ary Allen entered The Hun School as a junior in the fall of 1967. He participated in soccer and ice hockey, and though he suffered a severe ankle injury at the beginning of the soccer season in his junior year, which kept him out most of the season, he returned in his senior year to lead the soccer team in scoring, was named co-MVP, and second team All Penn-Jersey League.

Following graduation, Mr. Allen played soccer at the University of Miami and both soccer and tennis at Randolph-Macon College, lettering every year he played. In college, he received All-State honors in soccer and was named captain his senior year, leading the soccer team to win its first-ever State Championship, the Virginia College Athletic Association Championship, and secure a berth in the NCAA tournament. In 1972, Mr. Allen was named as an alternate to the U.S. Olympic Team, and was invited to train with Derby County Football Club in the then-First Division of English Professional League.

After college, Mr. Allen played in the fledgling NASL for two months before a career-ending injury. He then began a coaching career. In 1978, Mr. Allen became the youngest coach in Virginia to attain the U.S. Soccer "A" License, and became Virginia's first Olympic development coach. Mr. Allen has coached both men and women in two Division I college programs, a number of high school programs, state and regional Olympic development teams of all ages, and a women's state team in Virginia that, in five years, won three national championshis and was runner-up once. He also coached a professional team in the United Soccer League.

In 1980, Mr. Allen was appointed by the United States Soccer Federation as the co-director of the Eastern U.S. Regional Camp for the Olympic Sports Festival, and became a member of the U.S. National coaching staff. Since that time, Mr. Allen has coached thirtyone players who made All-American in college and seventeen players who made the men's and women's national teams, including one who was named as captain of the men's national team. He has also instructed at more than 200 national and state coaching courses nationwide, educating almost 9,000 coaches. In 1994, Mr. Allen was asked by FIFA, the world soccer organization, to help prepare the Technical Report for the 1994 World Cup.

Mr. Allen is an attorney for the Department of Defense. He and his his wife Maryse reside in Manassas, Virginia.



### Alexander K. (Sandy) Buck Jr. '74

andy Buck graduated from The Hun School in 1974. Lacrosse was Mr. Buck's passion. He played varsity lacrosse for four years; starting his career as a defenseman on varsity covering All-Americans from Haverford School and Lawrenceville. By Mr. Buck's senior year the lacrosse team had become a skilled, enthusiastic, and committed group of friends who enjoyed the game. They had an excellent win-loss record, went to the State B Division Championship game the day after his senior prom, and defeated Rutgers Prep for the title. He and his co-captain, John Marshall '74, were elected to the All State team, as was Jack Reeder '74.

Following graduation, Mr. Buck played four years of varsity lacrosse at Colby College, co-captaining the team in his senior year; he graduated from Colby College in 1978. He spent over eighteen years as a teacher, coach, and administrator in several independent schools in Massachusetts and Maine. Throughout his teaching career, he coached teams at the middle school and high school levels; winning three New England Championships with Pingree School in South Hamilton, MA. Mr. Buck also had the pleasure of coaching his son, Alex, through his youth lacrosse days and enjoyed watching him play for Pingree.

Mr. Buck has been the president of his family's foundation, Horizon Foundation, since its inception in 1996. He serves on several conservation-related non-profit boards in Maine, which informs the work he does at the Horizon Foundation.

He said, "In all my years of coaching and playing, Peter Savidge '62 stands out as the most influential coach I have known. Always a gentleman, Pete conveyed a knowledge and passion for the game and a love of competition, but he always valued sportsmanship above all else. His calm during trying times helped us focus our attention and energy on teamwork and skills."

Mr. Buck and his wife, Sissy, moved to the Maine coast two years ago. They have two children; Sarah is taking post-graduate courses in science in preparation for applying to natropathic medical school; Alex started his third year at Montana State University and is an art major. In his spare time, Mr. Buck enjoys skiing, flyfishing, kayaking, hiking, and playing racket sports.

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Brian C. Logue '75

**Fian Logue** entered The Hun School as a ninth grade student in the fall of 1971. Mr. Logue welcomed a new era at The Hun School that autumn day, as the School began coeducation. He started his freshman year with football and ended the year with varsity track, but his favorite sport was basketball.

Mr. Logue was a four year varsity starting point guard for The Hun School basketball team. He led his team in defensive assignments, but his basketball handling skills propelled him yearly as the all-time assist leader. He was awarded All-Prep, Sportsmanship, and Coaches Awards, as well as *Newark Ledger* "Best Back Court Duo" with 2000 Athletic Hall of Fame inductee Anthony Trani '75. Mr. Logue was the co-captain of the basketball team in his senior year.

After graduation, Mr. Logue entered La Salle University, but due to a serious achilles tendon injury, his college sport career was cut short.

Mr. Logue has been a member of The Hun School Alumni Board since 2000, and a member of The Hun School Executive Alumni Board since 2003. He is chairperson of one of the six strategic committees; Nominating, Assignment, and Recognition. Mr. Logue is also involved in the Princeton Alumni Chapter and was recently a Class Ambassador for his 30<sup>th</sup> Reunion. In 2006, Mr. Logue was awarded the Meritorious Service Award for his volunteer efforts for The Hun School.

Mr. Logue is chief executive officer of Armstrong Industrial Hose, a leading industrial hose manufacturer in the United States. Earlier this year, Mr. Logue was awarded twenty-five year service in the International Association Arson Investigators.

Mr. Logue once said, "My coaches and teachers at The Hun School helped mold me into the individual I am today. I enjoy annually running into a coach from a competing area prep school who still compliments my competiveness while at Hun."

