CADET GOLD FOR CARL

For the first time ever in the European Youth Championships both England's junior teams mounted the rostrum in Hollabrunn, Austria over the period, July 16-25, 1982, to collect bronze medals. So too did Carl Prean, in mixed tandem with Lisa Bellinger, the Isle of Wight youngster achieving the

accolade of gold by winning the Cadet boys' singles with a final victory over Ilija Lupulesku of Yugoslavia.

Young Prean will have fond memories of Hollabrunn with a haul of one gold and two bronze --- he figured somewhat prominently in the boys' team event losing but two of his 18 sets to Jan-Ove Waldner of Sweden and Vladimir Dvorak of the Soviet Union!

Lisa Bellinger can also feel proud of her

achievements in being the recipient of two bronze medals in the mixed doubles and girls' team event in which she too lost but twice in ten sets to the Russians **lolanta Daniliavichute** and **Elena Vecherok**.


Significantly it was Miss **Daniliavichute** who went on to win the girls' singles title and **Waldner** retained his boys' singles crown with the former ousting Lisa in the third round of the singles event.

Waldner picked up his third gold when also retaining the boys' doubles title, with his compatriot Jonny Akesson, but had to content himself with a silver in the mixed when, with Katalin Bolvari of Hungary, they were beaten in the final by Jorgen Persson of Sweden partnered by Olga Nemes of Rumania. But, in also retaining the boys' team title, with Akesson and Persson, Sweden's new meteor stamped his authority on the championships in no uncertain style.

The **Russians** too seem to have an assured future especially their girls who took all four titles in that category — one more than in Topolcany where Hungary took the Cadet girls' team. And, although Miss Nemes failed to do herself justice, **Rumania** can take consolation in their championship winning Cadet boys' team.


Overall our captains in Hollabrunn, Donald Parker and Jill Hammersley (Parker) can be justifiably proud in the deeds performed by their charges for, in the junior category, our boys team lifted themselves from 9th to 4th, and the girls from 8th to 3rd.

Unfortunately our cadet teams, comprising Martin Firth and Andrew Cunningham, and Joanne Shaw and Lesley Popkiewicz, found the competition just a little on the hot side as indeed did Adrian Moore, Nicky Hoare and, to a lesser degree, Billy Gleave although the latter has still to master his own temperament.

LETTER FROM HOLLABRUNN

(with apologies to Alistair Cooke)

Hollabrunn may be an hour away from Vienna, but it is a remote, small town surrounded by agricultural land, a college town that can provide both accommodation and a Sports Centre during the summer holidays.

For the young competitors just to be there is the greatest moment of their Table Tennis career that sustains them through a season which is hard and demanding when the temptation to stop or take it easy is often strong. European Table Tennis would be in a sad state without the European Youth Championships which have provided an early spur and fulfilled the early ambitions of so many great players of the present. Though there was much to criticise the occasion generated its own charisma and it was a privilege to be there.

For England it was a heartening tournament. I believe it was the first time that both our Junior Boys and Girls reached the semifinals of the Team Event in the same year. The last time a team of English boys did so was in 1975. The team - Day, Barden, Mitchell, Potton. The only other occasion in 1971 when Nicky Jarvis was the leading light. The girls did it a few years later with a team consisting of Carole Knight, Anita Stevenson and Karen Rogers. This gives some indication of the class of player needed to win a Bronze Medal and to win two in one year was something special. It was also the second year in succession that we won four medals and eight in two years too is a new achievement, though perhaps neither year quite equalled the 1976 inspired by a Paul Day tour de force.

Lisa Bellinger only lost three sets, two to the Russian Iolanta Daniliavichute who has a lot of flair and a rare combination of power and touch, the third to her team mate Elena Vecherok. All this she achieved after only three weeks with her new combination bat. What may be expected after twelve months?

The Swedish Boys are the Chinese of Junior Europe. They won all their matches 5-0, but not against England. Billy Gleave led Waldner 10-2 in the 3rd. Nicky Hoare led 20-16 in the 1st and 20-19 in the 2nd against the same player and 19-16 against Akesson in the 1st, lost that one and then won the 2nd. We could have won 5-2 or led 4-3 with two sets still to go. In the end we could only contemplate what might have been as the Czechs were destroyed 5-0 in the final.

All three boys will be available again next time, the main rivals will lose players to the 'march of time', the Czechs their whole team.

After that, impending combination bat legislation may cast more shadows over England than elsewhere.

I read of moves to colour the slower rubbers, so that they will be immediately detectable from the other end, a move presumably dedicated to achieving longer rallies. I entertain considerable doubts on that score since such a move will re-act mainly against defenders who have been an under-privileged class for many years, seldom seen at Finals Nights on the big occasions.

I see far greater clouds in the domination of the service which is often delivered from shielded positions that make it impossible to detect the spin and guessed returns often go into the net or are despatched for 3rd ball winners. To legislate therefore against, say, anti-loop, but to do nothing about service domination seems highly irrational. The equipment jungle remains more confusing than ever. A new glue, available only to a privileged few, has again made rubbers faster as has been the case ever since Dortmund in 1959 when rubbers were supposedly "standardised".

International legislators will gather in Tokyo in less than a year. Again I put it to them that it is the faster, not the slower rubbers that destroy rallies and spectator support.

In short, England's prospects, Junior and Senior, may depend as much on legislative and technological factors as on our efforts on and off the table.

About one aspect of the organisation one could not feel happy and that was the treatment of the spectator. There were very few and most of those had travelled hundreds of miles to see their teams. Unless equipped with that magic official badge they were herded into the gallery where in the nature of things viewing conditions were far from good, and removed quite ruthlessly from the main area where they could see well. It was generally guite unbearably hot. Heat rises and in the gallery it was therefore quite awful.

It is one of the charms of Table Tennis that the spectator or supporter feels very much part of things as he or she strolls around the arena as one can at any English tournament, large or small.

If there are a great number of spectators, then obviously things have to be different as for instance on Finals Nights, when other arrangements were in force which were adequate. The rest of the time there was plenty of room in the arena, but a number of Officials saw it as their job to herd spectators into the gallery where conditions were poor. Even during the consolation event these people were still in search of victims. I award them the Prean Lemon for the most forgettable contribution to the Championships.

For a long time our Sport has lacked the vital third dimension — the spectator. That cause was poorly served in Hollabrunn.

