

Stepney Centenary

Over the years succeeding Headteachers have been required to keep log books recording staff absences, visitors to school, holiday and closure dates and other unusual events. From these old books one can see the living history emerge and how it affected the pupils of the time. Great epidemics of childhood illnesses regularly swept through the crowded rooms and bad weather often curtailed physical activity lessons or recreation time. Glass screens were drawn back and the children had singing games in their desks. Teachers were constantly moved from school to school whether they were trained or not, which left the remaining teachers with classes of over 100 children to teach.

During the past one hundred years the school has weathered two world wars and numerous changes of departments. From the original plans to accommodate 889 in 1886 the movement of the people due to the redevelopment plans have brought the numbers on roll to 80 in 1986. A far cry from the original overcrowded conditions. However, as the school starts the second century the numbers should slowly rise again ready for the 1988 Reorganisation Plan.

Throughout the century maintenance and repairs have kept the outside features virtually unchanged but the modernisation programme of 1982-83 brought degrees of comfort never dreamt of in Queen Victoria's day. Carpeted classrooms, sink units, inside toilets and handbasins for children, areas for a library, T.V. and films, a room for parents to meet and a Hall/Gymnasium have all created opportunities for an expansion of education to benefit the 20th Century pupils.

Selected items from the Log Books will I hope prove interesting reading and recall memories of your own school days. Entries before 1931 are rather more sparse and complicated by many departmental changes but letters, photographs and memorabilia will all serve to illustrate the school's history.

The earliest existing photograph shows Miss Florence Bates and the original girls class of 1887 whilst Miss Howlett's letter gives details of her father, one of the original boys.

Actual recorded memories were made of those early days by Mr. Reg Skelton who sadly died early this year. He was 99 years old and began school in 1891 at the age of 5. Extracts from the tape are included.

Staff and Pupils have been proud to be associated with Beverley Road/ Stepney School for its first century and those attending in 1986 will, I hope, carry these traditions forward with the same dedication.



Our story opens in 1302 when a properly laid out road was started on the line of the ancient Hull to Beverley trackway. For centuries it was only fit for horses but in 1744 the road was taken over by a Turnpike Trust. The much improved surface was paid for by travellers at the Toll Bars, sited at Stepney, Newland and Dunswell. In those days Stepney was still a small village, taking its name from the Stepping Stone or Stepstone. This was a large stepped mounting block near a wooden bridge close to the present Stepney Lane.

When Stepney Lodge and grounds were built 200 years ago the stepping stone was built on to The Lodge. In 1886 the house was occupied by Mr. Edmund Philip Dixon, a Seed Merchant. The estate had gardens, vineries, groves of trees and a fish pond plus one field called Bull Field, Hence the Bull Inn.

Until quite late in the 19th Century Beverley Road was mainly surrounded by open countryside with cornfields, a few farms and an occasional windmill. Indeed the Cavaliers and Roundheads fought roughly on the site of the old Stepney Station. Later when the Press Gang stopped the Beverley Coach they were attacked themselves by women haymakers from the fields where Pearson Park now stands.

However buildings and fine houses had already begun to creep outwards along the road when the Mayor, Zacchariah Pearson presented the Park (27 acres) to the City in 1860. It is interesting to note that the Park received many trees and shrubs from the Zoological Garden when it closed (1840 - 1862). The splendid Gates are 30' high and 50' wide with the arms of Trinity House and the City of Hull incorporated into the decoration.

At about this time - 1886 - with Mr. Dixon in Stepney Lodge we know that
No. 1 Stepney Lane was occupied by George Kendall - Hackney Cab Proprietor.
No. 2

John Robert Davies - Sexton Sculcoates Church.
No. 4

George Simpson - Shoemaker.

Also listed at No. 4 Emily Hague, Jane Wheeler, Margaret Southwick - Laundresses. Opposite at the Bull Inn was proprietor George Wood.

Not far away, the Fountain Road Almshouses were erected in 1886 for 120 inmates at a cost of £15,000. From 1875 - 1890 we know that the horse trams turned at the end of their outward journey by Temple Street. The single fare being one penny.