Mr. Logue and his wife, Jennifer, reside in Lawrenceville, New Jersey with their two children, Brianna and Harrison.

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### Beatrice Huste-Petersen '82

**B catrice Huste-Petersen** entered The Hun School as a tenth grade boarding student in the fall of 1979. Prior to attending The Hun School, Ms. Huste-Petersen ran on her high school team participating in cross country, and indoor and outdoor track. Upon her arrival at The Hun School, a girls' cross country team did not exist, therefore she ran with the boys' and often scored as their fifth "man." She ran cross country for three years and received the *boys*' Coaches Award her senior year. Ms. Huste-Petersen placed second at the girls cross country Prep State Championship in 1979 and eleventh in 1981.

Ms. Huste-Petersen ran indoor and outdoor track all three years and was the NJISWAA State Champion in the 100m and long jump in 1980, 1981, and 1982; in the 200m in 1981 and 1982; and discus in 1982. Upon graduation, she received the Robert Strianese Award.

In 1982, Larry Kidder P'88, P'90, faculty member and then track coach wrote, "Track is a sport that consists of fifteen different events that involve running, throwing, and jumping. Most athletes participate in one or possibly two areas. The athlete who excels in all three phases of track and field is extremely rare. Senior Bea Huste is just such a person. Bea's name has become synonymous with excellence in girls' track in New Jersey."

Ms. Huste-Petersen continued her running career at Kenyon College where she was an All-American in track and field, NCAC Conference Champion MVP for two years, captain of both her cross country and track teams, as well as held multiple college records including a conference record in the 1500m that stood for twenty-one years for her accomplishments. She was the third woman to be inducted into Kenyon's Athletic Hall of Fame.

Ms. Huste-Petersen continues to run and finished as the  $23^{rd}$  woman in the 1989 New York City Marathon; in 2006 she finished  $139^{th}$ .

Ms. Huste-Petersen is a physician's assistant at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York and is the founder of the EJ Autism Foundation. She and her husband Patrick reside on Long Island with their four children.

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### James J. "Jimmy" Reed P'60

ames Reed was born in Pottsville, Pennsylvania in December of 1903. He graduated from Liberty High School, in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania and continued his education at Lehigh University, graduating in 1927. At Lehigh University he wrestled for four years and played soccer for three. In his freshman year, he was undefeated in wrestling and served as team-captain as well. In 1928, Mr. Reed went to the Olympics in Amsterdam as a wrestling alternate. After the Olympics he came back to Princeton to serve as assistant coach at Princeton University.

During Mr. Reed's tenure at Princeton University, he and Dr. Paul Chesebro '14 became good friends. Dr. Chesebro suggested that The Hun School could use his expertise in starting up a wrestling program. So, on a part-time basis, in the 1950s, Mr. Reed began a long relationship with The Hun School as a wrestling and soccer coach. In 1959, there was a pause, as Mr. Reed was chosen as the coach of the United States soccer team in the Pan American Olympic games; they won five of seven games to finish behind Brazil and Argentina. In 1969, Mr. Reed retired from Princeton University, and came to The Hun School on a full-time basis as the head varsity soccer and wrestling coach.

Mr. Reed's son, John H. Reed '60, said, "It was at The Hun School that my father felt he had the most impact. He often felt that the high school years were the most formative years, and that he would be able to have a profound influence on the future of his students." Coach Reed treated his students with respect and taught them far more than how to play the game. He taught the values of integrity, honesty, teamwork, dedication, and passion for whatever you do.

Mr. Reed had many hobbies including darts, chess, sailing and riflery, but he is fondly remembered by former students and athletes as "the whittler." Many times during his years at The Hun School one would see him sitting on the front porch of Russell Hall carving something just for the fun of it.

Mr. Reed passed away in March of 1994. He is survived by a son, John '60, seven grandchildren, and thirteen great grandchildren.

# THE HUN SCHOOL OF PRINCETON ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME

The purpose of The Hun School of Princeton Athletic Hall of Fame is to recognize and honor those student athletes and other members of the community whose athletic accomplishments or contributions have been of the highest caliber and have brought credit to the School.

### Qualifications

- 1. A nominee must be an alumnus or alumna of The Hun School. Coaches, other School community members, and athletes with extraordinary cases may also be considered for the Hall of Fame.
- 2. Eligibility for admission begins the fifth year after the nominee graduates from The Hun School, reaches retirement after coaching, or has been actively involved in the Athletic Program for at least twenty-five years.
- 3. The nominee must have exhibited the highest caliber of athletic accomplishments during his or her time at The Hun School.
- 4. Selection will be based primarily on athletic accomplishments while at The Hun School. Subsequent achievements in athletics and other areas will also be taken into consideration.
- 5. The nominee must have been outstanding in the areas of scholastic achievement, citizenship, character, integrity, and good moral character while at The Hun School.

### Nomination Process

- 1. Any member of the following constituency groups may nominate: alumni, parents of alumni, grandparents of alumni, current and former faculty and staff, current trustees and former trustees, and trustees emeriti.
- A nomination form is available on our website, www.hunschool.org. The deadline for submitting nominations will be on or around November 15<sup>th</sup> of each school year.
- 3. The Selection Committee will meet during the school year. The Committee consists of specific permanent members. They are the headmaster, the director and assistant director of athletics, the director of institutional advancement, the director of alumni relations, former athletic directors, and the president of the Alumni Association. The Committee will also have balanced representation from current Hun School coaches and alumni.
