PASTOR'S REPORT

I consider everything a loss, compared to the surpassing greatness of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. Phil. 3:8

That was our theme verse for 2011, and I pray that it became more of a reality for every one of our members. I preached from this text at the beginning of the year, and sought to keep it before our eyes frequently on as many occasions as possible. It was the heading at the email prayer chain notices that went out every week. Has Jesus become more of a treasure in your life? Will He become increasingly so this year and throughout your life?

It was this theme verse that led me to begin preaching through the Gospel of Luke more than a year ago. I am continuing that series through this year as well. This keeps our focus on Jesus as we examine His person and work week by week. I pray that as we study what the Gospel tells us about His teaching and His character, this will make Him more central in your thinking and more influential in your living. We're continuing to work our way through Luke this year.

One of the major emphases this past year has been "cultivating an outreach mentality." The Lord opened up an opportunity for us to do that through flood relief for our neighbors in the Stockade immediately after the disaster in August with meals, encouragement, and an invitation for them to join us at our annual picnic right here on the grounds. Another of the ways we have been doing that is through the training available through "Evangelism Explosion." Nine of us from First Pres attended a three day training seminar on Long Island last summer. We brought that "Everyday Evangelism" ministry back with us and had 35 from First Pres attend an initial one day "Share Your Faith Workshop" here in Mekeel Hall. I augmented that with a series of sermons, going through the basic gospel outline … grace-man-God-Christ-faith. From that, 15 participated in the seven week "on the job" training, with a class each Wednesday evening before we went out on the streets to present the gospel. That will continue this current year.

Officer and leadership training was also a focus for me this year. It has apparently been many years since a structured pattern of training for officer candidates was offered here. I have developed a new approach to that with a series of nine self-study and then class discussion sessions. There is now a manual that we can follow each year to insure that those men who are ordained to office are better equipped to carry out those responsibilities.

My report must also include – with great thanks and appreciation – those many members who are using their spiritual gifts to build up the body here at First Pres. The Scriptures teach us that the Holy Spirit has distributed spiritual gifts to every believer. Our church has one pastor but many ministers – hopefully every one of you. Faithful saints are using their spiritual gifts each week in Sunday School classes, home Bible study groups, youth and children's ministries, committees, nurseries, Jail Ministry, the Friendship Center, administrative-financial-maintenance work, and music ministry. Jesus commends every one of you with the words, "Well done, good and faithful servant."

NEHEMIAH B. BASSETT TRUST FUND

David C. Pearson and W. Thomas Bird, Trustees

The Bassett Fund income each year is used to support students in seminary and for other Christian educational causes. The principal in this account as of December 31, 2011 was \$108,556. The investment portfolio consists of Money Market funds, Notes, Corporate Bonds and U.S. Government Securities. The return on the fun for calendar 2011 was approximately 5.42%. The income from the fund totaled \$5,971.04 and was distributed as follows:

Nehemiah B. Bassett was a member of First Presbyterian Church from 1823 until he died in 1844. Upon his death he left a trust to the church in the amount of \$9,994.00. Because of the difficulty in finding candidates to fulfill the terms of the trust, the fund lay dormant for many years. A future court order was rendered permitting the funds to be used for Christian education. It is a pleasure to administer this fund. Mr. Wallace Campbell officially resigned as Fund Trustee on July 13, 2010, after 39 years of faithful service and oversight of the fund.

A report of this trust is filed each year with the Session of our church.

JOSEPH & ROSE VERTUCCI BELAK EDUCATIONAL FUND

The Joseph & Rose Vertucci Belak Educational Fund was first established in 1983 at the death of Rose and in 1990 was added to with the death of Joseph. It has been used for the education of young people for the purposes of sharing Christ with others. It is with deep joy and appreciation that we acknowledge the vision of Joe and Rose and their love for the Lord Jesus as they continue to assist this generation to be prepared for sharing the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ. The value of the fund on Dec 31, 2011 is \$93,328.

