Mohammad Thneibat

Minister of Education

Holder of a PhD in administration from the University of Southern California, masters' degrees in political science and administration, and a BA in political and economic science from the University of Jordan, Thneibat served as minister of public sector development and parliamentary affairs in Marouf Bakhit's first government in 2006-2007. He served as minister of administrative development in Ali Abul Ragheb's Cabinet in 2000. In October 2001 he



took on a second portfolio of culture minister in the second reshuffle of Abul Ragheb's government. Threibat also served as secretary general of the Civil Service Bureau and worked as assistant professor at the University of Jordan.

Akef Zu'bi

Minister of Agriculture

Minister of Environment

Shakhshir has a BSc in Pharmacy from Cairo. He served as president of the Jordan Pharmacy Association and President of the Arab Pharmacy Union. He was Minister of Environment in Marouf Bakhit's first government.



Mohammad Hamed

Minister of Energy and Mineral Resources

Hamed, who has a PhD in transportation and mobility development from the University of Washington, served as chief commis-



as minister. He previously worked as strategic analysis manager at the Royal Court and as an international expert on EU missions. Hamed was also a professor in the Jordan University of Science and Technology and has served as director general and vice chairman of the board of the Land Transport Regulatory Commission.

Sami Halaseh

Minister of Public Works and Housing

Born in 1963, Halaseh is a civil engineer with an MSc in construction management from Oklahoma State University in the

US. He served as secretary general at the Public Works Ministry from 2008 until his appointment as minister. A recipient of the Independence Medal of the Second Order in 2007, Halaseh has managed and supervised major projects led by the ministry and funded through international grants and loans.

Minister of Justice

Born in 1964, Talhouni has a PhD in Law from the University of Edinburgh and a BA and an MA in law from the University of Jordan. A lawyer by profession who has been registered at

the Jordan Bar Association since 1988, he has worked as assistant professor at the University of Jordan's (UJ) law faculty and assumed several administrative posts there. He also served as the Ministry of Industry and Trade's companies' comptroller.
