SPIRITUALITY IN THE CITY

At its simplest, Christian spirituality is the lived experience of faith. *Spirituality in the City* offers an opportunity for guided reflection on the contemporary experience of following Christ on the journey into life with God and God's creation.

Since Christian spirituality is not just a dimension of the Christian life, but is the Christian life itself lived in and through the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, it concerns absolutely every dimension of life: mind and body, intimacy and sexuality, work and leisure, economic accountability and political responsibility, domestic life and civic duty, the rising costs of health care, and the plight of the poor ...

Spirituality in the City meets monthly, and is intended for people in the 20s to 50 age range – the young, the young in faith, the young-ish rediscovering the ways and claims of faith in life.

Fr Martin Davies will guide the new SJI group, Spirituality in the City. For most of his ordained ministry, Fr Martin has been involved in leading reflection days and retreats, and offering spiritual direction and accompaniment. More recently, he co-mentored a NZ diocesan spiritual formation course. Martin greatly values the Benedictine inheritance of Anglicanism, still applicable in many dimensions of life and the church.

SACRED READING: LECTIO DIVINA

The slow, prayerful reading known as *Lectio Divina* has several phases or movements, during which the reader allows the reading (*lectio*) or hearing of the text to linger in the mind (*meditatio*), descend to the heart in prayer (*oratio*), and find a place of rest in prayer beyond the need for words (*contemplatio*).

Not a study, nor a utilitarian reading [lectio divina] focuses on the entry into the heart of the Word of God with all the power of the Spirit. It is a sacramental time, full of the presence of God through his word.

IN CONVERSATION WITH GLORIA SHIPP

2013 is the 20th Anniversary of the beginnings of Reconciliation Week. The week is fittingly held within 27 May - Referendum Day, and 3 June - Mabo Day, with the later addition on 26 May of Sorry Day.

To mark the beginning of the Week of Prayer for Reconciliation, Colleen Hodge talks with The Rev'd Gloria Shipp. In the course of the afternoon we will visit the commemorative plaque in the baptistery of St James' King Street.



The Rev'd Gloria Shipp is a priest in the Diocese of Bathurst. A central theme linking the diverse aspects of her ministry is her work to empower people and encourage transformation. Her involvements include weekly Elders groups, Juvenile Justice Centre chaplaincy, and camps for the Indigenous community.



Colleen Hodge has extensive experience serving the Anglican Board of Mission – Australia, the Brotherhood of St Laurence and the National Council of Churches in Australia, and as a consultant member of the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Anglican Council. Her experience also includes executive membership of the Australasian Religious Press Association and editor of the ARPA Bulletin

THE EUCHARIST MAKES THE CHURCH

Sunday 2 June, 2:00 to 4:00pm

At a time when Australian Anglicanism is becoming both more evangelical and more broad church, with its catholic tradition dwindling and volatilising, the Eucharist risks losing its central place in our Christian imagination. Current 'Emerging Church' enthusiasms attempt to repackage Christian worship under the sway of market forces, and the Eucharist—the strangest and most mysterious of rites—is not at the forefront of what is emerging. Yet the early Church was made by the Eucharist and this central Christian practice remains a rich focus of everything that Christianity entails: about God and Christ, about the resurrection and the new creation, and about the meaning and purpose of our own lives, both individually as Christians and together as the Church. Join Canberra-based theologian Fr Scott Cowdell for an afternoon of reconnection with the beating heart of what it is to think and live as Christians, and with the wellsprings of Catholic Anglicanism.



The Rev'd Dr Scott Cowdell is Research Associate Professor in Public and Contextual Theology at Charles Sturt University, and Canon Theologian of the Canberra-Goulburn Anglican Diocese. He is the author of seven books exploring the interface between Christianity and contemporary culture, most recently René Girard and Secular Modernity: Christ, Culture, and Crisis (Notre Dame, IN: University of Notre Dame Press, 2013).

