General Manager



"I feel that very few times in any man's lifetime there comes an opportunity where the right set of circumstances and the right combination of things that you value so much all come your way at the same time."

And with that John Thompson announced his acceptance of the general manager's position with the Seattle Seahawks.

"I think this is going to be one of the great franchises in the National Football League for many reasons — the fans, the area, the solid ownership and the community."

Since that March day in 1975, Thompson hasn't changed his mind about the Seahawks' potential. In fact, he's enhanced that potential by putting together solid administrative and coaching staffs.

"I think we have as fine a staff as there is in professional sports," says Thompson. "We have top people in every department."

In addition to staffing, Thompson was the catalyst in the Seahawks' remarkable first year attendance. Seattle finished sixth in NFL attendance last fall averaging 60,173 per game during the regular season.

Thompson brought to his position 16 years of previous administrative experience in the National Football League.

Prior to becoming Seattle's general manager, Thompson was the first full-time executive director of the NFL's Management Council, the collective bargaining agent of the league's clubs. When he assumed the position in 1971, he became the first nonowner to head management negotiations in collective bargaining situations. He is still an associate member of the Council's executive committee.

His first NFL position was as publicity director of the Minnesota Vikings, when that club was formed in 1960. Thompson later became assistant general manager of the Vikings.

In 1970, he assumed the position of assistant to the president of the National Football Conference, where he worked under NFC President George Halas to serve as liaison between the league office and the conference members.

A graduate of the University of Washington and a Northwest native who grew up in South Bend, Washington, Thompson broke into sports administration at UW as sports information director.

He and his wife, Mimi, live on Mercer Island. The Thompsons have three children, Rick, a graduate of Hamline (Minn.) University and an employee in the Seattle scouting department; Mike, a graduate of Colorado College; and Kathi, a student at Washington State.

MARK DUNCAN Assistant General Manager



Mark Duncan assumed the position as Assistant General Manager with the Seahawks in April of 1975. Duncan is credited with the planning and directing of the club's Kirkland office and practice complex. Before coming to Seattle, he was Director of Player Personnel with the Los Angeles Rams. Duncan spent 10 years in the NFL office as Director of Personnel and Supervisor of Officials before moving to Los Angeles. He broke into the NFL

as an assistant coach with San Francisco (1955-62). A member of the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame, Duncan played college football and basketball at Denver University and then served as an assistant football coach at Colorado College and Denver before being named head coach at his alma mater in 1946. He was an assistant football coach and head baseball coach at Colorado State before joining the 49ers.

DON ANDERSEN Director of Public Relations



Don Andersen enters his second year as the Seahawks' Director of Public Relations. Andersen joined the Seattle staff in December of 1975 after serving two years in the World Football League, first as Vice President of Public Relations for the league office and then in a similar capacity for the Southern California Sun. Prior to moving into professional football, Andersen was the Director of the Athletic News Service at the University of

Southern California for seven years. While at USC, he served as press manager for five Rose Bowl games, two NCAA basketball championship tournaments and as color commentator on USC radio broadcasts. Prior to joining USC in 1967, Andersen had spent four years as an administrator with the California Interscholastic Federation.

DICK MANSPERGER Director of Player Personnel



Dick Mansperger is in his third year as Director of Player Personnel with the Seattle Seahawks. One of the first employees hired by the Seahawks, Mansperger came to Seattle from Dallas, where he had been Director of Player Personnel since 1972. Prior to being promoted, Mansperger had been a Dallas scout for six years. After playing under Dan Devine and Frank Kush at Arizona State, Mansperger joined the ASU coaching staff in 1958

and later became head coach at Palo Verde, Calif., J.C. for two years. He coached at West Texas State in 1961 and returned to Arizona State in 1962. Mansperger then joined the UCLA coaching staff for the 1963 and 1964 seasons. He went to Dallas as a scout for one year and then coached a season at lowa (1966) before returning to the Cowboys.

