Rabbi's Column

In Jewish tradition, we celebrate Passover once a year, including an elaborate retelling of the triumphant story of the Exodus from Egypt. Though there's one week set aside for remembrance and celebration, in which we concentrate our attention on this seminal event in Jewish history, Jewish liturgy implores us to remember the exodus from Egypt every day.

Though many congregations invoke victims of the Holocaust before the recitation of *Kaddish* at religious services, our communal call to memory is relegated to one day a year. *Yom ha-Zikaron laShoah ve-laGvura* (Holocaust and Heroism Remembrance Day) often shortened to *Yom ha-Shoah* is held on the 27th of the Hebrew month of Nisan, a few weeks after Passover and a week before Israel Independence Day. This year, Yom ha-Shoah falls on April 19th.

I've often wondered if the Holocaust had occurred nearer to when our liturgy was in formation, if it would have had a greater place in our daily Jewish life than it does today. Perhaps given another few hundred years it will. In the meantime, as Holocaust survivors and heroes are fewer and fewer, it's incumbent upon us, to keep this in our active memory.

This year, the Jewish Social Service Agency (JSSA) is giving us an opportunity to do just that.

Perhaps you're already aware that JSSA runs a Holocaust Survivor Program. Here a few things you may not know:

- In 2011, JSSA served 225 Holocaust survivor clients, 40 of whom were new to the program.
- The average age of JSSA's Holocaust survivor client is 85. Fifteen percent of clients are over 90.

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Bet Mishpachah Acquires Cemetery Space

As discussed at length at the annual meeting last December, the board has been deliberating for many months about the acquisition of congregational space at the Elesavetgrad Cemetery in SE Washington, DC. At the February board meeting, the decision was made to proceed with the acquisition. In March, we acquired the first 12 sites.

There are some administrative procedures that are still being worked on, but here is what we can say right now.

We eventually will have interment rights for forty sites in a new section of the cemetery. We have twelve now, and we will get twelve more next year (or sooner if necessary). We are committed to these twenty-four sites (3 rows of 8). The next two rows are being reserved for us, and we have the option to acquire them.

Mark Klempner, Holocaust Rescuer Researcher, to Speak on April 20

Please join us on Friday, April 20, for a very special presentation following *Shabbat* services. Mark Klempner, who lives in Costa Rica, has recently published a book entitled, "The Heart Has

Reasons" (www.hearthasreasons.com), that he has spent the last nine years researching. During his nine years of research, he interviewed Holocaust rescuers to try to determine not only why they did what they did, but where their moral compasses point today, and their advice to young activists. - Members and their immediate family may acquire sites for \$2,000 each.
- Pre-need purchases may either be paid in full or in installments.
- Time of death purchases must be paid in full within 45 days of interment.
- Interfaith couples are permitted; however the certificate of ownership will be registered in the name of the Jewish spouse. No non-Jewish religious symbols are permitted on gravestones.
- Inurnments of cremated remains are permitted.
- No grave liners are required.
- The price will include perpetual care.
- The price does **not** include opening and closing costs.
- Gravestones are **not** included in the price of the site, but are required.

This Month in Jewish History By Rabbi Toby Manewith

On April 1, 1895, the inaugural issue of *The American Jewess*, the first publication aimed explicitly at Jewish women, was published. The magazine covered a wide range of topics, from those that might be found in mainstream women's magazines, such as household management and beauty tips, and those geared specifically at Jewish women, including gender inequity in Judaism, Zionism, social justice efforts and features on prominent Jewish women. At its height, the publication claimed a circulation of more than 25,000.

The publication was driven by Rosa Sonneschein, who served as writer, editor and creative director for the publication's first seven volumes. Sonneschein left her life as a rabbi's wife in St. Louis to go the World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago in 1893. There, she met a number of like-minded Jewish women. *The American Jewess* was born out of their shared hope that Jewish women would continue to increase their sphere of influence, as they had through their involvement in Jewish women's groups popular in the second half of the 19th century.

The magazine was first envisioned among the Jewish women gathered at the 1893 World Parliament of Religions, the same conference at which the National Council of Jewish Women (NCJW) was founded. Consequently, it often served to promote the activities and ideals of the organization. Suggestions that the magazine become NCJW's official publication were not met eagerly. Today, NCJW has its own publication with a circulation rate more than double that of the *The American Jewess*.

The publication ceased printing just four years after its first issue in 1899. Sonneschein had ceded control of the magazine to her male managerial partner the year earlier, citing both health and financial concerns. Apparently, without Sonneschein's vision, the publication wasn't able to survive.