I air no personal grievances. The English contingent was a close-knit party more like a family presided over by Chairman Tom Blunn. He and his wife, Edna, were tremen-dous supporters of all English players.

For one match I became Captain of Wales when my good friend Len Elias found both his teams playing at the same time. Len has captained Welsh Junior teams for many years through good times and sometimes less good, but most notably that famous victory against Hungary in Poznan. There was, alas, no happy ending as the Welsh girls lost 3-0 to Switzerland but a good fighting display offers plenty of hope for the future. In Evelyn Wright they have a player who may one day revive memories of the great days of Nancy Evans and Audrey Bates.

It was perhaps fitting that the player with the best service should win the Boys' title. In the 'Czech Junior Open' Waldner had lost to both Brodas but this time there could be no doubting his superiority. I though Akesson had a chance in the final if he had believed in himself more and pulled out that controversial service a little earlier .This was delivered from under a lifted leg and everybody found it difficult, even Waldner. Against Nicky Hoare it won Akesson the match. Against Billy Gleave Waldner looked sunk; "he could not read a ball" as the

Cheshire battler would put it and he hung on grimly with some rather negative play whilst waiting for his next five services and they saved him in the end, nothing else. In his quarter-final match with the Rumanian Haldan it was quite clear where the best table tennis was being played as the Rumanian placed the most exquisite flowing strokes all over the table from either wing reminiscent of the artists of another era, but he cracked in the 3rd game under relentless serving pressure which in the end destroyed his rhythm. Nevertheless Waldner is a very versatile player, but as yet only his lobs and service are world-class.

For obvious reasons I do not want to write much about Carl's Cadet Gold. I can say that he enjoyed last year's team Gold at least as much and this year's Junior Team Bronze even more. He had a nervous passage in the Cadet Events at times and the question all along was whether he would have enough left after the Junior Team events. The finalist Lupulescu was a player of undoubted class, who, like Carl, had played well in the Junior Team Event and had also reached the semi-finals of the French Junior Open, a remarkable feat for a Cadet

Considerable credit is due to Don Parker who got Carl to the table in very good shape after a long period of waiting for the final. I thank the Selectors with whom I have sometimes crossed pens for giving him his chance in the Junior team events rather than opting for the Cadets. Olga Nemes, brightest hope of a fine Rumanian contingent and a world ranked player at 13, stayed with the Cadets and ended up with nothing.

In respect of Carl's performances in the Junior Team event the statistics will be sufficient. His victims included Akesson, the Silver Medalist, Persson (Bronze this time. Cadet Champion two years ago), Mazunov last year's Cadet winner, this time defeated 16 and 6, and six seeded players, in all he lost only twice, and that to two full Inter-nationals, the Russian Dvorak and Waldner. He therefore won 16 out of 18.

Much of what I wrote last season was critical and I felt that our Junior Game was losing direction and support and that often prejudice and theory was in conflict with reality. English Junior Table Tennis took a big step in the right direction before and during Hollabrunn and there is now plenty to build on.

My views on what players need to play above themselves are well known and I regard the contribution from the corner as absolutely vital. Don and Jill fully lived up to my highest hopes. They deserve every support.

SAD INDICTMENT

The regrettable demise of your rival magazine, TABLE TENNIS, should give satisfaction to no enthusiast of the game. Those people who with wisdom and fore-sight had argued that TABLE TENNIS NEWS should not be absorbed into the commercial venture, lest for economic consideration or the liquidation of the parent company the latter journal folded, have had their views vindicated. But that our sport cannot support two magazines and that TABLE TENNIS was a loss leader for Marsh Publications is a sad indictment of table tennis. A shame and a backward step too, that there will now be no specialist journal on the bookstalls.

It was a bold move to launch TABLE TENNIS and had the economic climate been better and the state of the game more healthy, then perhaps it could have survived. I think that there was a place for it alongside and complementing TABLE TENNIS NEWS. TABLE TENNIS NEWS is a well produced, commendable, solid, honest, homely, hotchpotch of detailed news and results, articles, photographs and letters, catering for every level, with something for everyone. But TABLE TENNIS, while not offering so much for the grass roots or the statisticians, supplied the sleek presentation, vitality, readability and controversy of professional journalism. In my opinion its best point was the feature articles, and I particularly enjoyed reading Richard Eaton.

The main crunch for TABLE TENNIS was the recession. Advertising revenue was too low. But the other death blow was that not enough people read it, let alone bought it. Why? The backbone of British table tennis is the local league player, a rather parochial animal (as far as T.T. is concerned) who has little interest or aspirations beyond his once weekly match. Difficult enough to get him to part with his money for one magazine, without offering a second. And TABLE TENNIS, with its analysis of players, events and trends and its hot debates, catered more for the students, gossipers, trendsetters, crystal ball gazers and fanatics of the game — sadly, a limited market in a declining sport.

Another problem is the relatively poor readability value of table tennis, despite its high skill factor. The advance in technique and the number and variety of bat surfaces means that the exchanges are generally short and fast, a kind of hugely accelerated athletic chess which does not lend itself easily to good descriptive prose.

Of England's top class players, and we have several, Jill Hammersley (Parker) has the game, with its long, spectacular, defensive rallies, which is most aesthetically pleasing. However, there is a limit to how much can be written on the stiletto like quality of the quicksilver reflex shots of Desmond Douglas, his blackness and what he is earning in the Bundesliga, on John Hilton's bamboozling twiddling — now that opponents can 'read' him better is he a spent force? — and the precocious talent and combination bat of Carl Prean (though his European cadet triumph).

English players continue to enjoy a fair degree of success, which rightly deserves praiseworthy report, but unfortunately most of the time they do not play in an intrinsically exciting, visually inspiring, dynamic way.

And although our stars are nice people and worthy, dedicated sportsmen and sportswomen — and I wouldn't change them — none has a really charismatic or controversial personality, panache or memorable wit (John Hilton may be the exception to this last point). As far as good publicity and good journalism goes, table tennis is crying out loud for great characters and great stylists, perhaps even more than for great feats. A strong argument can also be made that top events could be better presented to add to our sport's appeal, but I will not pursue that debate here.

So, in the face of almost insurmountable odds, the fledgling "Voice of British Table Tennis" has fallen. Fortunately we still have TABLE TENNIS NEWS, which is excellent value for money. I urge every enthusiast to cough up and buy it. What is more, you can put pen to paper and join John Prean in contributing your views, ideas and ex-

REVISED CLASSIFICATIONS

Some indication of the strength in depth of table tennis in the People's Republic of China is shown by the revised individual classification list for 1982 issued by the ITTF.

