technical study group

For the first time in OFC Champions League history, the OFC Technical Study Group (TSG) used video analysis during the group stage of the tournament.

The purpose of this was to allow for future technical analysis of trends in club football in the Oceania region, which would be rooted in local football development and playing performance.

OFC Coach Education Manager Didier Chambaron is delighted to see the TSG open a new chapter in its analysis of developing trends in Oceania club football.

"The TSG have been put in place for a few years now but this year we have decided to take a step forward in terms of match analysis," Didier Chambaron says.

"Football evolves and the tools we use to measure that evolution changes as well and as a confederation we have to provide our Member Associations with the best information we can," he adds The OFC video library, utilised during training courses, will also receive a boost from the information obtained.

The TSG observed individual matches across the group stage for their study, as well as attending training sessions and engaging in dialogue with players and coaches to discuss team preparation and expectations for the OFC Champions League.

The aim of the Technical Department is to create an "Oceania football" video library to use during courses and give participants concrete examples by using videos of matches in the region.

"These videos will be used during our courses. I think it is important we use pictures from our local football than from other parts of the world," Chambaron explained.

It is expected that the results and content of this ground-breaking study will be applicable in future courses, and enhance the information available to teams and coaches to further technical analysis and team performance.



ofc champions league preliminary/group stage summary

Featuring a preliminary stage similar to the previous year, the OFC Champions League finals stage was modified to comprise of the group stage, a two-legged semi-final play-off, and a two-legged final to be played at each competing team's home ground.

The preliminary stage was contested by the champions clubs of American Samoa, Tonga, Samoa, and the Cook Islands as Kiwi FC of Samoa advanced comfortably, winning all their matches to qualify for the group stage for the first time since 1999.

The group stage featured an increase from eight to 12 teams competing for the Champions League title and teams were drawn into three groups of four, playing each other on a roundrobin basis. The three group winners and the best-placed runner-up formed the semi-final quartet.

AS Pirae of Tahiti, Ba FC of Fiji, and Amicale FC of Vanuatu all advanced to the semi-final play-offs as winners of their respective groups, and were joined by Auckland City FC of New Zealand who finished as the best runners-up after AS Pirae knocked Waitakere United out of

the competition on the final day of group play.

The irony of AS Pirae's win saw them matched with Auckland City as the pair contested a mouth-watering semi-final, with the first leg held at Kiwitea Street. Auckland City won 3-0 with a brace by Emiliano Tade and an additional strike by Joao Moreira. Moreira went on to score again in the second leg at Stade Pater, responding to a Jimmy Tepa goal. Despite Naea Bennett scoring the winning goal for Pirae, the final aggregate was 4-2 at the conclusion, and Auckland City emerged victorious.

Amicale faced Ba, first in Govind Park, where the visitors came back from an early Avinesh Suwamy goal to take a 2-1 advantage into the second leg. At Port Vila, Amicale held the Fijians to a 0-0 draw and thus advanced to the final with a 2-1 aggregate victory to set up a repeat of the 2011 OFC Champions League.

the amicale fc interview

nathan hall



Australia-born Amicale FC coach Nathan Hall was hired with just one goal in mind — to win the OFC Champions League 2014 title with Amicale FC — he's a man on a mission.

OFC Media: What has it been like coming from Asia to Vanuatu as a coach?

Hall: Coming from a fully professional environment in Asia where you have fitness coaches, physios and doctors, the set-up here is obviously very different. That was a challenge, but I knew that when I came into the job and was fully aware of what I was walking into.

OFC Media: How have you found integrating into the country, and with the players?

Hall: Vanuatu is a very easy country to live in. There's no crime here, it's a safe place and so it has been good in that aspect. I've found the boys to be very courteous, hard-working and very attentive. They give their all in every training session.

OFC Media: How did you put your team together?
Hall: Because the objective has always been the OFC
Champions League I wasn't coming here to coach the
Vanuatu Premier League competition but to prepare a
squad of players for this competition. There were a lot
of challenges. We spent weeks on the phone, sending
emails, communicating with players' agents and trying
to entice them to come out here. I think we've done a
good job because when the foreign boys came here
they immediately gave us a little more quality that I felt
we needed to strengthen our squad.

OFC Media: You mentioned bringing in those foreign players helped the squad, but are you seeing talent emerging from local Vanuatu footballers?

Hall: There's no doubt that we have a talented bunch of local players. Some players need more time to develop and unfortunately in a competition like the OFC Champions league it's hard to just throw a half dozen players into the mix if they're not ready. That's why the Port Vila Premier League and the National Super League are there, to give chances to local players as the only way they're going to improve and prosper is by playing matches. There's a lot of really good players at Tafea, Erakor Golden Star and Tupuji Imere, and we also have a smorgasbord of good, young players. The standard is improving no question.

