Head Coach David Pierce

After just two seasons as the Bearkats head coach, David Pierce already has a place in the Sam Houston State baseball record book.

The former Rice assistant has led the Kats to two Southland Conference regular season championships and at-large selections to the NCAA Regionals.

After winning the school's first Southland regular-season title since 1989, the team went back-to-back for the first time ever. The combined 78 wins under head coach David Pierce is the second-most in school history behind the 89 wins from 1986 to 1987.

Pierce was honored as a "Regional Coach of the Year" in 2012 by the American Baseball Coaches Association (ABCA) as well as being named Southland Conference "Coach of the Year" in 2012 and 2013. He became the first Southland coach to earn consecutive honors since Texas-San Antonio's Sherman Corbett (2007-08).

He also was twice named by PerfectGame.org as one of ten rising stars in the NCAA Division I college baseball coaching ranks.

The 2013 squad won 14-of-15 games down the stretch to clinch the Southland title and solidify their status as an at-large candidate. The league championship and strong non-conference schedule earned the Bearkats a second consecutive No. 3 seed, this time at the Baton Rouge, La. NCAA Regional.

In NCAA Regional play, the Bearkats beat Louisiana-Lafayette, 4-2, for the first opening round win since beating No. 1 Miami in Austin in 1996. The Kats then took on LSU in front of the largest crowd (10,752) in the history of Alex Box Stadium. SHSU took a 5-4 lead into the eighth inning before falling 8-5 to the No. 1 seeded Tigers. The season ended with a 7-5 loss to ULL in which the Kats had the go ahead runs on base to end the game.

Pierce tutored two of the highest-drafted Bearkats in the history of the program. Cody Dickson, taken at No. 119 overall, is the highest drafted Bearkat baseball player since moving to the Division I level. Caleb Smith was selected in the 14th round to become just the 19th Sam Houston player selected in the top 15 rounds of the Major League Baseball draft.

Sam Houston won the 2012 conference title by a margin of four games and earned the No. 1 seed in the Southland post-season tournament for the first time. The 24 Southland victories tied the league record for

most conference wins in a season.

The Kats rolled up a 40-22 overall record, only the third time in the Bearkats' 26 seasons at the NCAA Division I level for the squad to compile 40 or more victories. For the first time in program history, the Bearkats earned national rankings in each of the major college baseball polls, climbing as high as No. 20 in one poll.

The 2012 Bearkats made their seventh NCAA Division I baseball regional appearance, earning an at-large berth in the Houston regional. Sam Houston defeated No. 1 seed Rice and reached the finals against World Series participant Arkansas to equal the program's best NCAA post-season performance ever.

Pierce was an assistant coach for nine years for a Rice Owl team that has been one of the best in college baseball. He served as hitting coach from 2003-2005. In his first season at Rice, the team hit .313 with 51 homeruns and 449 runs driven in on their way to the school's first ever National Championship.

As pitching coach from 2006-2011, he produced a pitching staff ranked in the top 30 in the NCAA in staff ERA for five years, including a No. 4 national mark in 2007. Eight Pierce-coached pitchers were selected in the major league draft, including left-handed starter Joe Savery as the 19th overall pick in the first round.

Pierce joined the college coaching ranks at Houston in 2001. He helped coach the Cougars to an appearance in the NCAA Tournament in his first season. In his second year, he helped take the team further with an NCAA Super Regional appearance, a game away from the College World Series.

Under Pierce's direction, UH sluggers pounded out nearly 700 hits and finished the season with a .310 batting average, the fifth-best single-season performance in team history.

He tutored a trio of Cougar hitters, who established themselves as one of the finest groups of sluggers in school history. Brett Cooley (18) and Chris Snyder (15) tied a school record with 33 home runs by a Cougar duo. Add in Jesse Crain's 11 home runs and that group posted the greatest home run totals by a Cougar trio in school history.

Pierce got his first top job as a head coach for five seasons at Pasadena's Dobie High School, where he led the Longhorns to three District 23-5A championships and three berths in the Region III semifinals.

Among his honors at Dobie was winning the district "Coach of the Year" award three times, being tabbed a coach for the Houston area all-star series, and a coach in the United States Junior Olympic trials.