Chinese players occupy the first three places in the men's classification and the first six places in the women's category spearheaded, respectively, by the current world champions Guo Yuehua and Tong Ling who won their crowns last year in Novi Sad, Yugoslavia, and will become due to defend them in Tokyo next May.

In the men's list which goes down to No. 52 only two Englishmen appear - namely Desmond Douglas at No. 13, having pre-viously figured at No. 8, and John Hilton, down from No. 29 to No. 43. Out from the previous list at No. 50 goes Paul Day.


In the women's list, Linda Jarvis - now retired and previously at No. 40 - and Karen Witt, who figured at No. 46 have been omitted. England's sole representative in the list is Jill Hammersley-Parker who has been lifted from No. 15 to No. 12 following her final appearance in the Budapest European Championships when beaten by Bettine Vriesekoop of the Netherlands in the women's singles.

Mikael Appelgren, of Sweden, who won the European men's singles title in Hungary this year has been lifted from No. 18 to No. 4 while his final victim and compatriot, Jan-Ove Waldner, comes in for the first time at No. 22.

6th Asian Championships JUST LIKE ANOTHER WORLDS by Mihaly Kozak of Hungary

The Asian Championships, featuring the best of the international field, primarily Chinese, Japanese and Korean players, ranks as a major event in world table tennis. This year's 6th Championships were staged in Jakarta in late May - early June, with the participation of male players from 17, and females from 11 countries respectivelv.

The event provided a surprise in so far as South Korea was not represented, this despite that table tennis has been chosen as an Olympic sport, and the next games are to be held in Seoul in 1988.

Chinese superiority prevailed in Jakarta, players from that country winning all seven events and, as at the last Worlds in Novi Sad in 1981, Chinese players vied for both the singles and doubles titles. The only upsets were that neither the male singles world champion Guo Yaohua, nor Tong Ling. the reigning female world champion, won a gold this time.

Kuo was eliminated in the semis, while Tong Ling was edged in the final. As for the doubles world champions, the men's and women's pairs this time played in a different line-up, while in the mixed Xie Saike and Huang Junqun only achieved third place.

MR. FRANCIS HARE

The Yorkshire Table Tennis Association and the Wakefield Table Tennis League have suffered the loss of an outstanding - Mr. Francis Hare, Wakefield member -League's longest serving official died suddenly after several years of failing health.

In the early 1930's Francis played and organised table tennis at British Ropes, Wakefield. He started work there as a junior clerk in 1919, served in nearly every department until he became office manager in 1950, holding that position until he retired in 1969. His compelling leisure time interest was table tennis and he soon became a leading official of his local league, serving with distinction as treasurer and chairman for many years. He was elected to the Yorkshire T.T. Management Committee in 1946 and quickly became recognised as one of the hardest working officials in the county. Francis thought nothing of travelling hundreds of miles on public transport throughout the season to do voluntary stints at county tournaments and then return home in the early hours. He was always happy to see young players doing well and gave them guidance whenever he could. One of Yorkshire and England's greatest players, Kathy Best (now Thompson) will remember Francis with gratitude and affection for his help and advice in the early years of her career.

Francis was awarded the county's special badge for outstanding service and on his retirement from the Wakefield League he became the first recipient of a trophy named after him which recorded forty years dedicated service to local table tennis. He was also made the League's first honorary life member. Francis, who lived to see much of his work bear fruit, will be sadly missed by those who had the pleasure of working with him and shared his enthusiasm for the sport he loved.

WORCESTERSHIRE **50TH ANNIVERSARY**

The coming season will be marked by the 50th Anniversary of the Worcester League. It will be celebrated by a Dinner at the Chateau Impney Hotel, nr. Droitwich. There will be over 100 guests including Maurice Goldstein (E.T.T.A. President), the Mayor of Worcester and, amongst those present at the inaugural meeting in 1932, Cyril Smith and Eric Willmont. Later in the season there will be a "Golden Oldies" Tournament (for over 50's) and a Hard Bat Tournament. It is also proposed to arrange for an exhibition by top class players. There has been a most encouraging start to this Anniversary as the Midland Shires Building Society are spon-soring the League's activities.

This season there is also to be a Premier Division of the Worcester League. There will be only 5 teams but of a high standard and teams will play each other 4 times. Leading players from Worcester, Hereford, Gloucester and Birmingham will be taking part. There is divided opinion on the advisability of this new Division. However, Worcester is in a central position and provides a "battleground" for players of high standard. It seems a good thing provided it does not cause too much disturbance to the other local teams, e.g. as regards allocation to Divisions. A problem may, of course, arise at the end of the season as regards promotion and relegation!

The County has 4 teams playing in the County Championships, namely 2 Senior, 1 Junior and 1 Veterans. The first team has been relegated, which has taken the second team down a Division. It does not appear there will be much change in the complement of players taking part. However, the services of Derek Baddeley, an ex-international player and one of the very first exponents of the "loop", will not be available as County Team Manager. Derek has decided to retire from the job and will be sadly missed. I think It is only if one has done this job that it is appreciated how much time, thought and patience are expended if the job is done well - as it certainly has been. It seems disappointing that Derek has also decided to give up playing the game having unbelievably reached the veteran stage. I hope he will reflect on this one. The County Association has not, as yet, appointed a successor. The Senior teams Selection Committee comprising Doug Moss, John Mytton and Doug Young will be endeavouring to fill the gap. It is pleasing that Doug Young has taken the lead in arranging County Senior team trials and liaising with the players.

Trials were held at the Christopher Whitehead School, Worcester on Sept. 11/12. Disappointingly Jeremy Duffield, the County champion, did not attend and Simon Claxton was unfit. However, the standard was good and the Trials were the best held in the County for some seasons. Trevor Washington played very well and was unbeaten. Steve Dunning also showed his class and was beaten only by Trevor. The ladies' trial showed Sandra Roden, a County Junior last season, in very good form. She beat Lynda Reid, the County champion, and lost only to 13-year-old Louise Davies.

SOMERSET

CONSOLATION, VICTORY AND REWARD

I begin this report with an apology for the absence of my article in the May/June issue, due to a variety of reasons too numerous to relate here.

