From the Headmaster

The essence of schooling is about good teachers getting alongside students and through their relationships and high expectations giving models and pathways to decent and productive lives. Education keeps on becoming more complicated and it shouldn't. Teachers make a difference and so does a sense of belonging and community within a school. It was with delight that we received the news that after some discussions with the Ministry of Education they have decided to bring forward from 2018 the repair and modernisation of our Hall and Library to this year. We have selected a project manager and hope to be using these facilities, with 21st century additions, by the start of 2015. The ministry decision is supported by engineering reports and means the Hall and Library will remain in the current position within the school.

The principles of relationships, high expectation and community won't ever be replaced. We are though entering a great state of change within education. Technology is of central importance, examinations will be online within three years and NZQA are moving towards anywhere, anytime assessment. Education is being seen as more of a public good. Its benefits are being measured in terms of the skilled workforce we are providing the economy and because of this the nature of school has changed. New Zealand can't afford half of its workforce to be unqualified and students are staying in education for longer and greater connections between schools and tertiary providers are being developed. I have recently spent time with Andy West the Vice Chancellor at Lincoln University and have been very impressed with the directions that Lincoln is heading in. Lincoln's dedication to our land based economy is in the national good and the opportunities for our students in this field are tremendous. I have been told that agriculture on the Canterbury Plains is potentially worth more than Australia's mining industry.

What will be important in the changing educational landscape is the integrity of principals. Principals have to maintain the rigour of our examination process and the social and character forming roles of schools.

The aftermath of the Earthquakes and particularly the reduction in international students and the building programme that lies ahead is putting financial pressure on the school, despite this we are in good heart. In last years' Scholarship examination we attained more scholarships than any of the private schools and in Canterbury were only second to Burnside whose roll almost doubles our own. We are the national cricket champions at both 1st XI and junior level and continue to experience a great deal of sporting success in a wide range of sports from rowing to triathlon. We are singing the school song in the gym as part of assembly (hence the enthusiasm about returning to the Hall) and cultural exploits are garnering much acclaim. The Jazz and Dixie Bands are superb and we were the only boys' school in the recent Sheila Winn Shakespeare festival in which we achieved high praise. The boys are proud of their school. They could still wear their uniform better, and one old boy sourced me a supply of garters that I have already exhausted, but they showed their true pride in dedicating their fundraising from work day this year to the restoration of the Shrine. This was the boys' decision.

There are challenges ahead and there are also high expectations and ideals and we are well placed to meet them. Thank you for your continued interest in the school. It builds heritage and identity and that matters to our boys.

Annual Report and Financial Accounts

Graham Russell, the President, moved the adoption of the Annual Report and reported on the activities of the Association:

Tonight is the 101st Annual General Meeting of the Christchurch Boys' High School Old Boys' Association. The objectives of this organisation are to keep old boys in touch with the school and to direct our attention to matters concerning the welfare and advantage of the school. I would like to report that as an executive we have worked hard to achieve these aims this year.

As we look back over the 12 months since our AGM last year on the 7th of May we have a lot to remember and to appreciate.

Our Centennial Dinner was held at the Richmond Club on the 18th of May and what a wonderful night it was. A very full room of over 100 men reflected the importance of the occasion. The distance that some Old Boys travelled to attend the Dinner also reflected its significance. On the night we awarded the Old Boys' Association Altiora Peto Medal to Barry Maister. To mark the Centennial it was announced that a new Old Boys' Centennial Trophy would be presented to the school. The trophy will be positioned amongst the premier trophies, medals and cups within the school, as an award that recognises the highest level of achievement. It was to be awarded to a boy of the school for exceptional achievement in any field, be that academia, culture, sport or leadership. Representing the Old Boys' Associating

I was proud to present the Trophy at the School's Senior Prize Giving. The first recipient of the Trophy was Anton Cooper. Anton was a Monitor at school, and is the World Junior Men's Cross-Country Mountain Bike champion, after he won his title in Austria earlier last year. In addition to the trophy, the winner of the Trophy also received an inscribed Gold Medal that he will retain forever, and a Scholarship of \$1000. We must continue to ensure that our commitment to this trophy is maintained in the way that we intended, namely to reflect the involvement, commitment and dedication of the Old Boys' Association to the school over its first 100 years.