Naturally there were schools in the Sculcoates district already. St. Mary's opened 1852 plus St. Pauls, Cave Street and one at the bottom of Stepney Lane. The neat little red bricked St. Mary's housed about 150 Boys and Girls under Mr. R.S. Davies and Miss Martha Hall. In 1884 Cave Street Junior Board School log records 37 children being admitted who would form the nucleus of the new Beverley Road Infant School. There were schools so why build yet another? For an explanation we must recap slightly.

The Kingston Upon Hull School Board was formed in 1871 and the Education Act of 1876 made Education compulsory for all children up to the age of 12. By 1880 it was raised to 13; by 1918 to 14; by 1944 to 15; by 1972 to 16. The 1880 report stated that Hull's Educational Standards had fallen below the national average. The curriculum was restricted, salaries low and untrained teachers used excessively. Members of the School Board were determined to improve matters by building new schools and improving standards. Thus it would seem that the land chosen for the new school on a commanding site at the junction of Stepney Lane/Beverley Road was almost in the country and would help to provide a healthy environment for the children.

The Board's Architect and Surveyor, Mr. William Botterill (23 Parliament Street) designed the light airy buildings with cookery centre attached. The Contractor, Mr. J. Skinner of Hull erected the school in faced red bricks, dressings of Ancaster stone with a roof of red tiles surmounted in the centre with a turret which was not only a pretty ornament but also useful for ventilation.

Great attention was paid to drainage, lighting and ventilation in this newly designed school and each department had an ample separate playeround for recreation. The hot water pipes, fitted by King & Co. of Holy Trinity Side provided the central heating system.

In keeping with the current practices of the day, domestic teaching was considered a most valuable subject so a cookery kitchen and small scullery were attached to the double storey block. All the rooms and entrances were given a dado of white glazed bricks as the value of cleanliness with large numbers of children was not overlooked. The Boys and Girls departments each had a very large T shaped school room 81 feet x 20 feet and 4 classrooms, 3 of these were fitted with desks and one, with a gallery. The Infants Department had a large schoolroom 54' x 26' fitted with desks and a kindergarten gallery plus two classrooms also fitted with galleries.

The original plan was for 301 Boys to occupy the ground floor, 301 Girls to occupy the first floor and 287 Infants to be accommodated in the single storey block. The staff were appointed and the school finally opened in May 1887 for 889 children.

Recollections

Reg Skelton was one of the first pupils to attend Beverley Road School, as it was then called. He was born in 1886 and recalled to us what school was like in those early days.

I started school when I was five. I remember that the Headmaster was Mr. Fraser Robinson. There was a Mr. Camp and a Mr. Baxter - he had to go to De La Pole Hospital, they called it the asylum. He never came back.

The baths were not built then, in fact they started building them when I was leaving when I was thirteen.

We didn't get school dinners in those days but there used to be a cafe at the corner of Cave Street where they let us have a basin of soup for a penny.

I thought our classrooms were very nice but the teachers were very strict. They all had a stick or a strap next to their desk. Mr. Camp always carried a leather strap as long as my arm to wallop you with if you misbehaved. If we were lucky we might have to write lines instead. I remember a boy getting the strap for looking at the horse trams out of the side window instead of working. In those days they used to change the horses at the corner of Stepney Lane. You weren't allowed to talk during lessons. We had arithmetic, algebra, geography - things like that, and we sometimes went in the yard for games. We played rounders, cricket and sometimes football, but I wasn't much good at sport.

Recollections (continued)

We started school at nine o'clock, had dinner at 12 o'clock and back for half-past one. Then it was home time at four o'clock. School holidays weren't as long as they are now - I only remember getting about a fortnight for our summer holidays, but we did have Bank Holidays as well.

In the morning we used to have assemblies and a vicar or somebody came in now and again to talk to us. We had a choir as well, I was in it. At Christmas time Mr. Camp picked out six good singers and we went to sing at his house on Christmas Eve, down Dover Street I think it was.