The last few months have been extremely hectic for our hard-working County Coaches John Reakes, Les Bridges and Bill Kelly, preparing our Cadet and Junior boys and girls for various competitions which, for their stage of development, are considered important. These were the Regional Trials at Worle School, Weston-Super-Mare, the English Schools Individual Championships at Mansfield and the English Cadet Ranking Trial at Northfleet.

A lot of strokes have been made, a lot of games have been played, hopes have been raised and dashed and ambitions have been realized during this period — and I have gained a few more grey hairs!

At the South-West Regional Trials at Worle School over the weekend of 24/25 April we had some good successes and encouraging results which indicated to us that we have got the broad base of talent on which to build.

The County No. 1 U-17 girl, Wendy Payne, gave a good account of herself in spite of having to use a borrowed bat. I hope this will inspire her to continue practising and playing during this coming season which will be her last as a junior.

Lee Sadler unfortunately missed these trials due to a mix-up of dates.

Sunday saw our younger starlets in action. Melonie Carey, Fiona Stuart, Sarah Webb and Rachel Scott in the U-14 girls and Paul Fowler, Paul Smith, Shaun Jones and Philip Payne in the U-14 boys all put up a creditable performance against very good opposition, Philip giving us a preview of his potential for the future with his new defensive style allied to a combination bat. He is the first of our younger players to try this style and I think if he works hard at it and resists the urge to smash the wrong ball he will win some good matches.

While the boys were performing admirably at one end of the hall there was an air of tension building up at the other end in the girls' competition with Somerset's hopes of a coveted place in the England U-13 Trial resting on the shoulders of our top two girls Melonie and Fiona, both having been finely tuned for this event. They started off in separate groups with Melonie having Sarah in hers and Rachael joining Fiona. Both came out top in their groups. They then entered a top six group to play off for No. 1. This was 'crunch time' with the biggest upset of the day when, against all the odds, Sarah beat Fiona after losing the first game to 5. I would have lost if I had bet on it. Well played, Sarah! Melonie, having beaten all others (and Sarah) met Fiona, and in a tense match fought back from one game down to win and clinch the trial invitation. The overall result was Melonie No: 1, Sarah No. 2 and Fiona No. 3.

Therefore, taking the girls' U-17, girls U-14 and boys' U-14 results, Somerset had a very successful and encouraging weekend.

The next big competition involving Somerset's young players was the English Schools' Individual Championships at Mansfield on May 1st.

This trip presented us with some expensive logistic problems to overcome with regard to transport and accommodation, but thanks to the hard work of Mike Williams and the generosity of the Bridgwater League and other friends who wish to remain anonymous, we were able to hire a mini-bus from Hamp School and stay overnight at a very pleasant hotel.

We were able to enter a boy and girl in all the age groups of U-11, U-13, U-16 and

U-19. The team was: Mandy Williams, Melonie Carey, Fiona Stuart and Claire Bryant, Paul Fowler, Paul Smith, Lee Sadler and Russi Captain. Unfortunately, Russi was unable to attend, which was disappointing for us, as we expected him to carry the flag well in the U-19. But our other stars all made their mark in helping to put the name of Somerset to the fore by winning at least one and in some cases more sets in their groups. The major honour went to Melonie, who, after losing in the first round to England-ranked Cadet Helen Broomhead -18 in the third of the U-13 event, progressed through to the consolation final, winning in fine style. This was her second consolation final in these Championships, losing in the U-11 final last year to Tanya Holland of Essex.

At the end of a very tiring but enjoyable day it was agreed that it had all been worth it both from the competition, which was very well run, as usual, under the direction of Eddie Mitchell, and the valuable experience gained by competing at this level.

The next episode of my saga is the English U-13 Ranking Trial at Northfleet, Essex, in which Melonie took part and Fiona was first reserve.

Melonie started slowly in her group, only recording one win, then she relaxed and played as we have seen her in practice, and recorded two fine wins over ranked players. At the end of another exhausting day a Somerset girl achieved her objective of a place on the Cadet Ranking List for the start of Season 1982-83, being ranked 18th.

This brought to an end the 1981-82 playing season, but it hasn't meant that we have gone into hibernation and like the old saying "We Never Close". We never stop our coaching days at the Somerset Training Centre, Chilton School, Bridgwater. This does not mean that nobody has a holiday we certainly needed one after last season — but we keep the players ticking over and introduce new steps in their programe. Also, our County Coaching Officer, Mr. Les Bridges, has been on a busman's holiday to Scotland, attending one of their coaching sessions, taking with him Fiona Stuart, who was invited there to be assessed for possible inclusion in the Scottish Cadet Ranking Trial early in October. We all wish her well and know that she will give a good account of herself.

I seem to have ranted on about our juniors long enough, so I will mention our top players carrying the Senior flag. This coming season will be of special interest to our coaching staff as they will see our three top Junior boys of the last five seasons making the big step to establish themselves in the Senior teams. They are Dave Wilson, Dave Lee and Dean Sully.

Welcome back to the game, Dean. We hope you can recapture the good form you were showing before your unfortunate accident made you miss most of last season.

Also, we hope to see our young ladies trying for a place in the Senior teams, namely, Wendy Payne who, although still a Junior for this season, played very well when called on for the Seniors last season. Also Louise Jarman and Claire Bryant who, if they apply their talent, could do well.

The end of last season saw the departure from the Somerset boundaries of our No. 1 lady, Jill Greene, and her husband, Graham, who have taken up residence in Basingstoke. But I have heard that we will still see them in Somerset colours for this coming season at least. Let us hope that our budding starlets will take the opportunity to watch, learn and try to emulate the wonderful touch that Jill has in her play. I know that she has been an inspiraiton to some of our older Juniors and it is beginning to show in their play. Thanks, Jill, for your past help in coaching at Worle and Chilton and giving them that good start to their table tennis careers which is invaluable at their age.

While I am on the subject of age and experience, I would like to suggest a possible fourth grade in the career of players which has been discussed among our county coaching staff and no doubt among other people in the game. This is the introduction of an Intermediate grade between the Junior and Senior ranks, bridging the gap from 17 to 21. This, I feel, would give a sense of purpose and encouragement to the late developer in Junior ranks and perhaps help to lower the drop-out rate amongst the talented, but still immature players, who find the deep end a different ball game when they realise that a good dog paddler can last the course longer than a free-styler.

