The Force for Progress is more than a scorecard for legislators; it is also a reflection of the collective work of California's Labor Movement.

We believe in economic security for all workers, whether or not they are in a union. Among our finest accomplishments in 2012 was winning a law along with the Attorney General to stop banks from foreclosing on families who are struggling to stay in their homes and modify their loans.

Additionally, we mandated that corporations be responsible for conditions in their warehouses where they have out-sourced the operations to third-party labor contractors, and required that state call center contracts create jobs here in California instead of offshore.

The Federation also negotiated directly with employers to restore fairness to the workers' compensation system and increase benefits to injured workers.

The Force for Progress also highlights challenges to the pro-worker agenda. Faced with an army of corporate lobbyists, many legislators chose to side with big business, not with working families. You can see the examples here. Nevertheless, we made some real progress: protections for homeowners, accountability for the banks, approval for high-speed rail, enforcement in the underground economy, and new rights for temporary workers.

This year the Force for Progress has special meaning. For the third time in 14 years, California Labor faced an initiative intended to silence workers and magnify the power of corporations. Our members rose up in historic numbers to defeat Proposition 32, and simultaneously

carried the state to other big electoral wins. We can again thank the enemies of organized labor for motivating workers to mobilize for the elections.

Our members, and the millions of workers who fight everyday for safer worksites, fairness on the job, and a path out of poverty, understand that the purpose of building political power is to make a difference in the lives of California families. Together we are California Labor and we are committed to restoring the California Dream of opportunity and fairness for all.

4. Prevailing wage coverage. AB 1598

(Buchanan). Allows for modular office system assembly and disassembly to be covered by prevailing wage laws.

5. Protect fact-finding process. AB 1606

(**Perea**). Clarifies that public sector employers cannot bypass the fact-finding process by declaring impasse.

6. Expand access to treatment. AB 1687

(Fond) Would have expanded an injured worker's

8. Temporary worker paystubs. AB 1744

(Lowenthal). Requires that temporary worker paystubs show the rate of pay and hours worked by assignment and that workers be provided a notice with client name and address.

9. Charter school benefit equity. AB 1819

(Ammiano). Would have ensured that charter school employees could access the same public retirement benefits as other school employees in the CalSTRS system.

10. Expand employment opportunities.

AB 1831 (Dickinson). Would have required cities and counties to delay criminal background inquiries until after an applicant's initial employment screening.

11. Protect warehouse workers. AB 1855

14. California Family Rights Act expansion.

AB 2039 (Swanson). Would have expanded the California Family Rights Act to allow workers jobprotected leave to care for seriously ill adult children, siblings, grandparents, grandchildren, and parentsin-law.

15. Call center job tracking. AB 2217 (Pan).

Would have required call centers to disclose their location and give consumers the right to ask to be transferred to a call center based in the US.

16. Private school disclosures. AB 2296

(**Block**). Improves disclosure to prospective students of private post-secondary schools.

17. Permanent status classified employees.

AB 2307. (Butler). Protects permanent status for classified school employees who have passed a single probationary period.

ASSEMBLY: 46-27 (5/17/12) SENATE: 22-14 (8/20/12)

18. Strengthen heat illness protection.

AB 2346 (Butler). Would have strengthened and codified outdoor heat illness regulations for farmworkers.

VETOED BY THE GOVERNOR

ASSEMBLY: 41-28 (5/31/12) SENATE: 21-12 (8/27/12)

19. Uniform disclosure for contractors.

AB 2389 (Lowenthal). Would have required that uniforms worn by private contractors doing outsourced work for companies or public agencies disclose the name of the contractor.

ASSEMBLY: 52-22 (5/21/12) SENATE: 21-14 (8/23/12)

20. Corporate tax database. AB 2439 (Eng).

Would have required the public disclosure of how much individual corporations pay in state taxes and if they chose the elective Single Sales Factor tax break.

21. Keep state call centers in California.

AB 2508 (Bonilla). Will keep call centers for public benefit programs in California and will bring off-shored call centers back to the state to create jobs for Californians.

22. Car wash worker wage lien. AB 2517 (Eng).

Would have created a wage lien to protect car wash workers from wage theft.

23. Prevent predatory billing.

SB 359 (Hernandez)/SB 1285 (Hernandez). Would have prevented predatory billing practices at certain hospital chains.

SENATE: 21-15 (5/14/12) **ASSEMBLY:** 51-26 (8/31/12) (SB 1285 passed the Senate floor then amended into SB 359.)

24. Restrict PLA bans. SB 829 (Rubio). Protects the ability of local governments to consider Project Labor Agreements on public works projects to ensure high-quality construction.

SENATE: 25-13 (4/19/12) ASSEMBLY: 50-23 (4/12/12)

25. Workers' compensation reform. SB 863

(de León). Comprehensive reform of the workers' compensation system that increased benefits for permanently disabled workers and reduced medical treatment delays for everyone.

SENATE: 34-4 (8/31/12) ASSEMBLY: 72-5 (8/31/12)

26. Homeowners' Bill of Rights. SB 900 (Leno/ Eng). Enacted the Homeowners' Bill of Rights, which prohibited banks from foreclosing on a family in loan

prohibited banks from foreclosing on a family in loan modification and increased penalties for filing false mortgage documents.

27. CSU and UC executive compensation

caps. SB 967 (Yee). Would have reined in excessive compensation increases for executives at CSU and UC at a time when workers' wages and benefits at those institutions are being cut and tuition is increasing.

28. High-Speed Rail funding. SB 1029 (Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review). Appropriated funds to begin construction of the high-speed rail line.

29. Economic development program. SB 1156

(Steinberg). Would have created a new economic development program to replace Redevelopment that promotes good jobs with living wages and benefits.

VETOED BY THE GOVERNOR

ASSEMBLY: 50-27 (8/28/12) SENATE: 21-15 (5/13/12)

30. Disclosure of CEO pensions. SB 1208

(Leno). Would have required publicly held corporations to report the top five highest retirement compensation packages for corporate executives.

ASSEMBLY: 32-36 (8/21/12) SENATE: 21-15 (5/30/12) DIED ON ASSEMBLY FLOOR

31. Retirement savings plan for private sector.

SB 1234 (de León). Creates a portable retirement savings account for private sector workers pooled at the state level to help increase retirement security for workers.

33. Right to Work for Less. AB 2495 (Grove).

34. Deregulation of VoIP technology. SB 1161

(Padilla). Deregulates Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) telephone service, the fastest growing phone service, enabling telecom corporations to cut jobs and erode worker safety measures.

(CLF was neutral at time of Senate Floor vote.)

35. Require workers to get vaccine or wear mask. SB 1318 (Wolk). Would have forced health care workers to wear surgical masks while working if they did not or could not receive the flu vaccine.

(CLF was neutral at time of Assembly Floor vote.)

36. Restrict Teacher due process. SB 1530

(Padilla). Would have weakened the due process rights of teachers.
