## **Comprehensive statistical analysis of the financing of operational activities for development of the United Nations system for 2006**

### **Report of the Secretary-General**

#### *Summary*

The total value of contributions received by the United Nations system for operational activities in 2006 amounted to \$17.2 billion. This total represents an increase of 0.4 per cent in nominal terms, and a decrease of 2.0 per cent in real terms, over the contributions received in 2005. The expenditures of the United Nations system for operational activities in 2006 amounted to \$16.4 billion.

The present report, prepared in collaboration with the organizations of the United Nations system, is submitted in response to General Assembly resolutions 35/81, 59/250, and 62/208, in which the Assembly requested the Secretary-General: (a) to continue to broaden and improve the annual financial report to the operational activities segment of the Economic and Social Council; (b) to build a comprehensive, sustainable and consistent financial data and reporting system for the operational activities for development of the United Nations system, in a coherent way; and (c) to provide a concise statement of progress and planned activities.

The 2008 Economic and Social Council report has been strengthened in the following ways: the Department of Economic and Social Affairs now collects data directly from 20 entities, compared to 7 entities in the 2007 report. The report now counts that portion of entities' assessed budgets used for operational activities for development, both on the contributions side and the expenditures side. For increased comparability, core/non-core contributions of the World Food Programme and the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees have been reclassified to bring them more in line with how other entities classify their data. The report shows self-supporting data from all the United Nations funds and programmes. In the past only United Nations Development Programme "cost-sharing" contributions were collected. The Department of Economic and Social Affairs collects and maintains detailed financial data regarding transfers within the United Nations system. In table 1 of the report, financial transfers are excluded to arrive at total United Nations system funding, without duplication. Conversely, all United Nations transfers are included in table 2 to provide an accurate snapshot of total contributions made to each entity.

Section VI of the report charts the strategy and plans for continued strengthening of the report towards a comprehensive and sustainable United Nations system-wide financial data and reporting system.

#### **Recommendation**

The Council may wish to take note of this report and to encourage continuing efforts to work towards a comprehensive and sustainable United Nations system-wide financial data and reporting system.

## I. Introduction

1. The present report, prepared in collaboration with the organizations of the United Nations system, is submitted in response to General Assembly resolutions 35/81, 59/250 and 62/208, in which the Assembly requested the Secretary-General: (a) to continue to broaden and improve the annual financial report to the operational activities segment of the Economic and Social Council (see General Assembly resolution 59/250, para. 22); (b) to build a comprehensive, sustainable and consistent financial data and reporting system for the operational activities or development of the United Nations system, in a coherent way; and (c) to provide a concise statement of progress and planned activities.

2. This report of the Secretary-General to the General Assembly and the Economic and Social Council has been prepared annually since 1981.<sup>1</sup> The report currently contains information on the 37 United Nations system entities that reported funding for operational activities for development. It is mandated by Economic and Social Council resolution 2006/14 and General Assembly resolutions 32/197, 35/81, 59/250 and 62/208. The report should be read in conjunction with the report of the Secretary-General on the implementation of resolution 62/208 on the triennial comprehensive policy review of operational activities for development of the United Nations system (E/2008/49).

3. The report consists of six sections. Section I contains the introduction; section II analyses and presents contributions for 2006: overall volume, volume by entity and overall and entity-specific contributions trends, as well as those of core and non-core resources; section III compares the trends between United Nations system financing and other multilateral and bilateral development assistance; section IV analyses in detail for the first time the contributions of the specialized agencies; section V analyses expenditures in 2006, expenditure trends and expenditure targeting; and section VI describes the progress in building a comprehensive and sustainable financial data and reporting system on United Nations operational activities and future plans.

## II. Contributions

### Total contributions 2006

4. The total value of contributions received by the United Nations system for operational activities in 2006 amounted to \$17.2 billion (see table 1). This figure, while representing stagnation as compared to 2005, is significantly higher than the provisional 2006 figure presented to the General Assembly at its sixty-second session (\$15.8 billion).

5. There are several reasons for the upward revision of contributions received by the United Nations system. The change is a reflection of efforts by the Department of Economic and Social Affairs and United Nations organizational entities to improve reporting to make it truly comprehensive by including all entities and all funds for operational activities for development.

6. The Department of Economic and Social Affairs is collecting, directly, financial data for the first time from five specialized agencies<sup>2</sup> and ITC. In the past the financial data for these entities were obtained indirectly from the UNDP report on technical cooperation. By having agencies report directly to the Department of Economic and Social Affairs on operational activities the definition has been sharpened and broadened.

7. These six entities have reported, at the request of the Department of Economic and Social Affairs, their assessed and voluntary core contributions (consistent with the way funds and programmes have been reporting their voluntary contributions). These core flows had been underrepresented in past reports, but have now been fully included throughout this report.

8. The revised contribution data also include the additional funding coming through transfers, such as from the Montreal Protocol, which had not been included in the past.

**Total contributions, including United Nations transfers**

10. The figures shown in table 1 exclude contributions that organizations received from other entities within the United Nations system as defined in the present report.<sup>3</sup> This was done to avoid double-counting towards the total United Nations system contributions. See table 2 for the total contributions made to each entity, including \$385 million coming from United Nations sources.

### Overall contribution trends

11. Contributions in 2006 stagnated in nominal terms, with an increase of 0.4 per cent over the contributions received in 2005, an exceptional year. The average annual increase over the contributions received in 2002 was 13.8 per cent (see table 3).

12. The real decrease over 2005 was 2.0 per cent, when account is taken of both inflation and exchange rate movements. The real annual increase since 2002 was 6.6 per cent.

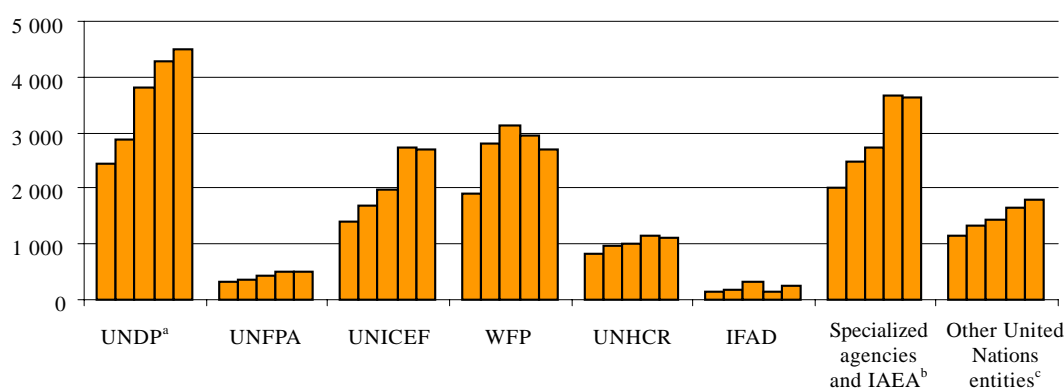
13. United Nations system organizations vary greatly in size, as measured by total annual contributions, and in funding trends (see fig. I).

14. UNDP is the largest United Nations system organization, which experienced large growth in its total contributions, reaching \$4.5 billion in 2006, an average annual increase of 16.5 per cent in nominal terms over the five-year period 2002-2006.

