2013 IIHF MEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENT INFORMATION

IIHF TOURNAMENT FORMAT

Preliminary Round

The 2013 International Ice Hockey Federation Men's World Championship features 16 teams divided into two groups. One group will play in Helsinki, Finland, while the other will play in Stockholm, Sweden.

Each team will play seven games within its group, with the top four teams from each preliminary round group advancing to the quarterfinals. The teams that finish 5-8 in their group will have no more games. The eighth-place teams are relegated to Division I.

Quarterfinal Round

Quarterfinal round games will be played within the groups, allowing teams to stay in their respective cities. The first-place team in each group will oppose the fourth-place team from its own group. Similarly, the second-place and third-place teams will comprise the other quarterfinal games.

Semifinal Round

All semifinal round games will take place in Stockholm. The groups will cross over in the semifinals. The progression from the quarterfinal round to the semifinal round is preset: the winner of Group H's first-place vs. fourth-place game will play the winner of Group S's second-place vs. third-place game, while the winner of Group S's first-place vs. fourth-place match will play the winner of Group H's second-place vs. third-place game.

Medal Games

Both medal games will be played in Stockholm. The two winning teams from the semifinal round will face off in the gold-medal game, with the losing teams playing in the bronze-medal game.

Three-Point System for Preliminary Round

- Three points shall be awarded to the winning team at the conclusion of regulation.
- One point will be awarded to both teams at the conclusion of regulation if the game is tied.
- An additional point shall be awarded to the team winning the game in either the overtime period or the Game-Winning Shots procedure.

Overtime Procedures

- If a preliminary-round game is tied after three periods, a five-minute four-on-four sudden-death overtime period shall be played immediately after an intermission of three minutes. The teams will defend the same goals as in the third period.
- If a quarterfinal, semifinal or bronze-medal game is tied after three periods, a 10-minute four-on-four sudden-death overtime period shall be played immediately after an intermission of three minutes. The teams will defend the same goals as in the third period.
- If the gold-medal game is tied after three periods, a 20-minute four-on-four sudden-death overtime will start immediately after a 15-minute intermission during which time the ice will be cleaned. The teams will change ends.
- If no goal is scored in the overtime period of any game, the Game-Winning Shots procedure will apply.

Game-Winning Shots Procedure

- Shots will be taken at both ends of the ice surface. Three players from each team will take shots alternately until a decisive goal is scored. If the score is still tied after three shots by each team, the procedure will continue with a tiebreak sudden-death shootout by one player from each team. The teams may use the same player or new players for each shot in the tiebreak shootout, until the outcome is decided.

2013 IIHF MEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP MEDIA GUIDELINES

MEDIA GUIDELINES

The 2013 Men's World Championship falls under the governance of the International Ice Hockey Federation.

IIHF protocol, as it pertains to media, is as follows:

- All accredited media shall have free access to cover all team practices, gameday skates and games.
- Locker rooms are closed to all media.
- All player interviews will be conducted in a designated "mixed zone" area within the arena. Requests for players should be directed to the appropriate media/public relations staff assigned to each team. The interviews will then take place in the "mixed zone" area.
- Players will be made available in the "mixed zone" no later than 10 minutes after the conclusion of the game, with a general media access period of 30 minutes.
- Following the conclusion of Team USA games and after practices, Head Coach Joe Sacco will be made available to the media.
- All media relations requests for the U.S. Men's National Team should be directed to Dave Fischer.
- The official television partners of the event will be given priority for all interviews.

USA Hockey provides the foundation for the sport of ice hockey in America; helps young people become leaders, even Olympic heroes; and connects the game at every level while promoting a lifelong love of the sport.

USA Hockey's primary emphasis is on the support and development of grassroots hockey programs. In January 2009, the organization launched the American Development Model, which - for the first time ever - provides associations nationwide with a blueprint for optimal athlete development. Always a leader in safety, USA Hockey furthered the enhancement of those efforts by advancing the USA Hockey SafeSport Program in June 2012.

While youth hockey is a main focus, USA Hockey also has vibrant junior and adult hockey programs that provide opportunities for players of all ability levels. The organization also supports a growing disabled hockey program.

Beyond serving those who play the game at the amateur level, USA Hockey has certification programs for coaches and officials to ensure education standards are met that coincide with the level of play. In September 2011, USA Hockey became the first youth sports organization in the U.S. to offer its coaches online, age-specific coaching education modules. Furthermore, a large focus is put on parent education with equipment needs, rules of the game and parental roles in youth sports among common topics.