CHUCK ALLEN Director of Pro Scouting



Chuck Allen, a former all-star line-backer with the San Diego Chargers, joined the Seattle organization in June of 1975 as Director of Pro Scouting. A former All-Coast and all-conference player at the University of Washington, Allen was an assistant coach with the Huskies (1973-74) before taking his current position. Allen played nine seasons with the Chargers and made the All-American Football League team in 1961 as a rookie. He was a second team

choice in 1964. Allen also served as the Chargers' defensive captain. He spent 1970, 1971 and part of 1972 with Pittsburgh and finished his career in 1972 with the Philadelphia Eagles. He was

recently selected to the all-time All-Northwest team.

VINCE LOMBARDI Dir. of Ticket Sales and Marketing



Vince Lombardi assumed the duties of Director of Ticket Sales and Marketing for the Seahawks in April of 1977 after serving as the club's Administrative Assistant to the General Manager since July of 1975. In addition to his new position, Lombardi will continue to coordinate training camp and team travel. Son of the late Vince Lombardi, former Green Bay and Washington head coach, Vince is a graduate of St. Thomas College in St. Paul, Minn.,

where he played running back and then served as an assistant coach after his graduation. Prior to joining the Seahawks, Lombardi was an an attorney in Minneapolis and served as a representative in the Minnesota State Legislature.

CHUCK VELTE Ticket Manager



Chuck Velte is in his first year as the Seahawks' Ticket Manager. Prior to joining the NFL club, he was with Northwest Orient Airlines where he had been in that company's sales office since 1973. During that time he handled commercial accounts, group sales tours, promotions and travel agency relations. Velte had been with Northwest Orient since 1966 in various capacities. He has served as a member on the Alaska Committee of the Seattle

Chamber of Commerce and is currently program chairman of the executive committee of the Alaska Visitors Association. A licensed private pilot, Velte is a graduate of St. Thomas College in St. Paul, Minnesota.

GARY WRIGHT Director of Publicity



Gary Wright is in his second year as Director of Publicity for the Seattle Seahawks. He joined the club after two years in the same capacity with the World Football League and Southern California Sun. He has also worked as Vice President of Operations for the Phoenix Racquets of World Team Tennis. Wright was Sports Information Director at Long Beach State for four years. While at Long Beach, he also served as color commentator for foot-

ball and basketball radio broadcasts. Wright has also been a high school coach and journalism instructor.

BRUCE SCOTT Trainer



Bruce Scott is in his second year as head trainer with the Seattle Seahawks after four years as assistant trainer with the Detroit Lions. In addition to his regular duties, Scott coordinates the club's off-season weight training program. He attended Ball State University and the D.T. Watson School of Physiatrics in Leetsdale, Pa., prior to becoming assistant trainer at the University of Washington. After three years at the University of Washington, he spent one

year as head trainer at the University of Arkansas prior to joining the Lions. He is a member of the Certified Athletic Trainers Association.

TIM RYAN Equipment Manager



Tim Ryan, former assistant equipment manager with the Los Angeles Rams, is in his first season with the Seattle Seahawks as Equipment Manager. Ryan accepted his current position in January of 1977. Ryan, 23-years old, was an assistant equipment manager with the Rams for six years and worked with the National Football Conference squad in last season's Pro Bowl game held in Seattle.

TOM FERMSTAD

Film Director



Tom Fermstad became the Seattle Seahawks Film Director in April of 1976. Fermstad came to Seattle after three years as the Minnesota Vikings' Assistant Film Director. He has also worked on nature documentaries and short dramatic presentations in the Minnesota area. Fermstad has also had experience in starting film labs in Minneapolis. Prior to joining the Vikings, he was in the army and served a tour of duty in Viet Nam.

JIM WHITESEL Assistant Trainer



Jim Whitesel is in his second season as assistant trainer with the Seattle Seahawks. Prior to joining the Seahawks, Whitesel was head trainer at Seattle Pacific College for two years. He has also worked as an assistant trainer at Washington State and the University of Washington. Whitesel is a UW graduate and earned his Masters Degree in Sports Medicine. He is a member of the Certified Athletic Trainers Association. Whitesel graduated from Pierce High School in Parkland, Wash.

