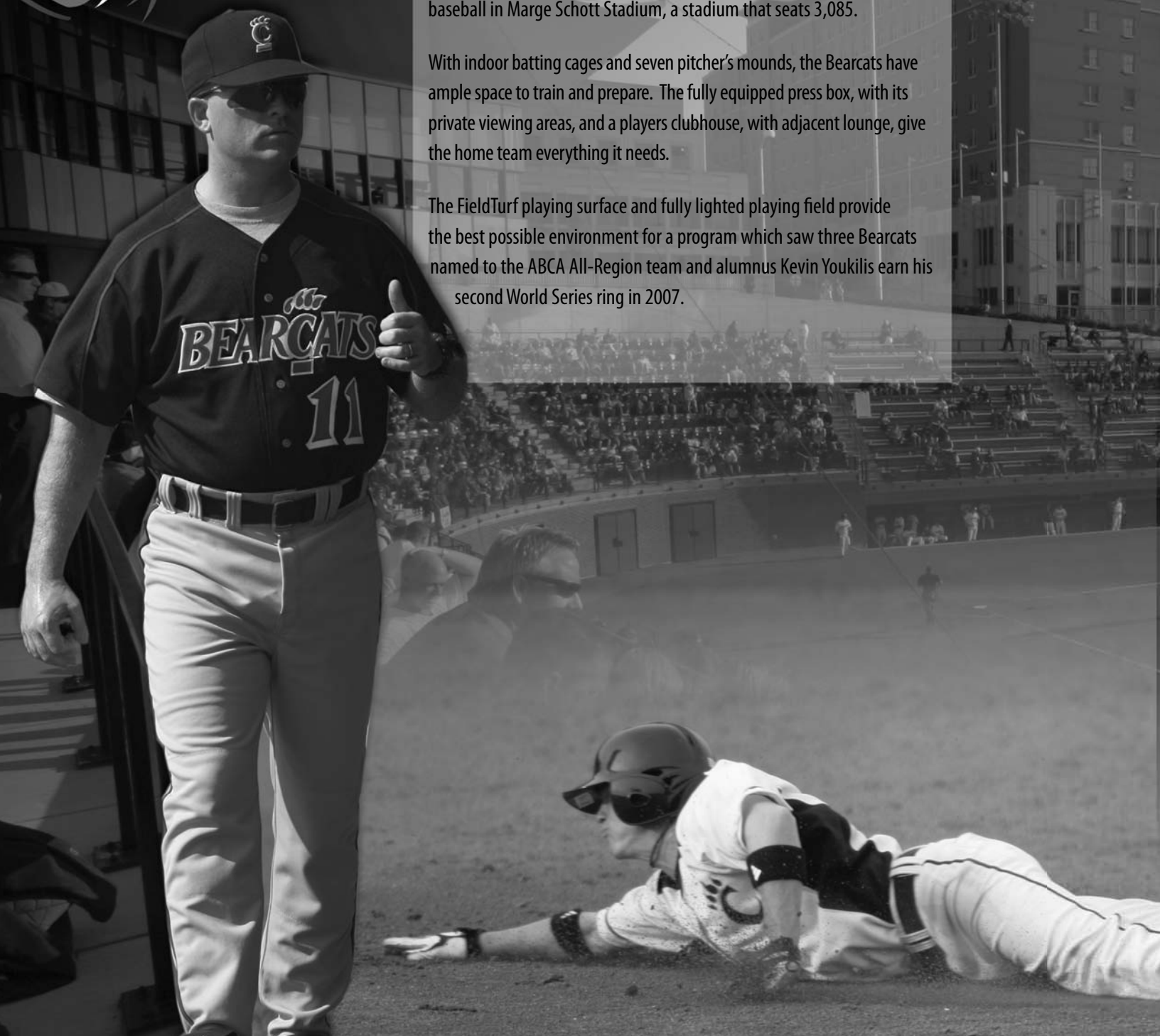
CINCINNATI BASEBALL



Head coach Brian Cleary has revitalized the Cincinnati baseball program in his 13 seasons as the head coach. In 2008 and 2009, the Bearcats finished among the nation's elite in home runs and during the 2008 campaign, UC advanced to its first BIG EAST Championship title game. The Bearcats play in one of the finest fields in all of college baseball in Marge Schott Stadium, a stadium that seats 3,085.

With indoor batting cages and seven pitcher's mounds, the Bearcats have ample space to train and prepare. The fully equipped press box, with its private viewing areas, and a players clubhouse, with adjacent lounge, give the home team everything it needs.

The FieldTurf playing surface and fully lighted playing field provide the best possible environment for a program which saw three Bearcats named to the ABCA All-Region team and alumnus Kevin Youkilis earn his second World Series ring in 2007.

UNIVERSITY OF CINCINNATI

The University of Cincinnati traces its origins to 1819, the year in which Cincinnati College and the Medical College of Ohio were chartered. In 1870, the City of Cincinnati established the University of Cincinnati, which later absorbed the earlier institutions. In 1906, the University of Cincinnati created the first cooperative education program in the United States through its College of Engineering. For many years, the University was the second-oldest and second-largest municipal university in the country. In 1968, UC became a "municipally sponsored, state affiliated" institution, entering a transitional period culminating on July 1, 1977 when UC became one of Ohio's state universities. The University of Cincinnati is classified as a Research Extensive University by the Carnegie Commission, and is ranked as one of America's Top 25 public research universities.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

At the University of Cincinnati, excellence is a hallmark of the academic programs. U.S. News and World Report ranks 12 UC programs among the Top 10 in the country, while another 26 programs are listed among the Top 50 in the nation.

Money Magazine's Elite Values in Higher Education, Kaplan's Unofficial, Unbiased Insider's Guide to the 320 Most Interesting Colleges, Octameron's College Match: A Blueprint for Choosing the Best School for You and Yahoo's Internet Life have all ranked the University of Cincinnati's programs among the best in the nation.

Undergraduate students in any college may apply to the University Honors Scholars Program. If selected as an Honors student, the rewards for being an outstanding student include smaller classes, honors housing, special advising, and scholarships worth up to \$60,000 over four years.

UC's cornerstone scholarship program is Cincinnatus, which awards more than 1,400 scholarships totaling over \$11 million.

- the first use of lasers to remove brain tumors

- Cincinnati hosted one of the first night football games in the United States in 1923.
- George Smith, captain of the 1934 football team, wore a device to protect a facial injury, a fore-runner of the facemask.
- In 1961, Hank Hartong became college football's first soccer-style kicker.
- UC was the first school to make five consecutive appearances in the men's basketball Final Four, 1959-63.

A LOOK AT THE UNIVERSITY

- In fiscal year 2006, UC earned more than \$332 million in grants and contracts. Research funding has quadrupled in the past 20 years, and the University's National Science Foundation ranking has climbed from a placement of 76th to 45th in the nation.
- UC's annual endowment is \$1.185 billion, ranking 54th in the U.S. and 17th among public institutions.
- UC offers 98 doctoral degree programs, 170 master's degree programs, 167 bachelor's degree programs, and 139 associate degree programs.

Numerous concert facilities attract big-name entertainers and acts to the Cincinnati area. The Ohio River offers a variety of scenic views and entertainment options.