Members of the organization are entitled to many benefits, including a subscription to *USA Hockey Magazine*, the most widely circulated hockey publication in the world; excess accident, general liability and catastrophic insurance coverage; access to USAHockey.com; and opportunities to participate in USA Hockey National Championships, as well as player development camps.

As the National Governing Body for the sport of ice hockey in the United States, USA Hockey is the official representative to the

United States Olympic Committee and the International Ice Hockey Federation. In this role, USA Hockey is responsible for organizing and training men's and women's teams for international tournaments, including the IIHF World Championships and the Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games. Closer to home, USA Hockey works closely with the National Hockey League and the National Collegiate Athletic Association on matters of mutual interest.

USA Hockey is divided into 12 geographical districts throughout the United States. Each district has a registrar to register teams; a referee-in-chief to register officials and organize clinics; a coach-in-chief to administer education programs for coaches; a risk manager to oversee liability and safety programs; and a skill development program administrator to facilitate learn-to-play programs for youth players and their parents.

In 1996, USA Hockey launched a revolutionary new initiative called the National Team Development Program, based in Ann Arbor, Mich. In its 16th season of play in 2012-13, the goal of this full-time development program is to prepare student-athletes under the age of 18 for participation on U.S. National Teams and success in their future hockey careers. Its efforts focus not only on high-caliber participation on the ice, but creating well-rounded individuals off the ice.

The program is composed of two squads - the U.S. National Under-18 and Under-17 Teams. The Under-17 Team competes in the United States Hockey League and also participates in three international events annually. The U.S. National Under-18 Team's schedule includes games against

NCAA Division I and III opponents, contests vs. USHL teams, as well as competition in three international tournaments.

The Ann Arbor Ice Cube, a first-class facility consisting of three ice sheets, locker rooms, offices, a training area and weight room is home to the NTDP. Unlike other competitive athletic teams, the success of the NTDP is not gauged on wins and losses. Instead, the focus is on the development of skills and acquiring experience against older competitors.

"Playing for your country is one of the greatest things any athlete can do," said National Hockey League superstar Ryan Kesler. "The NTDP's on- and off-ice programs built the foundation I needed to become the player I am today."



WHAT THE PROGRAM HAS MEANT

In evaluating how the NTDP has impacted hockey in the United States, consider:

- The U.S. has won the gold medal seven times at the IIHF Men's World Under-18 Championship (2002, 2005-06, 2009-12), with each team comprised primarily of NTDP players.
- The U.S., with a team comprised largely of NTDP players, captured its first-ever gold medal at the IIHF World Junior Championship in 2004. In 2010, Team USA earned its second gold medal and followed that success with a bronze-medal finish in 2011, the first time in tournament history that the U.S. won consecutive medals. The 2013 gold-medal team featured 13 players with ties to the NTDP.
- In 2011-12, more than 60 NTDP alumni played at least one game in the NHL.

Burke was the general manager of the 2010 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team that advanced to the gold-medal game in Vancouver, B.C. The U.S. settled for the silver medal after falling to heavily favored Canada in overtime of the title game.

Poile is currently in his 16th season with the National Hockey League's Nashville Predators, where he is president of hockey operations, general manager and alternate governor. The Predators have qualified for the Stanley Cup

Playoffs in eight of the last 10 seasons. Poile's 31 consecutive years as an NHL general manager rank as the second-longest active streak in the league and fifth longest in NHL history.

Jim Johannson, assistant executive director of hockey operations for USA Hockey, is on the staff of a U.S. Men's National Team for the 15th time. Johannson was previously part of the staff at the International Ice Hockey Federation World Men's Championship for six years as team leader (1999-2004), two as assistant general manager (2005-06), one as senior director of hockey operations (2007) and three as assistant executive director of hockey operations (2008-11).

A two-time U.S. Olympian (1988, 1992), Johannson brings extensive experience in international ice hockey both as a player and administrator. He served on the management team of the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team that won the silver medal at the 2010 Olympic Winter Games in Vancouver, B.C. In addition, he served as the senior director of hockey operations for Team USA at the 2006 Olympic Winter Games in Torino, Italy, and was the team leader for the silver medal-winning 2002 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team in Salt Lake City, Utah.