We welcomed a new Community Relations Manager, Colin McDonald to our meetings and Carl Millard, the new Chairperson of the PTA. I'd like to thank outgoing PTA Chairperson, Jillian Broadbent for her dedication and enthusiasm to the Old Boys Association during her tenure with the PTA.

This year the Old Boys' Association maintained our deep involvement with day to day school life. The recent Anzac Day service, the activities and wonderful contribution from the Te Kura Trust, the regular newsletters to Association members, the hosting of the Monitors and parents annual lunch at Adams House, and the various individual Branch activities, all combined to ensure old boys are entwined with the school as a key partner.

As the Old Boys' Association President I attended many school occasions such as the Senior Prize Giving, The Leaver's Dinner and the Governor General's visit to the school. These are great ways for the school to showcase the Old Boys' Association and the contribution it makes to the well-being and welfare of the school. For these invitations and the other opportunities to contribute to the school community, I want to thank Paul McWilliam, the school senior management and the staff.

Our sincere thanks go to Paul, for his significant contribution to the Association and his professionalism over the year and in particular these past number of months as he has managed the additional responsibilities associated with being the acting Headmaster.

This year we saw the establishment of an Old Boys' Branch in London. Our appreciation must go to Jim Blair for his efforts to coordinate and facilitate the establishment of this Branch from New Zealand. As I mentioned in a recent newsletter, "A structure has been developed in London and we are delighted that Emeritus Prof. Robin Carrell (49-53), of Cambridge University has agreed to be the Patron of the Branch and Gerard Williams (82-86) our first President. These two men will be supported by Vance Thompson (82-86) and Joe Deely (82-86) as committee members." We will watch with interest the ongoing development of this Branch and contribute whatever resources we can assist with to ensure that it is an ongoing success.

The future of our Shrine is a serious concern to the Association. The Press, 1 February 1926, said "The Shrine to commemorate the sacrifice of High School Old Boys in World War One (1914-1918) was unveiled and dedicated 31 January 1926 by the former headmaster Charles Edmund Bevan-Brown (1854-1926). The restoration of this significant memorial will to the key focus of the Association over the next two years. Various Branches have already pledged funds towards its restoration but a full upgrade process will be implemented

to determine the scope of the challenge and the costs involved.

To close, I want to thank in particular the officers of the Association this year – Colin Watson (Vice President), Barrie Johnson (Secretary) and Philip Hyde (Treasurer) and the entire executive for its ongoing work, commitment and humour.

Thank you for the opportunity to be the President of this important organisation. I have enjoyed the privilege and look forward to the years ahead of playing my part for the good of the school and the Old Boys' Association.

At this stage 4 further members arrived to make up the quorum.

Deputy Headmaster: Paul McWilliam presented his “Report on the School” activities over the last 12 months:

1. Congratulations to Colin Watson on being elected the Association President. Paul also thanked Mike Warr for his work on the Association Executive over the last 20 years and knows that with his work at School he will continue to be of great help to the Association. He thanked Barrie Johnson for his work as Secretary. He also thanked Trevor McIntyre for all his work while he was Headmaster of the School.
2. The PTA fund raiser, Art Auction, is to be held on Saturday 11th May at the Horticultural Hall, viewing from 3.30pm and the main Auction from 6.30pm. Many artists have given their work at discounted prices and the Association have donated the cost of the hall hire, (\$1,200.00)
3. Challenge for the School to increase the percent rate of examination passes. There are many reasons why other schools have better percentage than CBHS but the School is continually trying to improve the pass rate.
4. Scholars Assembly to be held next week, with the money from the Trust and the many Scholarships available to the pupils makes it well worthwhile for the students.
5. At present the School is being fitted with wifi to enable the boys to use their own computers etc. Because of the good work in strengthening the building the work is proving more difficult and expensive. The PTA have promised \$40,000.00 towards the cost.
6. School work day, when the boys work outside the school to raise funds, they raised \$40,000.00 which will be put towards shelter around the School for the boys.
7. Rowing 8 made the finals of the Maadi Cup, Cricket 1st X1 in the Gillete Cup, the Governor General presented caps to the 1st X1.
8. Jake Miller organised many speakers to speak to the School, ie, Jason Gunn, Helen Clark, Mahey Drysdale, Rhys Darby, Rob Fyfe and John Key with Erin Simpson and Mike Pero, among others still to come to School.
9. Anzac Service, Roll of Honour read by Jake Miller, Matthew Sollis told the story of his Grandfather, very touching and genuine.
10. Paul Thanked the Association for the way they contribute so much to the School.
11. Colin Watson thanked both Trevor McIntyre and Paul McWilliam for the great work they have done at School.

