lake, Mendocino and Trinity counties), the Centers of Excellence, an initiative of the Economic and Workforce Development program through the California Community Colleges' Chancellor's Office, offer this regional labor market profile — an overview of the county's demographic make-up, current and projected employment, and related resources.



Living in the Region

- → The 2010 population of the northern coastal counties was about 326,000; by 2020, the population is projected to grow by 50,000.
- → The labor force in the region totals about 146,000 workers; of these, about 19,000 are out of work (13% unemployment)
- → In 2010, the median household income was ranged from \$38,000 (Lake) to about \$41,900 (Mendocino)
- → The region is served by College of the Redwoods (Humboldt and Del Norte), Mendocino College (Lake and Mendocino), and Shasta College (Trinity)
- → Eighty-seven percent (87%) of the region's adult population (18 or older) completed high school, with 58% moving on to take college courses or obtain degrees

In the News

Across the state, regional economies are slowly improving. As new business or job gains are reported, they add not only to the economic wealth of a region but also signal an uptick in labor market momentum. In the northern coastal region, a few examples of recent signals include:

- → The Brewers Association recently released its annual top 50 craft and overall brewing companies in the nation, based on beer sales volume. Of the top 50 craft brewing companies, three are located in the northern coastal region: Lost Coast (Eureka), North Coast (Fort Bragg), and Anderson Valley (Boonville). Mendocino Brewing (Ukiah) and Lost Coast also made the list as two of the top 50 overall brewing companies.
- → In December, Walmart announced its plans to remodel and renovate a location in Eureka. When operational, the new Walmart store will provide opportunities for about 200 new jobs and additional tax revenue to support the area's local economy.

The Region at Work

In March 2012, the combined unemployment rate for the northern coastal region held steady at 13%, just 0.6 percentage points lower than March of the previous year. In the same period, the labor force increased by only 620 participants, adding that many more job seekers to the already competitive market. Overall, these are positive indicators, showing that employment is on the rise even as more adults enter the workforce.

Looking forward to 2014, industry projections estimate gains of as much as 6% or about 8,100 jobs. The largest gains are projected for healthcare and social services (up as much as 1,700); other services (+1,500), and retail trade (+1,400). Several industry clusters that have proven uniquely successful to the region include diversified healthcare, management and innovation services, and building/systems construction and maintenance.

Industry Spotlight: Healthcare Services

Employment in healthcare accounts for more than 18,000 jobs in the region, with the largest growth anticipated for hospitals, nursing care facilities, home health care services, and outpatient care centers.

Career Opportunities: Within health services, the occupations listed below show potential for growth and usually require some college, an Associate degree or above.

Largest growth: registered nurses, nursing aides and attendants, home health aides, medical assistants, medical secretaries, dental assistants, and emergency medical technicians/paramedics

Fastest growth: emergency medical technicians/paramedics, mental health counselors, home health aides, personal and home care aides, registered nurses, licenced practical and licensed vocational nurses

Industry Spotlight: Professional, Scientific and Technical Services

In this industry, businesses engage in processes where human capital is the major input. These businesses utilize the knowledge and skills of their employees, often on an assignment basis, to deliver services to the client.

Accounting for more than 8,600 jobs in 2011, by 2014, employment is expected to increase by the greatest amount within two types of services — management, scientific, and technical consulting services (+540 jobs) and other professional, scientific and technical services (+210 jobs). Other services includes a wide variety of consulting services, including agricultural, agronomy, biological, dairy, economic, and energy, among others.

Career Opportunities: Within professional, scientific and technical services, the occupations listed below show potential for growth and usually require some college or training, an Associate degree or above.

Largest growth: management analysts, bookkeeping, accounting and auditing clerks, office clerks, executive secretaries and administrative assistants, managers, receptionists and information clerks, accountants and auditors

Fastest growth: environmental scientists and specialists, business operation specialists, executive secretaries and administrative assistants, general and operational managers, veterinary technologists and technicians

Industry Spotlight: Construction

Often characterized by owner-operated or small firms, construction accounting for 9,830 jobs in 2011, by 2014, employment is expected to increase by the greatest amount within other specialty trade contractors (\pm 250 jobs), building finishing contractors (\pm 140 jobs) and building equipment contractors (\pm 113 jobs).

Career Opportunities: Within construction, the occupations listed below show potential for growth and may require some college or training, an Associate degree or above.

Largest growth: carpenters, construction laborers, construction managers, painters, supervisors/managers of construction trades and extraction workers, plumbers

Fastest growth: construction helpers (assist pipelayers, plumbers, pipefitters), tile and marble setters, carpet installers, cost estimators, HVAC mechanics and installers, plumbers, roofers

Online Job Postings

Real-time labor market information (real-time LMI) aggregates postings from hundreds of online job search engines and matches job postings to occupational titles. This data is helpful in better understanding the job market in a region and assisting students/job seekers in making career decisions.

In the northern coastal counties, the top postings are for registered nurses and middle school teachers. Across all job postings, the top skills/knowledge areas include: sales, physical therapy, merchandising, repair, occupational therapy, patient care and inspection. Frequently cited certifications or other requirements include: first aid CPR, occupational therapist, registered nurse, certified nursing assistant, and basic cardiac life support.
