Festival Maribor 2011

Richard Tognetti, Barry Humphries and Jon Frank to perform at one of Slovenia's major art festivals

From 1 to 11 September, Maribor will once again become one of Central Europe's cultural hotspots. Into its fourth year, the festival has become an important showcase of Australian cultural talent in Europe. Under the artistic leadership of Australian Richard Tognetti, Festival Maribor will boast a wide range of artists from all over the globe. One of the festival's highlights will be Richard's "Nothing" project, featuring a special quest performance by Australian icon, comedian Barry Humphries.

Since its inception in 2008, Festival Maribor has become a key event on Central Europe's cultural calendar. Richard Tognetti, the festival's artistic director, has earned a reputation for his creative and thoughtful programming, which is appreciated by audiences and artists alike. As in previous years, Richard has devised an outstand-



ing program of concerts for this year's festival, ranging from classical music recitals in intimate settings to evening concerts with unique repertoire selections of classical and modern music. Australian artists and compositions will feature prominently at this year's event.

On 2 September, the Festival Maribor Orchestra under Slovenian conductor Marko Letonja will perform Australian composer Peter Sculthorpe's Earth Cry.

On 10 September, the Timeline concert evening will juxtapose audio recordings of traditional Aboriginal music with the music of the Beatles, Nirvana, Michael Jackson, as well as live performances of music by Bach, Beethoven, Satie and Cage. Continued on next page. highlight at Festival Maribor will be Richard's production of "Nothing" on 6 September, where he will be paying homage to the philosophy and concept of "Nothingness". The concept of nothing or "no thing" has been the subject of philosophical deliberations of great minds and artists ranging from Greek philosopher Parmenides, to existentialists such as Jean Paul Sartre and the philosophers of Zen Buddhism. Richard will be approaching the theme from various different angles.

Barry Humphries, one of Australia's best known comedians and satirists, will perform as "orchestral narrator" throughout the evening. In addition, Barry will be reading from Façade, a series of poems by Edith Sitwell (British poet; 1887 - 1964), in which the poems are recited over an instrumental accompaniment by English composer William Walton (1902 – 1983). One of the compositions to be played on 6 September is 4:33, composed in 1952 by John Milton Cage Jr. The three movements of 4:33, one of the most controversial compositions of the twentieth century, are performed without a single note being played.

Further program highlights on 6 September will include more traditional works by Beethoven and Händel, as well as modern adaptions of songs by the Aphex Twins and Trent Reznor, and a composition by Richard Tognetti *Sometimes you wait*. Acclaimed Australian photographer and video artist Jon Frank has devised a multimedia program which will seamlessly weave visual stimuli into the musical performance.

The performance on 6 September will also be special because Slovenian conductor and artist Marko Letonja will conduct the concert with Richard Tognetti. Marko, born in Maribor, was chief conductor of the Slovenian Philharmonic Orchestra for more than 15 years. He has worked with the Orchestra Victoria and the Melbourne Symphony Orchestra. In 2008, Letonja was appointed Orchestra Victoria's Principal Guest Conductor. He extensively

toured Australia and New Zealand in 2010 and 2011. He will assume the position of chief conductor and artistic director of the Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra in 2012.



Background Barry Humphries

One of Australia's best known comedians and satirists, Barry Humphries is admired and loved by audiences all over the globe. Barry is a film producer and script writer, a star of London's West End musical theatre, as well as an award-winning writer and an accomplished landscape painter. Barry's probably most famous creation was Melbourne housewife, Dame Edna Everage - "internationally celebrated Megastar" - who achieved worldwide fame for both herself and her creator.



Background Richard Tognetti

Richard Tognetti has been the Artistic Director of Festival Maribor since 2008, and will be the festival's artistic director at least until 2012, when it will be the European Capital of Culture. The Australian Chamber Orchestra will be the festival's orchestra in residence in that year. Richard has established an international reputation for his compelling performances and artistic individualism. He studied at the Sydney Conservatorium with Alice Waten, in his home town of Wollongong with William Primrose, and at the Berne Conservatory (Switzerland) with Igor Ozim, where he was awarded the Tschumi Prize as the top graduate soloist in 1989. Later that year he was appointed Leader of the Australian Chamber Orchestra and subsequently became Artistic Director. He is also Artistic Director of the Maribor Festival in Slovenia.