MARY VERTUCCI D'AMICO WORSHIP FUND

Mary D'Amico was associated with our church for many years. Upon her untimely death in August 1995, her husband Joseph D'Amico, her sister Carmella Ciaranello and her brother Dr. Anthony Vertucci established a trust fund in her memory. In 2010 this fund was added to at the death of Joseph D'Amico. This fund is to provide resources for First Presbyterian Church to use in worship services of the church. It may be used for the enhancement of the church building, any needed items for worship or for worship programs. Current plans are to use some of these funds to restore the church pipe organ. The value of the fund on Dec 31, 2011 is \$17,263.

CARING COMMITTEE OF SESSION

The Caring Committee has the responsibility for assisting in providing for the spiritual and physical needs of all members and adherents here at First Presbyterian Church. The committee organizes the Caring Units, has oversight of the Home Group ministry, facilitates the Church Introduction Class, and interviews new members prior to a meeting with Session. A new ministry, Prime Timers, is organizationally under the Caring Committee. The group is headed by Dick Rose and meets monthly for fellowship and a fun activity. During 2011, the committee also reestablished the greeters following the 11:00 service. An activity in progress is a new church picture directory.

Caring Units: Due to the size of our church, it is a practical matter that the pastor is provided assistance in caring for the needs of all. Our congregation of about 410 members and adherents is divided among 14 Caring Units. Each unit has an Elder/Deacon team appointed to care for the needs of those people. These Elder/Deacon teams and the people in each unit are identified on a bulletin

board in Mekeel Hall adjacent to the coffee area.

Home Group Ministry: There were 11 Home Group Bible Studies in 2011 with a total participation of about 135 people. The groups were hosted at individual homes located throughout most of our geographical area. The subject material chosen by each group included both topical studies as well as books of the Bible. We praise the Lord for the willing hosts and leaders and the enthusiastic participation.

Church Introduction Class: There were two Church Introduction Classes in 2011, one in the spring and one in the fall. The intro class covers what it means to be a Christian, a Presbyterian, and a member of 1st Pres. Those attending the class are under no obligation to join the church. Those who would like to join are interviewed by members of the Caring Committee and are then presented for membership by Session interview. There were 16 people who joined 1st Pres from the spring and fall classes of 2011. Those folks were:

Prime Timers Senior Ministry

Annual Report Dick Rose, Coordinator

Prime Timers is a new ministry whose purpose is to provide the senior population of First Presbyterian Church with opportunities for service, for social engagements, and for encouragement through Christian fellowship. Oversight of the ministry is being provided by the Caring Committee.

Participation is open to any persons regularly associated with the church who are fifty-five and older or who have a spouse fifty-five or older. Guests will be welcomed at any of our activities thereby offering an opportunity for outreach.

Prime Timers has a program facilitator, me, ably assisted by my wife Betty. It is anticipated that various members will participate in the planning and leading individual events in the future.

Our usual meeting time is the third Friday of each month at Mekeel Hall although many activities will require both a different time and place.

Prime Timers made its debut at the Ministry Fair in September followed closely by its first event – lunch September 25th following the eleven o'clock service. Fifty-five seniors heard details about the group and added their input through survey sheets. Then they happily chatted and consumed sloppy joes.

Then thirty-six of us made the trip from Lenox to Stockbridge on the Berkshire Scenic Railroad on October 15th. We ate lunch at Michael's Restaurant and visited the local shops before returning to Lenox.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE of SESSION

Chairman: David Vincent

Areas of oversight for this committee include: Women's ministries, Men's ministries, Sunday School – all ages, VBS, and libraries.

Adult Sunday School should strive to offer at least three classes from among these four areas: 1. Bible study, 2. Topical/doctrinal, 3. Devotional, and 4. Other topics of interest. The committee confirmed that all curricula, volunteer teachers, and study topics and materials should receive Pastoral review, including the same for the various Women's Ministry Bible studies.

The committee endorsed three initiatives for 2011:

I. How can we create a Christ-centered environment that encourages our teens to not only become strong Christians, but also to grow in the fellowship of our church? Question: should we have a teen communicants' class (ages 13, 14) or should we expect teens to attend a church introduction class with adults? The committee agreed by affirmation that teens should have their own class, perhaps six sessions or so, specifically tailored to their age and interest, and not during the Sunday School hour. Pastor Roff will continue working toward that end.