When I left school I was in Standard 4 and because we were poor I was allowed to leave at thirteen. The other boys left at fourteen. When I left school I went to work at a butcher's shop down Spring Bank, but I soon left and went to work on the horse trams. The inspector told me to go to night class to improve my writing but I never did. I didn't like writing then and I can't write at all now.

I remember it used to cost a penny on the trams to go anywhere but when they got electric trams it went up to twopence.

Footnote: Reg Skelton was probably the oldest surviving pupil when he gave us this interview. Sadly, he died just a few weeks before his hundredth birthday.

Letter from Miss Howlett of Patrington.

It was with great interest that I read in the Hull Daily Mail, Humberside Echoes, about your forthcoming Centenary celebrations at Stepney School, as I sit and write this letter to you, my late father's Certificate in Honours in Mathematics which he gained at 13½ years still hangs on the wall of my home, the year May 11th 1892 also in 1890 he was the only boy in the City of Hull that year whom received the First Class Prize for Reading, Writing, Arithmetic whilst being a pupil at Beverley Road Board School.

My father was at the school when it opened and his parents had to pay 3d a day for his education. You say in your letter to the Mail that the Trott family lived in St. Paul's Street, I understand that my father left school at 14 and was a student teacher at St. Paul's Church School for a while. My father would by now have been 106.

Extract.

Extract from Letter - Miss Lorna Ballinger, Wanganui, New Zealand.

I enclose a school photograph dated 1887 which I thought may be of interest to you. My mother, Edith Trott (13.7.1880 - 24.5.1966) was a pupil in this class and in this photograph is shown fifth from the left in the second row from the front - dark dress and very fair curly hair.

The William Trott family came out to New Zealand from Hull in 1904, and they settled in Timaru in the South Island. My mother had fully trained as a State Registered Nurse at the Hull Infirmary and she also nursed in various other places before she came out here with her family.

Incidentally, during the second World War I was nursing in the N.Z. hospital ship "Maunganui", and due to repairs being made in Glasgow I was able to spend Christmas 1943 and New Year 1944 with those of my mother's folk who were still left in Hull. Her cousin, Fred Taylor, died about 1965, he then was a Headmaster of a Secondary School.

Miss Ballinger is now aged 76.

In looking through the Red Book of 1899 published by the "Eastern Morning News" it was fascinating to discover that Mr. W. Needler, Ratepayer, was proposed for the membership of the Kingston Upon Hull School Board. He polled 3,595 votes but was unsuccessful. In 1889 he received 5,906 votes but on April 21st 1892 with 11,139 votes he was duly elected. By then he must have been a figure of importance as a gun accident was recorded on 26.12.1892. It seems to be singularly appropriate that our Mr. Raymond Needler should come to present the gifts and certificates to the children for the Centenary.

What happened during the Century is recorded in the extracts taken from the available Log Books. Don't forget the school was finished in 1886 but it took a few months to appoint the staff and furnish it.







The enclosed photos were taken in the yard of the Beverley Road Girls Council School between the years 1926 - 1929. The larger one was taken when the choir won the hymn singing class at the Hull Musical Festival. I remember we sang "These things shall be" and got a very high marking for it. The teacher on the right was Miss Enid Robinson, who had a lovely contralto voice. It was she who started my interest in choirs and (except for the war years) I have been singing in one ever since. Little Miss Finley - a Scot - is on the left. I left school at 14 with a reference signed by Miss Lowe, the Head Mistress. She was paralysed and had to be carried up the four flights of stairs on a chair. This was done by two of the biggest boys from "down below" as far as I can remember. She sat at a desk in the Hall all day and could just manage to sign anything necessary. She had a sharp tongue but was always very fair.

We also went to the "fields" near Newland High School and sometimes to the Beverley Road Baths. The swimming teacher frightened me to death - so I never did learn to dive!



