Todd Foley (FA 08) began working in September as an associate editor at Focus on the Family Canada in Langley, BC.


Kendall Grant (FA 08) is enrolled in the Norman Patterson School of International Affairs at Carleton University in Ottawa.

Mark and Lauren Witten in Mumbai



We are stuck in a traffic jam, horns blaring and engines sputtering. Even at ten o'clock, the sweltering streets are crippled by gridlock. Two tiny children, catching a glimpse of white skin, flank our rickshaw and clamor for attention, begging. This is Mumbai, a crowded city of 20 million that never sleeps. Every inch of every street seems to function as someone's bed, yet somehow the city faithfully absorbs 10,000 new people every day. It is a place of contradictions, with rich culture and deep community, yet incredible darkness. And for three months, while serving as legal interns with International Justice Mission (IJM), it was home.

IJM is a human-rights agency dedicated to fighting against violent oppression of the poor and vulnerable around the world. In Mumbai, casework is focused on liberating young girls from brothels, prosecuting their abusers, and walking the girls down a long road to restoration and freedom.

It was challenging to envision how two Canadians, who were unfamiliar with the language, culture and legal system, could actually contribute to IJM's work or make any difference in the fight against human trafficking. With newly minted law degrees, we had a sum total of 12 months of practical legal experience between us. The reality of our contribution was both humbling and encouraging. Despite the many practical challenges of doing legal work in the developing world, and our limited experience, we were able to make a tangible contribution to the work. We provided legal research support for the national lawyers' case-work, and also had the opportunity to help train the more junior national lawyers, strengthening their advocacy and analytical skills.

During our time we came face to face with hopelessness, but were somehow left with reason to hope. We witnessed inexplicable acquittals in water-tight cases, but also saw the beginnings of change in landmark convictions that demonstrated that abusers could not operate with impunity. We worked alongside heroic individuals who risked their lives for these girls, but also saw rescue operations foiled by corruption that denied trafficked girls their one chance at freedom. Though it sounds cliché, the experience was life changing. It transformed our perspective on the importance of the rule of law, the integrity of our own legal system, and the ability to make an impact in the face of overwhelming darkness.