Back to the Juniors again and the new season and all it may hold.

For Somerset the season is already under way with the first Open Tournament crossed off the calendar. This was the Bridgend Junior Open on August 21. Somerset got together a squad of 21 boys and girls entered in U-12, U-14 and U-17 age groups, some of the younger ones being only 9 years old, but they did us proud, giving of their best, and when it came to the end of the day they all, with very few exceptions, reaped their reward with a fair percentage of the prize money and trophies.

Our three top U-14 girls, Melonie, Fiona and Sarah, reached the semis of the Cadet Competition, the fourth being the Gloucester No. 1, Jenny Ellery, seeded No. 1 with Melonie No. 2. The first semi was between Fiona and Jenny and the other between Melonie and Sarah. This opened up two possibilities, an all-Somerset final or Somerset v Gloucester. The latter proved to be the case, with the two top seeds meeting, and to the delight of Somerset supporters, Melonie took one step further than last year by taking the title in a tactical battle with Jenny. Well played, Les! She then teamed up with Fiona and took the doubles crown. All in all, a successful tournament for Somerset and another fine performance by the Bridgend Committee in their organisation of this event. Just one thing that was missing - the Pat Archdale team in their smart turn out, lending a touch of colour to the occasion.

Onward then Somerset to the next competition, this being the Swansea Open Cadet Junior and Senior. I will comment on this in my next report. With all the euphoria of the Juniors at the present, it is hard to mention a note of caution, but I must mention one item which is vital to the progress of these youngsters, and that is regular competition at good venues throughout the season in local leagues.

This is becoming harder each season with firms which have long traditions of table tennis promotion in their sports clubs either closing down or introducing other sports to the same match nights which in most cases are not conducive to good table tennis concentration. This is driving some players out seeking other venues and others to give up in frustration. Let us hope that this trend will soon be stopped and that we can all spread the word of the benefits of table tennis to the community, i.e. keeping the youngsters off the streets and channelling their energies in the right direction.

As a final note, I would like to wish all newcomers to the Bridgwater and District League the best of luck and success, in the coming season.

ESSEX

STILL ON THE MAP

Our learned chairman — those with long memories may recall — said in his opening notes of last season that he was to continue writing the Essex notes for the time being but that I would be taking over from him in due course. The story of the day at the closed, however, was provided by 13-year-old Lisa Hayden who completed a barely creditable hat-trick of cadet, junior and women's singles titles. She too was rewarded with a jump to No. 2. How long can Elaine Foulds hold on to the No. 1 spot?

After the A.G.M., the county has two new life members, Gill Squier and Len Hoffman, two new vice-presidents, Dick Roffe and Roger Vardon, but no new faces on the executive committee, as volunteers for the vacant posts of tournament secretary and vice-chairman were not forthcoming. Ian's contributions to the county and also to the Chelmsford and Braintree leagues have been enormous over the years. It is good to see him getting recognition from the top.

Launceston's saviour was ironically veteran John Bassett, who has come out of retirement this season for the umpteenth time and can still win comfortably over class opposition at the age of 42.

Only in his second round meeting with Philip Aspinall of Oldham was Cooke taken to a deciding game in the boys' singles his final success over Philip Gunn of Birmingham being little short of a romp.

Melanie Seaton of Yorkshire was the winner of the girls' singles beating Tracey Lightfoot of Crewe in the final having ousted the top seed, Jean Parker, in the semis.

Derek Schofield failed to retain his veteran singles title when beaten in the final by Matt Sheader of Louth who, in the semis, took care of Cheshire's other main contender Pete D'Arcy.

THIS & THAT IN SURREY



by MURRAY CORBIN

Hello! Here we go again! Perhaps you will allow me to wish every one of you a happy, progressive and productive season, irrespective of your role in promoting our sport. However I must warn you players that enjoyment and happiness will only prevail if you approach the season like true professionals — paying particular attention to every minute detail. In so doing, you will become addicted to practising and repeating good habits, like warming up before each game, practising with a particular idea in mind, watching opponents wherever possible before a match, and not being afraid to take a calculated chance to win a point. Players are generally so afraid of losing a point or a game that they play too safely and end up losing. Being brave by instinct is a rare gift, so most of us have to practice to become skilful at it. There are of course more rules to follow but by becoming addicted to a few more - like getting to a tournament early after being well rested the night before - you will help yourselves to achieve better results than you had anticipated.

After each season and before the next one starts, coaches must reassess and reshape their MASTER PLAN; keep the ideas that proved productive and replace the "rubbish" with new, sound ideas. Do not be afraid to experiment. Explain clearly what you are thinking and the benefits you are trying to achieve. Ask for comments and involve those around you. If an exercise does not work immediately or even not at all, it has still been an experience shared and you do not come out feeling a right "twerp". Our COACHING MANUAL, or Bible, is a work of art — a compilation of sound ideas that have stood the test of time; use it as a background and a treetrunk, but you must branch out to become a full tree; along the way prune or even cut down a few branches to keep a clear road of communication. To reiterate, explain the idea behind what you want practised and the benefit it should bring, ask the pupil for his opinion and never proceed until the important points are clear in both minds. One of the questions I am asked regularly by coaches during my lectures to clubs, here and abroad, is, "What makes a really successful coach?". My answer is always, "A coach is a business man: successful business men plan not to fail, the unsuccessful fail to plan. Communication is major factor in planning". I do not know a really bad coach but I see a few achieving less than they should: these have generally got stuck in a rut and failed to

respond to new challenges. Our life style changes every year along with technology, we too must look for new ways to get the same or better results, and make coaching enjoyable for all and not just a necessary chore.

MIKE KERCHER had his usual Saturday sessions going at Tweedale School during the summer, while FRED GARBET specially organised eight Sundays at Spicers for the Cadets. Invitations are always extended to coaches to come along with their invited pupils. Sadly, only GAIL McCULLOUGH, PETER CORNER and myself seem interested and willing to turn out to help the two aforementioned on a regular basis. We have so many coaches and student coaches in Surrey that they must simply be afraid to find out or be told that they are doing something "not quite correct". At County level, we sometimes have a conflict of interest relating to stance, form or one of the other five basic points a player must be well versed in. We are not ashamed of the pupils seeing our heated arguments, because they realise that this is being done for their sole benefit. This is the reason why Surrey holds its head high above many counties. Our team and individual results are always very satisfactory, but this is due to the application, discipline and team work of a dedicated few coaches.

