Flynn on fourth down from the 16, and


NU stormed the field for the second

## Mavericks manhandle overmatched Panhandle

Just about everyone got into the act Saturday for a UNO football team that needed to feel good about itself again.

The NCAA Division II No. 16 Mavericks (4-1) nearly set a school scoring record in their 71-0 victory over an overmatched Oklahoma Panhandle State before 3,000 at Caniglia Field, just one week after being humbled

"It helps us a little, because this is what we expected to do, and we didn't really give them much,' UNO linebacker Kenny Onatolu said. "But next week will be the real test. Will we come out flat? Or will we come out and play like we did today?

Next week, the University of Nebraska at Omaha jumps back into North Central Conference play, traveling to face surprising

Minnesota-Duluth. "We've got five games left and every single one of them are

big-time games," UNO coach Pat Behrns said. This one wasn't such a big-time

game.

The Mavs had every expectation of blasting the Aggies (1-5), who lost 63-7 earlier this year to Minnesota State-Mankato, another NCC team. The Aggies were paid a \$25,000 guarantee to play
