Eulo State School provides students with a broad and comprehensive education within a supportive and safe learning environment in a remote and isolated setting. All learning will be enhanced by open communication, mutual respect and self-discipline between teachers, students, parents and the wider school community. We focus on the development of each child's potential across key curricular learning areas, across sporting, musical and cultural activities. We recognise efforts and achievements and celebrate successes in all these areas.

Every year, Eulo State School has an ongoing commitment to its students, their families and the community in which the school is located. We work to maintain the educational engagement of our indigenous students and students at risk of disengagement from our education system.

Eulo State School enjoys strong support from the community, from the parents of students, and from students and demonstrated achievements reflects this. Parents and students are very satisfied that the school provides a good education and students are happy to be at this school. Eulo State School maintains a very high level of exemplary behaviour amongst the students.

We have not had any suspensions or exclusions at our school. It is an expectation of the school community that this will continue.

#### Characteristics of the student body:

The school draws its enrolment from the small township of Eulo and from a wide area of surrounding rural properties. Some children travel up to 130 kilometres to attend school. There are no school buses.

• The Eulo and District Hostel forms an integral part of the school environment. Just under two thirds of students attending Eulo State School reside in the hostel during the school week.

• About 20% of the school's enrolments are indigenous students. They maintain a high attendance record at Eulo State School.

• Students remain at Eulo State School to complete year 7. Data shows that these students then attend secondary boarding schools in Toowoomba or Brisbane.

• In the past, Eulo State School maintained a stable school enrolment. However, this now appears to have changed and the source of enrolments, i.e. families on rural properties is in decline.

#### **Curriculum offerings**

#### Our distinctive curriculum offerings

Because of the remoteness and geographic isolation of Eulo, the school community encourages the school to offer as wide a range of services to students as it is able to. Some of the services the school is able to provide are:-

- Allocation of staffing in order to support all students and their learning
- Grouping students in ability levels rather than rank grades
- Individual sightwords, reading and spelling programs to support learners
- A broad education in all areas including academic and social knowledge and skills so that students can participate fully in community life and engage confidently with others.

#### Extra curricula activities

- Annual participation in the local show display.
- The school holds a popular and well attended concert at the end of each year for all school and community members.
- Participation in the Small Schools Sports Camp held each September in Thargomindah.

#### How Information and Communication Technologies are used to assist learning

Eulo State School boasts 11 curriculum laptops for use by 11 students. At any time, students in years 4-7 are able to access a computer each if needed. Students access the internet to research selected or given topics in science and SOSE, to undertake maths activities from a variety of available sites, including the EQ site and TLF learning objects as well as outside internet sites. They have access to computers to complete writing and language activities and to access personal emails.

#### Involving parents in their child's education

All parents are strongly encouraged to become members of the School P & C Association. All major decisions at the school level rest with the Principal in close consultation with the P & C Association and relevant staff members. Parents take an active interest in their child's education and are warmly welcomed onto the school campus at any time. Parents are regularly informed of their child's learning, progress, results, interaction and general behaviour through regular reports.

The community is warmly appreciative of the school and supports many ventures on behalf of the school, including the End of Year Concert and any fundraising events throughout the year. The community enjoys receiving the school newsletter to see what our students have been doing. It also includes a Community News section for the town.

#### Reducing the school's environmental footprint

Data is sourced from school's annual utilities return and is reliant on the accuracy of these returns.

Eulo State School attempts to reduce the carbon footprint. A more efficient air conditioning and heating system has been installed in 2010 to replace energy using bar heaters and solar panels were installed on the roof. An improved sprinkler system to the school oval was also installed in 2010.

An application has been submitted and approved for the 2012/2013 Round of the National Solar Schools Program. These newest solar panels will significantly reduce our environmental footprint when completed in 2013.





#### Description of how non-attendance is managed by the school

Non-attendance is managed in state schools in line with the DET policies, SMS-PR-029: Managing Student Absences and SMS-PR-036: Roll Marking in State Schools, which outline processes for managing and recording student attendance and absenteeism.

There were no unexplained absences at Eulo State School in 2012. Students who are absent are away with parents or are at home due to illness. Indigenous students at Eulo State School, during 2012, had a high attendance record – indeed a better attendance record than non-indigenous students. Their attendance rate is 10% better than non-indigenous students and it is expected that this attendance record will continue. These children have a strong family support network around them which encourages them to come to school and to try to always do their best.