EARL LEGGETT, JR. Assistant Equipment Manager



Earl Leggett, Jr., who served as visiting clubhouse attendant last season, is in his first year as Assistant Equipment Manager. He is the son of the Seahawks' defensive line coach. The 21-year-old Leggett worked in the Texas Christian University equipment room for two years and then spent two seasons assisting the Southern California Sun equipment staff.

CHARLES GARCIA Staff Scout



Charles Garcia, a former scout for CEPO, is in his second season as a staff scout. Garcia played at Prairie View and graduated in 1957. After one year as athletic director and head coach at Cuero, Tex., High School, Garcia spent three years in the the Army. He then served as head coach and athletic director at Hitchcock, Tex., and followed that as defensive coordinator at Pinkston High in Dallas, Tex. Prior to joining CEPO in

Dallas, Tex. Prior to joining CEPO in 1972, Garcia was defensive coordinator at Bishop College for four seasons.

RALPH GOLDSTON





Ralph Goldston, in his second year as a staff scout, came to the Seahawks from the Chicago Bears, where he had been offensive backfield coach. Goldston played college football at Indiana and Youngstown and then was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles in 1952. He played four years with the Eagles and then nine seasons with Hamilton in the Canadian Football League. He closed out his career with Montreal of the CFL in 1965. Goldston

served as defensive coach for Montreal from 1966 through 1969 and then scouted for the Giants. He then coached at Harvard (1971-72) and Colorado (1973) before going to the Bears.

CHARLIE HALL Staff Scout



Charlie Hall joins the Seattle organization as a staff scout after six years with the QUADRA scouting combine. Prior to joining QUADRA, Hall was Director of Player Personnel for five years with the Houston Oilers. After graduating from Whittier College, Hall coached at Bellflower, Calif., High School and Cerritos Junior College in Norwalk, Calif., before joining John McKay's staff at the University of Southern California. He was an assis-

tant under McKay from 1960 through 1965.

MIKE KELLER Staff Scout



Mike Keller serves as a staff scout for the Seahawks and Assistant Director of Player Personnel. A third-round draft choice by Dallas in 1972 after an All-America career as a defensive end at Michigan, Keller spent the 1973 season on Dallas' injured reserve list and worked in the Cowboys' scouting department under the direction of Dick Mansperger, now Seattle's Director of Player Personnel. The following year he joined Dallas as a full-time scout

and then joined the Seahawks in May of 1975.

VIC LINDSKOG Staff Scout



Vic Lindskog joined the Seattle scouting staff this spring after 13 years as a scout with QUADRA. Lindskog joined QUADRA in 1964 after a career as a player and coach in professional football. Prior to breaking into scouting he was an assistant coach with the Los Angeles Rams from 1961 through 1963. He also coached for four years with the British Columbia Lions of the Canadian Football League and three seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles after

playing with the Eagles for eight years. Lindskog played his college football at Stanford and coached at Stanford for two years prior to signing as a player with Philadelphia.

JACK PATERA

Head Coach



Expansion is nothing new for Seattle head coach Jack Patera.

He has seen expansion in its formative stage as both a player and coach and he has also seen expansion in its mature stage.

Patera, who starts his second season directing the Seahawks this fall, was a player with the Dallas Cowboys in their first year of existence. The first year, 1960, saw the Cowboys go 0-11-1.

while the Seahawks were 2-12 in their initial campaign.

"The things we were looking for in our first year was to build a solid foundation on offense, defense and with our special teams," says Patera.

"On offense, you could say we did lay down a foundation because the results were there. We did the thing we felt we could do best and that was throw and, as the season went along, our running game picked up.

"It's hard to say if we laid our foundation on defense. We won't know until our people come back to camp after a year's experience."

Patera has also witnessed the result of sound organization in an expansion club.

As defensive line coach with the Vikings from 1969 through 1975, Patera helped Minnesota compile a 76-22 regular season record, play in two Super Bowls and four National Football Conference championship games.

Prior to breaking into coaching, Patera played seven seasons in the NFL as a guard and linebacker. He played with Baltimore from 1955 through 1957 after being a fourth-round draft choice. Patera then played in 1958 and 1959 with the Chicago Cardinals before joining the Cowboys for their first two seasons.