II. Start developing a vision for a marriage retreat: Al and Bonnie MaGill moved forward on this idea, enlisting the aid of Bill and Helen Challener and others, to dialogue with Paul and Virginia Friesen (Home Improvement Ministries www.HIMweb.org) and begin working toward a time and place for a married couples' retreat in the fall of 2012. It was decided that trying to find an acceptable time during the year to sponsor a marriage retreat is very difficult. Summer is out, winter poses major holidays and storm threats. Fall is dominated by Missions Conference in Oct and Men's Retreat in early Nov. The Women's Retreat is in late spring. It has been felt that many people would only justify the expense of a retreat once a year. The current proposal is to have a marriage retreat about every 4 years, and ask Men's Ministry and Women's Ministry to each give up a year, which would mean not having their own retreat once every eight years. MM has agreed to not have a retreat in the fall of 2012 in order to free up the fall for a marriage retreat.

III. Develop a program, probably for an evening service, to celebrate the 400th anniversary of the Bible in the "common tongue" – the King James Bible. By affirmation the committee declared June 12, 2011 "King James Version Day."

Various classes for adult Sunday School included a continuing study of Corinthians taught by David McKeon, a class on Evangelism, a study based on the book "Out of the Saltshaker" by Rebecca Pippert, a study of Romans taught by Pastor Roff, and a class based on growing as a Christian by overcoming sin using Kris Lungaard's book, "The Enemy Within: Straight Talk About the Power and Defeat of Sin" taught by Lamont Truttling. The summer series included a class on Creationism and Intelligent Design taught by Neal Cummings and Tom Salamone, and a class on Islam taught by Emad Andarawis.

Men's Ministry events included a focus on the 9/30/2011 release of the movie "Courageous" and the men's fall retreat at Camp Pinnacle on November 4-6, 2011. The retreat theme, Finishing Well, was from II Tim. 4:7, "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith." Rev. Ned Suffern from Redeemer RP Church, Queensbury, was the guest presenter.

Church Library 2011 Annual Report

Collection Development:

Books: 1,850 Videos: 277 We added 41 books this year, discarded 883, and removed the records of 280 lost/stolen books.

Circulation:

We circulated fewer than100 books this year.

Weeding Project:

In December of 2010 I began an extensive, long overdue inventory of the collection to determine which other books are missing and probably will never be returned. This project was completed by May, with the able assistance of Ross Meo. It resulted in the elimination of 1,063 titles from the database of books that we have or used to have in the library. Of these, about 280 were records of books that had been taken and never returned over the last 17 years. The other 883 books were ones that were so old, in such poor shape, or so culturally irrelevant as to not be worthy of being kept anymore. Many were duplicates; some were outdated, some were reference books that had never been used in 17 years. We found good homes for all the books in usable condition. A few were in such poor condition that they were simply dumped.

Audiotapes were disposed of. Videotapes, though never used anymore, remain in the library. We own DVDs and CDs, but have had no time to catalog them and get them ready to use.

I did a 'library moment' during worship service several times this year. I have made plans with Pastor Roff to do library moments a few times in 2012.

Collection

We added 41 new books into the collection over the course of the year, including sme new Christmas books to replace lost/stolen ones.

Long-Standing Needs:

Someone to write reviews of the new books and publish them in the church bulletin/newsletter.

Looking Ahead:

We need to purchase fresh, new books on current topics of interest to the congregation such as recovery ministry and ministering to families with special needs children, etc. We also need to spend money in 2012 purchasing and shelving electronic media including Christian music on CDs.

Sunday School

We continue to use the *Show me Jesus* Curriculum from Great Commission Publications for Sunday School for ages 4yrs-6th grade. For 2011 our Elementary Superintendent was Terry Leib. The preschool superintendent position is vacant, I continue to fulfill the jobs responsibilities for that position.

For Summer Sunday School we also used the *Show Me Jesus* curriculum from Great Commission. Classes were divided into 2 age groups, 4 & 5 year olds, and $1^{st} - 6^{th}$ graders. Sixth graders were given the option of attending either children's or youth Sunday School or adult Sunday School with their parents. Summer Sunday School classes were taught by several adult volunteers as well as Terry Leib and Lindy Gower.