The Rev'd Erice Fairbrother AHC, is vicar of a parish in the diocese of Waiapu NZ, Chaplain to the NZ Benedictine Associates of the Order of the Holy Cross, and an educator in formation and in ministry standards in the diocese. She has previously held the positions of Director of Distance Education and Training in the Church, Director and cofounder of the CAIRANZ Pastoral Supervision Formation and Training Programme, and teacher/innovator of a Contextualised Formation in Spiritual Direction Programme. Erice spent her sabbatical developing her original proposal of poetry as an authentic theological genre, at the conclusion of which she presented her Christological cycle of poems in readings in Hamilton, Napier and Auckland, Erice continues to have poetry, liturgy and essays published both in NZ and overseas.

On Saturday 13 July, The Choir of St James' will perform *Ein deutsches Requeim*, Brahms' *German Requiem*. Join Warren Trevelyan-Jones and a guest presenter for this early evening seminar, to discover the uniqueness of this Requiem from a religious perspective, and learn something of the work from a performance perspective.



Warren Trevelyan-Jones is the Head of Music at St James'. Before taking up this appointment in 2008, he was a member of the choir at Westminster Abbey. His career in church music spans over 25 years, together with experience as a professional singer that has taken him around the world. He has been involved in the making of over 40 CD recordings, and has worked as a singing teacher and music therapist.

ART AND THE BIBLE: DEPICTING THE KILLING OF HOLOFERNES IN THE BOOK OF JUDITH

Sunday 4 August, 2:00 to 4:00pm

Artemisia Gentileschi (1593 – c.1653) was a contemporary of Carravaggio, and the daughter of well-known Roman painter, Orazio Gentileschi. She was the only woman of the period to receive recognition as a painter in her lifetime. Her work is characterised by the depiction of strong women, often with Biblical themes, which stems from the trauma of being raped by her father's assistant, the subsequent public trial and notoriety that ensued.

Her depictions of the Judith and Holofernes story are markedly different from those of male painters, both of her time and in later periods. This seminar will examine the history, brief comparative analyses of other works, and a detailed analysis of Gentileschi's Judith paintings.



Karen Finch presents this seminar, following her enthusiastically received 2012 talk on Marc Chagall's White Crucifixion. Karen is the Communications and Publicity Coordinator at St James'. She has an MA in Art History. Karen is a sixth generation Australian Jew.

GOD'S KINGDOM ON EARTH

Eight consecutive Wednesdays (excluding 4 September) from 7 August, concluding 2 October, 6:15 to 7:30pm

The Global Financial Crisis, Credit Crunch and Occupy Movement have brought about a questioning of capitalism's institutional structures, and consideration of alternative sustainable business models. This series of discussions is designed to support Christian thought on these issues. The discussions trace the evolution of the promise of the Kingdom of God from ancient times to the present, exploring the link between natural law, religious teaching, practice and ethics in contemporary society, and whether the Kingdom of God can be defined as a political concept. This series pursues questions arising from the SJI 2012 forum, God & Mammon.



Dr Anthony Jensen is an advocate of the liberating and society-changing potential of employee ownership and workplace democracy, and has developed this in an Ethics of Ownership online course in the University of Wales. Dr Jensen's research findings into democratically owned and managed businesses in Spain, Italy and the USA, have been taken up by the UK and Australian Governments. Following his doctorate, he became an online lecturer at Oxford University. He currently lives in Sydney where he teaches at the Business School. University of Sydney. He is a parishioner of St James' King Street.

VATICAN II: LAMBETH AND SYDNEY

Saturday 17 August, 10:00am to 3:00pm

What has the Roman Catholic Second Vatican Council got to do with (Sydney) Anglicans? Fifty years after its opening, this seminar reflects on the broad scope of the Council Documents, and implications for Anglicans, then and now.



Professor Raymond Nobbs holds Masters degrees in Arts and Theology, and a PhD in History. He was Dean of the Sydney College of Divinity, from 1994 to 2007, prior to which he was Senior Lecturer in the School of History, Philosophy and Politics at Macquarie University. He has served as Chair of the Committee of Deans of Theology. His current research is the Lambeth Conferences.



Dr Anthony Maher has a degree in Theology from the University of Durham, a Masters in Religious Studies from the University of Lancaster, and a Diploma in Social, Political and Economic Ethics from Plater College, Oxford. His PhD in Pastoral Theology is from the Australian Catholic University. Anthony taught theology, philosophy and ethics at Newman College, Birmingham, before becoming Head of Pastoral Theology at the Catholic Institute of Sydney. His current research includes ecclesiology and pastoral ministry.
