PARK END WITH 8-TRY BLITZ

Welcome to Parknews. Park could hardly have done more than Saturday's 8-try thumping of Cinderford to stake their claim for promotion. But when news came through from Blackheath that Doncaster had won, it was all in vain and Park must prepare for another season in National 1. Park can take pride in having taken the division's only full-time professional club right to the wire – indeed their playing record of P30 W25 D1 L4 is better than the Champions' P30 W25 D0 L5, but they were pipped on bonus points. Perhaps the best measure of what was achieved is that we finished 24 points ahead of the nextbest semi-pro club, third-placed Coventry. Disappointing inasmuch as we didn't quite lift the title, but this was an outstanding performance with which to sign off for what has been by any yardstick a phenomenally successful season.

The following day Alex Codling said, 'Yesterday was a great way to end the season with our 9th win on the bounce and to score 18 tries in our last 2 games highlights the attacking intent and finishing on show. To finish 24 points clear of the nearest semi-professional team is a truly remarkable achievement and one the boys should be extremely proud of. There was a great atmosphere at the club yesterday and we look forward to more days like this next season.'

Whilst it is frustrating to finish second having a better playing record than the Champions, let's not spoil a great season by indulging in a bout of sour grapes. We all knew the rules before the season started. Doncaster got more points than we did – end of story.

But in looking at the season's ups and downs, do spare a thought for Stourbridge in National 2 North. They had the best playing record in that division and didn't even make the play-offs! Macclesfield are promoted from the North and Hartpury College from the South, while Darlington Mowden Park are at home to Ampthill in the Play-Off for the third promotion spot. The relegated sides are all three of the sides promoted last term: Hull Ionians, Worthing and Henley Hawks.

At the other end of the table, the side relegated from the Championship last term go straight back up while the side promoted last year come back down in the form of Ealing Trailfinders. As the French have it, *plus ça change, plus c'est la même chose.* There are rumours that Ealing's ever-generous sponsor, Mike Gooley of Trailfinders, has opened up the coffers to provide a huge war chest for the coming campaign. Money alone cannot, of course, buy the sort of team spirit Park showed in the recent campaign (though it's probably a pretty good deposit!). Here's looking forward to another really tough season.

While the League matches are done and dusted, the season is far from over. On Thursday 8th May we stage the London Floodlit 7s. It is the Club's main fundraiser for the year, full details are on Page 2, so please do support it yourself and persuade as many others as you can to come along. It's the Capital's Greatest Rugby Party - and you could see the new lights switched on. A week later we stage the inaugural Women's London Floodlit 7s, and there are details of that inside as well.

Joint celebrations

Both sides had something to celebrate after Saturday's match - for Park the victory, for Cinderford the news that Henley had only drawn at Tynedale and so the Foresters are safe for another season /continued on page 3....

Slingbacks win close, nail-biting encounter Slingbacks 35 Richmond 27 Championship 2

On Sunday The Rock saw probably one of the most entertaining, thrilling games of the women's South East division season. With weather that was perfect for rugby the Slingbacks kicked off against a Richmond 3's side with it all to play for. Whoever lost this encounter would be relegated. With that in mind the Slingbacks powered out of the blocks and put immediate pressure on Richmond, proving that this would be a game that they weren't going to give up easily. After lots of early pressure from the pack and a great cutting run from Christina Ovenden the Slingbacks won a penalty in Richmond's 22 after 2 minutes. Winger Esther King stepped up and coolly put it over to make it 3-0.

The early head start gave the Slingbacks momentum and with some impressive rucking and pressure again in Richmond's half the ball eventually got to the hands of full back Danielle Williams who ran the first try of the game in from 30 metres, just after 10 minutes, giving the Slingbacks a 8-0 lead.

Richmond responded and piled the pressure on the Slingbacks and at 19 minutes the Richmond 8 made a superb break, skipping through 4 tackles before being pulled down in a try saving tackle by Williams. This strength and determination continued and the Slingbacks played with consistent pressure and intensity, with all the pack carrying well and breaking the gain line, especially Hannah Murphy and Hannah Boardman. The backs were making great runs and defending with gusto, especially Camilla Breuton, who appeared to be everywhere at once. At 25 minutes Elicia Davis got the ball on the wing and ran through the Richmond defence to score a try under the posts. King converted making the score 15-0 at 25 minutes. A score that the Slingbacks would only have dreamed of at kick off.

The Slingbacks continued to pile on the pressure and won a pen-

alty after Richmond were penalised for continually killing the ball at the breakdown. King kicked the penalty bringing the score to 18-0 at 35 minutes.

Richmond then bought on ex-Slingback prop Mena Fombo who made an instant impact. Her work in the rucks gave Richmond the ball in order to score a breakaway try, which was converted making the score 18-7 at 38 minutes. Richmond continued to pile on the pressure and at 40 minutes, after repeated work at the breakdown found a space for Fombo to power over for their 2nd try in 2 minutes, taking the score to 18-12 at half time.

