Vessel MATIN Captain James Mudie of Dundee, struck rocks near Cullercoats and arrived River Tyne with damaged bow plating. At the Inquiry in Dundee it was recorded that Captain Mudie had been at sea for 40 years and in command for 30 years and in command of MATIN for two years.

Captain Mudie explained the accident was probably due to stillness of the weather and the magnetic compass having to be tapped to make it revolve. [NOTE: It may be presumed this is incorrect reporting and what Captain Mudie may have said was the compass had to be tapped to ensure the compass maintained a constant direction when the vessel altered course and turned around the compass.]

Joseph Gibson, Secretary of the United Association of Underwriters in Dundee said Captain Mudie was singularly fortunate and careful and had completed 2120 voyages between River Tay and River Tyne. There had been only two averages to vessels during his career and no total losses. The Court heard Captain Mudie should have been more prudent in hazy weather. His Certificate was returned to Captain Mudie.

Two miles south-east amd a third north from Buddonness High Light Tower; six and a half miles east-south-east of Tayport lights; and two miles north-west and a third north from the Fairway Buoy; five cables length north-east from the Elbow End; two cables west-north-west from No. 3 red buoy on the Gaa Sands. The lightship will ride in five and a half fathoms at low water. She will exhibit from her foremast from sunset to sunrise, a FLASHING WHITE LIGHT every ten seconds, visible in clear weather about eight miles distant. During foggy weather, a bell will be rung. The light vessel will have two masts and be painted red, with the word ABERTAY on her sides.

ABERTAY was moored 'on station' in the morning of 16th October 1877. [NOTE: ABERTAY was replaced in July 1939 by a second ABERTAY, an all steel vessel built at Caledon Shipyard, Dundee.]

None of the crew suffered from scurvy, due to abundant game at hand. Arrived Yokohama 2 September 1879 and returned to Stockholm, via southern routes, on 24 April 1880 when Adolf Nordenjkond was made a Baron. [Note: Vega was later bought and fitted as a whaler from Dundee.]

The Meeting then had under discussion the disposal of the Bibles belonging to the Incorporation. Whereupon Captain J. M. Cochrane moved that the bibles and whole other Books be disposed of by auction to the whole house at next General Quarterly Meeting and which motion was seconded by Captain D. Simpson and agreed to.

15 December:

After transacting the ordinary business of routine, Captain J. M. Cochrane moved in virtue of the previous Notice given by him that the Members constituting the Committee of Management including the Box Master and his Deputy be restricted to six in number and three being present to form a quorum and that the Bye Laws be altered to that effect accordingly all agreeably to and in virtue of the powers and authority constituted by the Royal Charter in favour of the Incorporation which motion was seconded by Captain David Simpson and on being put to the Meeting was unanimously agreed to and declared carried

During the year:

The Old Custom House, built 1590 at the west end of Grassmarket, was demolished for construction of the east side of Whitehall Crescent. The history of that building was described as follows: "Part of the building known as Drummond's Lodging (c.1573) and located at what "was later known as the west side of the Greenmarket was put to use as the Custom "House of the port of Dundee, in which was collected the shore dues and the "Governmant duties on customs and excise. About 1805 the use of the part of "Drummond's Lodging for those purposes was discontinued."

Andrew Leitch & Co, Dundee contracted to supply 50,000 tons Slammanan Coal to Danish State Railways over a twelve month period.

Correspondence between W. B. Thompson (Tay Foundry) and Town Council about heavy boilers being moved down Commercial Street and it was suggested Police Commissioners arrange strengthening supports. Town Clerk replied W. B.Thompson was not entitled to take boilers down Commercial Street and would be liable for damage.

Ship DAISY, crew included: Allan Walker age 31 of Dundee, Boatswain, and James Smith age 18 of Dundee, Assistant Steward.

Ship RANGER, crew included: William Johnston age 32 of Dundee, Chief Engineer, Charles Hunter age 22 of Dundee, 2nd Engineer and James Wills age 30 of Dundee, passenger (a carpenter).

The four masted Barque named LAWHILL, 2,942 tons, was launched from yard of W. B. Thompson as 'Steel Sailer No. 112' and towed to Victoria Dock for fitting out. Owner Captain Charles Barrie, Dundee and said to be the largest sailing vessel, and the largest vessel, built at Dundee.