Our Sunday School teachers beginning in the fall of 2010 were: 4's & 5's: Nancy Bodenstab, 1st & 2nd grade: Kathleen Mancuso; 3rd & 4th grade: Carol Pearson; 5th & 6th grade: Beth Jackson. Several adult volunteers provide nursery care for children ages 0-3 during the Sunday School hour.

The elementary Sunday School classes again participated in the Operation Christmas Child Project. The entire congregation was invited to participate as well. Sixty seven boxes were collected.

The memory work program continues in the Elementary Department with children being able to earn camp or book awards for completing memory work for the year. The honors memory work program has been updated to correspond to three CD's from the Seeds Family Worship Music Collection. Each grade level has a CD that corresponds to the memory for both year at that level. Each CD put verses to music to help the children in the memorization.

Thank You to our Superintendent, Terry Leib, Sunday School teachers and helpers for loving, teaching and serving our children.

Nursery

Many dedicated volunteers continue to serve in our nurseries; their service is very important and greatly appreciated. New quarterly nursery schedules for all Sunday nurseries, as well as special services are completed on an ongoing basis. Use of the sign-in number board paging system for both nurseries is running smoothly and is helpful in paging parents when needed.

Kid's Zone

Kid's Zone programming remains in place on Wednesday evenings. There were a few small changes to the schedule this year to move the Kids Zone ending time a little earlier. Kids Zone now begins at 6:30 and ends at 7:30 for the 4,5 & 6 year old class and ends at 7:45 for the 2nd-6th grade class. There is always positive feedback from parents when activities end earlier rather than later. The 2011 Kid's Zone year ended in May with a Fun Fair. There were at least 30 children in attendance along with a large number of volunteers and quite a few visitors. The Fun Fair is always a highlight of the year with games, prizes, face painting, and balloon animals.

For the 2010-2011 year both the 4, 5 & 6 year old class as well as 2^{nd} - 6th grade class used materials from Pioneer Clubs. The younger class was taught by several adult volunteers, although

finding adequate help was a difficult and volunteers were generally scheduled on a week by week basis. This difficulty led to a question of whether or not this class would be able to be offered for the 2011-2012 year. Thankfully Dave and Tammy Mills stepped in to lead the class and it was able to continue in the fall of 2011.

For 2011-2012 Dave and Tammy Mills began leading the 4, 5 & 6 year old Kids Zone class. They spent the first half of the year using a curriculum unit from Group Publishing from the Hands on Bible series. The second half of the year they will use a unit from Group's Buzz curriculum. The 2nd-6th grade class began studying about wisdom and will be using lesson materials from John's Pipers ministry, Children Desiring God.

For the 2011 Missions Conference in October Dan McBride spent the entire evening with the children doing a Bible lesson, activities and singing. Dan did a wonderful job sharing with the children about the work he and his family did in their ministry in Tanzania.

Thank you to all of our Kid's Zone teachers, leaders and all volunteers for their service at Kid's Zone each week.

Junior Choir

In 2011 Junior Choir met for seven weeks during our Lenten Dinner series. The children then sang for the 8:15 and 11am service on Easter Sunday. Starting in Fall of 2010 Junior Choir was incorporated into Kids Zone as an activity unit. Many parents found it difficult to commit their children to do choir for the entire year and numbers in choir had been quite low, to the point that choir would not be able to continue. In the fall of 2011 children again met for a second six week session of Junior Choir and sang at a Sunday morning worship service as well as for the Special Choir Christmas Cantata. Thank you to Elinore Farnum for a wonderful job leading choir and to Amanda Bigham for her excellent job assisting with choir.

Vacation Bible School

Karen Cummings served as the director for VBS. Karen did a wonderful job leading our Road Race 2011 VBS program. The children enjoyed a variety of activities for the race car themed program including music, crafts, snack, daily Bible drama lesson, and games. We had approximately fifty three children participate in the program. Special thanks to our director Karen Cummings and the many volunteers who did such an excellent job with VBS. The program could not happen without you.

EVANGELISM COMMITTEE OF SESSION

The Evangelism Committee's mission is: *To train and support believers in evangelism to penetrate our society with the gospel of Jesus Christ.*

To carry out the mission we believe that:

Every Christian has the responsibility to reach out to non-Christians in his or her sphere of influence.