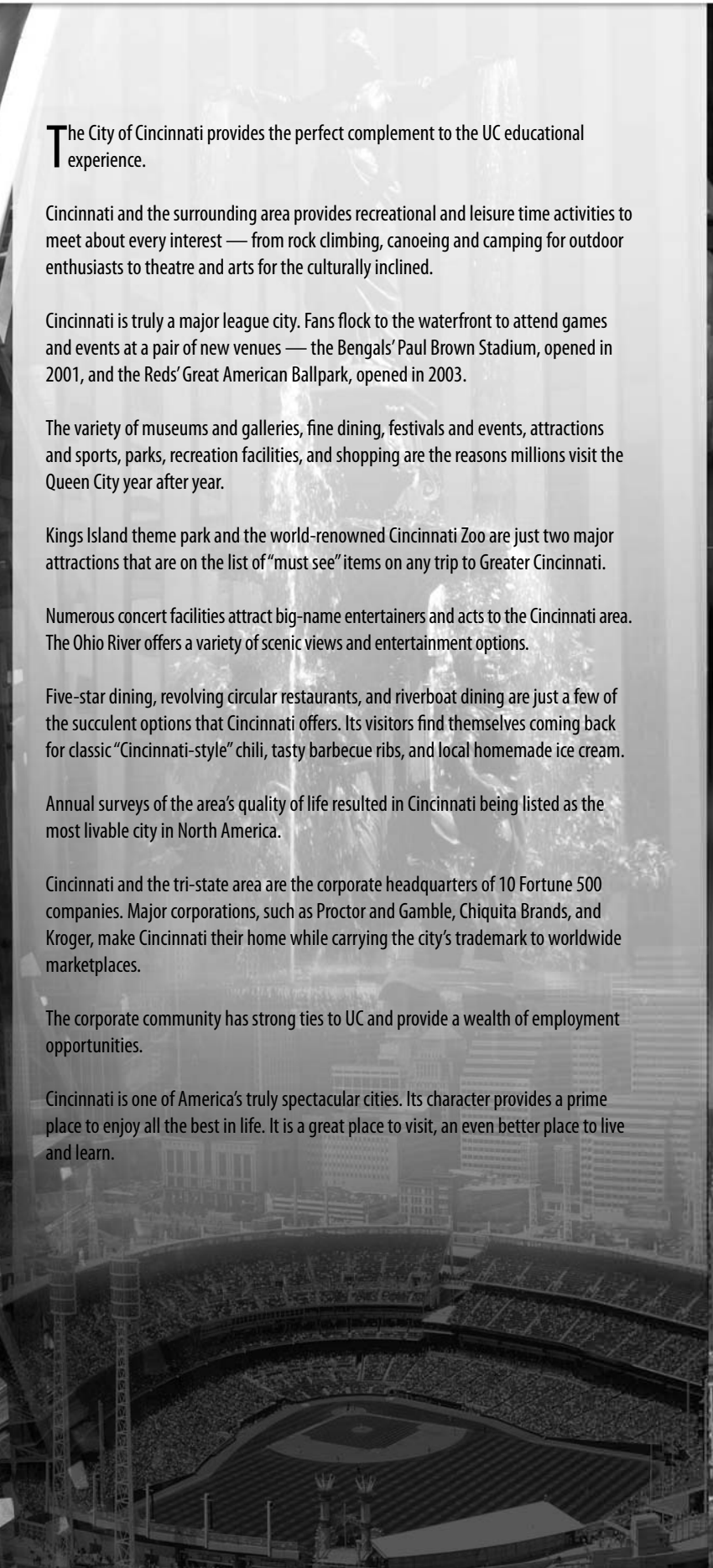

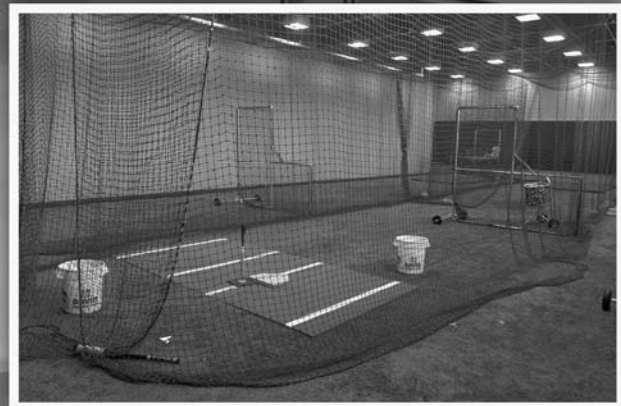
MARGE SCHOTT STADIUM

The University of Cincinnati opened its state-of-the-art, on-campus baseball stadium in May 2004. It was named Marge Schott Stadium in the spring of 2006 after the Marge and Charles J. Schott Foundation made a \$2 million gift to the Richard E. Lindner Varsity Village. Marge Schott was a well-known Cincinnati philanthropist who held controlling interest in the Cincinnati Reds from 1985 to 1999. She passed away in March, 2004, leaving the majority of her estate to the foundation.

The Stadium opened in time for the Bearcats' 2004-season closing series against UAB. The opening game was played on Thursday night, May 20 before a crowd of 2,200.

Recently voted the favorite road stadium in the BIG EAST Conference to visit, Marge Schott Stadium is located directly east of the spot where Johnny Bench Field, the Bearcats' previous home, sat for a number of years. Amenities of the stadium include:

- Seating capacity of 3,085
- Indoor batting cages and pitchers' mounds
- A fully-equipped press box with private viewing areas
- A professional-style players' clubhouse and lounge
- Dressing rooms for coaches
- Full laundry and equipment facilities
- State-of-the-art training room
- FieldTurf playing surface
- A fully-lighted playing field
- Dimensions of 325 down the lines, 365 to the power alleys and 400 to centerfield







RICHARD E. LINDNER VARSITY VILLAGE

The future arrived for the University of Cincinnati athletics program in May, 2006 with the completion of the Richard E. Lindner Varsity Village.

The extensive renovation and upgrade of all of UC's athletics facilities, and the construction of some new venues, positions the Bearcats' sports programs to compete among the nation's best.

The term "village" aptly applies because the close proximal location and interconnection of the facilities provides ease of use and access to services for all of the sports teams and their student-athletes, similar to that of a small town.

There was nothing small about the vision for Varsity Village, a \$105 million project, over half of which was privately financed.

The centerpiece of the project was the construction of the Richard E. Lindner Center. Its purpose is to serve as the home for all of the sports programs as well as the centralized support services.

Located between Nippert Stadium and Fifth Third Arena, the Lindner Center is a futuristic eight-story structure which houses offices, locker rooms, and reception and meeting space for each of the sport programs. The administrative services and support areas are also housed in the building.

The emphasis of the Lindner Center programming is on the student-athlete. One entire floor of the building is devoted to the Nancy Hamant Academics Center, which contains study facilities for UC's 560 student-athletes, including over 80 computer stations.

A new athletics training center, equipped with state-of-the-art diagnostic and treatment equipment, including three hydrotherapy pools, is included in the Lindner Center. The University Health Services for students has been relocated to the Lindner Center and provides expanded medical coverage conveniently located for UC student-athletes. An MRI diagnostic center is also part of the building, making UC the first school in the country to have one in its athletics facilities.

Space for strength and conditioning training in the adjacent Fifth Third Arena has been doubled to 18,000 square feet and has been furnished with the latest in weight training equipment. A new 12,000-square foot practice gymnasium will ease the scheduling of workouts and practices.

While the Lindner Center provides for the present and future of UC athletics, it also recognizes and celebrates UC's proud past. The ground level of the five-story atrium features the George and Helen Smith Museum detailing the history of both the athletics program and the University. Sports histories are portrayed in graphic murals and on video screens. A five-story trophy case, making it one of the world's largest, houses the Bearcat's championship memorabilia.

The unique building was designed by signature architect Bernard Tschumi. UC graduate Eva Maddox (DAAP 1966) orchestrated the design of the museum.

Varsity Village created three new sports venues and made significant upgrades and enhancements to two others.

The new baseball stadium, named for late Cincinnati Reds owner and area philanthropist Marge Schott, opened late in the 2004 season. UC's tennis program benefits from a new on-campus tennis center. The swimming and diving teams have a new training and competition home, the Keating Aquatics Center, in the nearby new student recreation center.

UC's track and soccer complex was totally renovated and permanent seating for 1,400 was added, along with a press box, and reopened as the Ben and Dee Gettler Stadium.

Nippert Stadium, which has been the home to UC football and the activities of just about every other outdoor sport since 1902, has undergone significant improvements in seating and other accoutrements for the spectators, such as expanded concourses and concessions areas, and a new video board. Teams benefit from field-level game day locker rooms and a grass-like FieldTurf artificial playing surface.

Even UC's Marching Band benefited with the creation of the Rockwern Band Center.

Landscaping has created a major walkway, O'Varsity Way, that leads visitors through the heart of Varsity Village. The Raymond D. Sheakley Lawn and Victory Plaza provide gathering and activities space for UC fans attending events.