 Nearly seventy percent of JSSA's Holocaust survivor clients require either moderate or full assistance with activities of daily living including such things as bathing, dressing and housekeeping assistance.

One other important fact: This year JSSA's Holocaust Survivor Program is facing a \$200,000 deficit.

I usually don't use this space to solicit donations and certainly not for other organizations. But when this came across my desk, it was hard to ignore.

A number of years ago, I led a number of trips to Germany for Jewish college students. I remember a conversation in which a student adamantly declared that he was curious enough to come on the trip but that he had regretted his decision and would never return; he was uninterested in learning more about a country that had so methodically decimated its Jewish population. When asked how he felt about visiting Spain or Rome, or Egypt, his feelings were different.

The Holocaust remains in our memory, but doesn't seem to prompt the urgency of current anti-Semitism. Nor, as I noted earlier, does it hold a place in the forefront of our minds similar to events and persons in our remote history such as our forefathers and foremothers who are called to attention in our liturgy.

I don't know how much longer we will be privileged to have Holocaust heroes and survivors in our midst, telling their stories. While we do, I think it's incumbent upon us to make sure they're well cared for.

How're we doin'?


That's a question I frequently get asked as treasurer of Bet Mishpachah. Since you asked, let me tell you.

First, you need to know that we operate on a fiscal year that runs from July 1st thru June 30th. As I write this, we have just completed the eighth month of our year—that's February 2012—and have four more months to go. We are also planning for the next fiscal year by working on the budget for FYE June 2013.

So how are we doing so far this year? We are OK. Our income is slightly below budget, chiefly due to lower than expected High Holy Day donations. But a successful calendar year end campaign and some employer matching donations made up for most of that shortfall. Expenses are pretty close to the budget, with a few minor exceptions. My projection for the end of this fiscal year is that we will have a small surplus. So far, so good.

We are only at the beginning of planning for next year's budget. While the situation is not critical, the picture isn't quite so rosy, and I am currently projecting a modest deficit. This assumes we do not increase our income over the previous year while expenses like salaries, rent, insurance, etc are going up. The board will be deliberating on how to address this in March and April when we finalize the budget.

This month in Bet Mishpachah history: April

In April 1982, David Green was President. There were 126 paid-up members. The monthly Women's Outreach Potluck Supper took place on the first Friday evening of the month. The board discussed the upcoming May auction, and decided that Friday night announcements would not be made from the floor and only by the board member on duty. The board also voted to contribute \$500 toward the new drapes for Christ United Methodist Church's social hall, since CUMC was going to fix up the rest of the social hall. Membership dues were cut in half to \$18 for the remainder of the fiscal year. Barrett Brick and Sheryl B. were guest speakers at the University of Maryland Hillel. The topic was the ten-year history of the Gay Jewish movement, our Congregation, and what it means to be a gay or lesbian Jew. About two dozen Hillel members attended the four-hour discussion.

In April 1992, Suzanne Wandersman was President. The monthly Women's Outreach Potluck Supper took place. Hug Ivrit, the Hebrew-speakers group, met, and the Book Group discussed Joyce Antler's America and I. Rabbi Saks led a workshop on *Halacha and Homosexuality*, and the final service leaders' workshop was held. The board voted to pursue space at the National City Christian Church. The first Shabbat service of the month featured Rabbi Sharon Kleinbaum, who spoke about Judaism and Social Justice. A Congregational Passover Seder was well attended, and a bowling benefit for Whitman-Walker Foodbank took place. A Yom Ha-Shoah Shabbat Service was held, and the Jewish Study Center sponsored a class on Sexual Orientation. Nine congregants rented a van for a weekend journey to Ellis Island. Finally, the first Men's Outreach Potluck Dinner took place.

In April 2002 Milton Stern was president. The congregation received a request from the DC Minvan for the use of the Ark and Torah Scrolls on the 1st and 3rd Saturday mornings. The request was approved. Several congregants expressed a desire to begin Friday Night services at 8:00. They decided to table this discussion. The Women's Program continued the previous month's discussion of the 2002 Women of Valor, a program of the Jewish Women's Archive. The topic was Anna Sokolow and was led by Rabbi Berner. This was followed by a Yom ha-Shoah Shabbat service. A Service Leaders workshop was held, and a series of Early Jewish History courses was led by Rabbi Saks. The first congregational Volunteer Recognition Shabbat took place, and Scott Reiter received the Dace Stone Volunteer of the Year Award. Game Night took place at the end of the month, as well as Lag B'Omer in Rock Creek Park.