The second half proved to be even more entertaining than the first. With the momentum against the Slingbacks they leaked two tries in the first 10 minutes, both which were unconverted taking the score to 18-22 in Richmond's favour at 50 minutes. But the Slingbacks were not beaten, they continued to put pressure on Richmond at the breakdown and at the scrum with everyone working tirelessly. At 55 minutes they got their break when Davis broke away again, skipping past countless Richmond players to score her 2nd try of the game, leaving the game at 23-22.

Davis within minutes then made a try saving tackle when Richmond broke down the wing. Richmond continued to pile on the pressure and with Emma Smyth coming off with an injury Libby Jensen made her Slingbacks debut, instantly putting in some massive tackles and working hard at the breakdown. At 60 minutes after being warned as a team for too many high tackles Boardman was yellow carded. 10 minutes with 14 is usually the undoing of many a team but the Slingbacks proved that they were not to be beaten and though they leaked a try just after the yellow card, managed to pile on enough pressure, win scrums and release Davis to score her hat-trick try under the posts, which was converted by King on 68 minutes taking the score to 30-27.

With Boardman back on the field the Slingbacks pushed for the final 10 minutes of the season and won 2 consecutive penalties that King attempted but unfortunately missed, at 75 and 76 minutes. However the Slingbacks had one final moment of glory in them – after continued sustained pressure and hard work by all in the breakdown they were camped on the Richmond try-line. At 78 1/2 minutes Breuton reached over for a 5th, bonus point try taking the score to 35-27 with 90 seconds left. The Slingbacks rode out the final 90 seconds and were deserved winners of a thrilling encounter. The Slingbacks finish the season 3rd from bottom and avoid relegation. The crowd at the game on Sunday were fantastic and the Slingbacks would like to thank everyone for their support this weekend and throughout the season. Forward of the match went to Boardman for running fantastic lines and always getting up quickly in defence. Back of the match went to Breuton for her management of the game and great defensive work.

He was a rugby man through and through and as good a judge of a player as anyone. He ran Park's Under-21 side and firmly believed in pushing youngsters on into the Senior sides. Roddy Golightly recalls travelling with Brian on several trips to watch players which Brian thought might be good recruits for Park. Each trip ended back at Chez O'Reagan where copious amounts of alcohol would be dispensed.

His contacts in Irish Rugby were second to none. It was he who was behind several matches played between Park and Old Wesley. Two of these involved trips to Dublin, very fondly remembered by all who took part. One of the many O'Reagan stories followed a Friday night friendly at the Rock, with Old Wesley as the visitors. After finally closing up after a long bar 'extension' our then steward, Doug Bradford, ventured outside to spot Brian fast asleep in the driver's seat of his Toyota. When Doug hammered on the window, Brian awoke instantly, "Oh Jesus, that was quick! We're home already!" (He took a cab in the end).

Brian was always quick to offer a job to a player in need at his Marble City enterprise. Many good players did a stint there, including the likes of Mark Jermyn and Simon Hunter.

President Geoff Bayles recalls a generous man. "He once gave me a marble table. I went to pick it up in my car, but had to hire a truck to get it home. I still have it and it is a pretty solid reminder of a good bloke".



Rosslyn Park Remembers

This is the last of a series of articles by Stephen Cooper, which appeared in last Saturday's match programme, celebrating some of the characters of Rosslyn Park who gave their lives in the Great War



Guy du Maurier joined Rosslyn Park in 1881 at the tender age of sixteen and played halfback. The club, founded only two years earlier by cricketing friends tiding over the winter months, was then based in bohemian Hampstead, home to his Punch cartoonist father, Georges. The family's creative circle included Rossetti and Henry James, and Guy's niece would be the novelist Daphne du Maurier. His sister Trixy was engaged to the Park founder Charles Hoyer Millar – which is one way of getting a 1st XV start.

This graduate of Marlborough and Sandhurst played his last game in 1885, crossing the whitewash against Maidstone, before departing for Burma in the service of the Queen Empress Victoria. He would spend much of his life overseas as a career soldier – in India, Crete, South Africa – before his death at Kemmel, near Ypres in March 1915, when commanding his 3/Fusiliers battalion.

Returning from the Boer War, where his hair reportedly turned white when the man next to him was killed by a shell, he was concerned at the state of British unpreparedness for a major European

conflict, which had long been rumoured. Rugby defeats at the hands of touring All Blacks and Springboks in 1905/6 deepened a sense that young Edwardian Britons had 'gone soft'.

His play 'An Englishman's Home', dramatising invasion fears, was the stage sensation of 1909; the new Territorial Force set up recruiting stations outside theatres. Guy, stationed in Africa was unaware of his sudden celebrity: his brother Gerald, the impresario (who sang at Park Smoking Concerts) and playwright JM Barrie (of Peter Pan fame) had produced the play without his knowledge. Initially billed as 'A Patriot', news of the author's identity as Major Guy du Maurier DSO was carefully leaked to the press by Gerald. His fame spread from New York to Berlin.