15. UNICEF financing and financing for the specialized agencies, taken as a whole, expanded considerably since 2002, showing 17.7 per cent and 15.6 per cent average annual growth in income, respectively. The growth in contributions was especially high in 2005. UNFPA funding trends have been remarkably stable. UNHCR trends are quite stable, in response to its annual appeals.

### Core and non-core contributions

16. The General Assembly has highlighted the need to enhance the core contributions to the United Nations development system. This was most recently reaffirmed by the General Assembly in its resolution 62/208, which stressed that core resources, because of their untied nature, continue to be the bedrock of the operational activities for development of the United Nations system. It noted with concern that the share of core contributions to the United Nations funds and programmes had declined in recent years and recognized the need for organizations to address, on a continuous basis, the imbalance between core and non-core resources.

17. Against this backdrop, in 2006, core/regular budget contributions (and assessments) for the United Nations system as a whole reached \$5.1 billion.

18. The trend in core funding showed an increase of 9.0 per cent from 2005 to 2006. For the period 2002-2006 the annual increase averaged 7.1 per cent per year. This represented a core share of 29.5 per cent of total contributions, an increase over 2005 (see table 4 and fig. II).

19. However, in constant dollars, taking account of inflation and exchange rates, the increase in core funds from 2002-2006 was reduced to just 0.3 per cent, per year, on average.

20. The non-core funding (other resources) declined slightly in 2006, a reflection of the fact that 2005 was an exceptional year of need owing to the two humanitarian crises (Asian tsunami and South Asian earthquake). For the five-year period, supplementary funds saw an average annual increase of 17.4 per cent in current dollars and 9.9 per cent in constant 2005 dollars.

21. Over the five-year period 2002-2006, non-core resources increased at an annual rate of 17.4 per cent, compared to an annual rate of 7.1 per cent for core resources.

22. In 2006, non-core resources for operational activities were \$12.1 billion, as compared to core resources of \$5.1 billion. This means that core funding in 2006 was only 29.5 per cent of total funding, while non-core funding was 70.5 per cent of total funding.

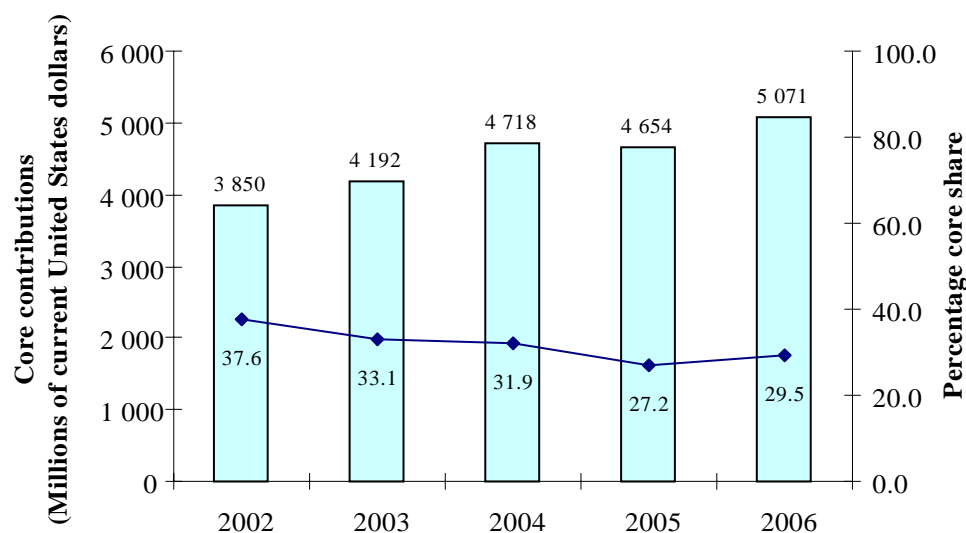
23. It should be noted, however, that in 2006 the core share of total resources went up for the first time in five years, by over two percentage points.

24. The changes in overall volume of core funds compared to prior editions of this report are owed mainly to a change in the way WFP classifies and reports its contributions (see box 1).

#### Box 1

##### Classifying contributions to WFP

WFP has no exact equivalent in its funding system to the concept of “core funding”. In the old classification WFP reported 95.1 per cent core funding for 2006, but this is not comparable to what is considered core funding in other United Nations organizations. In this revised classification, WFP reported 9.0 per cent of contributions as “core funding”, which more accurately reflects the percentage of resources it receives that are closely equivalent to what other United Nations organizations consider core funding. WFP has two funding windows, one called “multilateral”, which represents about 9 per cent of overall funding, and the other called “directed multilateral”, which accounts for the remaining 91 per cent of funding. Beginning with this report, only multilateral contributions to WFP are classified as “core”. By definition, a multilateral contribution refers to a contribution to WFP for which the organization can determine which project or operation the contribution will be used for and how it will be used. A directed multilateral contribution is one where the donor requests WFP to direct the contribution to a specific activity initiated by WFP or to a specific country programme (see “Amendments to WFP financial regulations, submission to the FAO Finance Committee and ACABQ” (2 May 2006)).

25. UNHCR financing has also been reclassified in this report to bring it into closer harmony with how the contributions to other entities are being classified. However, UNHCR considers that the core/non-core terminology does not fully reflect the nature of its activities, as discussed in box 2.

Box 2

**Classifying contributions to UNHCR**

UNHCR prepares an annual programme budget that includes specific programmed activities at the country, global and headquarters levels. Against this appeal it receives contributions in the form of unearmarked, loosely earmarked and tightly earmarked contributions. Regardless of the nature of the earmarking, the contributions are in response to the UNHCR appeal. The appeal is issued only after a complete programme cycle that includes a global needs assessment, participatory planning with all concerned parties, a bureau level review, and an executive level review. Once approved internally, UNHCR presents the proposed budget to its Executive Committee.

Historically, the earmarking has been negotiated over the course of the year so as to ensure that no portion is oversubscribed. Thus UNHCR is able to function in an environment where earmarking may achieve a “core” of resources. Where a donor would wish to make a contribution for an activity that is not approved by the Executive Committee, this could be considered “non-core”, on the basis that the contribution was outside of the appeal. Supplementary programme budget appeals throughout the year also raise funds that are 100 per cent earmarked for the specified activity. Thus, the earmarking is in direct response to UNHCR requests.

UNHCR suggests a revision to the terminology that would facilitate the presentation by classifying the data as: (a) earmarked or unearmarked; and (b) earmarked in line with appeals for funding or unearmarked in line with appeals for funding. Its view is that “core” and “non-core” have the potential to be interpreted as “mandated” or “non-mandated”, which is clearly not the case in that agency.

26. A second factor that raises the core financing is that core flows for specialized agencies had been underreported in past reports and are now being measured directly on the basis of reporting from the specialized agencies on their voluntary and assessed contributions for operational activities for development (see para. 8 above).

27. The trend data for specific United Nations entities are shown in table 5. (The breakdown for the specialized agencies is analysed specifically in sect. IV.)

28. In 2006 trends in core resources varied substantially among entities. UNICEF’s core resources increased by 31 per cent, largely due to increased contributions from private sector sources through the extensive network of UNICEF national committees, thus exceeding the projected growth of the UNICEF financial plan. UNAIDS reported 63 per cent growth in 2006, reflecting the continuing growth of its unified budget and workplan.