The Club Coach is, in my opinion, the most important coach — he is responsible for programming "good habits" into the beginner. If this is not achieved at this stage progress throughout a career may be hindered or even lost forever. For every young player who becomes a success at senior level there may have been more who looked likely prospects as juniors who have failed to fulfill this early promise.

Next we have the County and National Coaches who I believe should be "smooth-ing over" and teaching "advanced match strategy". Unfortunately, I often see them doing the basics, because on trying to set up an exercise they often have to revert to the basics before the exercise can become

effective. Too much time also has to be spent on physical training. A pupil should be fit and already experienced in this art which is necessary and complementary to the game. Whenever possible, I try to observe what the talented and skilful National ---PETER HIRST and DAVID FAIRHOLM — are doing. In August I went to see them in action at Crystal Palace during the GUINNESS WEEK OF SPORT, and as always I was impressed with their methods and enthusiasm, but, to reiterate, I would like to see them have a higher percentage of correctly taught pupils to work with.

POLES APART IN SEOUL

Wales was among the forty-one national teams which made the long journey to South Korea for the Second Seoul Open. The Europeans gathered in Paris for that long trip across the pole — eight hours to Anchorage, and then another eight hours to Seoul. But it was all worth it, and although players need to be reminded now and then that expensive journeys are made for the purpose of playing table tennis, this was a mini World Championship which was enjoyed by all whatever their results on the table.

The teams stayed at the Hyatt Hotel magnificent view across Seoul, with swimming pool, and a fashionable pool-side area, tennis courts, shops, bars, and for the players most important of all, splendid rooms and a mouth-watering selection of food for every meal.

The Officials were at the Schylla, a little more upstage, with even more comfort to spoil everyone. Transport was first class, and even the buses had police out-riders shepherding them through Seoul's frantic traffic.

Social occasions were at the highest and most lavish, with officials involved in receptions given by the Sports Minister, the Organising Committee of the 1988 Olympic Games, The Mayor of Seoul, and the Korean Television Company which incidentally did a fine job on many hours of exposure.

The Farewell party was one of the most unusual I have ever attended. It was held on the night before the Finals, an interesting innovation which was highly successful in many ways, but had the disadvantage of leaving everyone rather flat and with nothing to do after the Finals.

But the party itself was out of this world! We went out to one of Seoul's suburbs, to The Little Angels Performing Arts Centre, a somewhat unpromising prospect for a farewell party. But this magnificent building provided food and drink to please the most fastidious palate, offered in beautiful rooms and with delicate taste. The huge auditorium, with its rows of boxes, had its floor covered with dozens of round tables, where the contestants, a little apprehensively at first, sat to enjoy a performance by girls of between seven and fifteen in a series of brilliant production numbers, with songs and dances which held everyone, even the most cynical of youngsters, tight in their seats.

Little wonder that when this group of entertainers visited Britain in 1971, The Queen lavished very special hospitality on them, giving them unreserved praise for their artistry. A music and coloured fountain extravaganza was also a fascinating part of the show, and then the entertainment ended with disco music for those trained for a loose rugby maul.

And what of the table tennis, which after all was why we were there.

Our Welsh team had mixed fortunes. In the team event our first pair of Alan Griffiths and Mark Thomas played the Korea No. 1 team and found them far too strong. Nigel Thomas and Gary Wilkins played Canada, and lost 2-3, a somewhat disappointing result, as we had the beating of the Canadians.

Mark and Gary had to qualify, and both did so in good style. Mark then had a fine 1st round with Bob Tuckett of Australia, who has always come out top against us, but Mark ran him very close indeed. Gary lost to one of the strong Koreans. Nigel and Alan were direct into the first round. Nigel went out 3-straight to the strong Frenchman Birocheau, but Alan disappointed in losing 3-straight to a Saudi Arabian.

In an entry of widely ranging abilities, with so many Third World countries there, it was expected that the "favourites" would come through without much problem. And indeed it was so, although Korea's final team win against Appelgren and Waldner was a surprise. Sweden had beaten Japan I of Maehara and Saito 3-2, and Korea I had won a guite hard battle with Hong Kong.

Predictably the South Korean women took their team title, a semi-final 3-0 win over Sweden being followed by a 3-1 victory over Japan I, who had accounted for the young Finns Grefberg and Malmberg who had done so well to reach this stage.

In the men's singles Eric Boggan of the USA beat Sweden's Lindh, Bohm of Federal Germany surprisingly elîminated European Champion Appelgren, Waldner — European Junior Champion — triumphed in the fifth against Wan Kim of Korea, and Maehara worked hard and successfully to beat Korea's defensive genius Park Lee Hee in the fifth.

Eric Boggan had a comparatively easy win over Bohm in the one semi-final, but Waldner only scraped home 22-20 in the fifth in a long hard battle with Masahiro Maehara, and only the Swede's service proved the decisive factor.

Waldner beat Boggan in a tense Final, and although it was three-straight (19, 21, 19) it was again Waldner's tricky service that swayed the fortunes.

The huge crowd was understandably dismayed at South Korea's lack of success in the men's singles, but they had three women in the semi-finals of the women's event, where the sole Japanese girl Rei Wada struggled heroically before losing in the fifth to the runner-up Duek Hwa Shin, who lost in the final to her team mate Yung la Yang (13, 20, 13).



It is expected that the altered schedule will now qualify the "Sealink Youth Cup" as a national ranking tournament.



RANKINGS '82-83

Chairman, National Selection Committee

'Lentec' are continuing their valuable support of the National Ranking Panel by the provision of computer services for the coming season.

Last season's experimental year showed the value of a computer ranking system but by the end of the season it became clear that the programme used needed to be changed. Most of the problems faced were as a result of the inclusion of a points losses system.

Therefore, the programme for the coming season will be on a wins only basis. No points will be lost and there will be no penalty points. The event weighting will enable a player to gain considerably more points at the major tournaments and championships.

Points will be gained by wins over other players with a computer score (not just those in the issued ranking lists). Obviously, more points will be gained by a win over a player with a greater score than yourself.

A technical article will follow in a later issue of Table. Tennis News, but the following are details of starting points, events, weightings and bonuses.