But are we ready to put a team of eleven local players against Auckland City? That will take time.

OFC Media: Have you enjoyed taking part in this region's premier club competition?

Hall: Yes I have enjoyed it. The ten days in Fiji was tough with so many games in such a short space of time, most of the players were carrying knocks and niggles. I was very impressed with the character they showed because you know in a tournament like that it's not easy, you need to win the group to guarantee qualification so that was very demanding and very challenging in a lot of ways.

OFC Media: You remain the only undefeated side in this competition after beating Auckland City in the group stages, will that affect your side's approach to the finals?

Hall: I don't think anybody is getting too overconfident or getting ahead of themselves at all. I think we know there's still a job to do, but fatigue and tiredness is a factor for every team. Mentally it's been very demanding for all the teams. We've just got to roll up our sleeves and put in another two good performances, and if we can do that then we have a good chance of lifting that trophy.

OFC Media: The final is over two-legs, one week you have home advantage and the next you don't, will that be a factor?

Hall: Of course it is, and we need to try and get a positive result without question. You don't want to be going to a place like Auckland knowing that you need to win by one or two goals to lift that trophy, that's a tall order for any team in Oceania. Auckland don't concede many goals in their home ground and I don't think they lose a lot of matches there either. We just need to play as well as can, be relaxed and composed but at the same time, not too relaxed. If you take your foot off the gas or rest on your laurels for just that little bit you can get punished. So the two-leg tie is going to make it a bit different and we just have to go all out and try and win our home match.



In recent years the "Red Roosters" have emerged as one of the dominant forces of Vanuatu domestic football.

Having taken top honours in the past four consecutive Vanuatu Premia Divisen seasons they're starting to make a name for themselves on the regional front.

The high-water mark for the side came when they finished runners-up to Auckland City FC in the 2011 home and away final series, losing 6-1 on aggregate on that occasion. Last year they missed out on the final after being knocked out by another Auckland-based side Waitakere United.

With a new coach at the helm, Australian Nathan Hall, and a squad that has been carefully bolstered by foreign signings, Amicale have qualified for just their second ever OFC Champions League final.

Scotsman Colin Marshall, along with the Serbian trio of Milan Matic, Nikola Vasilic and

Marko Dordevic have proven shrewd additions to the side by Hall.

Combined with the in-goal prowess of Chikau Mansale, the sturdy Nelson Sale in the centre of defence and the fire power of Francois Sakama, Dominique Fred and Kensi Tangis up front, the Red Roosters have shown they're closing in on the complete package.

While they lack the record-winning title runs of their final opponent, Amicale is happy to be writing their own historic story. A 1-0 victory over Auckland City in the group stages was probably the greatest upset of the tournament and the most memorable moment of the Red Roosters 2014 OFC Champions League campaign to date.

They eased through the group stages relatively unscathed, with the semi-finals providing the most drama. After going behind early in the 1st leg against Ba FC, Amicale were fortunate to capitalise on a lapse in concentration to earn two valuable away goals going into the 2nd leg at home, which played out in a 0-0 draw.

auckland city fc

Nicknamed the "Navy Blues", Auckland City FC celebrates its 10th year of existence this season having first kicked a ball in competitive match action in the inaugural ASB Premiership season in 2004.

Since then, the club has won trophy after trophy, a haul of silverware that includes five ASB Premiership titles, two ASB Charity Cup victories and five OFC Champions League titles. At youth level the club is thriving with two ASB Youth League titles won in a row.

The benchmark for success at the club remains the OFC Champions League with the Navy Blues aiming for a record sixth title victory and their fourth consecutive continental title win in a row.

Coached by Catalan-born Ramon Tribulietx, the Navy Blues have also featured at five FIFA Club World Cup tournaments dating back to their first foray onto the world stage eight years ago in Japan. Without doubt the New Zealanders set thrilling new standards for Oceania club football when in 2009 the club finished 5th after winning two matches – 2-0 over UAE champions Ah-Ahli and a 3-2 victory over CAF champions TP Mazembe.

Famous players to don the Navy Blues shirt include former South African internationals Grant Young and the late Keryn Jordan, former Korea Republic international Ki-Hyung Lee, former All Whites great and current club skipper Ivan Vicelich, Spanish midfielder and Wellington Phoenix Player of the Year, Albert Riera, and Fijian international striker Roy Krishna.