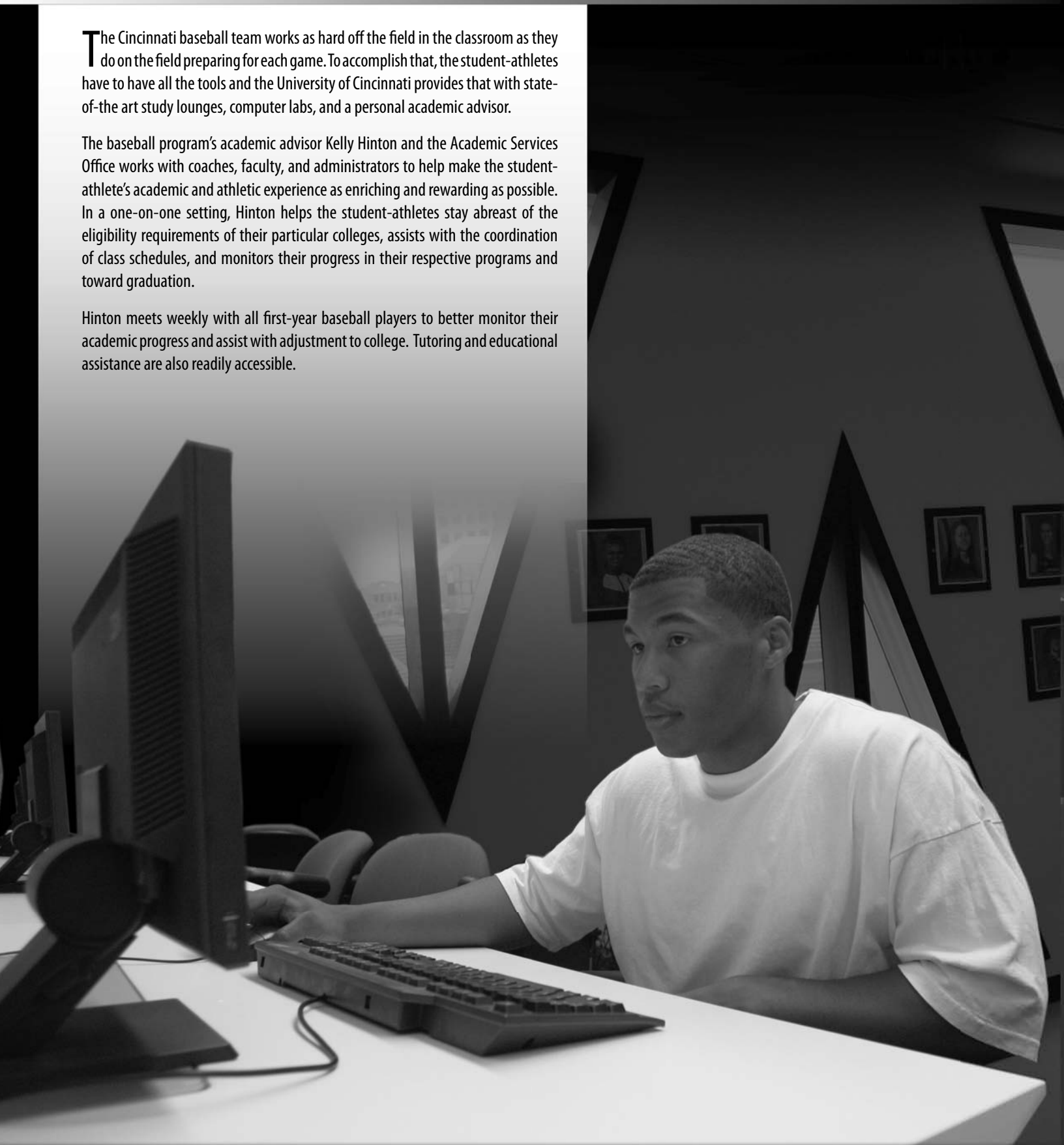


ACADEMIC SERVICES

The Cincinnati baseball team works as hard off the field in the classroom as they do on the field preparing for each game. To accomplish that, the student-athletes have to have all the tools and the University of Cincinnati provides that with state-of-the-art study lounges, computer labs, and a personal academic advisor.

The baseball program's academic advisor Kelly Hinton and the Academic Services Office works with coaches, faculty, and administrators to help make the student-athlete's academic and athletic experience as enriching and rewarding as possible. In a one-on-one setting, Hinton helps the student-athletes stay abreast of the eligibility requirements of their particular colleges, assists with the coordination of class schedules, and monitors their progress in their respective programs and toward graduation.

Hinton meets weekly with all first-year baseball players to better monitor their academic progress and assist with adjustment to college. Tutoring and educational assistance are also readily accessible.





SERVICES PROVIDED FOR STUDENT-ATHLETES

Academic Advising: The UC Academic Services staff provides information regarding policies, procedures, course selection, selection of major and minor areas of study as well as NCAA and university guidelines for adequate academic progress.

Priority Registration: Student-athletes meet with an advisor in their college in order to obtain a check sheet and a graduation plan. The student-athlete then meets with an athletic academic advisor during priority registration in order to register for the quarter. Priority registration allows student-athletes to register for classes around practice and competition schedules.

Counseling: Individual work is done with student-athletes with specific concerns such as decision-making, adjustment to college, communications, relationships, test-anxiety and necessary study skills. Appropriate referrals are made to other campus resources.

Monitoring Academic Progress: Progress reports are used to gather classroom performance information from professors. This information is shared with the student-athlete and his/her coach so everyone can keep abreast of the current academic progress.

Tutorials: Services are provided for one-on-one and small group tutoring. Student-athletes may submit requests for a tutor assignment in most courses.

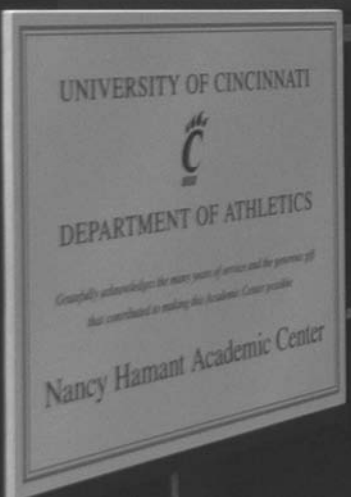
Career Development and Placement: The interests and strengths of each student-athlete are continually measured to prepare the student-athlete for a career beyond college. In addition to aiding career exploration and placement, this program provides assistance in securing summer employment opportunities and internships opportunities and post-graduate scholarships.



NANCY HAMANT ACADEMIC CENTER

The opening of the Richard E. Lindner Athletic Center pays huge dividends for student-athletes in terms of academics as the building houses the spacious Nancy Hamant Academic Center on the entire fifth floor.

The center, named in honor of the longtime faculty athletics representative, The Hamant Academics Center gives student-athletes a variety of ways to fulfill their study needs. The large study room is furnished to accommodate a variety of study habits and features 71 computer stations, a 50-person study room, five group meeting rooms and over 14 individual tutor rooms.





STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Strength and conditioning is one of the most important ingredients of any successful intercollegiate athletic program. To help the Bearcats' student-athletes maximize their athletic potential, UC combines a modern, comprehensive facility with the latest techniques in strength training.

No area of the baseball program is given greater attention and emphasis than strength and conditioning.

With the opening of the Richard E. Lindner Athletics Center, the Bearcats utilize an 18,000-square foot strength training facility. The new center includes over \$1 million in Hammer Strength equipment and a five-lane running track.

The mirror-covered room is trimmed in red and black and features a tuflex floor made especially for weight training facilities. The modernized weight facility is highlighted by a quadraphonic sound system.

Dave Andrews is the director of UC's olympic strength training and conditioning program. Andrews has a proven record of success developing student-athletes and helping them achieve their full potential and he works directly with the UC baseball team.

Strength and conditioning is on-going. Programs are tailored to enable athletes to maintain strength during the peak physical demands of a playing season and increase strength through more extensive training during the off-season.





SPORTS MEDICINE

The University of Cincinnati's sports medicine program is responsible not only for helping student-athletes make speedy recoveries from injuries, but in preventing injuries from occurring.

UC's sports medicine program is a comprehensive approach to the injury care and the wellness of the University's over 500 student-athletes, utilizing state-of-the-art diagnostic and treatment equipment with the latest methods in the care and prevention of injuries. Its objectives are simple: to prevent injuries, to rehabilitate injuries, to adjust to the stress following injuries and to educate student-athletes about various wellness issues. The goal is to get UC's athletes back in the classroom and on the playing field functioning at 100 percent capacity. The goal is attained in several ways. New student-athletes are carefully examined before they participate to detect potential problems. Student-athletes are afforded state-of-the-art therapeutic care.

The opening of the Richard E. Lindner Athletics Center in May 2006 provides a new, state-of-the-art sports medicine facility that caters to the needs of UC's student-athletes. Features of the facility include over 4,000 square feet of space for treatment and taping, spacious office suites for training staff and physicians, a physicians exam area, pharmacy, and x-ray facilities.

A highlight is the hydrotherapy facility which has a three-level, 5,000 gallon, two-treadmill exercise pool, and two 12-person whirlpools (one for hot and one for cold therapy). The sports medicine facility is located one floor below the new University Health Services Center, providing easy access to physicians and services. University Radiology has an MRI diagnostic center as part of the new complex.

Under the direction of Assistant Director of Athletics for Sports Medicine Jeff Carrico, UC's athletics training staff is the backbone of the sports medicine program. Trainers are present at every practice and event to monitor the health of the student-athletes and respond to injuries.

Dr. W. Kenneth Stephens, a fellow in the American College of Sports Medicine and member of the American Medical Society for Sports Medicine, has served as the Bearcats' team physician for the past 30 years. UC's University Health Service provides a staff of medical professionals accessible to student-athletes 24 hours a day.

Dr. Angelo Colosimo and the staff of the University Orthopedics Associates of Cincinnati is on call to address orthopedic injuries, performing all orthopedic surgeries and supervising post-operation rehabilitation programs.

The UC Medical College provides nationally-recognized specialists who are immediately accessible. University Hospital, a nationally-recognized medical center, is immediately adjacent to the campus, providing UC student-athletes the absolute best in health and medical care.

UC'S CATAPULT

BIG EAST Championships in every sport within the next five years, continued leadership by UC student-athletes in academics, and community engagement are the main goals of CATAPULT, an action plan for University of Cincinnati athletics unveiled by Director of Athletics Mike Thomas.

Thomas' five-year vision for UC's 18-sport intercollegiate program was launched six months into his tenure at UC. The plan focuses on three main initiatives: winning BIG EAST team championships, high-level academic achievement, and a comprehensive integration with the Greater Cincinnati Community.

"It is critically important for our student-athletes, past, present and future, along with our coaches, staff, alumni, and fans to know that we are 100 percent committed to being a championship program within the BIG EAST," said Thomas. "Setting specific goals will keep all of our stakeholders focused on where we need to go. The title of the program, CATAPULT, is truly symbolic of what our department is poised to do over the next five years, which is to leap over the rest of the BIG EAST, and go all the way to the top."

The basic components of CATAPULT are:

CHAMPIONSHIPS: UC will win a BIG EAST championship in every sport within the next five years. The Bearcats picked up their first BIG EAST championship in 2006 as the men's soccer team captured the regular-season title.