The most culturally relevant and effective evangelism takes place through personal relationships rather than impersonal methods.

Christians should be loving and patient with non-believers as they work through the process of making a commitment to Jesus Christ.

Our Goals are to:

- 1. Enable Christians to effectively communicate the gospel and defend their faith.
- 2. Encourage Christians to build relational bridges with non-Christians.

Our ministry includes:

Following up guests – In this year at least 67 local people visited our church. Many visited only once, but some came back a number of times, and some of them have joined our fellowship. A pastoral letter is being sent to each guest. Also, our congregational members are being encouraged to make a personal effort to get acquainted with our guests.

Evangelism Training – In the winter quarter Pastor Roff led an evangelistic Sunday school class, "Out of the Salt Shaker and into the World" which was attended by over 30. In August 9 of us attended a 3-day "Everyday Evangelism" training seminar. Shortly after that over 30 of us attended an all day "Sharing Your Faith" workshop. Following the workshop Pastor Roff launched a 7-week training course that 15 of us attended. First Pres has taken a major step toward personal evangelism. Our goal is to train many in our congregation to be effective in sharing the gospel with not yet Christians.

Outreach - During 2011 we continued to reach out to our Stockade neighbors. We invited Stockade residents to our Lenten dinners and several came. In September the Stockade "Walkabout" attracted visitors that toured our sanctuary. The most dramatic event took place in August as we reached out to the flood victims. A large number of our congregation prepared food and personally took it to the weary homeowners as they were desperately cleaning up the flood damage. Following that help we invited everyone involved in the flood, including first responders to our church picnic. It was a very heart warming event attended by approximately 200.

Lenten Activities – During the Lenten season we sponsored seven dinners with outstanding speakers. The average attendance, including many guests, averaged about 180, and many complimented us on the delicious food and inspiring messages.

Prayer After Morning Services – This year we initiated the opportunity for those with prayer needs to be ministered to immediately after morning services. Teams of elders and their wives and other volunteers have ministered to many and continue to serve this year.

In Conclusion - We have a very dedicated Evangelism committee, but we need the effort of all in our congregation to spread the good news of salvation. Take that first step with your friends and loved ones to be sure that they understand the importance of what Jesus said in Matthew 6:33 - *"But seek first His kingdom and His righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well."*

MISSIONS COMMITTEE OF SESSION

2011 Giving for Budgeted Needs

Our 2011 Missionary Budget was set at \$368,700, which was the same as budgeted in 2010. Receipts toward our 2011 budget were \$358,116.45 (96.65 percent of the budget). Actual disbursements for 2011 were \$356,342.07; leaving a surplus of \$1,774.38. When an earthquake and tsunami devastated Japan on 22 March \$4,665 was collected to provide relief through World Relief, Samaritans Purse and MTW. Another \$952 was collected to provide relief through Samaritans Purse and MNA when tornados struck several southern states

We continue to praise the Lord for allowing us to meet our missionary financial needs in 2011. The \$1,774.38 we have to distribute, as a result of some line items not being completely spent, will be disbursed to provide needed additional support, reduce deficits, and meet special needs for a few of our missionaries and mission organizations.

Caring for our missionaries is more than just giving money, however. The Missions Committee is strongly convinced that God works through the local church in the ordaining, commissioning, sending, and supporting of missionaries. We desire to be a vital part of their lives. We want to know about their needs, their cares, their victories, their defeats, how their children are doing, and how we can help. In this way we can offer help when help is needed, whether that be material, emotional or spiritual help. To that end, each Sunday we provide a missionary prayer insert in the bulletin highlighting prayer and praise items from several of our missionaries on a rotating schedule. We provide opportunities for our missionaries to visit and share with the congregation, and through the Christmas Missionary Offering we provide a special monetary gift to each of our missionaries.