Te Kura Trust Report Doug Archbold to report

Gave a brief update and handed out a copy of the Annual Report.

1. In brief the Tekura Trust made a profit of \$278,000.00 and made donations of \$179,738.00 to School.
2. \$40,000.00 from a special fund was given to School for prizes and scholarships.
3. The return for the year was 9.6% with the capital increasing to \$3.032 million.

Board of Trustees

The school and board have been through a particularly busy past 12 months and in many ways an exciting new era is ahead of us. We have been through a difficult period, but managed to maintain very good achievement levels in academic, sporting and cultural activities.

There has been significant leadership restructuring and change within the past 12 months. We have seen the departure of Trevor McIntyre as Headmaster after 9 successful years in the role. In June 2013 the school welcomed Nic Hill as the new Headmaster. We thank Paul McWilliam for his dedicated service as acting Headmaster.

In 2012 we worked with the Ministry of Education on our Education Review Office (ERO) report. The report identified strengths in student engagement, self review, and the special programmes associated with maori achievement, boarding house and priority learners. ERO pointed out some work that needed to be done in management structure and this follows on from the reorganisation of the support staff group. Our goal is to have an efficient administrative function that allows senior staff to focus on excellent teaching.

Financially the school has been impacted by the earthquakes, mainly due to a reduction in the number of International students. We are working on ways to lift numbers in this area. We are pleased that the office of the Community Relations Manager is starting to assist with attracting additional resources for the school. Our school charter has been improved upon over the years and this year we have a comprehensive, well presented document that guides our activities. Property matters are complex and really in the hands of the Ministry who are preparing a Master Plan for the rejuvenation of the school. This is expected to be presented in mid 2013. We continue to support the Educational Recovery Programme through contributions to the Riccarton and Secondary clusters.

In May 2013 there will be elections for the new Board of Trustees. We are working on succession planning to ensure a smooth transition.

It is of great comfort to the school that we have a committed and active Old Boys' Association. You provide a constant source of support and a connection to the values of our school that are particularly important in times of change.

Communicating the science behind pharmaceuticals

How do you describe what you do?

I collaborate with overseas medical communications agencies to help international pharmaceutical companies to communicate their latest scientific data both within their own company and to the public.

Most people think this is limited to helping pharmaceutical companies write up their clinical trial results for publication or produce advertising materials for them, but I also develop materials to support internal scientific training and educational activities for healthcare professionals.



Can you tell us about your career path?

When I first went to university, I intended to study medicine, but I missed out by just one mark in my health science first year at the University of Otago. This sent me down the path of studying pharmacology and toxicology.

I obtained a Bachelor of Science with Honours degree and then carried on to do a PhD in neuropharmacology.

What are you most proud of?

Being able to return to New Zealand and set up my own company exporting scientific services, and the company being successful enough that we could create a marketing campaign based on sponsoring an international travel scholarship for students at the University of Otago, and then subsequently receiving the 2013 New Zealand Innovators Award for the most innovative marketing and communications programme in the country for doing it!

Were you always interested in science at school?

I think I took every science subject available when I was at school, including physics, which I didn't like as much as chemistry and biology. I even talked about wanting to be a scientist as a primary school student. I was really lucky, as a high school student at Christchurch Boys' High, to be taught by two PhDs and a teacher who wrote the chemistry text book. They were very good at keeping a class of 30-plus teenage boys interested with practical experiments and tales of their own experience as science students and research scientists.