ACADEMICS: UC student-athletes will set the pace academically by continuing to lead the general student body in graduation rates and over a five-year period outperform the general student body in grade point average. UC student-athletes are graduating at a 59 percent rate, which exceeds the 49 percent rate of school's general student body and is on par with the national student-athlete rate of 62 percent. In the most recent compilation of the grade-point averages, UC student-athletes posted an accumulated grade point average of 3.07 while the overall GPA of the UC student body was 2.969.

BIG EAST CONFERENCE

With 30 years under its belt, The BIG EAST Conference continues on a path of success in and out of the athletic arena. The goals have always been the same. The league wants and expects to compete at the highest level and does so with integrity and sportsmanship. The commendable performances of the student-athletes at BIG EAST schools are the indicators of the league's proud tradition of success.

The BIG EAST has gone through membership changes since its birth, but the 2009-10 academic year will mark the conference's fifth straight with the same 16-member group, the nation's largest Division I-A conference.

In 2008-09, BIG EAST student-athletes again succeeded on the national stage. The Connecticut women's basketball team won its sixth national championship by defeating conference foe Louisville in an all-BIG EAST NCAA title game. The Notre Dame women's soccer team reached the NCAA championship game and the Syracuse field hockey squad advanced to the NCAA Final Four. Three BIG EAST women's cross country teams finished in the top 10 at the NCAA Championships. West Virginia was fourth followed by Villanova in sixth place and Georgetown in ninth.

Individually in women's sports, Providence's Dannette Doetzel won the 10,000 meters at the NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships. Connecticut's Maya Moore was the conference's sixth winner of the Wade Trophy as the top player in women's basketball. Notre Dame's Kerri Hanks won the Hermann Trophy, the top award in women's soccer.

On the men's side, Connecticut and Villanova advanced to the Final Four in basketball. The 2008-09 campaign was arguably the best men's basketball season in the history of the BIG EAST with the league setting NCAA standards with three No. 1 tournament seeds, four teams in the round of the Elite Eight and five in the Sweet 16.

The St. John's men's soccer team reached the NCAA College Cup before losing in the national semifinals.

BIG EAST football has maintained its high profile and its reputation as a balanced group. Seven of the league's eight squads were nationally ranked or received votes in the national polls in 2008. Cincinnati was the league champion. The BIG EAST, a charter member of the Bowl Championship Series, has won three of its last four BCS bowl games. West Virginia, Louisville and Connecticut also have won or shared league crowns over the past four seasons.

The BIG EAST has continued to produce student-athletes who were at the forefront of athletic and academic achievement. In 2008-09, 19 BIG EAST players were chosen to their respective *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America Teams, including eight first-team selections. Nearly 400 student-athletes have earned academic all-America honors.

The BIG EAST became the nation's largest Division I-A conference in 2005-06 when five new members began competing. The new schools were: University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida.

BIG EAST institutions reside in nine of the nation's top 34 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Milwaukee and Cincinnati. With its newest members, BIG EAST markets contain almost one fourth of all television households in the U.S.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 26 national championships in six different sports and 126 student-athletes have won individual national titles.

The BIG EAST has enjoyed tremendous basketball success, especially in this decade. In 2008-09, the BIG EAST produced four of the eight Final Four teams in men's and women's basketball. It was only the second time in NCAA history that one conference placed that many Final Four teams in the same season.

In 2003-04, Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA basketball titles in the same season. In '02-03, the BIG EAST became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in the same year when the Syracuse men and the Connecticut women captured their respective national championships. In men's basketball, BIG EAST squads have won three of the last 11 NCAA championships. BIG EAST women's teams have taken six of the last 10 NCAA titles.

Proactive movement has been a signature strategy for the conference that was born in 1979. The BIG EAST continually turns challenges into opportunities to become stronger.

In 2009-10, the BIG EAST will add men's lacrosse to its growing list of sports, which will increase its total to 24 sport championships. The first women's golf championship was held in the spring of 2003. Women's lacrosse and rowing were added in 2001.

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse universities. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven school alliance.

While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. Its student athletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably show a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful organization has been fortunate to have outstanding leadership. Michael Tranghese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate to Dave Gavitt, became Commissioner in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of The BIG EAST Football Conference.

For 2009-10, the BIG EAST will undergo one significant change. Tranghese stepped down from his position on June 30, 2009. John Marinatto, who has served as senior associate commissioner, has moved into the Commissioner's chair.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student athletes. The conference has enjoyed long-standing relationships with CBS, ESPN, Inc. and ABC.

BIG EAST men's basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual men's BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden. The women's basketball championship has led all conferences in attendance for the past six years. Attendance figures also are significant in soccer and baseball.

More than 550 BIG EAST student-athletes have earned all America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well represented in U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams. Several athletes earned gold medals in each of the last six summer Olympiads.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence where the conference administers to more than 5,500 athletes.

UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

GREGORY H. WILLIAMS



Gregory H. Williams serves as the 27th president of the University of Cincinnati, one of the nation's top 25 public research universities. He began his tenure at UC on November 1, 2009.

From 2001-2009, President Williams served as president of The City College of New York (CCNY), the flagship college of The City University of New York. He has worked as a university administrator for over 30 years, serving in a variety of posts at The George Washington University, The University of Iowa and The

Ohio State University. Prior to becoming CCNY's president, he was Dean of the Law School and Carter C. Kissell Professor of Law at The Ohio State University. Early in his career, Dr. Williams was a Deputy Sheriff, and he later worked as an aide to a U.S. Senator.

President Williams has published three books and a number of articles and book reviews for The New York Times, The Los Angeles Times and The Washington Post. He is best known for his award-winning and best selling memoir, *Life on the Color Line: The True Story of a White Boy Who Discovered He Was Black*. As a result of his autobiography, he has been featured on a number of national programs including "Oprah," "Dateline NBC with Tom Brokaw," "Larry King Live," ABC's "Nightline with Ted Koppel" and "Fresh Air with Terri Gross" of National Public Radio.

In 1995, *Life on the Color Line* was selected as Book of the Year by The Los Angeles Times. In 1996, the Gustavus Myers Center for the Study of Human Rights in North America named *Life on the Color Line* an "Outstanding Book on the Subject of Human Rights." It is often required reading for entering students at U.S. colleges and universities.

Currently, Dr. Williams serves as Chair of the Commission on Access, Diversity and Excellence (CADE) of the Association of Public and Land Grant Universities (APLU, formerly the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges), and he is a past president of the Association of American Law Schools.

During his tenure at CCNY, Dr. Williams' leadership brought the college increased national recognition. Enrollment increased by nearly 50% – including an increase in new freshmen, under new, more rigorous admissions standards, with the largest incoming honors class in the college's history. According to *US News and World Report*, City College is the most diverse college campus in the nation, where Hispanics are the largest group. As a result of his leadership, the State of New York has begun to invest close to \$1 billion dollars in new science facilities and a new home for the CCNY School of Architecture. Dr. Williams also led CCNY's first capital campaign in history, which has raised over \$330,000,000.

President Williams has received numerous awards. Among them are the "Governor's Tribute to African-American Leaders of Excellence in State Service" (2004) from New York Governor George Pataki for his significant contributions to the people of the state, the Austrian Cross of Honor in Science and Art, First Class (2006), and the "Dean of the Year" award given by the National Association of Public Interest Law (1999). He also was the first recipient of the National Bar Association's A. Leon Higginbotham, Jr. Award for Outstanding Contributions to the Preservation of Human and Civil Rights (1999).

President Bill Clinton invited Dr. Williams to the White House in 1998 as part of his "Call to Action" to promote pro bono work and diversity in the legal profession.

President Williams has earned five degrees, including a JD and PhD from George Washington University, and he holds four honorary doctorates.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



A 24-year veteran of college athletics administration, Thomas was named as the University of Cincinnati's Director of Athletics on October 20, 2005. Since taking the reins of the

department with 18 teams and 560 student-athletes, Thomas has championed student-athlete development and significant external growth, while also authoring a detailed plan for competitive success in the BIG EAST Conference and on the national level.

In May of 2006, Thomas introduced his vision for Bearcats Athletics, aptly titled CATAPULT – an acronym for championships, academics, and together. Thomas's five-year vision for UC's 18-sport intercollegiate program was launched on the six-month anniversary of his hiring. The plan focuses on three main initiatives: winning BIG EAST team championships, high-level academic achievement, and a comprehensive integration with the UC Campus and Greater Cincinnati Community.

By the end of 2008-09, the third year under the CATAPULT plan, UC's sports teams continue to excel in academics as a whole as the student-athletes combined to achieve a grade-point average (GPA) of 3.034 and continued to graduate at a rate of 16 percent higher than the overall student body. Those numbers will continue to grow as more and more students receive the benefits of the recently expanded and redefined academic services office and the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills program.

In 2007-08, Cincinnati was second in the 16-member BIG EAST with five teams garnering BIG EAST Academic Excellence Awards for posting the highest grade-point average in their respective sports (football, men's cross country, women's golf, women's swimming and diving, and women's indoor track and field).

This past year, two teams garnered BIG EAST Academic Excellence Awards (lacrosse and women's swimming), while five athletes earned the league's Scholar-Athlete Sport Excellence Award in their respective sport, tying

the University of Notre Dame for the most individual awards in the conference.

In 2006, Thomas hired head football coach Brian Kelly and the football team has made program history in the three seasons since. Kelly led UC to a school-record 11 wins in 2008, along with the school's first BIG EAST Conference Championship, and an appearance in the 75th FedEx Orange Bowl, the first Bowl Championship Series appearance by Cincinnati. The Bearcats' 21 wins since 2007-08 marks the first time UC has won 10 or more games in back-to-back seasons.

UC Athletics produced two BIG EAST team titles, five all-Americans, one all-Region selection, and 28 all-BIG EAST honorees in 2008-09.

In March 2007 UC Athletics was recognized in the 2006-07 Diversity in Athletics Award, presented by the Laboratory for Diversity in Sport at Texas A&M University. The award recognizes the NCAA Division I athletics departments that excel in various areas of diversity. UC was one of just 10 programs nationwide to earn the Diversity in Athletics Award for the graduation of African American male student-athletes.

On the external side, the University of Cincinnati is growing at a tremendous rate.

UC established single-season attendance records for football in each of the past two years, as it posted eight of the Top-12 crowds in Nippert Stadium history. In just four years at UC, Thomas has seen the average attendance in football skyrocket as it has almost doubled (16,016 to 31,965).

In terms of donor development, the UCATS office has reached all-time highs for participation with over 3,800 donors joining the club in 2008-09 (double its total two years ago) and annual fund donations at a record high. Thomas' work on the multi-phase "Raising the Bar" capital campaign, which will fund various initiatives for the football program, was crucial in the program raising its first \$5 million over a six-week period.

Fund raising and major gifts are on-going processes at UC with plans to build a new outdoor sports complex with a bubble which will serve as a practice venue for football, a competition site for lacrosse, and be accessible to the UC and Greater Cincinnati communities. The department is also studying the potential renovations and/or expansions of both Nippert Stadium and Fifth Third Arena. The Nippert Stadium renovation is critical as two months before the first football game of 2009, season ticket sales for UC football broke the all-time record.

Beginning in the fall of 2008, all UC teams were outfitted exclusively in adidas footwear, uniforms, training apparel, and accessories as the department signed its first across-the-board shoe and apparel contract. The four-year contract aligns UC with other adidas marketing partners such as the NFL, MLS, and an 11-year exclusive all-league partnership with the NBA.

Later in 2008-09, Thomas reached an agreement with IMG College, a division of IMG Worldwide, for a new 12-year multimedia rights partnership.

Prior to coming to UC, Thomas spent five years as the Director of Athletics at the University of Akron and seven years as associate athletics director at the University of Virginia, an institution known for achieving

impressive success both academically and athletically, before bringing that model to Akron. Virginia finished in the Top 25 in the Director's Cup in each year of Thomas' tenure there while at the same time was in the top ten nationally in student-athlete graduation rates.

Under Thomas' direction, Akron rose from last place to second among Mid-American Conference schools in the Director's Cup annual rankings. Simultaneously, Akron vaulted from last to second place in the MAC Academic Achievement Awards. Thomas increased the financial base of the Akron athletics program through increasing corporate sponsorship levels by 500 percent and boosted annual giving to athletics to its highest level in the school's history. Community support was rallied, with marked increases shown in football and basketball attendance. During this time period, the Zips won their first MAC football championship and the hiring of men's basketball coach Keith Dambrot has led to unparalleled success on the hardwood.

Support services and facilities for academic support for student-athletes were significantly increased, which resulted in a significant improvement in grade point averages and graduation rates of UA student-athletes.

Thomas coordinated over \$140 million in facility construction and renovation, including \$25 million in capital improvements at Akron, including a new indoor fieldhouse, a football practice complex, and a softball facility. He also spearheaded the new on-campus football stadium and was instrumental in the initial fundraising and planning stages of the facility which opened in September of 2009.

Recognized for his administrative acumen by his peers, Thomas presently serves on several national and conference committees, including the NCAA Division I Championship/Sports Management Cabinet (where he also serves as the NCAA men's basketball liaison to the cabinet), the NCAA Men's Basketball Issues Committee, and he also chairs the BIG EAST Championship and Competition Committee. Thomas has also previously served as a member of the NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet, the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Issues Committee, the NCAA Division I Academics/Eligibility/Compliance Cabinet, the NCAA Postseason Bowl Licensing Subcommittee, and the Division 1A Athletics Director's Association Legislative Review Committee.

Twice during his career, Thomas has received distinction for his efforts and dedication as a director of athletics, garnering the General Robert R. Neyland Outstanding Athletics Director Award in 2005 at Akron and then again in April of 2008 at Cincinnati.

Prior to his experience at Virginia, Thomas spent seven years at the University of Denver as assistant athletics director for internal operations, and one year at the University of Iowa in marketing and promotions, and operations.

Thomas, 49, received his B.S. degree in Business Administration from Colorado State University in 1983, and his M.S. degree in Athletic Administration from Western Illinois University in 1986. He and his wife, Jenifer, have four children: Vince, Joey, Mick, and Meredith.

In 13 seasons at the University of Cincinnati, Brian Cleary has established himself as one of the top coaches in UC baseball history. After

taking over a struggling program in 1997, Cleary has led the Bearcats to 335 wins in his career, ranking second on the school's all-time win list behind the legendary Glenn Sample.

The 41-year-old Cleary has established a strong core of athletes. Due to his energy and passion to deliver a winning product for the University, he has upgraded the talent level within the program thanks to an emphasis on aggressive recruiting. With the influx of talent, Cleary has set his sights on taking the program to the NCAA Tournament after a 30-plus year absence.

For the past five seasons, Cleary has rebuilt a team that's poised to contend for BIG EAST championships. With the completion of the state-of-the-art Marge Schott Stadium and the signing of five straight top recruiting classes, the foundation has been built to allow Cincinnati to compete for BIG EAST Championships and NCAA Tournament appearances for years to come.

Regarded as one of the top coaches in country to develop hitters, Cleary has coached 40 position players that have either been drafted or signed as a free agents. Of those 40 players, only seven were drafted out of high school.

One of those 40 players was Mike Spina, who cemented himself as one of the top hitters in Bearcats history in just two years of action. After breaking UC's single-season home run record and tying the program's single-season RBI record with 21 home runs and 79 RBI in 2008, Spina drove in 69 runs and broke his own single-season home runs record with 23 in 2009. Additionally, Spina ranks in the Top 10 in UC's career record books in slugging percentage (.703, 1st), home runs (44, 3rd), on-base percentage (.443, 4th), and RBI (148, 6th).

Alongside his experience on the collegiate level, Cleary has also served two stints coaching on the international level. Cleary coached the British National Team in the Baseball World Cup (2009) and the European Championships (2007). During his time with the teams, Cleary served as an assistant coach and worked primarily with the pitchers, helping the squad capture a second place finish at the European Championships in 2007 and a second-round appearance at the Baseball World Cup in 2009.

The fortunes of the Bearcats were never better in 2008 as Cleary's charges set a school record for wins in a season (39) and conference wins in a season (19). UC battled for the BIG EAST regular season championship all year, finishing second in the standings and advancing to the championship game of the postseason tournament. At the conclusion of the year, another mark was matched as four of Cleary's players were selected in the MLB Draft (Josh Harrison, Dan Osterbrock, Tony Campana and Mike Spina). None of those players were drafted out of high school.

The progression began to show dividends during the 2006 season as Cleary guided the Bearcats to their sixth 30-win season ever and first post-season appearance since 2001. Following the season, Logan Parker became the 11th draft pick in the Cleary era when the Cincinnati Reds selected him in the 12th round of the MLB Draft.

The 2005 season brought an improvement of 10 victories from the year before, as the Bearcats finished the campaign with a 25-30 mark. The season concluded with Josh Kay and Mark Haske both being selected in the MLB Draft. Later in 2005, UC's recruiting class received honorable mention nationally from *Collegiate Baseball* magazine.

Cleary made an immediate impact upon joining the Bearcat family. After inheriting a team that won only five games in 1996, Cleary pushed his teams to increased win totals each of his first four years. After winning 12 games in his first year, he increased that total to 15 in 1998, 30 in 1999 and 35 in 2000.

The 1999 squad posted a breakthrough 30-29 season, shattering 17 individual and eight team records and finishing as the eighth most improved team in the nation (12-game improvement). The 30 wins marked just the third 30-win season in UC's 115 years of baseball and the first winning campaign since 1995.

In 2000, the Bearcats won a school record 35 games and advanced to the finals of the C-USA Tournament. The squad also set four individual and eight school records.

In 2001, UC garnered 34 wins, the second-most in school history, and went 16-11 in Conference USA to finish tied for third. That finish was the best by a Bearcat team in Conference USA. Kevin Youkilis was a third-team all-American and one of three Bearcats taken in the 2001 Major League Baseball Amateur Draft. Tony Maynard was named a freshman All-American, and Chris Hamblen was a finalist for the Johnny Bench Award, given to the top catcher in the nation. That season, *Baseball America* named Cleary one of the Top 10 coaches on the rise in Division I.