Remember this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously. Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work. As it is written: "He has scattered abroad his gifts to the poor; his righteousness endures forever." Now he who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will also supply and increase your store of seed and will enlarge the harvest of your righteousness. You will be made rich in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God. This service that you perform is not only supplying the needs of God's people but is also overflowing in many expressions of thanks to God. Because of the service by which you have proved yourselves, men will praise God for the obedience that accompanies your confession of the gospel of Christ, and for your generosity in sharing with them and with everyone else. Outreach Committee

2011 was as usual a busy one for the Outreach Committee. The focus of this committee is service to the community. The areas that the Outreach Committee was involved in are:

Jail Ministry at Schenectady County Correctional Facility Year 2011

SCHENECTADY COUNTY JAIL: The year 2011 was a remarkable year for our ministry team, serving the Lord at the Schenectady County Correctional Facility. There was not a single Sunday during the year that we were denied entry to conduct Sunday morning worship services with the men. The jail staff is appreciated for their assistance every Sunday and at other times.

Another remarkable happening is that 47 men prayed in 2011 either to ask Jesus to be Lord and Savior or to rededicate their lives to Christ. However, the task of mentoring and discipling these men has been difficult, as they often are released or transferred to state prison before we have a good

chance to minister to them individually. For new or rededicated Christians, we visit them on weekdays to more fully explain the Gospel and to help them grow in their faith and walk with the Lord.

During the fall, John Morris provided two series of evening classes of Charles Stanley's Letting Go of Anger video presentation with follow up discussion. In early 2012, we are offering to selected inmates the Navigator Design for Discipleship study to help them grow and mature in their faith.

Men are being fed the Word, encouraged and challenged in this ministry, which has been ongoing for 60-plus years. We believe we are simply called to serve at the jail, as faithful witnesses for our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. In addition, a few women from our church go into the jail on Saturdays to lead a Bible study with women inmates. Another group of men, lead by Brian Merriam, provide a Bible study every Saturday morning for the men inmates.

The Pen Pal correspondence ministry serves over 20 inmates in state prisons, most of whom came through our local jail ministry. The ideal goal, with adequate resources, is to mentor each of the men or women who profess Christ, continually through the prison system, to discharge and beyond. At Christmas, the Deacons and volunteers distributed gifts to every inmate in the jail.

We are hopeful of providing mentoring and discipleship to a few men who will be released later this year or next. This after-care ministry to former inmates from the county jail or state prison has had only partial success over many years.

Please pray for: a) men and women to help in this vital ministry, b) openness among inmates to receive the Good News by faith, and c) follow-up and mentoring of new and recommitted Christians. Faithful men serving in this ministry as we begin the year 2012 are Peter Butryn, Rennie Basdeo, Ron Compo, George Contreras, Larry Denham, David Geisinger, Ron Hastings, Ken Kottke, Bruce Lewis, David McKeon, John Morris, Tim Pennings, Al Steinbach, and Lamont Truttling.

If you have Christian publications that you would like to donate to the jail ministry they would be appreciated. We could use some paperback books (no hardbound book allowed) that focus on Christian living, growing in faith, provide testimonies, etc. We could also use devotionals and Decision magazines. Please no Christianity Today or Moody magazines – we need publications that present the Christian message simply.

HERITAGE HOME FOR WOMEN - coordinated by Ron Compo. Each Sunday afternoon we have a 30 minute service that is open to all the ladies that are resident in this facility. It is always a joy and a delight for the team members to visit this home and lead the singing and then share a message from God's word. The service is held in the main common room and the attendance ranges from 15 to 20. CITY MISSION - coordinated by Matthew Butts. We presently have a three-fold ministry at the Mission. First of all, we have a Sunday Evening service once per month. Our church also serves at the evening dinner program several times a year. And finally, the Outreach Committee was responsible for the City Mission food drive which was held twice during in 2011. We also wish to thank the people who are involved in this vital ministry.

BAPTIST HEALTH - coordinated by David McClelland. We have been going into this facility since the 1980's and we provide a worship service the first and third Sundays of each month. The worship teams are comprised of a speaker, a piano accompanist for the hymns, and 5-6 helpers to assist residents to and from the service. Should any of our church members feel the calling of the Lord to be involved in this ministry please contact any of deacons.

TRACT MINISTRY - coordinated by Matthew Butts. Tracts are supplied at the tract racks at the church and Mekeel Hall, and locations in town such as the bus station and the YMCA. The tri-fold First Pres tract has been used extensively this year. We also use tracts in the many Christmas gift packages we give to people.