Michael Mandel to Resume Leadership of Tach'shitim

Choir's Next Performance Will Be at High Holy Days

Michael Mandel has graciously agreed to return to the position of artistic director of *Tach'shitim*, our congregation's choir. He was the director in the choir's early years, and the last time he led it was at High Holy Days 1992, before leaving the Washington area for education as a cantor. He was invested as a cantor by the Hebrew Union College, Jewish Institute of Religion, in June 1997.

When he came back to Washington, he rejoined the choir, lending his beautiful voice to the group and to many cantorial solos at our services. We are lucky to benefit from his inspiring leadership of our choir in meaningful participation in our religious services, not to mention his talent as a composer and arranger of Jewish liturgical music.

From 1993 to 2011, *Tach'shitim* was led by Michael Resnick, who took the choir to new heights of performance, including more significant roles in our services at High Holy Days and throughout the year, concerts before other audiences in the Washington and Baltimore areas and at the International GALA Choruses Festival, and the recording of a CD, *Family and Friends*. Michael was thanked for his long, successful tenure at the synagogue's 36th Anniversary Service in December 2011, at which he led the choir in a post-service concert.

2012 is a year of transition for *Tach'shitim*. Besides the change in artistic director, we are realigning many of the other administrative responsibilities within the choir. In addition, we hope to integrate some new choir members (see accompanying article about auditions). Given all this change, we have decided not to perform as a choir until the High Holy Days. This will allow us to focus on providing a quality and spiritual participation in the High Holy Days services, and it will give ample time for the new voices in *Tach'shitim* to learn a great deal of music.

However, service leaders are always welcome to request participation in their services by one or more members of *Tach'shitim* by directly contacting those individuals. The decision to perform, as well as any other details, will be between the service leaders and the choir members (as opposed to it being a decision or performance by the choir).

Tz'daka and Mishloach Manot Updates: Thank You!!!

In the last months, Bet Mishpachah gave its yearly *tz'daka* of \$500 via the Krampf Fund to one local and one international organization. We also donated a symbolic tree at the *Tu b'Shvat* Seder in February (\$27). In March, Bet Mishpachah members pledged and donated very generously a total of \$1,250 to the Queen Esther fund at the Purim service!

We would like to share with you a bit the work of the four organizations that received our support.

The Sexual Minority Youth Assistance League (SMYAL) is the only Washington, DC metro area service organization solely dedicated to supporting lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and questioning (LGBTQ) youth. Founded in 1984, SMYAL is a 501 (c) (3) nonprofit organization. Their mission is to promote and support self-confident, healthy, productive lives for LGBTQ youth ages 13-21 as they journey from adolescence into adulthood. To fulfill the mission, they work on five focus areas: (1) Life Skills & Leadership Development, (2) Counseling & Support, (3) Health & Wellness Education, (4) Safe Social Activities, and (5) Community Outreach and Education. http://www.smyal.org

From Risk to Opportunity in Jerusalem sponsors Music education for Children of Ethiopian descent. The Ethiopian community still faces tremendous challenges to its integration in the Israeli society; Ethiopians as a group rate among the poorest in Israel; the rate of children who drop out of school and end up with drug and petty crime problems is saddening. This music project offers gifted children, who could never afford a music lesson, funding in high quality music education like lessons with an instrument, theory, funding of an instrument. Children gain self confidence and become visible as successful artists in the Israeli society. New Israel Fund/Green Environment Fund: Shatil (NIF's action-arm) works to build environmental activism in underrepresented areas such as development towns, Arab towns and other areas in Israel's periphery, where residents often lack the resources to move to less hazardous locations and lack political influence to challenge polluters or press for enforcement of government procedures and regulations. Shatil also works to expand activities that address the link between environmental justice and public health as well as economic and social issues and spheres, to strengthen the capacity of Israel's environmental organizations, to empower the public to play an active role in protecting the environment, and to facilitate the development of coalitions advocating for environmental protection.

House of Ruth in Washington DC: Founded in 1976, the House of Ruth helps women, children and families in greatest need, with very limited resources build safe, stable lives, and achieve their highest potential. At House of Ruth, women, children and families heal from lifetimes of traumatic abuse. The project provides counseling, therapy for children and help with housing. According to staff, "seven to ten outcome goals are set for each program, and we look at critical indicators of progress such as the percentage of women who sustain psychiatric stability and sobriety; the percentage of women who have healthy, nurturing relationships with their children; and the percentage of children who are emotionally stable and practicing social skills."