29. IFAD showed a 75 per cent growth in core contributions over 2005, similar to what occurred in 2004. As regards the core resources, this trend is owed to replenishment periods that cover three years. IFAD is currently in its seventh replenishment, covering 2007 to 2009. The first year of a new replenishment usually shows a high level of contributions, being the upfront payment of the new replenishment combined with late payments of the previous replenishment. As regards non-core resources, these have no funding cycles but are just dependent on the active agreements negotiated.

30. In 2006, UNEP saw a decline in core contributions made to its Environment Fund, trust funds and other contributions that are in direct support of the programme of work of UNEP. However, preliminary data for 2007 show that contributions to all areas have returned to levels witnessed in 2004 and 2005.

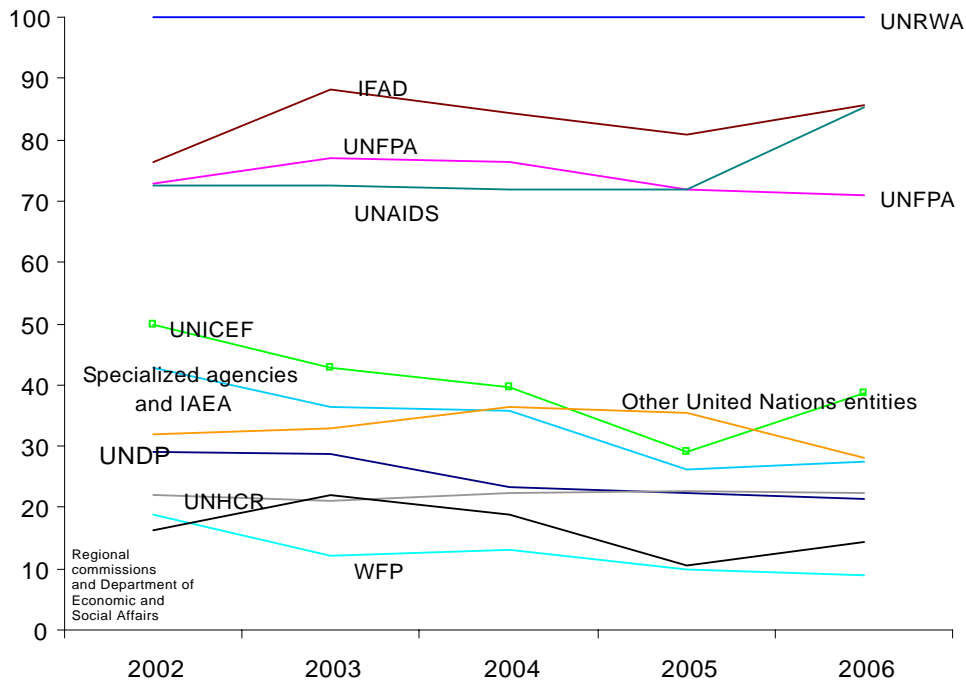

31. Figure III illustrates the relative share of core resources in relation to the total resources individual United Nations organizations receive.

32. Three patterns are clearly identifiable. UNRWA resources are 100 per cent core, year after year. A second group of entities receives a high proportion of core resources (IFAD, UNAIDS and UNFPA). A third, and bigger, cluster of entities has a low core share in its respective budgets (UNICEF, UNDP, WFP, regional commissions and the specialized agencies).

**Long-term trends**

33. The long-term trend over 15 years in financing for three United Nations funds — UNDP, UNFPA and UNICEF — is shown in table 6. The real growth in core funds decreased an average of 0.3 per cent per annum from 1991 to 2006, but has increased an average 3.0 per cent per annum in the last five years, 2001 to 2006.



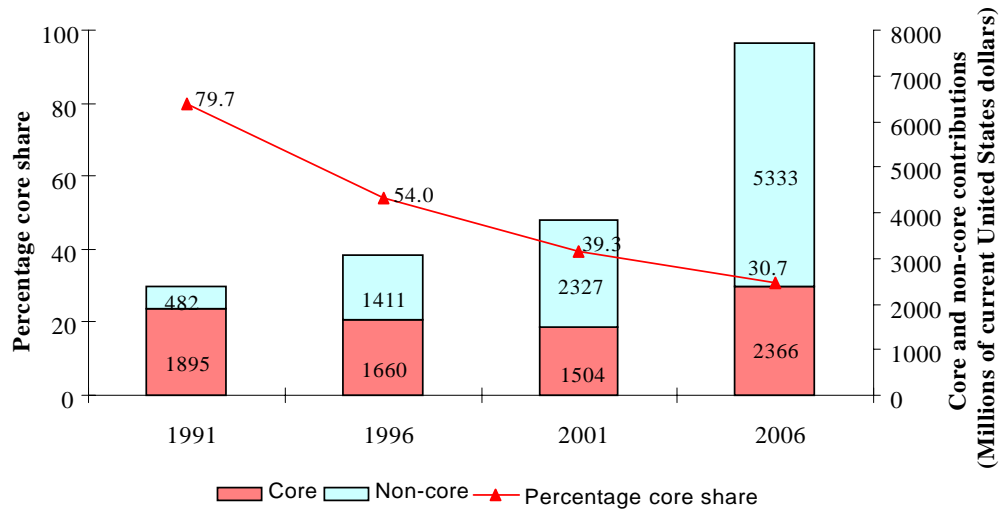

34. Figure IV shows the actual situation with respect to the declining balance between core and non-core funding in UNDP, UNFPA and UNICEF. The result is that, whereas in 1991 core contributions accounted for 79.7 per cent of all resources for these three United Nations funds, their share has dropped steadily over the years to the point that in 2006 core funds accounted for only 30.7 per cent of their total contributions. This is owed to very large increases in earmarked funding and modest increases in core funding.

35. Tables 7 and 8 present the top 10 contributing countries to operational activities for development in 2006, in terms of their total contributions to the United Nations system and the percentage of their GNI that they have allocated.

36. The United States was the biggest contributor, having contributed \$2.7 billion, followed by the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and Japan. Norway allocated the largest percentage of its GNI, 0.27 per cent, followed by Sweden at 0.23 per cent and Luxembourg at 0.22 per cent. There was a sharp fall after that for the remaining seven Member States listed in table 8. It is useful to view table 8 in the context of the overall ODA target of 0.7 per cent of GNI as ODA to developing countries. For example, in 2006 the net ODA of Norway was 0.89 per cent of GNI overall, of which 0.27 per cent was channelled through the United Nations system.

#### **Non-Development Assistance Committee donors**

37. A welcome development in recent years has been the growing importance of contributions of non-DAC member States to the United Nations system. Non-DAC countries contributed a total of \$451 million to the United Nations system for operational activities for development in 2006, excluding self-supporting contributions. Table 9 lists the top 10 non-DAC contributing countries. These contributions may seem modest compared to the overall contributions, but they represent a 104 per cent increase over the \$221 million contributed by non-DAC countries in 2004. These are contributions for expenditure in other developing countries, following the definition of ODA. It is likely that some Latin American countries will be added to this list in the next report once the source of UNDP local funds can be disaggregated.