CHRISTMAS GIFTS – The deacons bought and passed out over 500 gifts. With our limited resources once again we have concentrated our gift giving on the places we have an ongoing ministry - the places mentioned above. Thank you to members of the congregation that contribute funds through the year to support this ministry.

Service Committee

The Service Committee of the Deacons had a very productive year in 2011. We were called upon to serve the congregation several times with assistance in home repair, and significant thanks goes to David Gascoyne who continued to help in this role when he could. We enlisted the help of other deacons and volunteers who braved the July heat to help in the relocation of one church member from her apartment to another one close by. We had a record breaking year for raising funds for Camp Scholarships, with over \$4,000 raised at Elinore Farnum's annual recital, and more than a dozen scholarships awarded. Operations board helped us tremendously by removing the pulpit and front barricade from the front of the church, allowing the audience to better view Elinore in what many called her best performance yet. The service committee also has heartfelt thanks to the Deaconesses, who prepared over a dozen gift baskets for each of Easter and Christmas seasons, which our committee hand-delivered to each of the recipients.

The CD ministry led by Eric Fiveland records and archives all church services and many of our special activities and makes them available for our church family. Several hundred CDs were produced this year.

The Congregational Committee provided the planning and preparation for the annual Church Picnic which was to be held at River Road Park in Niskayuna. However due to Hurricane Irene this event

was postponed and eventually rescheduled as an outreach event, on the Church ground, to those in the Stockade that suffered from flooding. Many people from the congregation attended and brought food to share to the dozen or so people that came from the area.

From November 4 - November 6, 30 men attended a special fall weekend retreat at beautiful Camp Pinnacle in the Helderberg Mountains overlooking Albany, N.Y. The guest speaker was Ned Suffern, Pastor of Redeemer Reformed Presbyterian Church in Queensbury, N.Y. The theme, "Finishing Well" was based on II Timothy 4:7-8:

"I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith."

Pastor Ned explored this theme with the men during 4 well-prepared sessions through-out the weekend. The men enjoyed breaking up into small groups for discussion and prayer, a time of worship each morning before breakfast, and a Sunday morning worship service with communion.

Everyone enjoyed the excellent food prepared by the staff at the camp! The men especially enjoyed fellowship with each other by helping the camp with several work projects, and through various recreational activities and games. For the first time, in 2011, a group team competition (indoor volleyball game) was tried, with gag prizes presented after dinner. This was lots of fun and well-received by the men!

On December 3rd a Church-wide event was held that combined church decorating, gift wrapping of the Christmas Deacon's gifts, crafts for kids, and singing of Christmas carols. It was well attended and well liked by all. Doughnuts and coffee were provided by the Deacons.

On December 17th, Christmas caroling to shut-ins and nursing home residents took place. Approximately 20 people participated in the Christmas caroling. They split up into four groups and sang to approximately 20 First Pres shut-ins who are not able to come to church. After the caroling, the group enjoyed a delicious dinner that was prepared by and provided by the Deacons. Each week coffee, tea, hot cocoa, and light snacks are served in Mekeel Hall during the Sunday school hour in order to promote fellowship among the members of our church and create a warm inviting atmosphere for visitors.

These are the people we care for regularly by sending them cards and calling them on the phone, but what they value most is a face-to-face visit. Their eyes light up when they see a friendly face; they love to tell their fascinating! stories to an intently listening ear; they are comforted by familiar Bible verses, and they enjoy news of the church family. This is our calling and pleasure, and we do not take our responsibility lightly. When we meet every other month, we share updates on each of our folk and then pray together for them. We encourage them with gifts at Christmas and when we think they would like a nice surprise. In sharing communion, they are reminded that they are still part of our body. Pastor and an elder bring this sacrament to them in their individual homes and in a service twice a year at Kingsway.

It is very important that these folks still feel they are part of us, and we are constantly looking for ways to do this better. We have recently made changes to our guidelines to include written reports of our visits and other contacts so that they are never neglected because of our busyness.

None of us are eagerly anticipating our own residence in a long-term care facility or being confined to our homes, partly because we fear being forgotten or ignored. For many of these folks, the deaconess is their only tie with First Pres, and if we neglect them, it's easy for them to think God has forgotten them as well. While we serve them on your behalf, we would encourage you to contact them, too. Join us in keeping our invisible members visible.