THE TRIP

Harewood, December 7th, 5 p.m. New uniforms, cameras, "best of luck". Some trying to appear nonchalant but most just frankly excited. Away to Auckland. Provided with headquarters in VIP room. Observed thoughtfully two large plane loads of Polynesian immigrants passing through the customs. Interesting meeting with John Graham, coaching Auckland when not headmastering at Auckland Grammar. "Never let the Welsh beat you."

A minute to midnight and off New Zealand soil. Papeete in the early morning; heat and bad service; Bali Hai looming out of the mist. Los Angeles airport—to most, their first acquaintance with real size and numbers. A high-class hotel. Then a trip next day through the centre and Disneyland. Many had thought it a place for kids—and many found being a kid had something. Then off in the evening on the second longest hop in the world, to Paris. Good view of Ireland. An hour at Paris airport—surely everything is not going to be so expensive? By big airbus to Heathrow and then to Baden Powell House—well-equipped, cheap and convenient. Good to be all together for a start. Next day John Dunbar sat his scholarship paper—which he was to pass, as we heard with great pleasure at Singapore Airport. Reception by Old Boy Terry McCombs at New Zealand House. Pleased to meet George Abbott, Bill Ishmael and Corinne Sharp, and Lewis and Mrs Black (daughter of Old Boy Sir Arthur Sims) all of whom had helped us so well. "Twickers" in the afternoon for the inter-university match, with old boys on each side (Mike O'Callaghan and Jock Lee). A practice in a bitter wind at Kensington Gardens. Exploring the tubes, shopping, sight-seeing and a visit to "Jesus Christ Superstar" (live show) became the pattern . . . But we had Rugby to play.

Thursday morning after a trip up and down the river by hydrofoil, and a visit to Greenwich Museum, we were entertained to lunch by our first opposition, with a high Rugby reputation—Dulwich College. An overcast day, slightly damp, but the ground had the usual beautiful English turf. Dulwich were generous enough to lend us five players for a secondary game, in which we were beaten 3-27, but everyone had had a run.

The main game. Team: Bailey (Captain), Brown, Georgieff, Wyatt, Sprott, Wall, Atkinson, Bain, Wilkinson, Newfield, Pope (Vice-Captain), Laugesen, Seymour, Price, Gorzeman. Result 10-10. When Rob Pope sprained his ankle while warming up, the tour seemed to be getting away to a bad start but with the dedication he was to display all through the tour he insisted on playing despite the fact that we had learned that there were no replacements in the U.K. under international level.

The boys finished 5th in the Maadi Cup final in the fastest time by a CBHS eight in well over a decade, an impressive 6.03. The Maadi cup winning time by Hamilton Boys was 5.55. Congratulations go to Tom Clyma and Angus Coull who have both won a trial for the NZ Junior (under 19) rowing team. Congratulations also to Henry Lissaman, Josh Rodger and Jared van Vianen who have won a trial for the South Island under 18 rowing team.

Winning medals across all age groups and in both sweep and sculling events shows a great combination of training and ability. Many thanks must go to our head coach Todd

Petherick and assistant coaches Sam Waghorn, Fabian Dolamore, Liam Smith, Lauren Thomas and Logan Keys who rejoined us in recent weeks. The coaching team have shown a great deal of skill in putting the boys in events where they could best perform and training them accordingly.

Tom and Angus will travel to Lake Karapiro on Easter Monday, 21st April and will be put through a 2k Erg test and much seat racing with teams announced on Sunday 27th April. If they are successful in making the New Zealand team, the boys would then relocate to St Peters at Cambridge from early May to continue to study and train until they head to Europe. They would then compete in the World Junior Rowing Championships at Hamburg, Germany, 6-10 August 2014 then on the way home compete again at the Youth Olympic Games - Nanjing, China, 16-28 August 2014.

For Henry, Josh and Jared the South Island under 18 trials will be held at Twizel over Easter with a similar testing process as for the Juniors. The team is announced on Easter Sunday and should they be selected then they will travel up to Lake Karapiro on Tuesday 22nd April where they will continue to train as well as watch the NZ junior trialists get put through their paces. They then compete in a S.I. versus N.I. regatta on the Friday and Saturday in a mix of small boats and eights.