38. However, often countries provide resources, either in cash or in kind, to United Nations agencies for development activities in their own countries. In 2006, so-called “self-supporting” resources, channelled by Governments and private entities, through United Nations agencies for expenditure in their own country, amounted to \$1.89 billion, coming from 154 countries. This is practiced, for example, quite extensively by UNDP in Latin American countries and by WFP. It is not clear the extent to which these are always “fresh” resources or development aid being re-channelled by local authorities through the United Nations for carrying out the country programmes of cooperation. These flows have been excluded from table 9, but need further study.

### III. Contributions to the United Nations system compared to non-United Nations multilateral and bilateral official development assistance

39. Contributions to the United Nations system in 2006 declined in real terms by 2.0 per cent (see table 10).

40. By comparison, contributions to non-United Nations multilateral institutions in 2006 increased substantially, amounting to \$22.2 billion, using DAC definitions. This included \$9.9 billion to the European Commission; \$6.8 billion to IDA; and \$2.5 billion to the regional development banks. The 2006 figure increased in real terms by 13.9 per cent over the previous year, representing substantial growth over the prior year.

41. These trends have to be seen against a backdrop where bilateral ODA in 2006, using DAC definitions, had a real decrease of 6.8 per cent over 2005 and a real annual increase since 2002 of 11.4 per cent. This amount includes non-core funding to the multilateral system.

42. The 2005 bilateral ODA figure includes a large debt relief component of \$25 billion, including a one-off relief to Iraq and Nigeria, compared to the more usual 2004 debt relief figure of \$7 billion or less. The large 2005 surge in debt relief exaggerated the 2005 total and led to an apparent fall of more than 6 per cent in 2006 in real terms. When debt forgiveness from bilateral ODA is excluded, then the real increase in bilateral ODA from 2005 to 2006 would be 1.6 per cent and the real annual increase since 2002 would be 7.3 per cent, which is very close to the five-year real annual increase of financing flowing into the United Nations system.

43. It should be noted that there are a number of important differences between the way the United Nations and DAC define, classify and report contributions to the United Nations system. Thus, the two methods give very different pictures of the size of the United Nations system's budgets for development. As a first step towards harmonization, these differences were documented in the 2007 Economic and Social Council and General Assembly reports and presented at the DAC Working Party on Statistics and are updated in this report (see annex I).<sup>4</sup>

#### **IV. Specialized agencies**

44. This is the first time the report of the Secretary-General has analysed the financing of operational activities for development of the specialized agencies individually. This has been done through direct data collection from the agencies, and therefore the strength of the analysis is highly dependent on the quality of the statistics provided by the respective agencies.

45. In preparation for this report, the Department of Economic and Social Affairs consulted broadly with agencies, especially specialized agencies, on their funding modalities and finance and budget structures. These discussions helped to structure the detailed questionnaire that was subsequently sent, and to gather and analyse the results, which are presented in the report. Data were received from FAO, ILO, UNESCO, UNIDO and WHO.<sup>5</sup> It is anticipated that direct data collection of all the specialized agencies will be carried out for the 2009 Economic and Social Council report.

46. The financial contributions for 2002-2006 for operational activities to 13 United Nations specialized agencies are presented in the tables and charts that follow. The detailed data behind these summary policy presentations can be found in annex VI, table A-5.

47. Several facts stand out. First, the specialized agencies vary greatly in size with respect to their operational activities' budgets. WHO is the largest agency, with overall annual contributions in 2006 of \$1.87 billion. It should be noted, however, that reporting on contributions to WHO operational work will need to be further refined in collaboration with that agency. At the other end of the scale is the World Tourism Organization, at \$1.14 million. In between these, FAO, ILO and UNESCO contributions in 2006 had operational activities of a similar magnitude, in the \$400 million to \$500 million range. UNIDO, ICAO and IAEA form another subgroup, with annual contributions in the \$100 million to \$200 million range, followed by the smaller agencies (see fig. V).

48. Total contributions to the United Nations specialized agencies for operational activities totalled just over \$3.6 billion in 2006 (see table 11). Although this represents a slight decrease from 2005 contributions, it is still significantly higher than 2004, and the average annual increase over the past five years has been 15.6 per cent, or 80 per cent for the period.

49. The triennial comprehensive policy review underlined the need for balance between core and non-core financing. For specialized agencies, assessed/core budgets have stagnated (see table 12). Figure VI shows how severely out of balance this ratio has become, even in the last five years. In 2002, 42.8 per cent of total financing came from core/assessed contributions. This share had eroded to 27.4 per cent in 2006, in part because of the growth in non-core, extrabudgetary financing.

**Distribution of contributions to the specialized agencies of the United Nations system: 2002 and 2006**

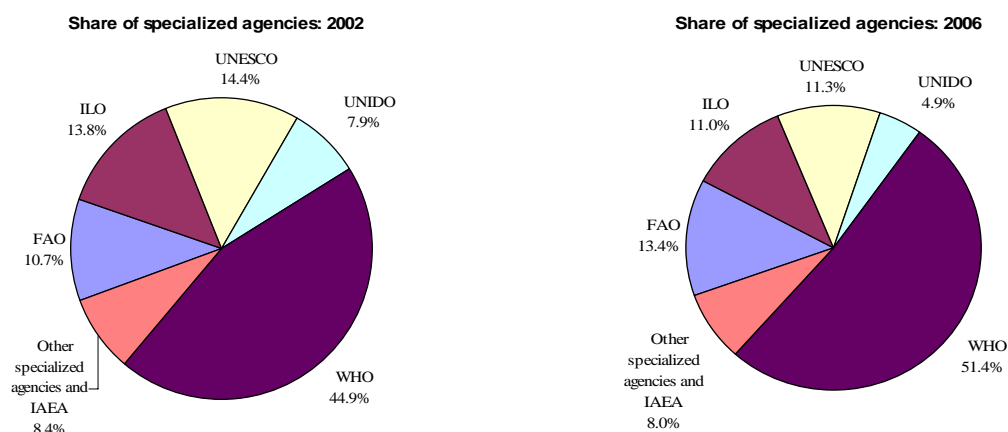
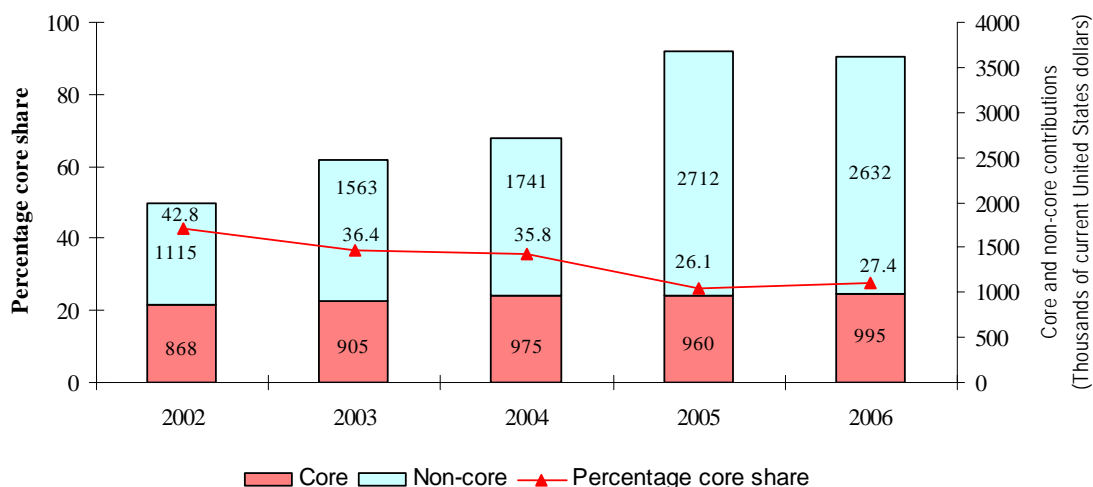

50. WHO is the largest of the specialized agencies, with operational, humanitarian and normative mandates for health in the United Nations system, and the go-to agency for leadership, coordination and technical support in health to countries. The reporting of WHO financing and expenditures will be further improved in next year's report.