His first coaching experience was with the Los Angeles Rams, 1963 through 1966, where he coached the original Fearsome Foursome — Lamar Lundy, David (Deacon) Jones, Rosey Grier, and Merlin Olsen. Following two coaching seaons with the New York Giants, Patera joined Bud Grant's staff at Minnesota, where he coached another of pro football's great defensive lines, the Purple People Eaters — Jim Marshall, Carl Eller, Alan Page and Gary Larsen.

Patera played his college football at the University of Oregon, where he earned All-Pacific Coast Conference honors and played in the College All-Star, Hula Bowl and East-West games.

A graduate of Washington High in Portland, Oregon, he has three brothers. One, Dennis, played with the San Francisco 49ers, and another, Ken, was an Olympic weightlifter and is now a professional wrestler.

Patera and his wife Susan have four children, Michael, 21; Mary, 18; John, 15 and Beth, 14.

SAM BOGHOSIAN

Offensive Line and Coordinator



Sam Boghosian is entering his second season with the Seattle Seahawks and fourth year as an assistant in the National Football League after two campaigns with the Houston Oilers. After earning All-Coast recognition on UCLA's 1954 national championship team, Boghosian broke into coaching at UCLA where he served until moving to Oregon State in 1965. He was Oregon State's offensive coordinator and line coach under Dee Andros until

moving on to Houston in 1974. In fact, Boghosian recruited Dennis Boyd, a Seattle draft choice, for the Beavers before joining the pros.

BOB HOLLWAY Defensive Backs and Coordinator



Bob Hollway, former St. Louis Cardinals head coach, is in his second season as Seattle's defensive coordinator. Prior to coming to Seattle, Hollway served as an assistant with the San Francisco 49ers. Following a standout career as a collegian at Michigan, Hollway broke into coaching in 1951 at Maine. After two years at Maine and one season at Eastern Michigan, Hollway returned to Michigan as an assistant coach (1954-66). He then joined

the Minnesota Vikings as an assistant for four years and then became head coach of the Cardinals for the 1971 and 1972 seasons. Following St. Louis, Hollway coached at Detroit for the 1973 and 1974 seasons.

EARL LEGGETT Defensive Line



Earl Leggett, a former standout for 12 years in the National Football League, will again coach the Seahawks' defensive line. Following an All-America career at Louisiana State, Leggett was drafted on the first round of the 1956 college draft by the Chicago Bears and played nine years as a defensive lineman for the Bears and helped his club to the 1963 NFL championship. He then played one year with Los Angeles (1966) and two seasons with New

Orleans (1967 and 1968). He broke into coaching in 1971 at Nicholls State and then moved to Texas Christian for the 1972 and 1973 seasons. Prior to coming to Seattle, Leggett was the defensive line coach for the Southern California Sun of the World Football League for two years.

ANDY MacDONALD Offensive Backs



Andy MacDonald is entering his second season of coaching the Seattle offensive backs. In addition to tutoring the backs, MacDonald is in charge of Seattle's special teams. MacDonald worked for three years as offensive coordinator at Michigan State before coming to Seattle. He also coached at Colorado State (1970-71), Tulsa (1969) and Iowa (1961-64), along with being head coach at Northern Arizona (1965-68). MacDonald was also a highly-

successful high school coach at Flint Northern in Flint, Michigan As a collegian at Central Michigan in 1950 and 1951, he led the nation in college division passing and earned Little All-America recognition.

LARRY PECCATIELLO Linebackers



Larry Peccatiello is entering his sixth season as an NFL assistant coach and second with the Seattle Seahawks as linebacker coach. Before coming to Seattle, Peccatiello was with the Houston Oilers for four years. An allconference receiver at William & Mary, he became an assistant coach at his alma mater in 1961 and stayed there until moving to the U.S. Naval Academy in 1969. In 1970, he joined Bill Peterson's staff at Florida State and

followed Peterson to Rice in 1971, where he served as defensive coordinator before moving into the NFL with the Oilers.