A big reason for these selections has been as a result of how well the boys performed at Maadi Cup and it is a deserved reward for many years of dedication and hard training. Credit must also go to head coach Todd Petherick for getting the boys to such a good state of form and fitness.

So it is a few days off for these boys and then back in to some solid training for the next few weeks. We wish them the best of luck in their quest for higher honours.

Well done to the Cricket Club.

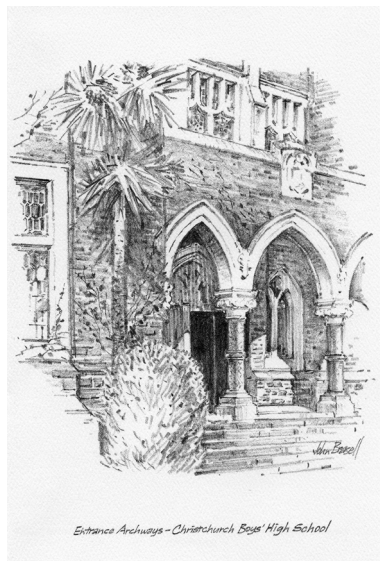
Tennis

Lesley Cleveland 1938-39

Les was a New Zealander who did many things in his life including being a highly entertaining lecturer in the School of Political Science and Public Administration at Victoria University of Wellington.

In his early life he fought as a member of the 2NZEF in World War II. After the war he worked as a bushman. He was also a mountaineer, who scaled Mt Bolanc as part of his own post World War celebration, before going on to climb Mt Cook.

Les was a poet, a pioneer Craigieburn skier, a singer, a song-writer and authority on wartime songs, a former press gallery journalist, a short-story writer, an author, a folklorist, a protester and a distinguished academic.

Les leaves a legacy of a witty, entertaining, colourful character who contributed much to the knowledge of ourselves as New Zealanders.

Abridged: The Press, March 15 2014

Les left CHBHS in 1939 having had two years in the 6th Form Lower and Upper. He was a contemporary of mine and I was able to teach him the basic chords for the guitar which he picked up very quickly. In later years he developed as a balladeer and published *The Great New Zealand Songbook* which is a valuable record of NZ folk and Service songs. He ran an amateur radio transmitter ZL3BE which I used to share with him on a Saturday night as we warmed up pies for supper on a steel plate heated by candles.

Les was a keen tramper and mountaineer and introduced me to the Canterbury High Country. He was surprisingly fit, always set a hot pace and clambered uphill faster than a mountain goat. We tackled some difficult country at times with virtually no climbing equipment and footwear more suited to a tennis court. I believe he later climbed the Matterhorn still wearing sandshoes.

He was a colourful character with many different accomplishments to his name.

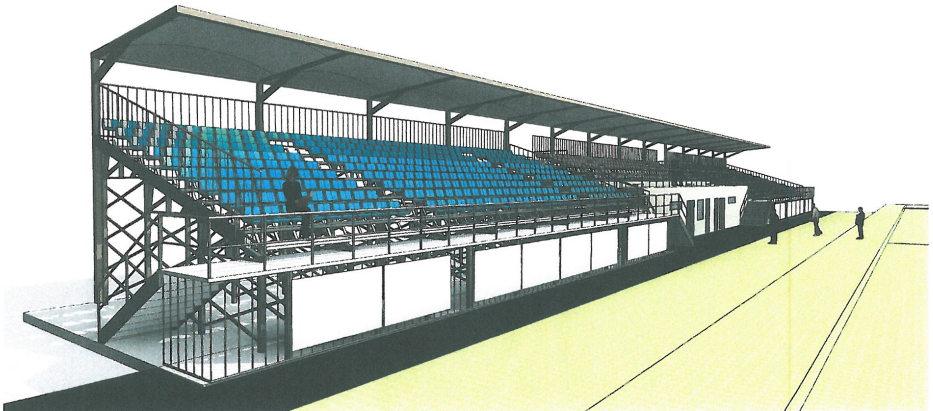
The John Morrissey Grandstand Gift
