


#### **Historic Contexts**

- Purpose and Need: Historic contexts are critical for land use planning: plan for the future by respecting and understanding the past-
- Contexts include:
- Overview of major themes in history of area-
- A timeline of important events-
- Catalogue of architectural styles and property types-
- **Recommendations** for future research and action.

### Research Tools

- Primary and secondary sources such as-
- Maps (tract and Sanborn fire insurance maps)-
- Newspaper and journal articles; sales ads-
- Interviews-
- Architectural surveys, building permits and the buildings themselves-
- County histories, etc.
- Conflicting information.

#### Forkner's Vision: The Garden of Eden

- In 1910 J.C. Forkner came to San Joaquin Valley to look at land-
- He obtained a one-year option to purchase 6,000 acres of hog wallow/ "outlaw land" from the Bullard Company-
- Made soil tests; Biblical vision that land could produce.

## Fig Production

- 1910- Forkner conferred with Berkeley professor Edward J. Wickson about viability of growing figs-
- Forkner hired Fresno fig grower Henry Markarian as a consultant-
- Forkner leveled land using horse teams pulling Fresno scrapers; later Ford tractors-
- Used dynamite to blast pugh the hard pan.



#### J.C. Forkner Fig Gardens

- Original 6,000 acres expanded to 12,000 with 600,000 fig trees-
- For every 10 fig trees, one ornamental planted in avenues and parks, thus 60,000 ornamental trees and shrubs-
- Fig Gardens for all: Modest homes and mansions alike... "Not simply a place to live but a place to live better"
- A sustainable community: public transit with street car line; boost to local economy.






#### Developed for Fig Production