51. FAO is the second largest specialized agency based on annual contributions used for operational activities for development. FAO reported core contributions, which amounted to \$34.6 million in 2006, comprising its technical cooperation programme and its special programme for food security, both of which are financed through FAO regular programme resources. Although funding for these two programmes had declined in recent years, total funding for FAO operational activities steadily increased by an average of 22.2 per cent per year since 2002, owing to a significant increase in non-core financing.

52. UNESCO is another large specialized agency, the United Nations agency for education, science and culture. Although further work is required to reconcile the UNESCO budget to fit with the classifications used in this report, it was agreed that 25 per cent (or just over \$76 million) of its regular budget is used for operational activities for development. This is the same coefficient factor used by OECD/DAC.<sup>6</sup> Extrabudgetary funds of UNESCO consist of earmarked funds in trust funds for projects and special accounts or thematic funds to which donors contribute. Although core funding at UNESCO has stagnated over the past few years, extrabudgetary funds had an average annual increase of 10.6 per cent from 2002 to 2006.

53. ILO income for operational activities rose to just under \$400 million in 2006. With its assessed contributions having stagnated over the past several years, ILO pursued alternative funding strategies. It promoted “core” extrabudgetary contributions that finance the core functions of development cooperation, in an effort to move towards greater integration of regular budget and extrabudgetary income. ILO also developed a resource mobilization strategy based on widening and deepening longer-term partnerships with a broad range of donors. Major donors to this second window of unearmarked contributions in 2006 were the United States of America, the Netherlands and France. Direct budget support and the decentralization of funding at the country level means that the role of field level fundraising is crucial when at the same time ILO is not well represented at the country level (rather through a regional structure).

54. UNIDO’s core budget, covering staff and operating costs, is funded by assessed contributions of the Member States (172 in 2006). Programmes and projects for technical cooperation are funded through voluntary contributions mainly from donor countries and institutions, from multilateral funds and UNDP. Gross appropriation for 2006 in the regular budget amounted to \$94.1 million. The data show that there was a drop in the receipt of contributions in 2006. That was due to the fact that UNIDO received and recorded in December 2005 a contribution for 2006 from the multilateral fund for the implementation of the Montreal Protocol in the amount of \$33.4 million.

## V. Expenditures

### Total expenditures 2006

55. The expenditures of the United Nations system for operational activities in 2006 amounted to \$16.4 billion (see table 13).

### Overall expenditure trends

56. The expenditures of the United Nations system for operational activities saw a nominal increase of 4.7 per cent over 2005 and an average annual increase of 13.0 per cent since 2002 (see table 14). When account is taken of inflation and exchange rate movements, the real increase over 2005 was 2.2 per cent, while the real annual increase since 2002 was 5.7 per cent. The large recent expenditures were highly influenced by expenditures on major humanitarian disasters.

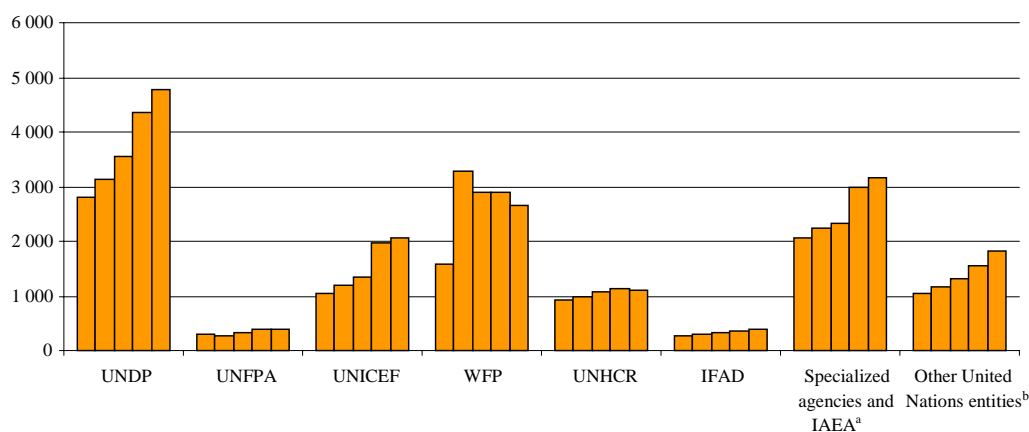
57. UNDP overall expenditures increased by 9.3 per cent in 2006 and 14.1 per cent on average for the five-year period 2002-2006 (see table 14). After UNDP, WFP incurred the largest expenditures in 2006, followed by UNICEF.

58. Total UNICEF expenditures in 2006 increased by 5.6 per cent, to \$2.07 billion. Annual average growth from 2002 was 18.7 per cent. Regular resources are allocated for each country with which UNICEF cooperates according to a formula agreed upon by its Executive Board based on three criteria for each country: the under-five mortality rate, gross national product per capita and the size of the child population. Expenditures include programme assistance, programme support and management administration.

59. The combined specialized agencies have one of the largest shares of expenditures. As a whole they expended \$3.16 billion in 2006, up 6.2 per cent over the previous year and 11.5 per cent on average per year during the five-year period.

60. Figure VII displays the five-year trends in expenditures of the main funds and programmes, the specialized agencies and other United Nations entities. This display makes several points very clearly: (a) UNDP has by far the largest expenditures and they grew very fast; (b) the very different sizes of the respective programmes, UNFPA and IFAD being of a modest size and stable compared to the other entities; (c) UNHCR appears stable and delivering in the region of \$1 billion per year; and (d) growth in expenditures of UNICEF and the specialized agencies, which reflects the additional large demand from humanitarian response in 2005 and 2006.

### Expenditures by programme country

61. Table 15 displays the top 10 programme countries in terms of expenditures, expressed as a percentage of their GNI. All 10 countries are least developed countries, a positive indicator of the targeting of United Nations system expenditures to the poorest countries (although Maldives has been recommended for graduation). In Liberia and Burundi, United Nations system expenditures represented 33.6 per cent and 16.8 per cent of their respective GNI.

62. In terms of expenditures per capita in programme countries, the top 10 programme countries include seven least developed countries (see table 16). Jordan is the centre for UNRWA operations for the region so these are really funds going to UNRWA programmes.