JERRY RHOME Quarterbacks and Leceivers



Runner-up in the 1964 Heisman Trophy balloting as a senior at the University of Tulsa, Jerry Rhome is in his second year of coaching the Seattle quarterbacks and receivers. After an eight-year NFL career as a quarterback with with Dallas (1965-68), Cleveland (1969), Houston (1970) and Los Angeles (1971-72), Rhome broke into coaching at Tulsa in 1973. As a collegian, he broke 16 NCAA passing records on his way to earning All-

America recognition and being selected the Washington Touchdown Club and Associated Press' Back of the Year as a senior.

The real answer will come in three or four years.

An expansion team building to become a contender takes time, patience and success in the draft.

"I think this year's draft was outstanding," says Seattle head coach Jack Patera looking for help to improve the 2-12 Seahawks into that eventual contender.

"I feel much better about this year's draft than last year's and I thought we had a pretty good nucleus last year."

Seattle's first draft produced nine rookies who were joined by five other rookies obtained as free agents, through trades, the veteran allocation and waivers.

Of the 14 rookies on last year's squad eight were considered regulars. In fact, the Seahawks starting backfield was composed of rookies — quarterback Jim Zorn and running backs Sherman Smith and Don Testerman.

Patera looks for more new faces breaking into the 1977 lineup.

"Out of the whole bunch," says Patera, "I'd say around five have a chance of starting."

The "whole bunch" includes 13 draft choices and three veterans, center Geoff Reece, defensive tackle Bill Sandifer and wide receiver Duke Fergerson obtained in trades on draft day.

"If we had gotten one outstanding player he wouldn't have as much impact as five good football players," said Patera and with that announced the trade of the Seahawks first draft choice to Dallas for the Cowboys' first round pick and three second-round selections.

The first two rounds of the draft were plenty busy for the Seahawks. After the Dallas deal, Seattle traded its second-round choice to the Rams for Los Angeles' second and Reece and then traded Dallas back one of its seconds for Fergerson.

In all, Seattle obtained six new players in two rounds.

"What the trade did was give us a jump on being competitive earlier," said Patera. "As I look at those people," he said referring to the new acquisitions, "they all have pretty good talent and the basis for drafting is finding more talent than we have."

What it means is more competition for jobs at training camp.

Some of the hottest battles figure to come from the offensive line where tackles Nick Bebout and Norm Evans, guards Bob Penchion and Bob Newton and centers Fred Hoaglin and Art Kuehn (both of whom started seven games in 1976) hope to retain their positions

Among the challengers will be four veterans Dave Simonson, Gordon Jolley, Ron Coder and John Demarie, plus plenty of new faces including Reece and the team's two top draft choices — first-round choice Steve August and second-round selection Tom Lynch.

Both August (6-4, 243) and Lynch (6-5, 260) will be looked at as guards and Patera wouldn't be surprised to see them starting by the end of the season.

Other draft choices contending for positions on the offensive line, center John Yarno, a fourth-round pick, and tackle Bill Westbeld, an 11th-round choice.

Seattle's rookie backfield of 1976 will be bigger in 1977 and more experienced.

Smith, who led the club in rushing with 537 yards and a 4.5 average, is up 13-pounds to 230-pounds, while Testerman, who rushed for 246 yards, is up five pounds to 235.

Backing up Smith and Testerman figure to be veterans Hugh McKinnis, Ralph Nelson and Oliver Ross plus rookie Larry Bates, a fifth-round draft choice in 1976 who missed the season with a knee injury, and 1977 draft choices Tony Benjamin and David Sims.

Zorn is a threat as both a passer and runner. The NFL Players Association's NFC Offensive Rookie of the Year, Zorn broke both rookie and expansion records last year while completing 208 of 439 passes for 2,571 yards and 12 touchdowns.

When he wasn't passing, Zorn was running. His 246 yards rushing on 52 carries tied him with Testerman for second on the club.

In fact, with Zorn's scrambling ability and the protection offered by the Seahawks' offensive line led by tackles Bebout and Evans, Seattle quarterbacks were sacked just 28 times — third least in the NFC — despite attempting more passes than any other team in the league.

Defense is one place Patera is looking for immediate improvement.

"One move," says Patera, "the acquisition of Sandifer, made us stronger. Maybe he's not all-pro, but he can be solid."

