While Alaalatoa considers making the Australian Under-20 side is his greatest achievement to date, he has also represented the Newington College 1st XV, GPS 1st XV, New South Wales Schoolboys and Australian Schoolboys side which defeated New Zealand Schools 26-19 in 2011.

Named last year's Australian Under-20 Player of the Year at the annual John Eales Medal ceremony, this will be Curtis Browning's second IRB Junior World Championship.

An imposing figure on the field, Browning played in four out of five of Australia's JWC matches last year, mostly at blindside but also as a second rower.

The towering forward continued his development this year, being brought into the Queensland Reds' Super Rugby squad as injury cover for one-time Wallaby Beau Robinson.

He played for the Reds in a trial match against the Waikato Chiefs on the Sunshine Coast before making his Super Rugby debut off the bench against the Bulls of Pretoria in Round 6.

He also captained the Queensland Reds College XV against Tonga A in the IRB Pacific Rugby Cup earlier this year.

The third-most capped Australian Schoolboy in history (behind Chris Feauai-Sautia and Hugh Roach), Browning captained the side in 2011 and scored a crucial try to help lead his side to a 26-19 victory over New Zealand Schools.

Browning is the grandson of former Wallaby Dick Marks, who represented Australia 17 times from 1962 to 1967, including five Bledisloe Cup matches.

Browning was a member of the ARU National Gold Squad – a national Rugby development program for high school students.







This is Johnston's first IRB Junior World Championship.




Physiotherapist