The Navy Blues 2014 OFC Champions League campaign saw the New Zealanders sneak through to the semi-finals by the narrowest of margins, relying on AS Pirae to defeat arch-rivals Waitakere United in their final pool match to get them through to the last four.

Ironically, AS Pirae's win set up a head-to-head last four joust between the Navy Blues and the Tahitian champions, a tie Auckland City FC won 4-2 on aggregate to reach the final with Amicale FC.

41-year-old Auckland City FC coach Ramon Tribulietx guided the Navy Blues to an unprecedented fourth consecutive OFC Champions League final after defeating AS Pirae 4-2 on aggregate in a pulsating semi-final showdown. OFC Media caught up with Tribulietx to gauge his thoughts on the OFC Champions League, FIFA Club World Cup and how Oceania club football has evolved in recent times.

OFC Media: You've been in charge at Auckland City FC since 2011 and enjoyed a good run of success - how hard has it been to keep that standard so consistently high?

Tribulietx: I've been in charge of the playing style since 2010, although shared the first season with Aaron McFarland in 2011. I think it is a matter of being consistent with your work, keep preparing and planning the same way, try not to leave anything unprepared, basically create a culture where you work to your best level every week.

OFC Media: The club won its first ASB

Premiership title since 2009 was it good to get that barren run off the club's back after a long wait? **Tribulietx:** We have been immersed on a change of style and maybe that meant we made some mistakes in crucial games, but we had to focus on the processes to make sure the change of habits was achieved. Despite not having won the final since 2009, we won three minor premierships which for me is the best barometer to determine the best team in any championship. This season's domestic title success was more of a confirmation that the work put in in the last few years was worth it. **OFC Media:** The OFC Champions League is a very tough competition to win, what do you enjoy most about it and what are the toughest challenges?

Tribulietx: I enjoy the atmosphere in Oceania environment, it always feels like a real football atmosphere and every time we have to play away it is a big challenge for us to adapt to the circumstances we have to overcome.

OFC Media: Amicale have emerged as a strong club over the past six months, what do you expect to see from them over the two legs?

Tribulietx: A very strong team with a lot of experience, prepared to win, smart with they play, great challenge for us and very difficult for sure. **OFC Media:** Do you think the standard of the top clubs in the Oceania region is improving? Is it getting more difficult to win the OFC Champions League?

Tribulietx: Definitely. Every year it is more and more difficult to reach the same levels of achievement. The clubs in the Oceania region possess a lot of talent and coming up against this particularly on their own turf is very difficult. **OFC Media:** Emiliano Tade has emerged as a

key figure this season after being on the fringes of the squad in previous seasons - where has he improved as a player do you think?

Tribulietx: Emiliano Tade has improved his physicality a lot and his work ethic. I'm very happy that positive things have happened for him, he definitely deserves this recognition for the amount of work he has put in over the last season. Winning the ASB Premiership golden boot was a nice reward for Emiliano on the domestic front.

OFC Media: Auckland City FC squeezed past a difficult semi-final situation against AS Pirae – what was your view of that tie?

Tribulietx: The game played out as we expected – we faced a very aggressive AS Pirae and we did not quite manage to control the game the way we wanted. But our mind was set on trying to score an away goal that could be definitive, and we did so. I think the Auckland City FC club supporters have to be very proud of their players. They've competed well over the course of a very long season and performed admirably.









facts, figures and statistics

The OFC Champions League saw a number of milestones reached as the 12th edition of Oceania's showpiece club event captured the imagination of fans across the pacific and around the world.

James Pritchett (Auckland City FC)

The 31-year-old former All Whites defender (pictured centre left) became the first player in OFC Champions League history to reach the 50 appearances mark when he took to the field against AS Pirae in the semi-final 1st Leg at Kiwitea Street on April 27.

Amicale FC

The Vanuatu club becomes the first ever non-Australian, non-New Zealand, club to reach a second OFC Champions League final. Amicale FC qualified for their first OFC Champions League final appearance in 2010-11 season when they lost 6-1 on aggregate to Auckland City FC.

AS Pirae

The Tahitian champions re-emergence as a force in Oceania club football was confirmed when they defeated both Auckland City FC (2-1) and Waitakere United (3-1) in the semi-final 2nd Leg and group stage respectively. It is the first time a club has ever registered two wins over the New Zealand representatives at an OFC Champions League competition.

Marama Vahirua (AS Pirae)

Marama Vahirua (far left) became the second player with UEFA Champions League experience to feature in the OFC Champions League. The first was former All Whites and Waitakere United defender Danny Hay.