Solid players are exactly what Patera is looking for up front on the defensive line to go along with Steve Niehaus, who was named the Players Association's NFC Defensive Rookie of the Year.

"The thing Steve did was improve consistently. He has strength and quickness. He's going to be a good one."

With the addition of Sandifer, Richard Harris, a starter at tackle last year, figures to move to defensive end where he will contend with incumbents Dave Tipton and Bob Lurtsema for a starting assignment.

Also bidding for a starting position at end will be rookie Dennis Boyd, a third-round draft choice. Among the other defensive line hopefuls are returnees Carl Barisich and Larry Woods, 12th-round draft choice I.V. Wilson and free agents Mark Chalmers and Bob Simpson.



To obtain Sandifer the Seahawks had to trade their starting middle linebacker Ed Bradley and there could be a four-man battle for the vacant position between veterans Greg Collins and Ken Hutcherson along with draft choices Terry Beeson and Pete Cronan.

Collins was used mainly in passing situations last year as Bradley's backup, while Hutcherson missed the entire season with a knee injury after coming to Seattle in the veteran allocation.

Beeson and Cronan were both second-round selections.

"It should be a very, very good year for our linebackers," says Patera. "We should be just that much stronger but remember we could be a lot stronger in raw talent but not see much of an improvement because of the inexperience of the group."

On the outside the Seahawks have both experience and youth. On the left side last year, veteran Ken Geddes split time with rookie Sammy Green. While on the right side Mike Curtis saw most of the action but is backed up by another fine young performer, Randy Coffield, and free agent Charles McShane.

McShane had a trial with Dallas last year.

Last year's starting cornerbacks both return, Eddie McMillan and Rolly Woolsey, plus their backup Ernie Jones. Jones, a rookie in 1976, started three games last year and could challenge for a more regular position this year.

The Seahawks picked up two new faces at safety in free agent Steve Preece, a ninth-year pro, and ninth-round draft choice Steve Adzick to challenge returning starters Al Matthews at strong safety and Dave Brown at free safety. Other challenges should come from returnees Lyle Blackwood and special teams star Don Dufek, who blocked three punts as a rookie a year ago.

Seattle's kicking in 1976 was handled by veteran John Leypoldt, while rookie Rick Engles won the punting job.

"We're coming out a better club," says Patera, "just through existing one year."

BUILDING THE FRANCHISE



CHRONOLOGY

June 15, 1972 Seattle Professional Football, a group of business and community leaders, announce their intention to attempt to secure a National Football League franchise for the City of Seattle. Herman Sarkowsky serves as spokesman for the group.

November 2, 1972 Construction began on the Kingdome.

June 4, 1974 The National Football League announces that Seattle will have a franchise for the 1976 season.

December 5, 1974 The National Football League announces that it has voted membership to Seattle Professional Football, Inc., headed by Lloyd W. Nordstrom with partners Herman Sarkowsky, D. E. "Ned" Skinner, Howard S. Wright, M. Lamont Bean, and Lynn P. Himmelman.

March 6, 1975 John Thompson, Executive Director of the NFL Management Council, named General Manager of the Seattle franchise.

June 17, 1975 Nickname "Seahawks" selected from 20,365 entries and 1,741 different names. One hundred fifty-one suggested "Seahawks."

July 25, 1975 Mailed season ticket applications.

July 28, 1975 Season ticket applications accepted — 24.168 received the first day.

August 5, 1975 Chamber of Commerce-sponsored kick-off luncheon attended by 1,700 including Commissioner Pete Rozelle.

August 23, 1975 Season ticket sales closed after 27 days — 59,000 tickets sold.

November 6, 1975 Agreement reached between KIRO and Seahawks for radio broadcast rights.

December 18, 1975 Seahawks agree to a 20-year lease agreement to play all games in The Kingdome.

January 3, 1976 Jack Patera, assistant coach of the Minnesota Vikings, named head coach of the Seahawks.

January 20, 1976 Lloyd W. Nordstrom, spokesman for the Nordstrom family, the Seahawks' majority owners, dies of a heart attack while vacationing in Mexico.