CAMP PATTERSONVILLE

Craig Williams, Board Member

It is hard to believe that a small Christian children's camp in upstate New York could have such an impact around the world for Christ, but it is true. I believe God has blessed the ministry of Camp Pattersonville because it has been faithful for 64 years in proclaiming God's Word to the children who attend camp. 2011 was no different, 293 campers came and fixed their eyes on Jesus. Camp has traditionally ministered to children ages 7 - 12 but last year (for the last week of camp) and again this year (for the last 2 weeks of camp) the ministry was devoted to young teens, ages 11 - 14. And like last year this program was again received very well. We praise God for His faithfulness and for how He has used many of His people to accomplish this ministry.

"Looking unto Jesus" Hebrews 12:2a has always been the theme of camp and continues to be the focus on which we desire to minister to the children, giving them an opportunity to hear the wonderful good news about Jesus and His love for them in an outdoor camping setting. Many of these campers received Jesus into their hearts and lives for the first time and many rededicated their lives to Christ.

There were four recurring themes this year. The first was taking the Bible seriously. The second was trust; full throttle trust, trust in what Jesus did and trust throughout the day in all activities. The situation can change rapidly, and we need to constantly be trusting the Lord. The third was reading the Bible for yourself. The fourth, among the staff, was the fellowship of sharing in his suffering (Phil 3:10). These led to a good year. The staff was focused, not complaining, and willing to be uncomfortable and sweat for the sake of the goal.

Our goal continues to be to explain the gospel clearly, including changing one's mind about self and placing one's undivided trust in Jesus. We teach that Jesus is God himself in the flesh and desire to give each camper an opportunity to respond. The campers learned and memorized the following Bible passages during the AM lesson time. The complete passage was recited before all meals, and a reward was offered at the end of the week for those who could say the verse. About ³/₄ of the camp were able to say the whole verse. During staff week, we prepared to teach what these mean. Philippians 2:5-11, Revelation 1:5-8, Matt 24:37-42, 1 Cor 15:51-57, 2 Cor 5:17-21

In the campfire lessons, the director taught through the lives of David and Elijah, along with how to be saved and live a life of trust in the Lord. Many kids responded by giving their lives to Jesus or by further committing their lives to follow him.

A couple of famous hymns were taught along with all the other camp songs: "Look Ye Saints", "Come Thou Fount," "Crown Him with Many Crowns," and "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name." 3 or 4 verses were taught of each, and the meanings of the words and phrases were taught throughout the week. Music is a highlight of camp, and we choose songs carefully. Staff learned these during staff week and at least one of them was sung at every meal to help in memorizing. We find that the kids want to sing the hymns and want to stand.

In addition to the Bible studies, campers also enjoyed activities such as swimming, hiking, exploring the creek, water carnival, field carnival and camp games (i.e. capture the flag and camper counselor hunt). Various crafts were also enjoyed such as reed baskets, hand-carved helicopters, PVC trumpet, and paddleboats. The main craft was wooden electric lamps. Singing, Bible stories and skits (around the camp fire, weather permitting) each night were the perfect ending to the day.

RETIRED MISSIONARIES FUND

David C. Pearson, Signatory

In 1992 First Presbyterian Church received significant bequests from the estates of Robert Cooper and Charlotte Koch. Half of these bequests was used to establish a fund for retired missionaries who do not have sufficient income to adequately support themselves. The earnings are distributed to these missionaries based on an annual budget.

During 1999 the principal of the fund was increased from the Marion Follett and Frank Wagner bequests, and in 2009 also augmented by a bequest from the estate of George R. Fusner. Interest on the principal was \$10,946.35. On December 31, 2010, the market value of the fund was \$236,321.91. Growth in market value in 2011 was \$15,352.80, bringing the endowment balance to \$251,674.71. The Fund balance as of January 1, 2011 was \$2,625.88, income from gifts of \$10 plus interest and dividends from the endowment of \$10,946.35, and expenditures of \$12,010, leaving a balance as of December 31, 2011 of \$1,572.23. The fund income during 2011 was expended as follows:
