Unlike many pageant winners, Deidre Downs, 27, did not dream of being Miss America when she was a little girl. This Birmingham native instead preferred to be on the pitcher's mound during Little League baseball and playing sports, which eventually earned her a full volleyball scholarship to the University of Virginia. When Deidre's desire to focus on academics required her to relinquish her scholarship, she followed her mother's suggestion to enter a Miss Alabama pageant in hopes of winning scholarship money. After competing for five years, Deidre secured the title of Miss Alabama in 2004. The following fall, she was crowned Miss America 2005— the third Miss Alabama contestant to win the title in the pageant's 75 year history. When all was said and done, Deidre won a total of \$100,000 in scholarshipsmoney Deidre used to fund both college and medical school costs. Deidre also won the Quality of Life Award from the Miss America Organization for her community service work with pediatric cancer. Today, Deidre is finishing her final two years of medical school at the University of Alabama and aspires to be a pediatrician.

On March 15, 2008, Deidre Downs exchanged her former titles of Miss Alabama 2004 and Miss America 2005 for a new and much-anticipated title--that of Mrs. Andrew Gunn. Alabama Weddings Magazine is pleased to present an exclusive interview and coverage of Deidre's wedding celebration!

one-to-one with Deidre Downs

AW: Deidre, tell us how you met your spouse. What is he like?

DD: Andrew and I actually met in a history class at Samford University. We started dating the summer I won Miss Alabama and then broke up the following October. We didn't date again until after my reign as Miss America had ended and I moved back to Birmingham and started medical school. He asked me out again, and halfway through dinner, I knew I would marry him one day.

[Andrew is] very laid back--very funny--but in a quiet kind of way. When you meet him, you can instantly tell that he's a nice person. He's got such a huge heart and we have so much in common. We both like sports, history, politics, and traveling. We don't really disagree on much, and we rarely fight.

AW: How did he propose?

DD: I was shopping with my mom when Andrew called and asked her to bring me to his house after we finished. (The custom-made engagement ring he ordered had come in that day.) Mom was in on the surprise and after dropping me off, she and my best friends waited at Michael's Restaurant. After he proposed (and I, of course, accepted), we joined our friends and family for a celebratory dinner.

AW: When asked about your main challenges in planning the wedding, you mentioned the guest list and the bridesmaid dresses. Explain why.

DD: The biggest challenge we faced was narrowing the guest list. I had always wanted to have a sit down dinner, so I knew we couldn't have 500 or 600 guests unless we went with more a buffet style dinner. But I knew from the beginning that I wanted the sit down dinner--that was my dream, so we knew 300 to 400 guests would probably work instead. But we really wanted to include everybody.

The bridesmaid dresses were a difficult decision for me because I typically don't care for bridesmaid dresses. Sometimes the colors or styles aren't great, and it's difficult to pick out something that will work for girls with different tastes and different needs when It comes to finding flattering styles. I went with long black dresses with spaghetti straps. We had an after-six wedding, and long and black was in keeping with a later, formal wedding,

AW: How did you go about selecting your gown?











DD: We tried on dresses and more dresses, and at the last shop we visited, Bella Couture, we found the perfect gown! I really liked the bottom of the dress, how it flowed, its little pickups, the subtle pearl beading on the bodice. Its details weren't something that jumped out from far away, but close up the gown was intricate. As soon as I tried it on, I knew it was the dress I wanted. I could just picture myself walking down the aisle in that dress.

AW: What kind of bridal showers or bachelorette parties did you attend?



DD: There was a kitchen-themed luncheon, at the home of Carol Hill, a couples' party with a stockthe-bar theme, and a bridal tea, hosted by Nan Teninbaum, executive director of the Miss Alabama pageant. On Thursday before the wedding, my matron of honor and I spent the day at the spa, and that night we attended a wine and cheese get-together. The bridal luncheon was held at The Veranda, and that night the rehearsal dinner was held at Park Lane. Both were perfect venues. Kathy G catering did an outstanding job with the rehearsal dinner. The room was gorgeous and the food was incredible!
