PEN USA ANNOUNCES 2010 LITERARY AWARD WINNERS

(September 8, 2010) — **PEN USA**, the West Coast center for the renowned writers' organization International PEN, has unveiled the winners of its prestigious 2010 Literary Awards competition. The prizes, announced by PEN USA Executive Director Adam Somers, honor outstanding work by writers in 10 separate genres.
