Nebraska beat Wake Forest 31-3 Saturday at Memorial Stadium, and there's no disputing why. While Bill Callahan's West Coast offense continued to look as trendy as a rubber corn-cob hat, the Blackshirts appeared in late-season form as they bruised and abused the Demon Deacons' backfield much to a sellout crowd's delight.

Bullocks scored a touchdown. Corev McKeon did. too. Stewart Bradley even got one. That's a school record.

"You can't really explain it," said safety Blake Tiedtke, who picked off a pass in the second quarter. "If you play hard, if you go to the ball, those things happen. It's just fun. We're compet-

The defense, which forced five turnovers, has allowed just 10 points in two games. Its four touchdowns are exactly four

more than it created in 2004. "Any time you can create a turnover on defense and then capitalize and score, that just adds to the dimension of momen-tum," Callahan said. "It makes