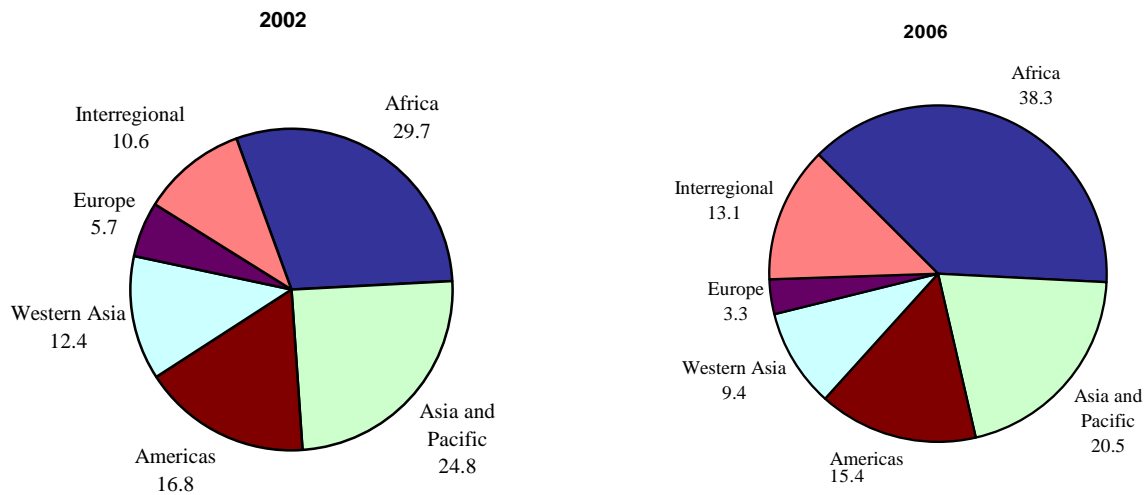

65. The Africa region has consistently received the largest share of expenditures, reaching 40.1 per cent in 2005 and 38.3 per cent in 2006. The Asia and Pacific region accounted for the second largest share of expenditures for each of the years except 2003, when the Western Asian region, which includes Iraq, had the second-largest share. The expenditures in Iraq in 2003 and 2004 accounted for a very large part of the Western Asia share in those two years. Figure VIII shows the growing importance of Africa in United Nations expenditures.

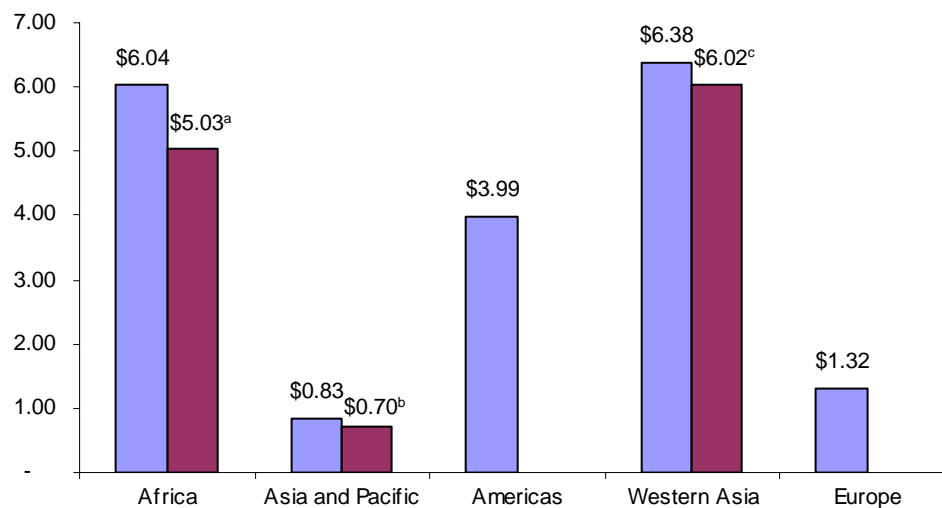
Figure VIII

66. Another way to study regional expenditures is to analyse the per capita expenditure, taking into account the different population sizes of the regions. In 2006 the United Nations system spent the most per capita in the Western Asia region, a geographic area that includes the Middle East, excluding Egypt, spending \$6.38 per capita in the countries in this region and their regional programmes. This includes expenditures of UNRWA, which are almost all spent in this region. When funding to Iraq is excluded, the per capita regional expenditure drops to \$6.02 (see fig. IX).

67. Similarly, per capita expenditures in Africa in 2006, which overall amounted to \$6.04 per head, drop to \$5.03 per head when expenditures in the Sudan and the Democratic Republic of the Congo are subtracted. The low per capita figure for Asia and the Pacific is a reflection of the enormous population size of the region, which includes China, India, Pakistan and Indonesia. Most of Europe's expenditures are concentrated in the countries of the former Soviet Union and the former Yugoslavia. The high per capita figure for the Americas is owed to the self-supporting funding that occurs mainly in this region.

#### **Expenditures in the least developed countries**

68. Table 19 shows the expenditures in the least developed countries from 2002 to 2006, expressed as a percentage of total expenditures.

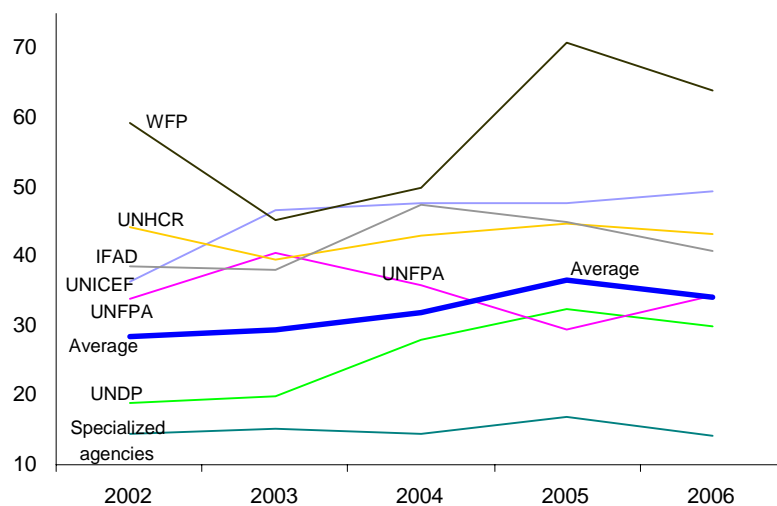

69. Different United Nations organizations allocate greatly differing proportions of their total assistance to the least developed countries (see fig. X).

70. WFP has consistently allocated the highest proportion of expenditures. It currently allocates 63.8 per cent of its expenditures to these countries, reporting an increase of 14 percentage points over 2004, and a decrease of 7 percentage points from the high in 2005, resulting from greatly expanded expenditures in the Sudan, Ethiopia and other African countries. UNDP expenditure in the least developed countries reached 30 per cent of its total expenditure in 2006. The percentages for UNDP and the specialized agencies would be higher if self-supporting expenditures, which are most prevalent in richer countries, could be excluded.

#### Expenditures by sector

71. There is a need to improve the coverage and quality of the sector data, building on the work of the Administrative Committee on Coordination classification system and the ongoing work with the OECD/DAC Working Party on Statistics. The data as currently reported by the United Nations entities can be seen in annex VI, table B-5.

## VI. Progress in building a comprehensive and sustainable financial data and reporting system on United Nations operational activities

72. The General Assembly, in its resolution 62/208, noted with appreciation the report of the Secretary-General on the comprehensive statistical analysis of the financing of operational activities for development of the United Nations system.<sup>4</sup> The Assembly also recognized the importance of consistent, reliable and comprehensive statistical data and analysis about the United Nations operational

activities in order to provide an understanding of evolutions and trends contributing to sound policy decisions.

