


"My paintings have their own unique DNA," says artist Christopher H. Martin. "They're defined by process and color. By fusing different strains of process, a hybrid forms with fantastic results." Martin works in a technique he calls reverse-glass painting, which juxtaposes the clarity of glass with the boldness of color, and creates ethereal works that focus on the abstract balance between painterly expression and organic form. "Glass came about as a primary choice for me," he explains. "I've spent at least 80 percent of my efforts on it over the last 20 years." Martin exhibits locally at his namesake Aspen gallery, which he sees as a "polished extension" of his studio, and draws inspiration from the colors and compositions of stone, water patterns, geodes, wood grains and forest canopies found throughout Aspen. Labeling his work as less literal and more interpretive of his surroundings, Martin finds that living in the mountains has reinforced his methodology and aesthetic. "I'm overwhelmingly enchanted," he notes, "by the sophistication and diverse nature of such a small intimate town." christopherhmartin.com; 970.925.7649
