

It has been a big year for the Australian Democrats. It may not be apparent to many yet, but this year marks a turning point for us. The best way to describe the key effect of our national work this year is the change in our perspective about us. This is the key to our revival and, I believe our long-term future.

GROUNDWORK

We took a new direction this year on the party's National Executive.

We had valuable support from advertising firm Euro RSCG, from member Luke Miller establishing member discussions on-line

Politics. We had a lot of ground work to do to set up a solid foundation for an influx of members and renewed activity amongst the membership.

The rebuild campaign kicked off in April and goes through to getting Australian Democrats elected at the next Federal election, expected late next year. It was a steady start, we made membership more

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accessible with reduced rates, updated our website and assisted YADS and some States with website updates. We developed our presence in the on-line community and began fundraising.

We didn't want to be just engaging on-line and held a series of social gatherings in every State and Territory around the country on the last weekend in June, where Australian Democrats old and new could meet up. For me, this was one of the highlights

STRUCTURES

We have followed with updating our membership engagement structures, to make it easier for members to contribute to party activities and more suitable to their interests and time poor lives. Part of that is setting up on-line groups, the first of which, the policy groups, were initiated by an email to members and media, inviting members to get involved in policy development, sent out on 22nd July 2009. Within one week the members had established twenty-seven issue based policy groups. This was another major highlight for me.

Important factors in supporting this real time, accessible, democracy are modern communication networks and systems. We plan to show the way in online participation in democracy with a new state-of-the-art, sophisticated website. This is a focus of the rebuild in the second half of the year. Raising the funds and requesting proposals for the site, with the aim of launching the first phase by the end of the year.

In my first media interview in April the questions I got were "Was the media release really from us?" and "Weren't we dead and gone?" In my most recent interviews, in July, the question was "Is there a place for the Australian Democrats in the Australian political landscape?" (With some respected commentators agreeing with me that there is.) A big turnaround in a short time of focused work, well done everyone.

Now...

There are more and more ways to get involved in the party, as little or as much as you want. Please do so by voting in the ballots in this Journal, joining groups, donating, volunteering, recruiting members and spreading the word. It's our party, we own it, and we must make it work.

WHAT A YEAR!

Chis was the first year for us as an extra-parliamentary party and, while it's been a trying time, we've certainly made a lot of progress in the early stages of Party re-building.

I have been working hard with my colleagues on the National Executive to lay the foundations for our Party's re-birth. I would define the last year as seeking to establish the frameworks and processes to ensure a functioning, accountable Party that better enables members to engage.

HERE ARE SOME OF THE ACTIVITIES OF OUR RE-BUILDING

- The website, www.newdemocrats.org.au, is a great platform for members to discuss and organise.
- The Bastard Watch campaign has been very successful. Not just in terms of the positive media coverage we received (some of which is the best we have seen in many years), but in terms of the inspiration it has provided to many members as we are seen to be taking grassroots democratic action!
- Finally, engaging with new people has seen our direct volunteer base explode. We are receiving offers for Party campaign and administration positions that have been vacant for a long time. Particularly, marketing and fundraising.

Obviously, there is a long way to go, but there is real hope. I can see that from the many people



contributing to the Party and from the solid foundations that are being built.

The focus now has shifted to writing our future. Now is the time to create strategic directions and processes for the Party's re-birth. Projects I am currently involved with are:

- Creating a policy process at national and state levels
- Creating a framework for developing consultative strategic directions
- Envisaging what a new constitution will look like

I hope these are things you are thinking about too! As a member said to me the other day: 'It's exciting!' Indeed.

One complaint that I must acknowledge is the insufficient communication with our members. While communication has been improved, there is certainly more that can be done. I believe developing a strategic direction will help us to all be on the same page and the policies that flow from that, encompassing communication, will ensure that members are informed.

ear Members and Supporters,

On July 20 I announced that if the SA Democrats did not recruit 1000 new members by November 23, I would leave the party and stand as an Independent.