In his five years at Dobie, Pierce produced three all-state players, 36 all-district stars, and 10 players who went on to perform at the college level. His star pupil at Dobie was former college all-America Shane Nance, who went on to pitch in the major leagues for the Milwaukee Brewers.

He also worked as a batting practice pitcher for the Houston Astros from 1994 through 2000.

Pierce's playing career began at St. Pius X High School in Houston. He then went on to Wharton County Junior College (1982-83) and the University of Houston (1984-85). He helped pace the Cougars to an appearance in the NCAA Tournament as a senior in 1985. He completed his degree at Houston in 1988.

Pierce and his wife Susan have two children, Chelsea and Shea. Their son, Shea is a sophomore catcher on the Bearkat baseball team.

DON SANDERS STADIUM

Sam Houston State's Don Sanders Baseball Stadium is located east of the Bowers Stadium football facility.

The \$5.5 million Sanders Stadium includes spacious dressing areas, indoor hitting cages, and coaches' offices.

Don Sanders is a former owner of the Houston Sports Association and the Houston Astros Baseball Club and currently, along with Nolan Ryan, is co-owner of Ryan-Sanders Baseball. Ryan-Sanders Baseball owns the Rangers' Class AAA Round Rock Express and the Astros' Class AA Corpus Christi Hooks.

The Houston entrepreneur and philanthropist donated \$1 million to establish an endowment fund to enhance the baseball program at Sam Houston State, Sanders's alma mater. Sanders, founder and chairman of the investment firm Sanders Morris Harris, is a leading figure in Houston in a variety of civic, corporate and financial enterprises. He was the founder and chairman of the Houston Police Foundation and a member of the University of Houston System Board of Regents and Houston Police Pension System.

In 2001, he was named Houston Interfaith Charities' "Sportsman of the Year." His current board affiliations include the Nolan Ryan Foundation, the DePelchin Children's Center, and the Houston Museum of Fine Arts.

The stadium opened on Feb. 11, 2006. Numerous UIL high school baseball playoff games and the 2008 Southland Conference baseball post-season tournament have been held in the stadium.

NEW VIDEO/SCOREBOARD

Bud Haney and Don Sanders, both Bearkat alums, have made possible the addition of the new board at Sam Houston State's modern baseball facility.

"We greatly appreciate this generous gift from Bud Haney and Don Sanders in support of the Bearkat baseball program," Sam Houston State president Dana Gibson said. "The video board will add a new dimension of entertainment, excitement and energy for our fans on game day."

The video/scoreboard will see its first use when the Bearkats open the 2014 baseball season Friday, February 14.

Haney and Sanders teamed to donate \$240,000 towards the \$300,000 cost of the video board.

"The new video board will help the vision for Sam Houston baseball of becoming the elite college baseball program in Texas," Haney said. "This will be a first class video board for a first class baseball facility."





Dimensions for the new board will be 31 feet, 10.4 inches tall by 36 feet wide. The board will feature a 20mm video display with 198 lines of resolution by 360 columns of resolution.

The board also will feature four sponsor advertising opportunities to provide additional revenue for the Bearkat athletic program.

"It is an honor and a privilege to participate in such a major positive upgrade to our stadium," Sanders, the stadium's namesake said. "I am pleased to work with Bud Haney to make this possible."

Sam Houston State baseball has seen remarkable success since the stadium opened. The Bearkats earned NCAA Division I regional playoff berths in 2007, 2008, 2009, 2012 and 2013.

"Sam Houston is fortunate to have wonderful alumni who give at such a high level to help this university succeed," Bobby Williams, Bearkat director of athletics said. "The addition of the video board not only elevates the fan experience at the complex but also will provide outstanding opportunities for additional advertising revenue for the program. The athletic department is grateful to our university president, Dr. Dana Gibson, whose leadership has been instrumental in implementing this project."

Further enhancing the facility, dedication ceremonies for the Bud and Joan Haney Diamond Room took place April 27, 2007, as part of the formal naming ceremony for Sanders Stadium.

four consecutive years. The Haneys were honored for their generous donation to the baseball program. The Bud and Joan Haney Diamond Room is a multi-purpose meeting area in the baseball/softball facility.