Extracts from an article by Mr. H. Engelbrecht

About 1923 the Boys Senior department had 7 classes with boys aged 10 upwards. Discipline was very strict and the Headmaster carried a whistle which he blew if he saw anything which displeased him. In those days the Staff remembered the school surrounded by fields as there was no Swimming Bath. When the teachers took PE (drill) lessons outside, the gypsies stood by their caravans and made comments. The school was lit by gas in the early days and the boys enjoyed watching the electricity installed. The classes were all much bigger in the old days and some teachers fixed a mirror above the board so they could see what was happening.

There was no school milk at first but boys had to pay ½d bottle later. On field days they had to provide their own bus fares or walk to and from Cottingham Road. City Sports were held at Craven Park on Saturday afternoons and Beverley Road won the Junior and Senior Shields one year. Mr. A. Leckonby and later Mr. S. Adams trained the runners whilst Mr. Engelbrecht trained the Football and Cricket Teams 1935/6. Season Beverley Road Boys won the Football Championship of the Northern Division. That year the goal average was 100 goals For and 20 against. The Captain was Wm. Banks who was also Captain of Hull City Boys. Others who won regular team places were R. Thirsk, P. Jessop, A. Walker and D. Hayworth. Of course Swimming was the pride of the school and the Honours Boards and Cups made them famous.

In 1908 the School won the English Shield and this was their highest achievement. Year after year they also won the Education Committee Shield and often the Yorkshire Trophy. Old scholars will remember Mr. Sellars, Mr. Lowry, Mr. Mould and Mr. Woodford for their help, encouragement and enthusiasm for swimming. Special mention should be made of the brave rescues by Patrick Nelson and Stanley Houghton and later F.G. Ward who received the Royal Humane Society's Certificate - a rare distinction for a young boy to win.

On the Friday before war broke out in September 1939 the Boys and Staff were evacuated to Hornsea but many returned and the school opened again. Once the serious bembing started the school was badly damaged but order was restored and boys came back from their temporary home in Newland Avenue School. In May 1941 after a severe blitz many children went to Bourne. The school was badly damaged again and this time sail cloth was used to mend the windows which flapped on windy days or let the rain in. The war did end and VE day was celebrated but it was quite a time before signs of war, the shelters and blast walls were removed. News of two old boys was very interesting. Ernest Harrison was elected Mayor of Grimsby and Walter Tatam trained on HMS "Nimble" - an old wooden walled ex W.Indian slave chaser moored on Princes Dock.

Recollections - Letter from Mr. A. Rollinson. (Extracts)

About 1937 (it must have been for the Coronation) we had a School Party with cakes, buns, sweet biscuits and other "goodies", Each child had a paper "crown" and we had a King and Queen. I was one of the "attendants"! Before the 1939 war, we paid 2d (one half-penny) pre decimal coins then, for one-third pint of milk. There was a local dairy in this area called Southwicks Dairies. The school colours that I remember (football shirts circa 1939-40) were black with a yellow V. Were we "The Bees"? I used to get stick or the cane for being late in Mr.Longden's time and Mr. Proctors. Why did those who lived nearest the school always arrive late? The morning began with the pupils standing in 'lines' in the yard and then marching in to Assembly. The whole school sang 2 or 3 hymns such as "All things bright and beautiful" - but my favourite was "What a friend we have in Jesus" - and it still is today. I'm sure the Scripture Readings did us some good. About 1937-38 a school outing took place to Leeds and Temple Newsam. Being mostly children of the poorer section of society, we had to save up our pennies for many weeks to pay for the excursion. I do recall that once a week, a class of the Senior Boys would attend Brunswick Evenue School for Carpentry instruction (This was referred to by the boys as Woodwork or Manual). I think the teachers name was Mr. Hobson. We made pan-stands, boxes, small stools or a knife box. During the blitz enemy bombs falling in Fenchurch Street and Cave St. shook the foundations of the school buildings. About 1942/3 the Music Teacher was Miss Hollingsworth. We also had a wireless for schools broadcasts. It was in 1941 or 1942 that we rehearsed the Jugoslavian National Anthem in English! so that we could sing it to Peter, the boy King of Jugoslavia at the Regal Cinema, Ferensway.