This was a radical thing to do and I know it felt like a slap in the face for many people — both those working so hard on the Rebuild project and long term members who have put their heart, soul and even their mortgages into the party for many years.

I am sincerely sorry for any hurt I may have caused but I believe it is absolutely the right thing to do and in the best interests of the Australian Democrats and our values.



I took this extraordinary step because I was watching the SA Division going through the motions in the lead-up to the election. It had enough active members to hold a meeting but not enough to get an MP re-elected or to run any significant grass roots campaign.

My division had very little money, energy

and few members. We were headed for another familiar defeat.

We have a proud past but appeared resigned to a future of failure.

Given the events of recent years this is entirely understandable but for anyone who really wants to make a difference it is not acceptable. My challenge to the party is designed to act as a circuit breaker that jolts the party out of its slumber and forces people associated with the party to choose it or lose it. If the current party members really want the party to continue they will start signing up new members. And if enough of the community wants the Democrats to continue they will join when they are asked.

If we wait until the election to ask for people to choose the party it will be too late. My challenge is designed to force that choice to bring life back into the Division before the formal campaign even gets started.

What happens in SA is critical. This is the only state or territory where we have a chance to have a Democrat in parliament from March 2010. No one is claiming that we are going to win one elsewhere so it could be SA or nothing for several years.

If we keep the SA seat our chances of winning elsewhere will be much greater.

I have been criticised for this move but I always expected that. Much more surprising was the level of support from both inside and outside the party from people who felt 'something had to be done'.

I know not everyone is as positive about my challenge and I don't expect them to be.

But I do believe that all Democrats must take a dispassionate and strategic look at what I have done and how things might unfold from here. These are the possible outcomes:

a) We do not recruit a significant number of members and I stay. If that is the case we will almost certainly lose because we won't have the resources to mount a campaign and the support to win it.

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b) The Division fails to recruit a significant number of members and I leave. With noparty or money behind me and possibly a damaged reputation, it is unlikely that I


would hold the seat but with so many people hungry for independents my prospects would be slightly better than they would in a party with no resources or energy. And if I did attract significantly more votes than the party it would force a fundamental rethink of the future of the party.

- c) The Division recruits 600-700 and I leave the party. The party has lost an MP but has been reinvented, revitalised and have the longevity to build up and contest further elections. This sort of outcome would, if managed well by the party, see the party perform better than me in the 2010 election.
- d) The Division recruits 1000 and I stay an outstanding success. You have an MP, an energetic party and a renewed brand. This is obviously the best outcome for the party. It is also the best outcome for me.

So I argue that a dispassionate approach demands that the party attempt to rise to the challenge however much some members may resent the way in which it was imposed.

Many will say the target is impossible. It will certainly be difficult but mathematically if we can recruit the first couple of hundred and each of those on average recruits one more member each we would reach that target.

It should not be difficult to get that first 200. There are friends, family members and the possibility of sponsoring students and seniors. I am personally prepared to contribute \$1000 to sponsor 100 students. And interstate members could also attempt to recruit any friends they might have in SA.



Here in South Australia the Democrats have been the butt of

jokes for years. The Attorney General Michael Atkinson has been publicly claiming that we don't have enough members to be registered as a party (150).

Now imagine 1000 members. And imagine a rally on the steps of Parliament House of hundreds of Democrats in party t-shirts all shouting "Don't count us out" "Come out and count us".

That would be a sight to relish.

It would build the momentum and energy the party is craving right across the country.

ACT DIVISION PRESIDENT REPORT

Che ACT Democrats began the year recovering from an exhausting 2008 ACT election campaign. We didn't manage to get anyone elected but with only two candidates and no official registration, we still did extremely well in terms of media coverage and exposure. We raised good



issues, pushed the Democrats message and were a part of the whole campaign. Even if our vote didn't reflect the interest that was shown to us.