73. It requested the Secretary-General, making use of existing capacities within the Secretariat and, if necessary, voluntary contributions:

(a) To continue to broaden and improve the coverage, timeliness, reliability, quality and comparability of system-wide financial data, definitions and classifications for the financial reporting of operational activities for development of the United Nations system, in a coherent way;

(b) To build a comprehensive, sustainable and consistent financial data and reporting system for the operational activities for development of all the relevant organizations and entities of the United Nations system;

(c) To include, in this regard, in the report to be submitted to the Economic and Social Council in 2008 a concise assessment of progress made and a description of planned activities;

(d) To invite Member States to contribute to the support of the work mentioned above (see resolution 62/208, para. 28).

74. The mandate to build a comprehensive and sustainable system-wide financial data and reporting system on United Nations operational activities is firmly anchored in the related mandates contained in the resolution, most notably in its section II, entitled “Funding for operational activities of the United Nations development system”, which provides a policy context for the data requirements for the system. The funding aspects of the resolution characterize some of the principal demands for financial data and reporting that will help shape the design and evolution of the comprehensive financial data and reporting system summarized in paragraphs 87 to 93 of the present report.

#### **Progress during 2007-2008**

75. The report of the Department of Economic and Social Affairs providing a comprehensive statistical analysis of the financing of operational activities for development of the United Nations system is the annual assessment of United Nations system financing for development and, every three years, supports the triennial comprehensive policy review and evaluation.

76. As funding is a major policy concern of the triennial comprehensive policy review, the Development Cooperation Forum, the Annual Ministerial Review and the Financing for Development Office, this one consolidated annual report on United Nations system funding levels, trends and patterns makes available a statement on United Nations funding that can be used by all these entities. The Secretary-General has made the improvement of system-wide coherence a priority.<sup>7</sup> The strengthening and standardizing of the financial data and reporting system are concrete steps in that direction.

77. The report currently contains information on the 37 United Nations system entities that reported funding for operational activities for development.

78. Until 2007, financial data were collected directly from only five funds and programmes (UNDP, UNFPA, UNICEF, WFP AND UNHCR), IFAD and UNEP. For the remaining entities in the report, data were obtained indirectly through the UNDP report on technical cooperation of the United Nations system. For the current report, financial data have been collected directly from most United Nations entities. These enhancements will, in due course, facilitate the access to and interpretation and use of the data for a range of purposes.

79. The collaboration with UNHCR, included in last year's report for the first time, and the collaboration with the Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs in 2007 by means of a joint Department of Economic and Social Affairs/Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs questionnaire to all United Nations organizations opened new avenues for the analysis of funding for humanitarian assistance as different from funding for development. Work began on a relational database.

80. The Department of Economic and Social Affairs participates in the CEB Finance and Budget Network and is collaborating with CEB efforts to improve business practices. Extensive consultations were held during the past year with many entities about how best to incorporate and analyse their funding data and reflect their funding modalities. The content, methodology and utility of the data and the reporting have also been discussed with Member States.

81. The partial reconciliation between the different estimates of the United Nations and OECD/DAC concerning the total funding of the United Nations system provided a transparent description of the reasons for these differences, and it is updated in the current report. During the year there has been enhanced collaboration with DAC/Statistics and Monitoring Division on strengthening multilateral data.

82. Although a good deal of progress has been made in the last year in improving the reporting on financing for operational activities for development and the quality of the data it contains, a concerted effort is needed to consolidate these improvements. It is important to make sure that the financial and statistical standards and practices reflect current operations and will permit a comprehensive and reliable overview of the operational activities of the United Nations system in the future. An important element of the challenge is the requirement for a results-based policy and programme review within and across the United Nations system.

### **Planned activities**

83. Following the adoption of resolution 62/208, work has been under way to improve the financial data and analysis through the following three areas:<sup>8</sup>

(a) Provision of an accurate aggregate statement of the United Nations annual financial receipts (excluding transfers among United Nations agencies to avoid double counting);

(b) Provision of an accurate snapshot of agency-specific total annual financing (including transfers from other United Nations agencies), entity by entity;

(c) Provision of reliable trend data on past and, to the extent possible, future trends.

84. These three objectives are complex owing to the funding transfers among agencies, which can lead to accounting and tracking difficulties.

85. The underlying purpose of preparing annual financial reports is to accurately measure and systematically analyse the funding for operational activities of the United Nations system. Agencies use differing definitions and rules governing data parameters like contributions, expenditures, core funding, regional boundaries, humanitarian programmes, etc. Efforts under way need to be speeded up to establish a common standardized system of financial reporting

86. In addition, the financial statistics are being harmonized with the ODA statistics and vice versa, while recognizing that ODA is only one of the concepts that this data system will measure.

### **Building of a comprehensive financial data and reporting system**

87. The work to build a comprehensive and sustainable financial data and reporting system on United Nations operational activities will aim to provide comprehensive data and analysis on United Nations system financing that is easily accessible to all. It will aim to provide data and information on trends in financing, disaggregated at the level of each entity, and to amalgamate them for a consolidated statement of United Nations financing.

88. Efforts will be made to establish enhanced understanding of the operational activities and trends in the development and humanitarian areas and in the development share of peacebuilding and peacekeeping work of the United Nations system. This broad approach to operational activities for development makes it possible to sub-classify the distinct components, and thus support the better understanding of the operational work of the entities.

89. Efforts will also help measure and analyse the results of the changing funding modalities on funding flows. These include innovative new modalities such as WHO's negotiated core voluntary contributions, as well as direct budget support, multiyear funding frameworks, cost sharing among donors and recipient Governments; unilateral self-supporting funding, which is not ODA; thematic funding, sector-wide funding, humanitarian flows and in kind resources.

90. There is a need to report on the most up-to-date financial data. The data have typically lagged two years behind the reporting date. This is partially owed to differing programming cycles and timing of data preparation by agencies. Up-to-date data is something that heretofore has not been possible. Future reports will aim to provide aggregate forecast data for the most recent year and full detail for the prior year.

91. As mentioned above, efforts will be pursued to provide a new focus on specialized agencies. The combined specialized agencies account for one of the largest shares of contributions for operational activities. In 2006 they accounted for nearly a fifth of total contributions. However, these figures understate the total financing of the specialized agencies, as they do not reflect a considerable part of their assessed contributions and related expenditures that are concerned with operational activities. Accordingly, the data collection, analysis and reporting on the

financing of operational activities need to include expanded coverage and reporting of the specialized agencies, and present more comprehensive and disaggregated data that will be obtained directly from them.

92. Future reports will also assess multilateral aid emanating from the World Bank and regional development banks and compare it against United Nations system flows in overall ODA and broader assistance to countries.

93. A key feature of future work will be close collaboration between the Department of Economic and Social Affairs and United Nations system entities; CEB, UNDG and the DAC Working Party on Statistics.

## Annex I

### **Harmonizing contributions to the United Nations system between United Nations and Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development/Development Assistance Committee data**

1. There are a number of important differences between the way the United Nations and DAC define, classify and report contributions to the United Nations system. Thus, the two methods give very different pictures of the size of the United Nations system's budgets for development. As a first step towards harmonization, these differences were documented in the 2007 Economic and Social Council and General Assembly reports and presented at the DAC Working Party on Statistics.<sup>a</sup>

2. The figures have been updated in this report to reflect 2006 contributions (see table in present annex).

#### **Classification differences**

##### *Core versus non-core*

3. In United Nations statistics, both core and non-core funding from Governments to the United Nations system are classified as contributions to the United Nations for its operational activities. DAC classifies only core contributions from Governments as multilateral aid to the United Nations system, while non-core contributions, sometimes called multilateral assistance, are classified as bilateral aid.