In 2003, Tognetti was co-composer of the score for Peter Weir's "Master and Commander: The Far Side of the World"; violin tutor for its star, Russell Crowe; and can also be heard performing on the award-winning soundtrack. In 2005, he co-composed the soundtrack to Tom Carroll's surf film "Horrorscopes" and, in 2008, created "The Red Tree", inspired by illustrator Shaun Tan's book. He co-created and starred in the 2008 documentary film "Musica Surfica", which has won best film awards at surf film festivals in the USA, Brazil, France and South Africa. As well as directing numerous recordings by the ACO, Tognetti has recorded Bach's solo violin works for ABC Classics, winning three consecutive ARIA awards, and the Dvorak and Mozart Violin Concertos for BIS. Richard Togneti was appointed an "Officer of the Order of Australia" in 2010.

He holds honorary doctorates from three Australian universities and was made a "National Living Treasure" in 1999. He performs on a 1743 Guarneri del Gesù violin, lent to him by an anonymous Australian private benefactor.

Ars Electronica 2011

Interview with Australian artist Matthew Gardiner



rs Electronica, based in Upper Austria, is one of the world's leading platforms for digital art and media culture. In 2010, Matthew Gardiner, one of Australia's most innovative artists, was invited by Ars Electronica to live and work in Austria as part of the festival's artist in residence program. In 2011, he transformed his residency into a full time occupation as an artistic researcher at the Ars Electronica Futurelab.

Matthew Gardiner is well known for his work with origami and robotics. He was awarded the 2009 Rupert Bunny Visual Arts Fellowship to participate in the Ars Electronica residency program. We wanted to learn more about Matthew's work and how he likes living and working in Linz.

Matthew, we understand you are currently working at the Ars Electronica Center in Linz. Can you please tell us how this collaboration came about? What exactly is your role/position?

In 2010 I was invited to be an

artist-in-residence at the Ars Electronica Futurelab as part of an initiative that was funded by the Australia Council for the Arts and produced by Antoanetta Ivanova of Novamedia. The invitation "came out of the blue", the Australia Council had shortlisted me and I was invited to submit a proposal for a residency. As it turns out my proposal was a perfect combination of concept, infrastructure and resources. Too often a great idea is beset by the challenges of production, you have on one hand a

brilliant concept, and on the other no equipment or resources to realise it. The exact opposite was the case during my residency, everything I needed they had, and whatever I didn't have, I was bringing with me. Over 6 months, I produced my largest ever art work, 50 oribots that were grown over 1800 hours inside the FabLab in a 3D printer, each oribot has 1050 folds, a grand total of 52,500 folds made by hand with a techno-origami process that I developed in the Futurelab. I had the

time of my life, and after the festival I was invited to return and join the Research and Innovation Group, led by Christopher Lindinger, as a permanent member of the team. For me, this is one of the best jobs in the world.


You coined a special term for your art. Can you please tell our readers the origin of "Oribotics"?

Oribotics is a field of artistic research that joins origami and robotics. The term literally means folding robotics, and its been going on now for nearly eight years. It began as an idea for a folding robotic flow-

er in 2003, and was first realised with a LEGO mindstorms kit and some touch screen technology developed by my father Ray Gardiner. Together we have created an evolving series of kinetic sculptures, all of them flowers, and each generation takes a step further in production quality, longevity, interactivity and beauty. The lastest generation uses a biomimetic joint system inspired by a crab arm, and a folded membrane made from polyester fabric that are both extremely long lasting. You can see



them in person at the Ars Electronica Centre; they are exhibited downstairs above the Fablab which they created. were If you have not been to Ars Electronica I highly recommend visit, and if you cannot get there immediately take a look at www.matthewgardiner.net for videos and pho-Oribotics like

many artistic ideas can sound complicated in words, but its really quite simple and enchanting when you see it.

What are you currently working on and how do you get inspired?

My current theme is called functional aesthetics, and my main role is to develop this theme through research projects. The field is closely related to my core interests of folding, robotics, kinetic and interactive media art. Currently I am developing my theme, conceiving new works, and writing proposals for projects that all have positive social and ecological benefits. A variety of things inspire me, for instance nature, science, dreaming, and origami. Nature is great to look at when you have a design problem. Because her solutions are tested over millions of years, she has an aesthetic that is pure, beautiful and intelligent. Science and technology bring a continuous stream of innovations. In particular I am interested in new materials, electronics, and manufacturing techniques that are bubbling up to the consumable level. I dream a lot, and often have daytime flashes of inspiration where a new idea visually builds itself in my mind in an effortless process, and I'm usually quite excitedly scribbling down the essentials on paper after these moments. Since I was eight I've been passionate about origami. Paper by itself is beautiful and folding simply ads to its beauty, although in recent years I've come to realise that the aesthetic of folds and the resulting complexity and intricate geometry really fuels my creative engine.