Diamond Jubilee

CHCHCHCHCHCHCH

Following the AGM on July 10th at the Regent Centre Hotel in London, 168 members and guests gathered to celebrate the English Table Tennis Association's Diamond Jubilee. The evening proved enjoyable in every way with an excellent meal, speeches, presentations and dancing.

Those present had the rare opportunity to hear the Hon. Ivor Montagu speaking about his involvement in the early days and on this occasion an impressive illuminated address was presented to the man who became the first Chairman of the ETTA in 1922 at the age of 17.

Regrettably, because of illness, A.K. "Bill" Vint, OBE, a former secretary (1950-56), chairman (1958-62) and president (1970-73), was unable to be present and another prominent guest, Emlyn Jones, MBE, Director General of the Sports Council, was also absent because of a family bereavement.

Rivalling the Hon. Ivor Montagu in his powers of oratory H. Roy Evans, OBE, President of the ITTF, proposed the toast to the ETTA and his speech is worthy of recording in full:

"Mr. Chairman,

First of all, thank you for giving me the privilege of congratulating the English Table Tennis Association on this celebration of its Diamond Jubilee.

There could be a number of significant reasons for your having invited me to perform a very pleasant task — the first, because I am the President of the International Table Tennis Federation looking out, metaphorically, from the headquarters at St. Leonards-on-Sea on all our constituent members, or because I have been able, from Cardiff-on-Sea, to look out across Offa's Dyke at the tremendous achievements of a neighbour — or it may even be the wish for the masochistic thrill of risking what a Welshman would say about the English!

Your history starts officially at the birth of the English Table Tennis Association on April 24th, 1927, but I think this may be the appropriate occasion upon which to record some of the incidents that occurred during the pregnancy.

Whatever is the truth about its conception — and the stories vary in accordance with whatever country you live in — the facts on record point to the establishment of the game in much of its present form in the very early 1920's.

It may be news to many of you to know that the first international match was between England and Wales, played on 9th March, 1923. Similar matches took place in 1924 and 1925, and honesty forces me to confess that England won all three. But then came an upset — in 1926 Wales won and repeated this triumph at the Memorial Hall in Farringdon Street on January 15th, 1927. Note the significance of that date — for this traumatic experience for the English took place during a period of anxious gestation, and after this final kick in the womb, the child ETTA was born on 24th April! So life began for what was to become very soon the strongest and best organised table tennis organisation in our World.

It is not easy for an outsider to identify all those who guided the destiny of the English Association during the years of rapid growth, and doubtless I shall forget many worthy of mention.

Your records include names like Oldroyd, Bunbury, Maurice Rose, Corti Woodcock, some stalwarts of the early years, others of later eras. Your Secretaries, by the nature of their work, became known across the geographical borders — Hookins, Poupard, Decker, Siddron and Bill Vint.

And in case you think I've forgotten, let me leave for special mention those two to whom you probably owe the greatest praise — Ivor Montagu and (dare I say it?) Welshman Bill Pope, the vision of the one being complemented by the drive and enthusiasm of the other. It was the devotion, and unstinting labour of all these people, and many others too numerous to mention, which resulted in the set up of the club, league, county and national organisation, coordinated in rule and regulation which even today stands as a model structure for administering the game at every level.

History must record your debt to them, but you have an even greater loyalty to those who stand at the head of your Association today — Maurice Goldstein, Tom Blunn and George Yates, who are striving to maintain England's position in circumstances far more complex than at any time in the past. But forgive me if I refer more specifically to those who have projected English prestige internationally. The person who undoubtedly

did most for England, and indeed for the International Table Tennis Federation during his long terms of office is lvor Montagu. It was his foresight and enthusiasm which prompted the English Association to stage the first World Championships in London in 1926, and to repeat this great task in 1935, 1938, 1947 and 1954. It was in the main due to his drive that informal discussions taking place about the formation of a World body turned to reality when the International Table Tennis Federation was inaugurated in 1926. In those formative vears lyor had the devoted support of Bill Pope who worked so hard to put into operation many of the constitutional ideas that gave England the solid stable base that entitled you to be regarded as leaders in international table tennis. After Bill Pope's untimely death, Bill Vint came into the international scene, and he and lvor contributed to instil English ideas and English stability into the ever growing and more politically influenced field of international table tennis. Both are entitled to praise from you for their projection of the English way of table tennis life, and from the ITTF for the invaluable guidance given us over many years. The ITTF is also deeply appreciative of another invaluable contribution - the spread of your very efficient umpire organisation outside your own borders, and the setting up of the ITTF's International Umpire Scheme, which has resulted in our having more than 1,000 qualified umpires operating in all parts of the World. We are indebted, for the administration of this scheme to that master of exactitude --- Colin Clemett. During many of these sixty years, English players, too, have brought polish to the ETTA's gleaming brassplate. You have always had players good enough to keep you high up in the World ranking, from the likes of Godfrey Decker, Percy Bromfield, Carris, who played in that first international, to those who won the ultimate accolade - Fred Perry was your first World Champion in 1928/29, Johnny Leach brought you the title in 1948/ 9 and again in 1950/51. The Rowe twins and Ann Haydon adorned the distaff side, whilst expatriates Victor Barna, Richard Bergmann and Dora Beregi brought you some reflected glory.

But it has taken a long time to arrive at the era of Desmond Douglas and Jill Hammersley. There is no time now to debate why you have to some extent lost ground in player-power. It is so clear that the National Press likes winners at high levels, and you will, I fear, continue for some time to be-moan the paucity of table tennis cover in the big dailies. You must be grateful for the coverage given by your local newspapers, and for your excellent magazine "Table Tennis News" which, following the traditions established when you had the first and only specialist table tennis periodical, continues to enjoy a high reputation at home and abroad. Let me now quote you from the Foreword to the English Open Programme of 1952 - written I suspect by Ivor Montagu To the historian, eras are an intricate interweaving.of personalities and circumstances from which no part can be cut without spoiling the pattern. The future is but the past entered through another gate. The present exists BECAUSE of the past just as the future will be created by the present".

So, what are you doing about the future now?

In the matter of playing ability, the situation

isn't easy. The deterioration of our game as a spectator sport, partly caused by an influence we hope can be modified in Tokyo next year, the upsurge of other games, many easier to play, and making for more attractive television, and all the problems associated with the provision of some kind of financial support to players trying to compete with others, state subsidised or heavily sponsored — all these are problems of great complexity, needing to be tackled with courage and determination now.