James Mitchell, Third Mate, age 21, from Broughty Ferry.

Harry Mony, Sailmaker, age 46, from Dundee.

William Scott, Bosun, age 26, from Dundee.

1957 Broken up at Lourenco Marques (Maputo).

6 September 1892 (to May 1893);

Robert Kinnes organised Dundee Antarctic Expedition (to May 1893) with four ships, namely:

ACTIVE (Thomas Robertson); BALAENA (Alexander Fairweather);

DIANA (Robert Davidson); POLAR STAR (James Davidson).

Dr. W. S. Bruce was surgeon on board BALAENA. The Dundee Antarctic Expedition was not a financial success. [Note: Dr. Bruce later led the SCOTIA Expedition to Antarctica.]

NOTE: The above items remain the property of the Fraternity of Masters and Seamen in Dundee and are currently on loan to Dundee City Council/McManus Galleries, Dundee.

At the same exhibition, Items No. 1, 2, 25 and 26 were described as 'Four communion cups belonging to the East, or Parish, Church Dundee. Two bears (sic) the inscription "Given by the Fraternity of Seamen 1766." Further information given: 'These cups (all four) were made in Dundee by J. Steven [John Steven]. Hall Mark Pot and Lilies.'

At the same exhibition, Catalogue Reference No. 519, is a portrait of barque LEIPZIG entering Marseilles, 1848, (Thomas Cappon, Master). Signature: Pelligure. Captain Thomas Cappon was a Past Boxmaster and a member of the Fraternity. The barque LEIPZIG carried the timber from which the Pile Light was built by the Fraternity in 1848.

18 November:

Pilot cutter PILOT wrecked on Abertay Sands. Two crew and five pilots saved by Lifeboat.

During the year:

Joinville Island in Antarxtica was thought to be a large island but in 1893, Captain Thomas Robertson of the Dundee Antarctic Expedition found to be two islands. Joinville remained the name of the larger, and the smaller was named Dundee Island.

Thirteen ships laid up in Dundee/River Tay due lack of trade.

Captain George Taylor died, age 75. Captain Taylor was Master on the Pilot Cutter from 1865 to 1890.

DRYDENS, Captain John Henderson of Dundee on coastal trade between Dundee and Berwick.

HURENA of Dundee, from Dundee to New York, in heavy weather, W. Atchison, seaman was lost overboard. Third Officer John Daker washed overboard and then grabbed a rail and returned on board.

The Master in answer to one of the Members stated that Ten Masters had died within the Five years preceding December last and that only Sixteen Masters now remained on the Pension List. The Mortality amongst the Masters and Mates Widows had been in a similar proportion and added that a great proportion of the pensioners were over Eighty years of age.

7 May

Alexander Stephen & Sons launched Yard No. 96, barque, not named. Dimensions 319' x 45' x 26'6", and, at 4920 deadweight tons, this was the largest sailing vessel built at Dundee and was the last sailing vessels built by Alexander Stephen & Sons. Later bought by Laiesz and named PITLOCHRY after owners had visited the town. Captain Robert Miethe, her most famous Master said "If ever there was a perfect ship, it was she." Sunk on 28 November 1913 collision with Elder Dempster liner BOULAMI.

10 September:

Dundee Shipbuilding Company taken over by Alexander Stephen & Co.,

Dundee Ship Building Company Limited formed.

On Wednesday 10 April D. B. Livie, Boatbuilders received an order for a 16' boat for Skye and the completed boat was despatched on Friday 12 April.

7 August:

Directors of General Accident Company, Perth, paid £50 to the widow of James Feathers Hay of Tayport, Mate of ship ACRENCE, posted missing at Lloyd's 7 August. The family had a policy for £100 with General Accident but had allowed it to lapse on 14 April due non-payment of premium

August:

Federation of Sail makers Fifth Annual Conference at Dundee. Robert Henderson, Dundee, President.

Ten delegates represented 1000 members. It was noted that membership was down from 287 and continuing to shrink, and had been 1500 in 1855. There was a difference of opinion about use of sewing machines.