Haney, class of 1963, earned his Bachelor of Business Administration degree in accounting. He earned NAIA All-America honors in 1960, 1961, 1962, and 1963 while playing at Sam Houston State and in his senior year, the Bearkats won the NAIA World Series national championship.

The founder, president and Chief Financial Officer of Profiles International, a Waco-based occupational assessment company, which now contributes upwards of \$15 to \$20 million to the local economy, Haney is also the co-author of "40 Strategies for Winning in Business."

HOUSTON COLLEGE CLASSIC

Sam Houston State will compete in the Astros Foundation College Classic at Minute Maid Park for the first time ever in 2014.

The field for the 14th annual event will feature six universities, which all hail from the state of Texas. Rice University and the University of Houston will make their annual appearances in the tournament and will be joined by Texas, TCU, Texas Tech and Sam Houston State.

This will mark the second time in tournament history that the field will feature all Texas teams and the first time since the inaugural tournament in 2001 (Baylor, Houston, Rice, TCU, Texas, Texas Tech).

The Bearkats will be making their first appearance in the tournament and the first of any Southland school.

The event will feature nine games at Minute Maid Park from Feb. 28-March 2, 2014.

SHSU will play TCU Fri., Feb. 28 at 3:45 p.m., Texas Tech Sat., March 1 at 12:05 p.m., and Texas Sun., March 2 at 10:05 a.m.

Even though the Kats don't play Houston and Rice in the tournament, they will still face-off in their annual home-and-home series.







Assistant Coach Sean Allen

Sean Allen joined Sam Houston head baseball coach David Pierce's staff as assistant coach in August 2011, playing a major role in directing the Bearkats to back-to-back Southland Conference regular season championships in 2012 and 2013.

The 2013 squad won 14-of-15 games down the stretch to clinch the Southland title and solidify their status as an at-large candidate. The league championship and strong non-conference schedule earned the Bearkats a second consecutive No. 3 seed, this time at the Baton Rouge, La. NCAA Regional. In regional play, the Bearkats beat Louisiana-Lafayette, 4-2, for the first opening round win since beating No. 1 Miami in Austin in 1996. The Kats fell 8-5 to LSU in front of the largest crowd (10,752) in the history of Alex Box Stadium before ULL eliminated SHSU with a 7-5 win.

Allen came to Sam Houston from Florida International University in Miami, Fla., where he was an assistant for a program that rolled up a 130-103-1 record and earned NCAA Division I regional berths in 2009 and 2010. From 2002 to 2007 he was an assistant coach at the University of Houston.

"Sean is one of the most respected young coaches in college baseball," Pierce said. "He has proven he can recruit and develop talent. He has coached hitters, infielders and pitchers with two strong programs and knows how to create a winner."

Allen served as recruiting coordinator, pitching coach and infield coach at FIU, helping build a program that went from a 20-36 record his first year as an assistant in 2008 to a 40-20-1 mark his final season.

Florida International won the Sun Belt Conference tournament championship in 2010 and participated in the NCAA Division I regional in Coral Gables, Fla. In 2009 FIU earned an at-large NCAA berth and appeared in the Chapel Hill, NC, regional.

Florida International was ranked as high as 20th in the national rankings. Allen coached the 2011 Sun Belt Conference Player of the Year (Pablo Bermudez) and four All-Conference players.

While at the University of Houston, Allen worked with the Cougar infielders and as the hitting coach. The Cougars earned NCAA Tournament berths in 2002, 2003 and 2006, and advanced to the NCAA Super Regionals in 2002 and 2003.

Under Allen's direction, Houston ranked nationally in fielding percentage in 2003, 2004 and 2006. He also played a major role in the offensive development of consensus All-American and later Pittsburgh Pirate pitcher, Brad Lincoln, who was named the National Player of the Year by four different entities in 2006.

In 2006, Allen's lineup hit 71 home runs -- the fifth-highest total in UH single-season history -- with All-Conference USA First-Team performer Matt Weston leading the way with 16 homers. The Cougars batted .314 and had a slugging percentage of .544 that season.