On the administrative side - may I say it as a friend - you have for too long failed to appreciate that many of the principles and practices you have taught the world are now in operation to the same degree, or even to a better degree, in many parts of the World. You are not alone in this - in many other international sports, control is passing from the English, or the British, to countries which learned all about sport government from us. Maybe it is too late to reverse that tendency - or maybe we should rid ourselves of the conviction that we have a divine right to govern, and concentrate on the task of reviving our own glories. It may seem churlish for me to finish on a chiding note, but I want you to believe me when I say that the Irish, the Scots and the Welsh want to see an England riding high in a sport to which it has given so much through the past sixty years.

Let me conclude, Ladies and Gentlemen, by offering you the toast to an organisation dear to the hearts of the old hands who are here in such happy numbers and dear also to the younger ones who are now active in play or in administration — The English Table Tennis Association — its first sixty years, and to its everlasting life".

Two excerpts from the souvenir programme are also worthy of recording here, those from Ivor Montagu, Life Vice-President and Founder President ITTF and from Tom Blunn, the current chairman of ETTA.

JUBILEE GREETINGS

Greetings to all our members and our friends and neighbours — Wales, Scotland, Ireland, Jersey, Guernsey and all points north and south and east and west!

Is it really sixty years since a few of my elders and betters got together and restarted Table Tennis, hijacking me into the chair not so much on account of any merit as in the role of convenient fall-guy — since we were not quite sure how anything was going to turn out?

Looking back, it's all turned out a marvel. For now our game has become one of the most widespread of all, giving pleasure even to millions and founding friendships all over the globe.

How did all this happen? Maybe we were right to be starry-eyed then, two whole generations ago. Personally I feel very humble about the whole business. If every one wanted proof that it is not just particular people who get things done, we only have to think of how things grew in our game, in our country, in our association — and no doubt this goes for all the others too. Just try to count the indispensable people women as well as men, youngsters as well as old hands - who have done their bit as patient club secretaries and committee men, as referees and umpires, organising and keeping accounts (besides keeping the peace), improving the equipment and polishing the rules, reporting and coaching, playing for fun and even sometimes playing well, besides brewing the tea, making the

sandwiches and perhaps even opening the occasional bottle.

Everybody has been needed. No names everybody has done a part of it. I think it fair to say, too, that we have all enjoyed it. Thanks to everyone, keep it up!

"IT'S GOT TO BE GOOD"

Six months of tough negotiation by ETTA Chairman, Tom Blunn, came to fruition on September 7th with the confirmation that the British ball manufacturer — Halex are to sponsor the National League, beginning this season. The final details have yet to emerge but it seems certain that most of the cash will go towards increased prize money — news that was welcomed by the top clubs and players. "It's got to be good for the League", said Soham's international, Paul Day, "as the cash will increase the League's prestige with the players. After three years of the competition, it's a very important boost".

Announcing the link-up, Group Publicity Manager, Vee Pattinson stressed the company's commitment. "Halex are right behind the National League for the marketing of our Halex Ultra ball", she said, "and we're backing our support for the Halex National League with a club kit for local clubs and increased promotion of the Halex/ETTA Proficiency Award Scheme. It represents a £100,000 investment by MY Sports and Games Ltd. — the parent company of Halex — over the next four years".

Included in the deal is printing material for the League — scoresheets, handbook and stationery — which will enhance the image of the League and help its administration.

CLUBS FIND SPONSORS TOO

As well as the overall sponsorship, clubs have again been busy during the summer break and the league champions, Ellenborough, have signed up with Thorn EMI Lighting. "We're pleased to be supporting the League champions", said Marketing Executive, Peter Bultz, "and we are hoping to develop our involvement with indoor sports lighting from our link with Ellenborough". Also in the Premier division, Larkhall have moved from Clapham to Letchworth, where they will receive support from the Letchworth Corporation at their superb new venue, and Omega have combined their move to the Wamsad club in Maidenhead with a financial link-up to Bristol & West Investments club. But Wamsad, unlike Letchworth who have captured David Wells from Soham, have retained the same basic formula of Bradbury, Barr, Wellman and Reeves and must be favourites to fight out the bottom spot with Newcastle.

Last year's runners-up, Ormesby, have been doubly hit — with the loss of Sealink sponsorship and two of last season's squad. Steve Mills has gone to lead Dunlop Birmingham with their new signing lan Horsham and Keith Rodger is seeking another club. But a neat bit of fixture shuffling before the season could have dealt Ormesby a winning hand as all their matches with Soham and Thorn EMI Ellenborough are now scheduled for two weekends in March. With Donald Parker specialising in "peaking" the Ormesby players might be able to get it together at the same time. Or a "guest player", signed just before Christmas, could tip the balance.

FIRST DIVISION FORECASTS

"Winning the First division is going to be tougher than the Premier" predicted Jaques Generation dynamo, Tim Manhire, before the season. And the club's line-ups seem to bear him out, with one current, and two former, European champions in the division. Carl Prean leads Jaques Generation, Jill Hammersley-Parker is No. 1 for Tarmac Wolverhampton and John Hilton will turn out for Grove, leaving ATSV Saarbrucken after two years in the Bundesliga. "John is not just going to be our star player", said Grove General Manager, Ian Marshall, "but he's also going to play a key role in the development of Grove table tennis. All our National League players turn out for local league matches so that everyone in the area benefits in the long term". Hilton, living just an hour away in Flixton, is to take regular coaching sessions at the Market Drayton centre.

The first division, formed by the top four of last year's two regional Second Divisions has included TCB Dolphins, who easily won the play-off with Tarmac Wolverhampton at the end of the last season. Dolphins, now with sponsorship from Twentieth Century Bank, lost out to Soham in a battle to bring Nicky Hoare to Brighton; Malcolm Francis transferred to Colne Valley after failing to agree terms; and Peter Puddock has retired to play darts instead of table tennis.

But Dolphins are still optimistic. "We're investing in our youngsters Gary (Lambert) and Adrian (Moore) who, we feel, are going to improve enormously this season, particularly under the experience and steadying influence of Roger Chandler", said Carol Beames of TCB Dolphins. "However, it would be true to say that we're on the look out for new players as well". Looking for more funds by the sound of it too, as Dolphins are holding a 10 mile sponsored "Fun-Run" (is there such a thing?) on Cctober 16th. Good news for their opponents the following day — Tarmac Wolverhampton!