Naea Bennett (AS Pirae)

Naea Bennett (far right) set a new record for the longest break between scoring in an OFC Champions League match. The 36-year-old striker netted for AS Pirae against YoungHeart Manawatu in the OFC Club Championship semi-final on 19 May, 2006. He then scored four goals in his next appearance against Kiwi FC on 12 April, 2014, waiting a total of 2,881 days, or 7 years, 10 months and 20 days between goals. Bennett has a total of 14 goals in just 11 OFC Champions League matches played over three tournaments. Only Sanni Issa (7 goals in 9 games for Ba) and the late Keryn Jordan (17 goals in 17 games for Auckland City FC) have a comparable strike rate.

Auckland City FC

The defending champions became the first club to play 50 OFC Champions League matches when they defeated Nadi FC 3-0 at Churchill Park, Lautoka, on 8 April. They have now played a competition record 54 matches, 36 wins, 10 draws, 8 defeats, scoring 152 goals, conceding 48.

Fenedy Masauvakalo (Amicale FC)

Masauvakalo (centre right) became the first player from Vanuatu to reach 25 OFC Champions League appearances when he came on as a substitute in the 0-0 draw with Ba in the semi-final second leg on Saturday 10 May.



The OFC Champions League Group Stage Tournament was a success both on and off the pitch with the UNICEF, Fiji Government, OFC and Fiji FA joining forces to promote the "Kick Dengue Out of Fiji!" campaign.

With Dengue affecting 80,000 Fijians this year alone, enough to fill Lautoka's Churchill Park, ten times over, the OFC Champions League harnessed the popularity of football to raise awareness of this mosquito-borne disease.

A regional audience of 3 million television viewers, 450,000 daily listeners via radio and 7,000 social media followers received comprehensive "Kick Dengue Out of Fiji!" messages, not to forget that fans in the stadiums were able to read about Dengue in the official Match Programmes, with over 2,000 distributed across Ba and Lautoka.

OFC Competitions Michael Song says the initiative was highly successful.

"The "Kick Dengue Fever Out of Fiji!" campaign was extremely successful and we're delighted that the OFC Champions League could be a platform for the betterment of peoples' health not only in Fiji, where Dengue is prevalent, but elsewhere across Oceania.

"We're certainly very hopeful that we can collaborate with Franck Castillo and our colleagues at UNICEF Pacific, Fiji Government and the Fiji FA on future projects to help raise awareness of social obstacles and disease in a practical and meaningful way," he says.

The promotion of "Kick Dengue Out of Fiji!" stretched across the world with FIFA Weekly covering the tournament operation and logistics and a further 270 journalists informed daily about the competition and activities around the corporate social responsibility.

What you need to know about dengue:

- Dengue is spread by the Aedes aegypti mosquito or the black and white striped ones. They can bite at ANY time of the day
- It's important to destroy all mosquito breeding sites. These can be found anywhere in containers that collect stagnant or still water like abandoned bottles blocked drains, old tyres, pots and drums.
- If left untreated, dengue can be fatal. Know the signs and symptoms of dengue and when to seek medical attention!
- REMEMBER, A STRONG DEFENSE IS THE BEST OFFENCE! It takes just one mosquito to spread dengue to an entire household! Using insect repellant everyday will help to protect you and your loved ones from getting bitten!

FIFA club world cup morocco 2014

The FIFA Club World Cup Morocco 2014 represents the pinnacle of global club competition and draws together the champion sides from every confederation plus the national champions of the host nation in a seven team tournament.

The prize money on offer sees the winning club net \$16 million USD while the seventh placed club pockets \$500,000 USD, no small amount of money within an Oceanian football club context.

Traditionally the tournament has been dominated by clubs from UEFA with Barcelona twice, Manchester United, Bayern Munich, Inter Milan and AC Milan each winning the trophy. The South American influence remains strong with Corinthians twice lifting the coveted title while compatriots Sao Paulo and Internacional nabbing one win each.

In 2014, Morocco welcomes back the FIFA Club World Cup as they host the tournament for the second consecutive season. Deposed champions Bayern Munich won't be back to defend their title after losing to Real Madrid in the UEFA Champions League semifinals. Real and cross-town rivals Atletico meet in the UEFA Champions League final to decide which of the two Spanish giants represents UEFA in Morocco.

Qualification for Morocco is complete for Mexican club Cruz Azul who booked their tickets for December after winning the CONCACAF Champions League. The champions from Asia, Africa and South America have yet to be determined as Amicale and Auckland City FC jostle for OFC's berth in North Africa in Port Vila and Auckland over the next fortnight.