This year has been focused on rebuilding, recruitment and reregistration. In other

words, we are committed to the Australian Democrats rebuild campaign at both a national and a divisional level. We also recognise that a major part of that is to recruit new members and look to having more than sufficient numbers to be registered in time for the next ACT Election. And through doing this to increase overall participation and member involvement with some real grass roots campaigns.

As I said in my speech at the Declaration of the poll:

"It's time to move into the future now. There are a number of new opportunities to explore as I take my party, the Australian Democrats, into that future and embrace it and look forward with a positive focus and new energy as the great *progressive* party we are. In four years time we intend to contest the next election, from a position of greater strength. And further down the track, we will be able to look back and say: "We're still going strong. And we still "keep the bastards honest!"" "

This is an important time for the party. Next year we will undertake our first national election without federal parliamentary members to lead us. I ask all members what I asked of ACT Division members when I became ACT Democrats president last May. That is, to continue

"to show the great faith they have shown in joining and being Australian Democrats. The needs of the party have to come first, at this time. And I ask members to join me as we all pull together with the common purpose of rebuilding, reshaping, and reinvigorating the Australian Democrats. We can be the great third force in Australian politics again. But that can only be achieved with a cooperative effort."

The ACT Democrats thank all Australian Democrats members for the small part we play in this wonderful party.

I'm really looking forward to getting involved in this new role. I think technology policy is a field that all Australian political parties have struggled with for quite some time. Because the landscape around it has changed so drastically in the last few years, it's a great opportunity to direct some policy that will see the Australian Democrats as real leaders in some new areas.

Particularly within technology policy, I'm looking forward to developing policy that will enforce some of the original Democrats' stance against censorship. The next step will be developing these and other "talking points" into a comprehensive policy. A policy that will really resonate with both those who feel that online Australia has been ignored or even attacked by other parties and the government, as well as people who just need support with where online Australia meets our offline lives.



It's going to be hard work, but I think it's going to be highly rewarding. The Australian Democrats have by far the best foundations on which to build this, with a history of

striving for freedom of expression and information; equal access to the developments that improve our lives and the best commitment to true democratic process.





DOWN SHIFTING WITH JOHN HOWARD

I recently attended lectures by Al Gore and John Howard.

The Al Gore lecture was far more inspiring. But Democrat readers are mostly familiar with his *take action now* to mitigate the downside of climate change message. So I will concentrate on the lessons John Howard was giving to political parties out of power, liked the Democrats.

He made several good points:

. the focus of media interest has changed from foreign affairs to economics,

. most politicians underestimate the importance of talk back radio, particularly at the popular end,

GM CROPS / FOOD

Whether or not the Australian Democrats are able at this time to become involved in the debate on Genetically Modified crops / food. I think it is important that members know the seriousness of this issue.

We, in Australia, are throwing away a fantastic opportunity to be one of the few places in the world which are GM free. Tasmania has recognised the long term value of this.

In Europe the tide is turning as consumers realise the amount of animals which are fed GM stockfeed. It is becoming a problem to satisfy demand for non GM feed. I understand demand in the Middle East is liable to rise as Saudi Arabia, a major power player in the region, is supporting GM free food.

Reasons to be concerned:

GM food is virtually untested, unlabelled and unmonitored. This in itself should send alarm bells ringing. Why would the biotech companies be so fearful of testing and labelling of their food?

FSANZ accepts the data of the corporation marketing the GM crop as evidence of safety.

The few independent studies done with rats / mice have shown serious adverse effects from eating GM food including the last study, by the Austrian government, of increasing sterility and smaller offspring over successive generations.

Monsanto, the huge corporation with an infamous record of bribing, pollution etc is the key player in biotechnology with 674 patents and has bought up over 50 seed companies in the past decades, including the biggest in the world.

If members are unaware of these insidious developments, I suggest they browse the internet or read Jeffery Smith's books.