Johannson has also worked with 13 U.S. National Junior Teams, serving as general manager the last four years. Under his direction, Team USA has medaled three times in four years. The U.S. captured the 2010 gold medal in Regina and Saskatoon, Sask., then the 2011 bronze medal in Buffalo, N.Y., marking Team USA's first-ever consecutive medals at the tournament. Team USA was golden once again in 2013 in Ufa, Russia. In 2004, Johannson served as team leader for the gold medal-winning U.S. National Junior Team in Helsinki and Hameenlinna, Finland. He also worked with the bronze medal-winning 2007 U.S.

National Junior Team and was the lead administrator in hosting the 2005 IIHF World Junior Championship in Grand Forks, N.D., and Thief River Falls, Minn.

A full-time employee of USA Hockey, Johannson joined the organization on Sept. 1, 2000, as manager of international activities and United States Olympic Committee relations. He was promoted to senior director of hockey operations, a newly created position, on August 5, 2003. On June 25, 2007, Johannson was elevated to assistant executive director of hockey operations and is responsible for the day-to-day management and integration of all in-sport related initiatives. He handles USA Hockey representation in obtaining players and coaches for national teams in international competition. In addition, Johannson interfaces with the USOC on matters of mutual interest.

A former U.S. Men's National Team member, Johannson spent five years (1995-2000) as the general manager of the Twin Cities Vulcans, a Junior A team in the United States Hockey League. Under his guidance, the Vulcans captured the 2000 USA Hockey Junior A National Championship in Green Bay, Wis.

Johannson, a native of Rochester, Minn., played nine seasons in the International Hockey League, splitting time among three teams. Prior to embarking on his professional career, Johannson played at the University of Wisconsin, where he helped the Badgers capture the 1983 NCAA Division I national championship.

Johannson resides in Colorado Springs, Colo., with his wife, Abby.



JOE SACCO

HEAD COACH

Joe Sacco is serving as the head coach of the U.S. Men's National Team for the first time.

Sacco was an assistant coach for the U.S. Men's National Team at the 2009 (Berne, Zurich-Kloten, Switzerland) and 2010 (Cologne, Mannheim & Gelsenkirchen, Germany) International Ice Hockey Federation Men's World Championships.

As a player, Sacco has widespread experience on U.S. National Teams. He competed in the 1992 Olympic Winter Games in Albertville, France, helping the U.S. to a fourth-place finish. He also played in six IIHF Men's World Championships (1990-92, 1994, 1996, 2002), was a member of U.S. Men's National Select Team that competed in the 2002 Deutschland Cup, and skated for Team USA at the 1989 IIHF World Junior Championship.

Sacco was the head coach of the National Hockey League's Colorado Avalanche for the last four seasons. He was a finalist for the Jack Adams Award as the NHL's Coach of the Year in his first season behind the bench in 2009-10, guiding Colorado to a 43-30-9 record and a berth in the Stanley Cup Playoffs. The Avalanche became the first Western

Conference team to make the playoffs after finishing last in the conference the previous year since the league expanded to 30 teams in 2000-01. His four-year record stands at 114-109-23 (plus 14-22-7)

Prior to leading the Avalanche, Sacco spent two seasons as head coach of the American Hockey League's Lake Erie Monsters. He also spent two years as an assistant coach with the AHL's Albany River Rats (2006-07) and Lowell Lock Monsters (2005-06).

Sacco was a fourth-round pick (71st overall) of the Toronto Maple Leafs in the 1987 NHL Entry Draft. He appeared in 738 NHL games over his 13-year career, which included stints with the Maple Leafs, Anaheim Ducks, New York Islanders, Washington Capitals and Philadelphia Flyers. All total, he finished with 94 goals and 119 assists for 213 points.

Sacco played college hockey at Boston University, where he appeared in 111 games over three seasons (1987-90).

A native of Medford, Mass., Sacco currently resides in Denver, Colo., with his wife, Tammy, and their children, Joseph, Matthew and Christina.

ASSISTANT COACH

Phil Housley is serving as an assistant coach for the U.S. Men's National Team for the second time. Previously, he was on the U.S. bench at the 2011 International Ice Hockey Federation Men's World Championship in Bratislava and Kosice, Slovakia.

