## Character Builder 您好參? 你

The basic unit of the Chinese language is the zi (字), i.e. a Chinese word. Each zi has a written form (called a character, made up of strokes), a sound (made up of consonant and vowel) and a meaning (or multiple meanings). When we speak or write Chinese, we string zi together to form terms, phrases and sentences.

This week: Words about staple foods



Pronunciation: *mai* (Putonghua, 4<sup>th</sup> tone), *mak* (Cantonese 6<sup>th</sup> tone) Basic meaning: wheat 麥 = wheat/barley: 小麥 (xiao mai = small-wheat = wheat), 大麥 (da mai = big-wheat = barley), 麥穗 (mai shui = wheat-ears). 麥田 (mai tian = wheat-fields) look beautiful with 麥浪 (mai lang = wheat-waves = billowing of wheat heads). 打麥 (da mai = hit-wheat) means thrashing wheat. 麥稈 (mai gan = wheat-stem) = straws.

麵粉 (mian fen = noodles~powder = wheat-flour) is made into 麵條 (mian tiao = noodle~strings), 饅頭 (man tou = bun~head = buns), 糕點 (gao dian = cakes~dumplings). 麥片 (mai pian = wheat~piece = oatmeal) and 麥草 (mai cao = wheat~grass) are health foods.

麥當奴 (*mai dang lao* = "McDonald's"-transliterated = wheat~should~labour) is the Chinese name of Big Mac.