Allen began his coaching career as a student assistant in 2002, working with the UH infield and serving as the team's first base coach.

A four-year letterman with the Cougars from 1998 to 2001, Allen ended his playing career as UH all-time leader with 542 assists in the field. In addition, his 192 assists in 2000 was the second-highest total in UH single-season history. During his playing days, the Cougars competed in an NCAA Super Regional and advanced to NCAA postseason play in three consecutive seasons.

A 1998 graduate of Carlsbad High School in Carlsbad, N.M., Allen was a three-time All-District 4-4A honoree and helped the team to four-straight state semifinal and a state championship in 1996. He was honored as the league's Defensive Player of the Year as a sophomore and junior.

Allen earned his bachelor's degree in sports administration from the University of Houston in 2001.

Philip Miller has been part of Sam Houston baseball squads that have earned five NCAA Division I regional playoff berths.

He returned to Sam Houston State as an assistant to head baseball coach David Pierce in August 2011, helping direct the Bearkats to the back-to-back Southland Conference regular season championships in 2012 and 2013.

In 2010 and 2011, Miller was an assistant coach at Northwestern State. Previously, he was volunteer assistant for former Bearkat skipper Mark Johnson for SHSU squads that won three Southland Conference post season tournament championships to advance to the NCAA Division I regionals.

"Philip is a tireless worker with expertise in all facets of running a Division I program," Pierce said. "He has great organizational skills on and off the field and will be a great contributor in many ways."

The 2013 squad won 14-of-15 games down the stretch to clinch the Southland title and solidify their status as an at-large candidate. The league championship and strong non-conference schedule earned the Bearkats a second consecutive No. 3 seed, this time at the Baton Rouge, La. NCAA Regional.

At Northwestern State, Miller served as the Demons' infield and defensive coach as well as first base coach. He assisted with the Demon hitters, recruiting responsibilities, and field maintenance. In 2009, he helped guide the team to a second place finish in the Southland Conference and advance to the Southland Conference Tournament.

The 2010 Demons finished second in the SLC in batting average (.322) and tied for fourth in fielding percentage (.963). The Demons placed a league-best seven student-athletes on the All-Southland Conference honor squad. Two Northwestern State position players were drafted in the 2010 MLB Amateur Baseball Draft.

During his stint with the Bearkats, Miller was outfield and first base coach and assisted with hitters, infielders and catchers. He coached three All-Americans, six All-Southland Conference outfielders and four Southland All-Tournament selections

The Kats made NCAA regional appearances at the University of Mississippi (2007) and Rice University (2008, 2009).

Miller played Northwestern State from 2002 to 2005. In those four years he was a member of two conference championship teams (2002, 2005). During his senior year, the 2005 Demon squad won the Southland Conference with 22 conference wins. That was also the season NSU earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Regional in Baton Rouge.

A native of Clinton, Louisiana, Miller (28) graduated from University High School where he lettered in baseball, cross country and basketball. Miller earned his Bachelor's in Business Administration from Northwestern State in 2005 and his Master's in Education from Sam Houston State in 2010.

Miller is married to former NSU softball standout, Lyndsey (Gorski) Miller.




General Sam Houston is the only man in U.S. history to be governor of two states (Tennessee and Texas).



WHAT IS A BEARKAT ?

Sam Houston's athletic teams have been nicknamed "The Bearkats" since 1923 when the university's name was changed by the Texas state legislature from Sam Houston Normal Institute to Sam Houston State Teachers College.

Prior to 1923, the sports teams were nicknamed "The Normals."

Early references to "Bearkats" spelled the name either "Bearcats," "Bear Cats," or "Bearkats." A bearcat is said by some to be a kinkajou, a small, golden, carnivorous mammal that resides in the jungles of South America.

It is doubtful those who coined the "Bearkat" nickname had either a kinkajou or a binturong in mind, however. More likely, the name came from a popular local saying of the time, "tough as a Bearkat!" Since the animal in the saying was thought more mythical than real, the spelling settled upon was "Bearkat."

The Sammy Bearkat mascot began appearing at Sam Houston sports events in 1959.