January 22, 1976 Pete Gross of KIRO named play-by-play announcer for Seahawks radio broadcasts.

February 27, 1976 Kirkland site selected for Seahawks office and practice facilities.

March 30, 1976 Veteran allocation held in New York City. Seahawks select 39 NFL veterans.

April 8-9, 1976 College draft. Seahawks select 25 collegians in their first college draft. Notre Dame's Steve Niehaus is the first choice and he flies to Seattle for evening news conference on April 8.

April 23-25, 1976 Rookie orientation. Jack Patera greets 53 rookies for three-day session including physicals, equipment fittings, team meetings, two light workouts and boat tour of Seattle's Lake Washington.

May 3-5, 1976 Veteran orientation. Forty-one veterans report for orientation session similar to that of rookies.

June 1, 1976 Seahawks and KIRO-TV sign a five-year agreement whereby the station will carry the club's pre-season games in the Seattle area.

July 9, 1976 Seahawks open training camp at Eastern Washington State College in Cheney.

August 1, 1976 Seahawks play first game before 60,825 fans in the Kingdome. San Francisco holds on to defeat Seattle, 27-20, as Jim Zorn is tackled on the two-yard line when the gun sounds.

August 29, 1976 Seahawks capture first victory, a 17-16 win over San Diego as Ron Howard catches a three-yard Jim Zorn pass for the winning touchdown with only 13 seconds remaining.

September 12, 1976 Seattle opens regular season play with a near miss against St. Louis, 30-24. In typical exciting Kingdome action, the game ends with the Cardinals intercepting a pass in the end zone.

October 17, 1976 Seahawks win Expansion Bowl with 13-10 victory over host Tampa Bay. Linebacker Mike Curtis blocked a Tampa Bay field goal attempt with 42 seconds remaining to preserve the victory.

November 7, 1976 Seahawks capture their first regular season victory at home with a 30-13 win over Atlanta. Sherman Smith becomes the first Seattle back to rush for over 100 yards with 124 yards on 14 carries.

January 17, 1977 Seahawks host the Pro Bowl and it is the first sellout in the 27-year history of the Pro Bowl and is the largest crowd under the AFC vs. NFC format. AFC scored a 24-14 win before 63,214 fans.

May 3, 1977 Seattle trades its first-round draft choice, the second player in the draft, to Dallas for the Cowboys' first-round selection and three second round picks. The Seahawks select Steve August, offensive tackle from Tulsa, on the first round.

THE KINGDOME

The Seattle Seahawks finished sixth in regular season home attendance last year and they did it in the country's newest domed stadium — the Kingdome.

At a cost of \$67 million and with a seating capacity of 64,752 for football, the Kingdome is the least expensive domed, air-conditioned stadium of its size anywhere in the world.


Built on a 35.9-acre site just south of Seattle's central business district, the walls of the dome anchor the world's largest self-supporting concrete roof.

The project was completed by Peter Kiewit Sons' Construction Co. and was originally a bond issue passed by a 62 percent majority of the voters of King County and spearheaded by County Executive John Spellman. Construction began on November 2, 1972.

The first professional game in the Kingdome, August 1, 1976, between the Seahawks and San Francisco 49ers drew 60,825 fans.

The Kingdome is also the home of the American League Seattle Mariners and the North American Soccer League Seattle Sounders. Among other events held in the Kingdome during its first year of operation were three rock concerts, the Billy Graham Crusade, the Auto Show and Seattle Boat Show.

The Billy Graham Crusade was the single event attendance leader with 74,000 on May 14, 1976, while the Seattle Boat Show drew 119,007 people over a ten-day period.





KIRKLAND COMPLEX

The Seattle Seahawks office and practice complex located in Kirkland has to rank as one of the finest, if not the finest, of its kind in the National Football League.

Designed by Assistant General Manager Mark Duncan, the complex houses the Seahawks administrative and coaching staffs on the top floor of the 20,000-square foot building. On the bottom floor are player dressing facilities, a training room, weight room, equipment room, coaches dressing facilities and team meeting rooms.