16 September:

Ship CALCUTTA of Dundee, owners Charles Barrie, Low (of Newport) Master, Andrew Ramsay, 2nd Mate and David Thomson, Steward, both of Dundee. Vessel was abandoned off Staten Island, near Cape Horn. Some survivors lived on an Island for 43 days. All crew saved in due course.

11 December:

MAROA arrived Dundee with 45,160 bales jute. Largest vessel to arrive at Dundee with jute and the cargo took four weeks to discharge, using every horse and cart available to carry jute from docks to mills

During the year:

SARDINIA built at Dundee 1895. [NOTE: 15 June 1916 sunk by Austrian submarine.] D. B. Livie, boatbuilders, built 12 Gigs each 24' and 6 gigs each 34' for Admiralty; Yacht for Royal Tay Yacht Club; Coastguard boat which was towed to Stonehaven and delivered there. Whitsun:

Tay Shipbuilding Company (James Mollison) gave up business at their yard. Ground was later leased to Bell & Sime.

14 July:

Newspaper report:

Yesterday the Naval Reserve training ship H. M. S. UNICORN was loosed from her moorings and towed round to the crane at earl Grey Dock by the steam tug EXCELSIOR, for the purpose of having removed the obsolete guns of the old muzzle-loading type of ordnance. One is a 6 ½ ton gun and the two others are 71 cwt., and these are to be replaced by a 6" breech loading gun from Leith Fort. By the removal of the old guns a good deal of alterations have been necessary, and this work was entrusted to the Dundee Shipbuilding Company, the whole arrangements having been carried out in a most satisfactory manner. Mr. Wood, Admiralty supervisor from Sheerness Dockward, has inspected the work effected and has expressed satisfaction with the manner in which it has been performed. By the introduction of this 6" gun, the newest and most expeditious methods of laying, training and elevating guns will now be used in the training of the men. The old guns are to be sent by railway to Leith.

17 July:

Newspaper report:

H. M. S. UNICORN was yesterday removed to its old position having been placed on board one of the newest type of breech loading guns from Leith Fort. The work has been personally supervised by Commander Clarks, whilst Mr. Wood, Admiralty supervisor, has been present during the operations.

Ballingall & Robertson to refill the entire window with new stained glass in commemoration of the diamond jubilee of Her Majesty.

The Secretary further stated that he had made enquiry at several of the Representatives of the other Trades who had their emblems alongside the emblem of the Trinity House in said Window with a view to ascertaining their intentions as to same and he read a letter from Mr. George Haggart of yesterday's date who acts as Clerk to the Three Trades to the effect that his constituents along with the Nine Incorporated Trades had resolved simply to do nothing and were not to oppose the removal of the present window or object to the new one being substituted. Mr. Haggart further mentioned in said letter that he had heard of an idea for having the present small panes shewing the different emblems to be taken out and replaced in St Andrews Church Cowgate although he understood nothing very definite had come to in that direction.

14 September:

Captain R. T. Leitch of Dundee read before the Scottish Shipmaster's Association a paper on 'The Commercial Education of Shipmasters'.

Captain Leitch also informed North of England Protecting and Indemnity Association of the following support for navigation schools in Scotland:

DUNDEE School of Navigation received £25 from the Residue Grant and the Dundee Harbour Trustees also made an allowance for the upkeep of the School.

ABERDEEN School of Navigation received £100 a year from the Town Council Residue Grant and the use of the School House, Rent free, from the Harbour Trustees.

LEITH Navigation School received £75 from the city of Edinburgh, and £100 from the Leith Residue Grant. Sufficient ground had also been given, by the commissioners for the port of Leith, for a new school.

GLASGOW had a private Navigation School but it appeared no public grant was given.

Thirty one vessels arrived at Dundee with jute from India.

Fifty five vessels arrived at Dundee with flax and hemp from Baltic ports Riga, Libau, Reval, Konigsberg and St Petersburg, and Archangel.

Hundred and twenty eight vessels, 101,943 tons registered at Dundee, including 26 sailing vessels.

Six whalers from Dundee went to the Arctic and returned with 16 black whales; 484 walrus, 18,093 seals; 145 polar bears; 230 tons whale oil and 219 tons bone.

Fishing: There were 1,148 landings from trawlers at Dundee.