In 1914 Guy's Fusiliers returned from Lucknow, India, went under canvas near Winchester and crossed the channel to France in early 1915. Guy's letters from the front to his wife Gwen so impressed novelist Henry James with their compassion and sensitivity that he had them privately published after his death.

Lt Colonel Guy du Maurier was killed on 9 March 1915. After making sure that all his men were in safety, he was killed by a shell bursting in the doorway of the farm building used as battalion headquarters. He was 49 - the oldest Park player to die, and once again commemorated on the new memorial in our clubhouse.

PARK COULDN'T HAVE DONE MORE

Cinderford 17

National 1

They could hardly have done more than this 8-try thumping of Cinderford to stake their claim for promotion. When news came through from Blackheath that Doncaster had won, it was all in vain and Park must prepare for another season in National 1. Disappointing, but this was an outstanding performance with which to end a very successful season and the players could leave the pitch proud of what they have achieved.

Park took this match by the throat from the kick off. Cinderford showed they were a pretty useful side when they were allowed to play - but they rarely were. Park's midfield tackling gave a platform from which they always looked dangerous.

Cinderford defended well against a couple of early attacking lineouts, but Park won a penalty in front of the posts. Instead of taking a certain 3 points they opted for the scrum. Number 8 Hugo Ellis peeled off the back and found winger Dom Shabbo outside him, who scored. Scott Sneddon's conversion made it 7-0.

Soon back on the attack, Park stormed through the middle to gain another penalty. This time it was hoofed for the corner to set up the catch and drive. Cinderford looked to have successfully defended the initial drive, but the ball came back to hooker Adam Bellamy who forced his way over, Sneddon again converting for 14-0.

Still enjoying a near-monopoly of the attacking play Park gained a penalty on half way and set up a drive towards the right-hand corner. Finding their way forward blocked they whipped the ball across the field through several pairs of hands, where winger Dave Vincent had an overlap on the left and went over in the corner for 19-0.

Cinderford did not simply lie down and a good attack saw them win an eminently kickable penalty close to the posts. Instead they went for the catch and drive. Park initially won the ball, but the visitors won a free-kick and set up a good position close to the line. Park centre Charles Broughton managed to dislodge the ball and before the visitors realised what was happening Vincent had grabbed it and sprinted away with a lone defender between him and the line. He offloaded to scrum half Jack Gash who went in under the posts unchallenged for the bonus point try two minutes short of half-time. Sneddon's conversion made it 26-0.

Still Park were not done with scoring, as stand-in lock Tom Baldwin charged through on the right for a score of 31-0 at the interval.

Park were back on the attack from kick off, reaching the 5 metre line with some neat handling before being penalised. A good



run through brought a penalty, hoofed to the corner only to be penalised at the line out. Shabbo chipped over a defender but was beaten to the ball. But it was Cinderford who got the score. Centre Jack Adams - excellent in a beaten side - charged through the middle and found winger Sam Baker outside him, who put his side on the scoreboard at 31-5.

This inspired the visitors



to give Park a hard time, and they forced Park back onto defence. Flanker George Mills made a powerful run through nearly reaching the line. Eventually the visitors lost control of the ball close to Park's left touchline, Vincent picked it up and sprinted nearly the length of the field, despite nearly being unbalanced by a despairing tap tackle, to score in the corner. Sneddon nailed an excellent touchline conversion for 38-5.

Park replied with a mighty drive almost to the visitors' line. Eventually the ball was released to the right where skipper Ellis, with the line at his mercy, passed instead to former skipper Darrell Ball, who had answered an SOS call to interrupt his Army duties to play – as he had promised he would - when his old club were short of numbers. Ball scored behind the posts and the genuine delight of his teammates said everything about the team spirit behind Park's success. Sneddon converted for 45-5.

Cinderford were not yet done for as Adams produced a piece of magic, chipping over the defence and gathering the ball himself for a super try to make it 45-10.

The visitors gave it everything, winning a penalty that was hammered to the corner. In defending the situation Broughton was adjudged to have intervened illegally to stop the move and sent to the sin bin. Cinderford attacked again but the final pass went to touch. Replacement winger Peter Cole made a good break out of defence to relieve matters for Park and eventually flanker Sam Shires seized a loose ball and sprinted over, under the posts, Sneddon's conversion making it 52-10.

Cinderford returned to the attack. Awarded a penalty they took a quick tap with Park's Ellis still prone. He tripped the player and was sent to join his teammate in the bin, leaving Park to see out the final minutes with only 13 men. Cinderford piled on the pressure, switching the ball from right to left where Adams came onto the ball to bag his second try. Replacement Mark Davies slotted over a very quickly taken conversion for 52-17, leaving his side a minute in which to bag a 4-try bonus point.

Even reduced to 13 men it was Park who looked more like scoring. A powerful run through the middle by flanker Harry Broadbent drew a good last ditch tackle. Park retained possession until the clock ran down and then pragmatically hoofed the ball to touch, bringing down the curtain on a season that – despite ending in disappointment – was hugely successful.