Behind the building is the equivalent of two-and-one-half practice fields located on waterfront property on the eastside of Lake Washington owned by the Skinner Corp.

KIRO Newsradio 71 will again broadcast six hours of Seahawks football each Sunday during the regular season with a talented three-man team led by play-by-play announcer Pete Gross. Gross will be joined on the broadcasts by Wayne Cody, who reports developments from the sidelines, and color commentator Don Heinrich, former National Football League quarterback and assistant coach. Along with the play-by-play description of the game, KIRO Newsradio 71 will begin a regular season Sunday broadcast at 11:30 a.m. with NFL History, a

review of the history of the Seahawks' opponent, followed at 11:45 a.m. by the Visiting Coaches Show. At 12:05 p.m. Cody roves through the stands and discusses Seahawks football with fans on the Seahawks Fan Club Show and at 12:40 p.m. the Seahawks Huddle, a pre-game show with player interviews, team records and lineups. After the game is the Seahawks Post-Game Show featuring statistics, scoring highlights, and press box personality interviews and then player interviews on the Locker Room Show. The Pro Football Scoreboard, scores and highlights of the other games around the NFL, is broadcast at 4:30 p.m. followed at 5 p.m. by the award-winning Seahawks Replay Show, taped highlights of scoring and important plays, with Gross and Dick Harris. The Jack Patera Show, with comments from the head coach, beginning at 5:15 p.m. concludes KIRO's game-day coverage.

TELEVISION

Regular season road telecasts will be broadcast locally on KING-TV (Channel 5) in the Seattle area, while home games must be sold out 72-hours in advance of kickoff before they can be televised live.

Pre-season contests will be carried by KIRO-TV (Channel 7) with Gary Justice calling the play-by-play and former Denver head coach John Ralston serving as color commentator. The Seahawks' pre-season opener at San Francisco and the Sept. 11 game with San Diego will be carried live by KIRO-TV, while the four pre-season home games will be shown on a delayed tape basis.







DIVISIONAL TIE-BREAKER

In the event that two or more teams tie for the championship in their division, there will not be a special playoff to determine the champion. A division champion will be selected by applying, in the order given, the following tie-breaking procedures until a winner is established:

- 1. The club with the best won-lost percentage in those games played between or among the involved clubs.
- The club with the best won-lost percentage in intra-division games.
- 3. The club with the best won-lost percentage in intraconference games.
- 4. The club with the best point differential in those games played between or among the involved clubs.
- 5. The club with the largest differential between regular season points and regular season points allowed, when it is applied only to all intra-division games played within the division.
- 6. The club with the largest positive point differential between regular season points scored and regular season points allowed when it is applied to only intra-conference games, or the average of same if the involved teams have played an unequal number of intra-conference games.
- 7. The club with the largest differential between regular season points scored and regular season points allowed, when it is applied to all teams and games played in the League's regular season schedule.
- A coin flip between or among the involved clubs.

In the event that two or more teams are tied in determining the fourth team to enter the playoffs, the first step in breaking such tie shall be to apply the procedures of the above any time that two or more of the teams are from the same division, so that no more than one team from any division will remain in contention. If a tie still exists, the following tie-breaking procedures will be applied, in the order given, until a winner is established:

- 1. The club with the best won-lost percentage in those games played or among the involved clubs; providing, however, that this clause shall not be applicable unless each of the involved teams has played at least one of the other involved teams, and further providing that in the case of a tie involving three clubs this clause is only applicable if one club defeated both of the others or one club lost to both of the others.
- The club with the best won-lost percentage in intraconference games, provided the involved clubs have played an equal number of intra-conference games.
- The club with the best point differential in those games played between or among the involved clubs; providing, however, that this clause shall not be applicable unless each of the involved teams has played at least one of the other involved teams.
- 4. The club with the largest differential between regular season points scored and regular season points allowed, when it is applied only to all intra-conference games played within the conference; provided, however, that if the involved clubs played an unequal number of intra-conference games the point differential will be divided by the number of applicable intra-conference games.
- The club with the largest differential between regular season points and regular season points allowed, when it is applied to all teams and games played in the League's regular season schedule.
- 6. A coin flip between or among the involved clubs.