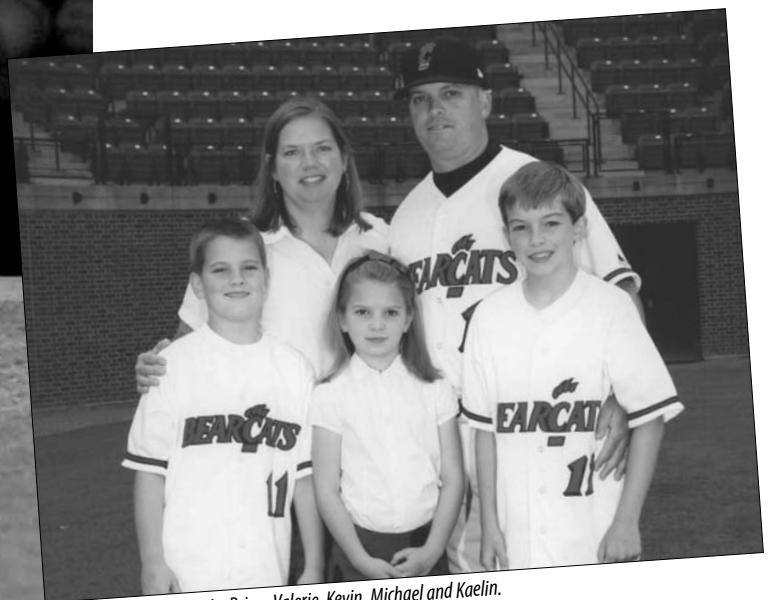
Cleary came to UC after three seasons at Tulane, where he helped the Green Wave to a 116-70 mark and two NCAA Tournament appearances. Cleary's efforts as an associate head coach, assistant coach and recruiting coordinator helped Tulane to the 1996 C-USA championship and a Top 25 national ranking. In addition to his duties as recruiting coordinator, Cleary coached the hitters, infielders and baserunners and served as the team's third-base coach.

A 1990 graduate of Fairfield University, Cleary, a native of Boca Raton, Fla., earned four letters and was a two-time Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) All-Academic team pick.

THE BRIAN CLEARY RECRUITING PHILOSOPHY

Brian Cleary's recruiting philosophy is simple. Start by keeping the best local talent at home. During Cleary's tenure, he has aggressively recruited the area and his energy and passion for UC baseball has rubbed off on recruits who want to play for their hometown team. Of the local products that have played at Cincinnati, nine have gone on to play professionally. Former Bearcats and local products Lance Durham (Toronto Blue Jays), Tony Campana (Chicago Cubs), Josh Harrison (Chicago Cubs), Curtus Moak (Cincinnati Reds/Oakland A's), Chris Hamblen (Texas Rangers), Dan Osterbrock (Minnesota Twins), Steve Pickerell (Tampa Bay Devils Rays), Matt Singer (New York Yankees), and Kevin Youkilis (Boston Red Sox) have all played minor league baseball in various organizations in recent years. Youkilis has achieved success in Major League Baseball after winning two World Series titles and playing in two All-Star games.

From there, Cleary attracts top players from across the country, including Mike Spina (Newberry, Fla./Oakland A's), Josh Kay (Park Ridge, Ill./Oakland A's), Mark Haske (Fairgrove, Minn./Detroit Tigers) and Logan Parker (Odessa, Texas/Cincinnati Reds) who have all been selected in the last five MLB drafts. Cleary's first three recruiting classes were ranked among the best in the nation by *Collegiate Baseball* magazine, the only program in Ohio so honored.

GREG MAMULA

Assistant Coach » 1st season

Greg Mamula enters his first season as an assistant coach for Cincinnati after serving as the head coach at West Chester University of Pennsylvania for the past three years. During his tenure at West Chester, he averaged 41 wins per season while compiling an overall coaching record of 124-45 (.734).

Regarded as one of the top young head coaches in NCAA Division II baseball, Mamula was named the PSAC-East Coach of the Year and the Atlantic Region Coach of the Year in 2009, while his team finished the year seventh in the nation after reaching the Division II College World Series. His 2009 team set the school record for wins in a season with 46, breaking the previous mark of 45 set one year earlier.

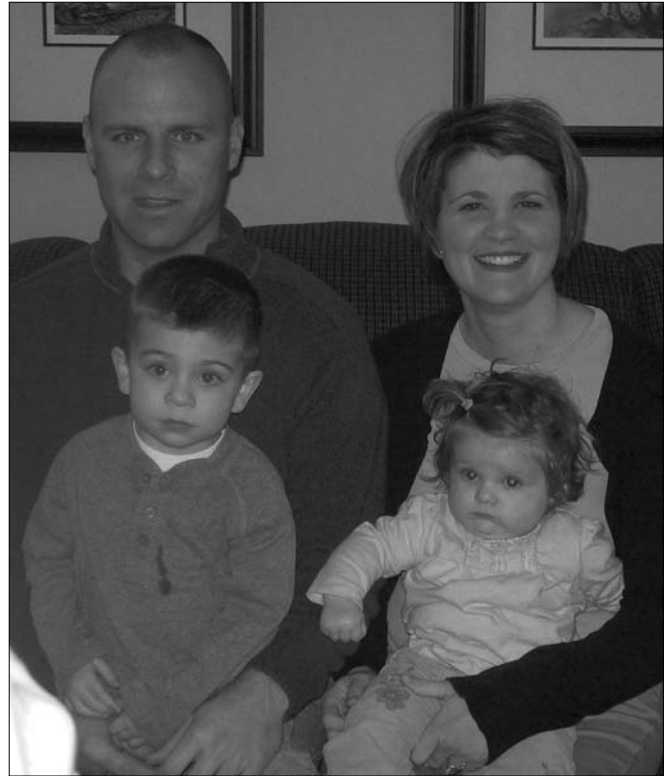
In all three years at West Chester University, Mamula led his squad to the NCAA Mid-Atlantic Regional Tournament title game and a Top-30 ranking. His team ranked among the best statistically in several offense and pitching categories in all of Division II baseball. Over his three seasons, they hit .334 and had a 3.66 team ERA. Mamula mentored two PSAC-East Players of the Year, two conference Pitchers of the Year, and one conference Rookie of the Year in addition to 29 all-conference players, 13 all-region, and four all-America performers.

Mamula's coaching resume includes five years as an assistant coach at the University of Delaware (2001-2006), where he was regarded as one of the hardest working recruiting coordinators in the region. He was also an assistant for three years at Shippensburg University (1999-2001) where he was the infielders coach and assisted with recruiting and hitting.

While at Delaware as the team's recruiting coordinator, Mamula brought in 17 all-conference performers, which included two all-Americans, and 12 players who were selected in the MLB draft – none of which were drafted out of high school. In his final year at Delaware, the Blue Hens offense led all of Division I baseball in home runs (111), doubles (143), and slugging percentage (.574).

As a player, Mamula was a four-year starter as an infielder at St. Bonaventure University. There he was an Atlantic 10 All-Academic Team Selection his junior and senior seasons and his senior year was named team captain.

Mamula and his wife Melissa live in Cincinnati and have two children, Reid and Allison.

SCOTT HUMES

Volunteer Assistant » 1st season

Head Coach Brian Cleary has brought on Scott Humes for the 2010 season to serve as a volunteer assistant.

Humes comes to UC after serving as Director of Baseball Operations in 2008 and as a volunteer assistant in 2009 for Florida International University.

Humes will be working with the outfielders while coaching first base on game days.

Humes has coached baseball throughout Southeast Ohio as the head coach of the Midland Indians from 2003-06 and as an assistant at both Moeller High School and Wyoming High School.



J.D. HEILMANN

Pitching Coach » 1st season

Following seven years as an assistant coach at Xavier University, former University of Cincinnati pitcher J.D. Heilmann is back at UC, entering his first season as the Bearcats pitching coach.

Heilmann, who is regarded as one of the top young pitching coaches in college baseball, is known for his

ability to develop and relate to pitchers. Heilmann's skills were never more evident than in 2008 when he coached a XU pitching staff that posted a league-best ERA of 3.39 in Atlantic 10 play, which included 2008 draft pick Charlie Leesman and free-agent signee Michael Lucas. Leesman was the second-highest draft pick in program history.

Heilmann was an integral part of the Musketeers success in 2009 as Xavier won its first Atlantic 10 Tournament title and earned an automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament. He served as the pitching coach and recruiting coordinator from 2006-09.

In his first two seasons at Xavier, Heilmann's primary on-field duties were outfielders, base running, and bunting, and he also assisted in local and regional recruiting. During those two years, he coached outfielder Jay Johnson, who was eventually a 13th-round draft pick by the Boston Red Sox.

Prior to coaching at Xavier, Heilmann briefly coached at Division II Northern Kentucky University and at local Division III power Mount St. Joseph. At both stops, Heilmann was in charge of the development of the pitching staff, as well as assisting in recruiting. While at Mount St. Joseph, Heilmann played a key role in the Lions' success, which included a Heartland Conference Championship and a NCAA Regional runner-up finish in 2000.

In addition to his years on the collegiate level, Heilmann spent five summers as both an assistant and head coach in the nationally-recognized Midland summer baseball organization. He helped guide his teams to success on the national level, evidenced by a fourth-place finish in 1999 and two second-place finishes in 1997 and 2002.

Heilmann, who played for the Bearcats in 1997, earned a communications degree while completing his eligibility at the University of Cincinnati following a transfer from Ball State.