4. The United Nations includes non-core contributions in its estimates because it considers that the purpose of both core and non-core Government contributions to the United Nations system is to support its operational activities. DAC classifies non-core contributions to the United Nations system as bilateral aid because it considers that donor Governments effectively control the use of non-core funds and that the United Nations agencies are channels of delivery, as opposed to recipients, of aid.

5. This difference in the treatment of non-core contributions is the most important single cause of differences between the data published by the two organizations. It is a source of confusion in resource accounting and studies on United Nations system performance, and the totality of DAC funding managed by the United Nations system is more than twice the DAC core funding figure (see table in annex). Also, it can easily lead to errors in analyses of total flows; there is double counting if the DAC data on bilateral aid are added to the United Nations contributions data.

6. For example, the DAC *Development Cooperation Report 2007* states that contributions of DAC member Governments to UNICEF in 2006 were \$660 million, whereas the present report shows that contributions of DAC member Governments to UNICEF in 2006 were \$1,684 million, a difference of more than a billion, since the United Nations figure also includes non-core contributions of DAC member

Governments to UNICEF of \$1,023.6 million. The situation is similar for other United Nations agencies. In fact, the non-core contributions to the United Nations system for all DAC member Governments combined in 2006, as shown in the table in the present annex, were \$6.47 billion, all of which by definition have been included indistinguishably in DAC statistics on bilateral aid.

7. The new treatment of WFP data for 2006 aligns it better with reporting by other United Nations organizations and DAC (see box 1 in the report). DAC treats only its members' contributions to WFP's multilateral "funding window" as core; that is, as multilateral ODA. These amounted to \$242 million in 2006. Furthermore, the United States, by far the largest donor to WFP, is not shown in DAC statistics as a donor to WFP at all because it reports its entire contribution to WFP as bilateral aid. (Similar changes have been effected with UNHCR contributions, as discussed in box 2 in the report.)

#### *Contributions from other multilateral or regional agencies*

8. Contributions from other multilateral or regional agencies are very important for the United Nations system, amounting to \$1.5 billion in 2006, of which \$1.152 billion came from the European Commission. These contributions, mainly non-core, are included in the United Nations figures. The DAC statistics report \$464 million from these organizations (the core contributions only). DAC data measure multilateral flows at the point of contribution by the national donor to the multilateral system, be it a bricks-and-mortar entity or a trust fund. The United Nations also tracks funds that are transferred among agencies for programme implementation and execution. Information is available on the contributions by the European Commission and other intergovernmental organizations to the United Nations system to the extent that they are reported by agencies to the Department of Economic and Social Affairs.

#### *Non-Development Assistance Committee contributions (other than the "self-supporting" contributions)*

9. United Nations figures include contributions to the United Nations system from non-DAC countries that amounted to about \$451 million in 2006. The amount shown in DAC data is only \$110 million. The difference is owed partly to the inclusion in the United Nations figures of non-core contributions from non-DAC countries, but also to the fact that DAC does not receive data from some large non-DAC countries.

### **Inclusion-exclusion differences**

#### *Self-supporting contributions*

10. Some United Nations agencies receive contributions from non-DAC member Governments for expenditures in the contributing country. These are variously called self-supporting, local, cost-sharing or co-financing contributions, and may indeed represent pass-through contributions from funding originally provided by development banks or bilateral donors. These are not measured in the DAC system and would not be treated as contributions to the United Nations, as DAC would have already classified them as contributions either directly to the recipient country or to the relevant development bank. The United Nations also uses the "originating donor" classification approach in order to avoid double counting, but this is done

only among the agencies of the United Nations system where it is possible to disaggregate the source of funds. This is not always possible, as in the case of the UNDP local resources mentioned below.

11. It has been estimated that self-supporting contributions of this nature, found mainly in the Latin American region, were about \$1.89 billion in 2006, of which \$1.363 billion was contributed through UNDP and \$325 million through the specialized agencies. It is of note that the total amount of self-supporting contributions by Latin American countries was \$1.443 billion in 2006.

*Non-governmental and private contributions*

12. The United Nations data include contributions from NGOs and private organizations. In DAC statistics these are recorded under the category of private flows (i.e., not ODA), and those extended to the United Nations cannot be separately identified. These non-governmental and private contributions to the United Nations were at least \$1.47 billion in 2006, a sharp increase over 2005.

*Other issues*

13. There are also other contribution issues currently under review, such as contributions to the United Nations system for thematic programmes, still mainly reported by DAC as bilateral aid but included in the United Nations financial statistics. As this and other issues are discussed in international and regional forums, the results will be analysed as part of the updating of the reporting situation in the next United Nations report.

14. On the basis of this analysis, it is possible to draw up a very rough 2006 reconciliation table between the United Nations and DAC data (see table below).

15. The use of different definitions and classifications by the United Nations and DAC means that the United Nations contributions data cannot be added to or compared with the DAC ODA data without considerable double counting. Because the United Nations total figure for 2006 is nearly three times greater than the DAC figure, the two data sets present a very different image of the scale of United Nations operational and development activities. It may be helpful if DAC statistics could in future provide an additional figure of the total flows that DAC countries channel through the United Nations system for development and other purposes. The total core and non-core flows to the United Nations reported to DAC would then approach the United Nations figure of \$17.2 billion.

## Annex V

### Technical note on sources and coverage

For the purposes of this report, the United Nations system is defined as the 37 entities<sup>a</sup> that reported funding for operational activities for development, including humanitarian and environmental activities (this does not include the Bretton Woods institutions).

Data on contributions and expenditures are obtained directly from United Nations funds and programmes (UNDP, UNEP, UNFPA, UNHCR, UNICEF, WFP, UNCTAD, ITC, UN-Habitat, UNODC, UNRWA), IFAD, the Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs, UNAIDS, the Peacebuilding Support Office and five of the major specialized agencies (FAO, ILO, UNESCO, UNIDO, WHO). Data on the contributions and expenditures of other United Nations system organizations are derived from data on technical cooperation activities collected by the United Nations Development Programme from other United Nations organizations, including the regional commissions, and reported in the UNDP annual reports of the Administrator. Data on ODA are derived from the Development Assistance Committee annual reports.

Data on contributions refer to actual contributions for operational activities received in a given calendar year from Governments and other public and private sources by organizations in the United Nations system. Data on resource transfers from one agency of the system to another are excluded wherever possible. Data on expenditures represent the support provided by the organizations of the system for the operational activities in developing countries. Contributions and expenditures are expressed in current United States dollars, unless otherwise stated.

The designations employed and the presentation of the material in the report do not imply the expression of any opinion whatsoever on the part of the Secretariat of the United Nations concerning the legal status of any country, territory, city or area of its authorities, or concerning the delimitation of its frontiers or boundaries. The term “country” as used in the report also refers, as appropriate, to territories or areas. A hyphen between dates representing years signifies the full period involved, including the beginning and end years.