Housley was the head coach of the U.S. National Junior Team that won the gold medal at the 2013 IIHF World Junior Championship in Ufa, Russia. He was an assistant coach for the U.S. National Junior Teams in 2007 (Leksand & Mora, Sweden) and 2011 (Buffalo & Niagara, N.Y.), helping each team collect a bronze medal.

In September 2012, Housley was one of two head coaches for the inaugural CCM/USA Hockey All-American Prospects Game in Buffalo, N.Y.

A seven-time member of the U.S. Men's National Team (1982, 1986, 1989, 1996, 2000, 2001, 2003), Housley earned a silver medal with the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team at the 2002 Olympic Winter Games in Salt Lake City, Utah. He also helped Team USA capture

the 1996 World Cup of Hockey title, and was a member of the 1982 U.S. National Junior Team. In May 2012, Housley was inducted into the IIHF Hall of Fame.

A recipient of USA Hockey's Bob Johnson Award in 2000 for excellence in international competition, Housley was inducted into the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame in 2004 following his 21-year career in the National Hockey League. A first-round pick (sixth overall) by the Buffalo Sabres in the 1982 NHL Entry Draft, he spent the first eight years (1982-90) of his career there and, in 2007, was inducted into the Buffalo Sabres Hall of Fame. Housley finished his NHL career with 1,232 points (338-894), the most by any American defenseman.

Housley recently completed his ninth season as the head coach of the Stillwater (Minn.) High School boys' varsity ice hockey team.

A native of South St. Paul, Minn., Housley and his wife, Karin, reside in St. Mary's Point, Minn., and have four children, Taylor, Reide, Wilson and Avery.



**TIM
ARMY**
ASSISTANT COACH

Tim Army is serving as an assistant coach for the U.S. Men's National Team for the third time. Previously, he was an assistant for the 1994 and 1996 U.S. Men's National Teams, helping the 1996 squad capture the bronze medal at the International Ice Hockey Federation Men's World Championship.

Army also served as an assistant coach for the U.S. World Cup Team in 2004. In addition, Army was the head coach for the U.S. Under-18 Team at the 1995 and 1996 Pacific Cup. He was also the head coach of the U.S. Under-18 Select Team that placed second at the 2010 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament, the best result by a U.S. team since 2006.

Army has spent the last two seasons as an assistant coach for the National Hockey League's Colorado Avalanche.

Before joining Colorado, Army spent six seasons as the head coach of his alma mater's men's ice hockey team, Providence College. Under Army's guidance, the Friars were ranked as high as 11th nationally. Additionally, he guided his squad to an appearance in the Hockey East Tournament quarterfinals in 2006-07 and three Mayor's Cup trophies.

Prior to his position at PC, Army spent three seasons as the head coach of the Portland Pirates of the American Hockey League. He posted a 99-89-32-20 mark in 240 games with the Pirates. In his second season at Portland (2003-04), Army guided the Pirates to a record of 32-27-13-8 for 85 points as the team qualified for the Calder Cup Playoffs. Portland defeated the Providence Bruins in a first round series,

marking the franchise's first playoff series victory in six years. That season, Army's team set numerous franchise records, including highest penalty killing percentage (89.5 percent), fewest goals against in one season (160) and most shutouts in a season (17), which also tied the AHL mark.

Before his stint at Portland, Army spent nine seasons as an assistant coach in the NHL for two different teams. He worked for four seasons as an assistant with the Mighty Ducks of Anaheim (1993-97) and five years with the Washington Capitals (1997-02). While in Anaheim, Army coached the 1996-97 team that earned the franchise's first ever playoff berth. In his first year with the Capitals, Army helped lead the squad to the 1998 Stanley Cup Finals, the team's only appearance in the finals.

Army began his coaching career as an assistant at Providence College in 1987. He spent six seasons there, helping to lead the Friars to more than 20 wins in four of the six seasons. The Friars also posted a 116-87-18 overall record in that span, including appearances in the 1989 and 1991 NCAA Tournaments.

Army is one of the top players in Friar history. He ranks first all-time in games played (151), sixth in points (179), 11th in goals (71) and is tied for fourth in assists (108). He helped his squad post a 97-50-8 mark over four seasons, including the top single-season record ever at Providence in 1983 (33-10-0). The Friars won 20 or more games in each of his four seasons as a player and reached the Frozen Four twice (1983 and 1985).



DANTON COLE

ASSISTANT COACH

Danton Cole is serving as an assistant coach for the U.S. Men's National Team for the first time.

Cole completed his third season as a head coach with USA Hockey's National Team Development Program in April of 2013. He guided the U.S. National Under-17 Team during the 2012-13 campaign.

Cole served as head coach of Team USA at the 2012 International Ice Hockey Federation Men's Under-18 World Championship in Brno, Czech Republic. His gold-medal-winning squad went undefeated in the tournament, posting a perfect 6-0-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record while giving up only six goals throughout, an all-time tournament best.

The Pontiac, Mich., native got his first taste of international coaching experience when he served as an assistant coach for the U.S. Under-18 Select Team at the 2009 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament in Breclav, Czech Republic, and Piestany, Slovakia. However, Cole was no stranger to the international game, having played as a member of the U.S. Men's National Team at three IIHF Men's World Championships (1990, 1991, 1994), earning Outstanding U.S. Player recognition in 1991.

Prior to his time with the NTDP, Cole spent three years as head coach of the men's ice hockey team at the University of Alabama-Huntsville. He led the Chargers to their second-ever College Hockey America championship in 2010, as well as their second NCAA Division I Tournament berth in program history.

In addition to serving as a coach in the college ranks, Cole brings a wealth of experience coaching at the professional level. He served as head coach of the Grand Rapids Griffins, the American Hockey League affiliate of the Detroit Red Wings, from 2002-05. During that span, he became the winningest coach in team history with a

116-72-17-3 (W-L-T-OTL) record, while guiding the Griffins to the Calder Cup playoffs in both the 2002-03 and 2003-04 seasons.

Cole then spent part of 2004-05 and all of the 2005-06 season as the head coach of the United Hockey League's Motor City Mechanics before joining the college realm as an assistant coach at Bowling Green State University in 2006-07.

Cole's coaching career began in the 1999-2000 season when he was named an assistant coach for Grand Rapids, then of the International Hockey League. He spent one more season with the Griffins before earning his first job as a head coach with the Muskegon Fury of the UHL in 2001. During the 2001-02 season, he guided the Fury to a 48-22-0-4 (W-L-T-OTL) record and the Colonial Cup championship.

As a player, Cole appeared in 318 games in the National Hockey League from 1989-96, including stints with the Winnipeg Jets, Tampa Bay Lightning, New Jersey Devils, New York Islanders and Chicago Blackhawks. He was part of the Devils squad that earned its first Stanley Cup title in 1995.

Prior to embarking on his pro career, Cole was a four-year letterwinner at Michigan State University from 1985-89. While a Spartan, Cole appeared in 180 games and compiled 163 points (69-94). He was part of the Ron Mason-led Michigan State squad that captured the 1986 NCAA Division I Men's Ice Hockey Championship. In 1989, he received the Big Ten Medal of Honor as MSU's top student-athlete in both scholarship and achievement. Cole was named to three Central Collegiate Hockey Association All-Academic Teams and twice served as an assistant captain for the Spartans. He was named Most Valuable Player his senior season and graduated with a degree in finance. In 2013, the MSU hockey program honored Cole with its Distinguished Spartan Award for his achievements as a player and coach.



SCOTT MASTERS

VIDEO COORDINATOR

Scott Masters is serving as the video coordinator for the U.S. Men's National Team for the first time.

Masters has been a video coach in the National Hockey League for 11 of the last 12 seasons. He spent the 2012-13 campaign with the Colorado Avalanche. Prior to that he was the St. Louis Blues video coach from 2006-12. He was a volunteer assistant coach for the University of Denver men's ice hockey team in 2005-06. Masters began his career as a video coach with the Florida Panthers, spending four seasons there (2001-05).

A native of Arvada, Colo., Masters earned his communications degree from Colorado State in 2000. Scott and his wife, Carrie, reside in Denver, Colo., with their daughter Ryanne, and son, Ben.

Bob Webster, whose extensive involvement with USA Hockey spans five decades, returns as team leader of the U.S. Men's National Team for the ninth straight year.

Webster has worked with 15 previous U.S. Men's National Teams (1979, 1982, 1986-87, 1989-96, 2002-04) as an equipment manager. He served in a similar capacity for the 1998 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team, the gold medal-winning 1998 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team, the U.S. men's team that captured the World Cup of Hockey championship in 1996 and the U.S. Women's National Team from 1997-2002.

Webster first served as an apprentice equipment manager with the Omaha Knights of the Central Hockey League before moving on to the Roanoke Valley Rebels of the Southern Hockey League in 1975. In 1976, he joined the Colorado Rockies, serving as the team's equipment manager until 1981.

Webster currently works in sales in the construction industry in the Denver area. The Omaha, Neb., native and his wife, Jane, reside in Littleton, Colo. The couple has two children, Ryan and Shannon.

Additionally, Rogers was Team USA's equipment manager at the 2006 Olympic Winter Games in Torino, Italy, the 2004 World Cup of Hockey and the 2004 Deutschland Cup in Germany.

Rogers has spent the last 15 seasons with the National Hockey League's Nashville Predators as the club's head equipment manager. He worked his 1,500th game as an equipment manager in professional hockey on January 10, 2009, and his 1,000th game with the Predators on November 12, 2011.

Elected president of the Society of Professional Hockey Equipment Managers (SPHEM) in June 2012 after previously serving as its Western Conference representative, Rogers was the head equipment manager for the Eastern Conference All-Stars at the 2008 NHL All-Star game in Dallas.

ZENOBİ****ATHLETIC TRAINER**

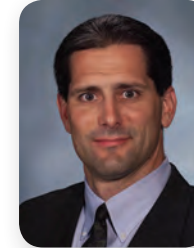
Dave Zenobi is serving as an athletic trainer for the U.S. Men's National Team for the first time.

He also directs communications for USA Hockey-hosted events, including the 2011 International Ice Hockey Federation World Junior Championship, in Niagara and Buffalo, N.Y. that proved to be the most successful and attended event ever hosted by USA Hockey.

Fischer has served on the NCAA Men's Frozen Four staff since 1989 and was a media liaison at the 1993 U.S. Olympic Festival in San Antonio, Texas.

PRESIDENT

Ron DeGregorio's leadership is a major reason why USA Hockey has evolved into arguably the leading hockey federation in the world today.

From championing the USA Hockey SafeSport Program in 2012 to helping fuel national support for passage of the organization's Progressive Checking Skill Development Program in 2011, DeGregorio's commitment to advancing the sport is on-going.

His ingenuity is evident throughout the organization, but perhaps nothing as visible as USA Hockey's National Team Development Program. A lightning rod for criticism in the U.S. when it was established in 1996, the NTDP has evolved into a revered program and has significantly influenced U.S. success in international competition.

DeGregorio, who continues to play hockey today, was elected president of USA Hockey on June 14, 2003, and unanimously re-elected to his fourth term on June 10, 2012.

His first appointment with USA Hockey came in 1973 when he was named registrar for the New England District. As registrar, DeGregorio oversaw the reorganization of the district into several smaller, more manageable affiliates. He was also the first registrar to appoint associate registrars, which helped increase USA Hockey's efficiency and visibility at the local level.

DeGregorio was first elected to the USA Hockey Board of Directors in 1975 and was the organization's first vice president of youth hockey. In the 1980s, he served as treasurer of USA Hockey. In 1995, he was elected as a vice president and the international council chairperson, positions he held until being named president.

He has represented the USA at countless events during his tenure with USA Hockey. His first official role came as team leader of Team East at the 1979 United States Olympic Festival, from which the 1980 "Miracle On Ice" U.S. Olympic Ice Hockey Team was chosen.

DeGregorio also served as team leader for the 1994 U.S. Olympic Ice Hockey Team that competed in Lillehammer, Norway. DeGregorio has represented the USA at the 1998, 2002, 2006 and 2010 Olympic Winter Games and at numerous International Ice Hockey Federation World Junior Championships, IIHF Men's World Championships and IIHF Women's World Championships. He has also been a member of the United States delegation at IIHF meetings and conferences as international council chairperson.

The former Middlebury (Vt.) College goaltender is known throughout Massachusetts as the originator of the "Mini One-on-One," a youth hockey competition that is broadcast through the Boston Bruins' television network. DeGregorio was distinguished with the National Hockey League's Lester Patrick Trophy in 2002 in recognition of his outstanding service to ice hockey in the United States.

DeGregorio served on the Board of Directors of the United States Olympic Committee's Pan-American and Olympic Captive Insurance Program and was also involved in professional hockey as one of three principal owners of the former American Hockey League Kentucky Thoroughblades.

DeGregorio is president of the PenFacs Group, an investment and insurance firm specializing in the design, administration and funding of executive benefit plans. He has four grown children and three grandchildren and resides in Salem, N.H., with his wife Susan.

It would be hard to find a more accomplished executive in the Olympic family than Dave Ogrian.

A Connecticut native, Ogrian returned to USA Hockey as executive director on Aug. 1, 2005, after previously holding the same position from 1993-99. Ogrian began his career in the sports industry with the organization (then the Amateur Hockey Association of the United States) as its director of public relations in 1978.

Under his leadership since 2005, USA Hockey created a new department for membership development that has helped in the resurgence of growth in youth hockey in the U.S., including attracting more than 100,000 players in the eight-and-under age category for the first time in the organization's history; guided the development of the USA Hockey SafeSport Program to continue and enhance the organization's leadership role among amateur sports entities in providing a safe environment for all involved in the game; gained rights to host IIHF World Championships at all levels; and began an annual nationwide celebration called Hockey Weekend Across America; and focused efforts on raising the profile of the USA Hockey Foundation.

Among his many accomplishments during his first term as executive director, Ogrian oversaw a significant increase in membership and revenue, and the construction of the current national headquarters; helped create the National Team Development Program; was a driving force in establishing the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, presented annually to the top player in women's college ice hockey; and developed the concept of STAR (Serving the American Rinks) with U.S. Figure Skating.

Before returning to Colorado Springs, Ogrian served as executive director of USA Football from 2002-05 after he was recruited by the National Football League and NFL Players' Association to build a new, independent, non-profit organization to support and promote the sport of amateur football at all levels.

Prior to joining USA Football, Ogrian served as president and CEO of the Colorado Springs Sports Corporation where he led the development and creation of the Colorado Springs Sports Hall of Fame and the Rocky Mountain State Games.

From 1999-2000, Ogrian worked for the United States Olympic Committee as deputy executive director of marketing. While there, he led the USOC team that, together with the Salt Lake organizing committee, generated almost \$200 million.

Previously, Ogrian served the USOC from 1990-93 as director of broadcasting. He was responsible for creating the initial broadcast division and generated over \$12 million in revenue as well as unprecedented exposure for the national governing bodies of Olympic sports.

From 1980-88, Ogrian worked at ESPN in corporate communications and programming.

Following a successful eight years at ESPN, Ogrian joined the College Football Association as assistant executive director for television.

Ogrian received his Bachelor of Arts degree in English from the University of Connecticut (1974) and his master's degree in film from Boston University (1978).

Listed among *The Sporting News*' Top 100 Most Powerful People in Sports from 1993-99, Ogrian is currently among *The Hockey News*' Top 50 People of Power and Influence.

He is a member of the U.S. Olympic Committee Board of Directors and serves on the USOC Audit Committee, Olympic Bid Working Group, USOC Strategic Planning Committee and Paralympic Advisory Committee. He is also a member of the nominating committee for the U.S. Olympic Hall of Fame and served on the United States Olympic Committee CEO Search Committee in 2009.

Additionally, Ogrian is active in the Colorado Springs community, serving on the El Pomar Foundation Pikes Peak Regional Council and the board of directors for the Colorado Springs World Arena.

Dave and his wife Maryellen have three grown children: son Matt, and daughters Tracy and Dana.



TONY ROSSI

**VICE PRESIDENT,
INTERNATIONAL COUNCIL CHAIR**

Outside of a highly successful business career, Tony Rossi has generously donated significant time, resources and expertise to USA Hockey for more than 30 years at the grassroots and executive leadership levels.

After beginning his volunteer career with the National Governing Body in the mid-1970s, Rossi was elected to the USA Hockey Board of Directors in 1983 and served as a director from the Central District until 1988. In 1989, he was elected to the USA Hockey Executive Committee, serving as secretary from 1989-95. In 1995, Rossi transitioned to the role of USA Hockey treasurer, a position he held until June 2003.

In his role as both secretary and treasurer, Rossi helped guide the formation and growth of The USA Hockey Foundation, a charitable and educational non-profit corporation that provides long-range financial support for USA Hockey and promotes the growth of hockey in the United States.

In June of 2003, Rossi was elected to his current post as USA Hockey vice president and international council chair. In his role, Rossi works closely with the organization's National and Olympic Team programs, as well as the International Ice Hockey Federation during a host of global competitions held throughout the year. He was elected to the IIHF Council in May of 2008 and re-elected in 2012.

Rossi also serves as president for RMK Management Corporation and Moran & Company.

He resides in Chicago with his wife, Marie, and has four children, Elena, Deanna, Michael, and Tony, Jr.



WALTER L. BUSH, JR.

CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD

One of the most recognized and respected leaders in hockey, Walter L. Bush, Jr., is the chairman of the board for USA Hockey, a position he has held since June 2003.

Bush has served as a member of the organization's Board of Directors since 1959 and became president of USA Hockey in June 1986, following Wm. Thayer Tutt and Tom Lockhart. He served in the capacity for 17 years before taking his current position as chairman of the board. In recognition of his 45th year of service to USA Hockey, the organization dedicated its national headquarters as The Walter L. Bush, Jr. Center in June of 1999.

Bush retired as a member of the International Ice Hockey Federation Council in May 2008 after a 23-year stint, the last 14 years as a vice president of the organization. Bush served on numerous committees within the IIHF, including as chair of the IIHF Women's Ice Hockey Committee, the IIHF Inline Hockey Committee and the Selection Committee for the IIHF Hall of Fame from its inception. As chairman of the IIHF Women's Ice Hockey Committee, Bush was instrumental in organizing the first IIHF Women's World Championship. He also led the successful charge that made women's ice hockey a medal sport in the Olympic Winter Games beginning in 1998 in Nagano, Japan. Bush has been involved in hockey as a player, coach, manager, administrator and team owner. His hockey background includes having played at the high school, college and senior levels. His senior team won three Minnesota state championships and, from there, Bush became involved in team management. He managed the 1959 U.S. National Team at the IIHF World Championship, and, in 1964, he served as general manager of the 1964 Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team.

Bush was named special assistant to U.S. Olympic Committee President Bill Hybl for the U.S. Delegation at the 1998 Olympic Winter Games in Nagano, Japan.

Bush was president of the Minnesota Amateur Hockey Association for three years and was owner and president of the minor league Minneapolis Bruins from 1963-65.

He later led a group of businessmen in securing a National Hockey League franchise - the Minnesota North Stars - for the Twin Cities area. He served as the North Stars' first president from 1967-76 and later became chairman of the board. Bush spent 17 years in the NHL working with a variety of committees. Afterward, he was active in professional hockey as a principal owner of the American Hockey League Kentucky Thoroughblades.

Bush received the Olympic Order from the International Olympic Committee, the highest honor in the Olympic movement.

Bush was elected to the IIHF Hall of Fame in 2009 and the Hockey Hall of Fame in 2000. He received the NHL's Lester Patrick Award in 1973 in recognition of his outstanding service to ice hockey in the United States. He was enshrined in the United States Hockey Hall of Fame in 1980 and, in 1989, was elected to the Minnesota Sports Hall of Fame. He currently serves as a governor for the Hockey Hall of Fame in Toronto.

Bush, who was honored with the U.S. Olympic Foundation's inaugural George M. Steinbrenner III Sport Leadership Award in 2006, resides in Naples, Fla., with his wife, Sis. He has a daughter, Anne Hanson, and two sons, Walter III and Steven.

The U.S. Men's National Team won six of its first seven games at the 2012 IIHF World Men's Championship, including an overtime victory vs. Canada, achieving its best start in the tournament since 1939. The U.S. dropped a heartbreaking decision to tournament co-host Finland in the quarterfinals and despite winning six of its eight games in the tournament finished seventh of 16 teams. Max Pacioretty tied for the tournament lead with 10 assists, while his 12 points (2-10) led Team USA and tied for fifth among all players. Team USA's three best players of the tournament were goaltender Jimmy Howard (3-2-0-2, 2.42 GAA, .911 SV%, 1 SO), defenseman Justin Faulk (4-4) and forward Paul Stastny (3-6).

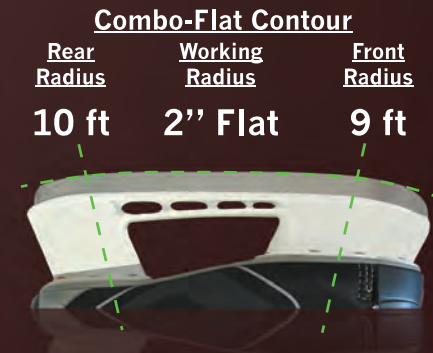