A 1993 Moeller High School graduate, Heilmann helped the Crusaders capture a state baseball championship, while earning all-city and all-league honors.

Heilmann and his wife, Raegene, son, Dax, and daughter, Ryley, reside in Batavia.

2010 SEASON PREVIEW

Following a season that saw the University of Cincinnati baseball team reach the BIG EAST Baseball Championships in back-to-back seasons for the first time since joining the conference in 2006, the Bearcats look to continue their ascent to conference prominence in 2010. UC lost 57 percent of its home run total and 45 percent of its RBI totals in Mike Spina, Lance Durham, and Cameron Satterwhite, along with its all-time saves leader in Jake Geglein, but the Bearcats have a large group of young players looking to step in and make their mark on Cincinnati baseball.

CATCHERS

UC has all four catchers back behind the plate in 2010 in senior Jimmy Jacquot, junior Nick Rohlfs, sophomore Braden Kline, and redshirt freshman Cramer Dethy. Jacquot and Rohlfs split duty last season and both displayed their potential at different points of the season.

Jacquot and Rohlfs hit .248 and .226, respectively, but the duo single handedly helped the Bearcats triumph in clutch situations. Rohlfs led UC to a come-from-behind win with a career-high five RBI performance against rival Louisville on April 5 in front of a nationally-televised audience on ESPNU to snap a six-game losing skid mid-way through the season, while Jacquot helped UC take two of three games at St. John's in a crucial three-game set late in the season after hitting .692 with two home runs in the series.

Dethy and Kline are UC's other catchers, adding depth to a strong group of signal callers.

INFIELDERS

Arguably the most experienced group for the Bearcats in 2010 will be their infielders. UC lost a vital part of its infield in third baseman Mike Spina, who was drafted by the Oakland A's in the 11th round of the 2009 Major League Baseball Draft and also finished his career ranked third in UC history in home runs (44) and sixth in RBI (148), but the three other positions are filled with experience.

The double-play combination of junior shortstop Chris Peters and sophomore

second baseman T.J. Jones started 50 games side-by-side a year ago giving the Bearcats leadership up the middle. Jones is Cincinnati's top returning hitter from a year ago after hitting .327 with four home runs and 32 RBI. Peters, who is a rangy defender, vastly improved his offensive game from his freshman campaign to his sophomore campaign, hitting .252 with three round-trippers and 31 RBI in 2009.

Last season, freshman Cory Hough primarily played first base following an early-season injury from incumbent first baseman Kevin Johnson. Both players return in 2010 giving head coach Brian Cleary some depth at the position.

Freshman Logan Jackson and sophomore Kiley Jones are set to compete for the starting position at third base, while senior Beach Brooks provides the versatility to play several positions throughout the infield.

OUTFIELDERS

Senior Jamel Scott is penciled in as the starting centerfielder for UC in 2010 and looks to recapture his form from 2008 after an injury-plagued 2009 campaign. Scott, who when healthy is one of the top stolen base threats in the country, will be playing next to a familiar teammate in Justin Riddell.

Riddell got off to a hot start last season and completed his sophomore season with a .297 average, six home runs, and 30 RBI.

Junior college transfer Mikel Huston and sophomore Kendal Coleman are the other two outfielders with collegiate experience after Huston played two years at Seward County Community College and Coleman finished his rookie season with the Bearcats hitting .256 with 12 RBI in 34 games.

Additionally, Cleary welcomes freshmen Jake Proctor, Marcus Heath, and redshirt freshman Anthony Howard to Clifton. Proctor is in contention for one of the starting outfield spots.

PITCHERS

Nine pitchers return from the 2009 squad and they will be joined by a talented group of freshmen arms. Senior Tyler Smith will serve as captain for the Bearcats

this season and anchors the group on the mound. Junior Dan Jensen, senior Andrew Burkett, and sophomore Brian Sand all had solid years in 2009 and had productive off-seasons in their respective summer leagues.

Senior Brian Garman, junior Nick Johnson, sophomore Sam Slavik, and junior Dan Glozer all saw valuable time during the 2009 campaign giving UC a variety of options on the mound.

The incoming class of Thomas Gentile, Christian McElroy, Zach Isler, Andrew Strenge, Derek Cox, James, Jones, Jason Pascuzzi, and Heath give Cincinnati an explosive talent pool of young pitchers and all are in the running to make immediate contributions.

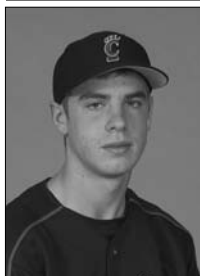

2009 SEASON REVIEW

THREE PLAYERS SELECTED IN 2009 MLB DRAFT: Senior Mike Spina and junior Lance Durham were selected by the Oakland A's and the Toronto Blue Jays, respectively, on Day 2 of the 2009 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft. Spina, who returned for his senior season after being drafted in the 45th round by the Minnesota Twins in 2008, was drafted with the 12th pick in the 11th round by the A's, while Durham was selected with the 19th pick in the 14th round by the Blue Jays. Junior Kevin Johnson became the third UC baseball player to be drafted in the 2009 MLB Draft when he was selected with the 17th pick in the 38th round by the Florida Marlins.

DUO BRINGS HOME BIG EAST HONORS:

Prior to the 2009 BIG EAST Tournament, the conference announced that senior Mike Spina and junior Lance Durham both were second-team all-BIG EAST honorees. It marked the second consecutive year that Spina earned second-team accolades, while it was the first BIG EAST all-conference selection for Durham.

Spina led the Bearcats and the BIG EAST in home runs with 23 and finished third in the league in RBI (69), third in total bases (148), third in walks (38), and fifth in slugging percentage (.670). Spina's 23 home runs broke the UC single-season home runs record, which he set in 2008 with 21 home runs. In his first season with Cincinnati, Durham finished the season with a .427 batting average and a league-best 99 hits, while finishing second in the conference in on-base percentage (.508). In just one season at UC, Durham finished first on UC's single-season batting average and single-season hits charts.

WALK-OFF WEEKEND: Needing to win two-of-three games against Seton Hall in the final conference series of the regular-season, Cincinnati used a pair of walk-off's to clinch a spot in the 2009 BIG EAST Tournament, marking Cincinnati's third appearance in the BIG EAST Conference tournament and first time the Bearcats have made the tournament in back-to-back seasons. After splitting the first two games of the series, UC trailed 5-4 in the ninth and was down to its final strike. Senior Cameron Satterwhite blooped a two-out single in between the Pirates center fielder, right fielder, and second baseman to score sophomore Chris Peters, sending the game to extra innings. In the bottom of the 10th inning, freshman T.J. Jones started a two-out rally with a single through the left side before moving to second base on a single up the middle by Peters. With two on and two out, Durham singled off the first baseman's glove allowing Jones to score from second, sending Cincinnati to a 6-5, 10th-inning win.

WE'RE GOING TO EXTRAS: With Cincinnati's extra-inning 6-5 win over Seton Hall in its regular-season finale, the Bearcats ended the season 4-0 in extra-inning games. UC's first extra-inning triumph came against Davidson, where the Bearcats topped the Wildcats 11-10 in 10 innings. On April 9, Cincinnati rallied for a 5-4 win over Notre Dame to improve to 2-0 on the season in extra-inning contests. On April 25 vs. Villanova, Cincinnati trailed 9-8 in the 10th inning with two outs. Senior Mike Spina delivered a solo home run on a one ball, two strikes count to tie the game at 9-9. During the next at-bat junior Lance Durham homered giving UC the walk-off win and improving the Bearcats to 3-0 in extras.

KING OF THE HILL: For almost one month in the middle of the 2009 season, Jake Geglein was tied atop the University of Cincinnati career saves list with Curtis Moak (1998-01), a 25th-round selection by the Cincinnati Reds in 2001. On Friday, April 17, 2009, Geglein recorded a six-out save against St. John's to preserve an 11-8 win and move past Moak on UC's career saves list with 16. Geglein collected nine saves on the season, which ranked second in the BIG EAST. His four saves in league play ranked first. With his save against Ohio on May 12, Geglein notched the 20th and final save of his career, becoming the first UC player to reach 20 career saves. Geglein also finished his career tied for 10th in the conference record books with nine career saves in BIG EAST contests.

"BULL'S-EYE: Lance "Bull" Durham, the son of former MLB player Leon Durham, put together a record-setting season in his first season with the Red and Black. In 2009, Durham led the team and the BIG EAST with a .427 batting average. Durham also led the conference in hits (99), and was second in on-base percentage (.502). In 58 games, Durham had 35 multi-hit games and he reached base safely in 55 games. Durham's 99 hits broke Kevin Youkilis' previous single-season hits record of 96 hits set in 1999, and he fell one hit shy of becoming the first Bearcat to notch 100 hits in a season. Durham also broke another long-standing UC record with a .427 average this season. Mark Gabbard previously held the record with a .413 average during the 1993 campaign. Durham's .427 average ranked 12th in the NCAA. On April 29 vs. Xavier, Durham hit his seventh home run of the year, which landed on top of Fifth Third Arena becoming the first player to achieve that feat in a game. It is estimated that Durham hit the home run about 500 feet. Durham was a second-team all-BIG EAST selection, a first-team ABCA All-Region selection, and a third-team Pro-Line/NCBWA All-American.