How do you like living in Linz? So far, so good. My family relocated about one month ago, and it was tough at first with so little in our apartment, but our extended "family" inside Ars Electronica were very supportive and lent us a variety of things from pots, pans and tables and chairs while we

wait for our ship-

ment of household goods to arrive. That's only domestically, but socially and culturally the city of Linz is really quite lively in summer, with many festivals and street activities. It seems every week the city of Linz offers something new to see and do. Nearby to Linz are a lot of picturesque climbing locations, and I have been lucky enough to visit a few already. Linz has greeted us warmly and generously, and we look forward to making a valuable contribution back to the community during our stay.

Following Matthew's artist in residence in 2010, there will be three Australian artists that will be taking up residences at the Ars Electronica FutureLab under a three party agreement between Ars Electronica, the media art agency Novamedia and the Australia Council for the Arts in 2011 and 2012. They are: Jon McCormack (September-October 2011), Matthew Gingold and Daniel Crooks, whose residencies will follow later.

Repatriation of Indigenous Remains

Review

On 30 June 2011, 31 remains of Indigenous Australians were handed over to a delegation of Traditional Owners from Australia in Vienna. The Austrian Academy of Sciences (AAS) returned 30 remains and the Federal Pathology Anatomy Museum returned one set of remains. The remains returned by the AAS were part of the **Rudolf Pöch** collection and were managed and stored at the Department of Anthropology at the University of Vienna. Austrian explorer and anthropologist **Rudolf Pöch** visited Papua New Guinea for study purposes from 1904-1906. During that time he visited Australia and acquired the Indigenous remains.

A ceremony was held at the headquarters of the Austrian Academy of Sciences in the historic centre of Vienna. During the ceremony, the Traditional Owners thanked the Austrian Government and Austrian institutions for the return and encouraged other institutions around the globe to return remains held at their institutions as well.

The return was the result of successful cooperation between the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet Office for the Arts (OFTA), the Australian Embassy in Vienna, Austrian institutions and authorities. This was the second repatriation from Austria following the repatriation of 17 remains in 2009.

Australian Direct Aid Program (DAP) Bosnia and Herzegovina and Kosovo 2010-11

Review



Through the **Direct Aid Program (DAP)** sponsored by the Australian Government, the Australian Embassy in Vienna has been supporting activities of NGOs in Bosnia and Her**zegovina** and the **Republic of Kosovo** for many years. In the financial year 2010-2011, three projects were selected for funding in Bosnia and Herzegovina, and one in Kosovo. The Embassy in Vienna has continued its successful strategy to address the needs of the most vulnerable populations in the two countries (children, women and persons with disabilities). Thanks to DAP, the Embassy got to know many great individuals who are committed to helping those in need. In June 2011, the Embassy's DAP Committee Chair, Simon Mamouney, Second Secretary, and Mrs Nada Muster, visited two projects in Bosnia and Herzegovina. The visits were welcomed by the NGOs who used this opportunity to thank the Australian Government for its support. This year's projects included: providing support to an association for assisting individuals with special needs in **Rudo** to purchase two computers and to facilitate computer courses; the provision of two looms for the manufacture of traditional Bosnian rugs and carpets at an organisation for women with disabilities in Bijeljina (first row, left); contributing to the development of a questionnaire on domestic violence in Banja **Luka**; and purchasing small scale infrastructure items, such as furniture for children, sports equipment, a children's playground, books for a children's library, as well as games and music for the "Women's Wellness Center" (WWC) safe house in Peja/Pec in Kosovo (bottom row).



Gustav Klimt, Egon Schiele, Josef Hoffmann and Adolf Loos were central to this artistic revolution which transformed Vienna into a dynamic metropolis at the forefront of ground-breaking modernism.



Vienna at the dawn of the twentieth century was opulent, elegant and daring. Casting aside outmoded social mores and moralities, private life became public spectacle.

Cabarets, coffee houses, and nightclubs teemed with radical debate and artistic abandon. Gustav Klimt's society portraits immortalise the chic women who presided over this creative ferment. Josef Hoffmann and the Vienna Workshops created the bold new interior design and the household objects with which these women furnished their elegant homes, establishing the modern 'look'. As Sigmund Freud defined sexual fragmentation and erotic obsession for a new millennium, Egon Schiele explored human sexuality in images of unparalleled and startling frankness.

Vienna: Art & Design will explore this extraordinary period of artistic and intellectual genius, bringing together more than 250 works of art, including painting, drawing, graphic and decorative art, furniture, fashion, jewellery and photography, most never before seen in Australia. Visitors will experience the inventiveness and brilliance of a unique generation who laid the foundations for life in the twentieth century - a legacy still vividly alive today.