RECORD WATCH: UC had several players make a splash on the UC single-season and career record charts in 2009. With a home run against Seton Hall on May 14, senior Mike Spina broke his own single-season school record with 23 home runs. Spina also finished with 69 RBI, ranking fifth on the single-season list. Spina finished his career with 44 career home runs, ranking third in school history. Spina's 148 career RBI ranks sixth also ranks in the career Top 10 in batting average (.358), sacrifice flies (10), slugging percentage (.700), and on-base percentage (.443). Senior Cameron Satterwhite collected 52 doubles for his career, which tied for fifth on the UC career doubles list, and he became the seventh player in Bearcats history to reach 50 career doubles with three doubles at West Virginia May 9-10. The Cincinnati native also ranks seventh on the career home runs chart with 32 and is tied for sixth on the sacrifice flies chart with 10. Senior Jake Geglein set the UC all-time saves record with 20 career saves. Geglein also ranks fifth in career appearances with 84. In the single-season books, Geglein's nine saves in 2009 tied for second on the single-season charts.

NO LONGER A FRESHMAN: Freshman T.J. Jones was one of the catalysts at the top of the order for UC in the second half of the 2009 season. After starting the season 1-for-14 (.071), Jones moved from the bottom of the order to the top of the order. In the 42 games since March 20, Jones was second on the team in batting average, hitting .351. During that span, Jones led the team in triples (4) and was third on the team with 32 RBI. For the season, Jones hit .327, ranking in the Top 10 among freshman batting averages in the conference.

UC BASEBALL HISTORY

1900 • Miller Huggins, who would later play and manage in the majors for 30 seasons, serves as captain of a Bearcat team that went 2-3, including a 13-2 loss to the Cincinnati Reds. Huggins was elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1964 after winning 1,413 games as a manager.

1910 • John Binder crafts the first no-hitter in Cincinnati history, blanking Denison in a nine-inning game.

1924 • Ethan Allen, who would go on to play for 13 seasons in the Major Leagues, bats .473, the highest single season mark in program history.

1928 • The Bearcats record the first baseball conference championship in program history, using a 9-3 record to win the Buckeye Conference.

1930 • For the second time in three years, UC wins the Buckeye Conference, this time sharing the title with Miami (OH). Amidst the campaign, UC records the longest game in school history, a 21-inning affair against Miami (OH).

1952 • The Bearcats explode for a school-best 16 runs in one inning in a 22-8 win over Morehead State.

1954 • Legendary basketball coach Ed Jucker takes over as head coach of the baseball team for his first of seven seasons. That same year, Hall of Famer Sandy Koufax plays his only season of baseball at Cincinnati, posting a 3-1 record and a 2.81 ERA.

1958 • The Jucker-led Bearcats win the East Division of the Missouri Valley Conference.

1960 • UC paces the East Division of the MVC again, but falls to Houston in the title game to wind up second in the league.

1961 • The winningest head coach in Cincinnati baseball history, Glenn Sample, takes over the reigns of the Bearcats. In his first season, Sample leads UC to a 19-5-2 record, the MVC Championship and a District IV Playoffs appearance. Bill Faul becomes Cincinnati's first baseball all-American, as he is named a first-team choice. Faul also sets a UC best with 24 strikeouts in one game.

1962 • Faul is honored as the Bearcats' first ever two-time all-American when he earns third-team recognition.

1964 • The Bearcats turn the first triple play in school history in a game against Louisville.

1965 • Neil Rubinstein throws the second no-hitter in UC history, a seven-inning gem against Hanover. That same season, Billy Wolff is selected a first-team all-American. The Bearcats are MVC East Division Champions for the fourth time, but get swept by Saint Louis in the divisional playoffs.

1967 • For the second time in seven seasons, the Sample-led Bearcats win the MVC Championship and make another appearance in the district playoffs. During the season, Jose Worrall tosses the third no-hitter at UC with seven hitless innings against Ohio State. Pat Maginn garners second-team all-American accolades.

1969 • UC takes the MVC East Division crown, before falling to Tulsa in two of three contests in the MVC playoffs.

1970 • The Bearcats' final year in the MVC brings a seventh divisional title, but a fifth runner-up finish as Tulsa sweeps UC.

1973 • Tim Burman and Chuck Poston combine for a seven-inning no-hitter, the fourth hitless gem in school history, against Quinnipiac.

1974 • The Bearcats qualify for the district playoffs for the third time.

1979 • Cincinnati wins what is then a school-record 28 games under Sample.

1982 • Mark Thompson's seven-inning no-hitter against Wright State goes down as the fifth in program history.

1985 • Led by head coach Tom Higgins, the Bearcats win a school-record 29 games.

1988 • Jim Schmitz's second season as head coach is a good one as the Bearcats win 31 games, setting a new mark for wins in a season.

1992 • The Bearcats move into a totally rebuilt Meyers Field to play their home games.

1994 • On May 22, Meyers Field is renamed Johnny Bench Field, honoring the former Cincinnati Reds catcher.

1995 • The Bearcats win a school-best 34 games and capture the Great Midwest Regular Season Championship. A 1-2 record in the post-season tournament costs the Bearcats a shot at an NCAA tournament berth. Also that season, Chris Murphy completes a five inning no-hitter versus IUPUI, the sixth hitless gem ever at Cincinnati.

1997 • Brian Cleary takes over as head coach of the Bearcats.





1999 • The Bearcats establish an NCAA record for greatest ninth inning comeback, scoring 12 runs in the bottom of the ninth to overcome a 15-4 deficit in a 16-15 win against Ohio. Chris Hamblen becomes the first Bearcat ever to be named a freshman all-American.

2000 • Under third-year head coach Cleary, the Bearcats win a school-record 35 games, before falling in the finals of the Conference USA Tournament to Houston.

2001 • Kevin Youkilis closes out the top offensive career in school history by being drafted in the eighth round of the Major League Baseball Draft by the Boston Red Sox, becoming the highest drafted Bearcat in school history. Pitcher Tony Maynard was named the program's second freshman all-American. The Bearcats also set a school record for most C-USA wins in a season with 16, with three players in Youkilis, Hamblen and Matt Singer each earning first-team all-conference honors.

2002 • For the second consecutive year, the Bearcats have a freshman all-American as pitcher Kyle Markle is named honorable mention.

2003 • After serving as the Bearcats' home for 10 seasons, Johnny Bench Field closes its gates.

2004 • On May 22, the Bearcats open the doors to Marge Schott Stadium, hosting UAB in the first game in the new park. The Blazers beat Cincinnati, 14-3, in the contest.

2005 • The Bearcats play their first full season in Marge Schott Stadium, holding a 16-13 home record. Shortstop Mark Haske makes history on the next-to-last day of the regular season when he turns an unassisted triple play. The unassisted feat is the first in school history and the second ever turned by a UC team.

2006 • UC embarks on its first season as a member of the BIG EAST Conference. The Bearcats qualify for the conference tournament. Freshmen Steve Blevins and Josh Harrison are both named freshman all-Americans.

2007 • In his first season in a Bearcats uniform, Tony Campana wins the NCAA stolen bases title and sets a school record with 60 steals. Lefthander Dan Osterbrock is named UC's first all-BIG EAST first-team honoree.

2008 • UC won a school-record 39 games and played in its first BIG EAST Championship game, falling to Louisville, 6-3. Josh Harrison was a second-team all-America selection by *Collegiate Baseball* and Harrison and Tony Campana earned first-team all-BIG EAST honors.

2009 • Senior Mike Spina broke his own school record with 23 home runs and junior Lance Durham hit a single-season school-record .427 as Cincinnati made the BIG EAST Tournament and finished with a 29-29 record.

Coached the Bearcats for 21 seasons, amassing a 391-333-7 record. Directed UC to four NCAA tournament berths and two Missouri Valley Conference titles while sending more than 50 players on to the professional ranks. Played football and baseball as a student and later served as UC's head wrestling coach and assistant athletic director. Sample is a member of the University of Cincinnati Athletics Hall of Fame.

JUCKER 12

A former three-sport standout at Cincinnati, Jucker coached the UC baseball team for seven seasons (1954-60), leading it to an 87-39-1 overall record. His 1956 club became the first team in school history to advance to the NCAA Championship and the 1958 team won a Missouri Valley Conference title. Jucker also coached the men's basketball team to two national titles and is a member of the University of Cincinnati Athletic Hall of Fame.

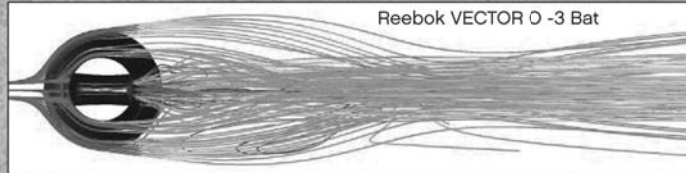
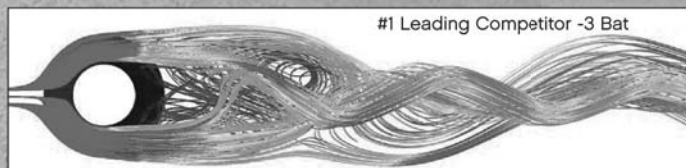
