2009 REPORT TO THE COMMUNITY



WELCOME

Reflecting on this past year of financial challenges, we are struck by the resilience, creativity and determination of people in our region. Last year as we wrote this letter we faced an uncertain future and RACC vowed to do everything possible to support artists and arts organizations through this tough time. While the future remains murky, we have positive things to report from this past year - details of which run through this annual report.

Thanks to enlightened and committed elected leaders, RACC held its entire grants program whole and supplemented it with Work for Art dollars, which increased by 19%. People in our region care and they give.

The Transit Mall reopened with 10 previously sited artworks cleaned, conserved and re-installed in new locations. Joining them were 14 new artworks, creating a sizable public collection of Northwest sculptures. RACC was delighted to partner with TriMet throughout this four-year undertaking and will be caretakers of all the public art on the mall. Americans for the Arts recently announced that RACC's Public Art Program is one of the top five award-winning programs nationally, which makes us very proud.

The Right Brain Initiative continues to grow. All 20 original schools returned and Portland Public Schools was able to add three new ones. We anticipate having ever-greater evidence of the value of integrated arts learning at the end of this first full year of programming. We thank all of our partners, funders and participants for this growing success.

The Creative Advocacy Network was launched, and its ranks of supporters—including elected officials, corporate leaders, artists, educators, arts organizations and individuals—continue to grow as we work toward our goal of \$15-20 million in new and dedicated arts funding. In hard economic times polling once again showed that arts accessibility and arts education are highly valued by regional voters. Please become active in this crucial movement.

Let's all keep participating, supporting and doing all we can to ensure that the arts and artists flourish.

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OUR ROLE

The Regional Arts & Culture Council (RACC) is an independent, not-for-profit 501(c)(3) arts service organization that works to integrate arts and culture in all aspects of community life. RACC's service area includes more than 1.5 million residents, 250 not-for-profit arts and culture organizations and countless artists of every discipline in the Portland, Oregon metropolitan region including Clackamas, Multnomah and Washington Counties.

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ADVOCACY

RACC works to build support and resources for a strong arts and culture community. We advocate for increased community participation and investment in the arts.

THE FOLLOWING ARE SOME OF THE ADVOCACY EFFORTS UNDERTAKEN IN 2009:

PUBLIC FUNDING

LOCAL ARTS FUNDING

RACC, Business for Culture & the Arts (BCA) and the Creative Advocacy Network (CAN) gathered wide community support to ensure that arts funding was maintained at current levels in all jurisdictions, including the City of Portland, Metro, and Clackamas, Multnomah and Washington Counties. RACC also secured public financing from the City of Portland to support the new Creative Advocacy Network and to expand The Right Brain Initiative in 2009-10.

DEDICATED FUNDING

RACC is working closely with CAN to advance the goal of securing long-term, dedicated funding for arts and culture in the region within the next one-five years.

STATE ARTS FUNDING

RACC supports the growth and development of the Oregon Cultural Trust, a permanent endowment to increase cultural participation in the arts, heritage and humanities across the state. In the spring of 2009, the Oregon legislature "recaptured" \$1.8 million from the Cultural Trust's license plate revenues to fill a budget gap. RACC rallied constituents to protest this action. Although the legislature proceeded with the maneuver, arts advocates successfully raised the profile of the Cultural Trust and gained new legislators' commitments to support the Trust in the future.

NATIONAL ARTS FUNDING

In partnership with Americans for the Arts (AFTA), RACC sent Action Alerts regarding Congressional action on arts funding, including National Endowment for the Arts (NEA), National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) and federal arts education programs. RACC also lobbied for \$50 million in arts stimulus funding to be included in the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act; the NEA and the Oregon Arts Commission have since distributed these funds to support jobs at nonprofit arts organizations across the country, including \$402,000 to organizations in RACC's service area.

VISIBILITY AND COLLABORATION

RECOGNITION OF THE ARTS

RACC celebrates the importance of the arts all year long, especially in March for Oregon Arts Education Month and in October for National Arts & Humanities Month.

GREEN GIFT GUIDE

RACC supported a collaboration within the arts community to give tickets, memberships and other performing arts experiences as part of a waste-free holiday season. The Green Gift Guide was distributed to more than 15,000 area residents and promoted through local retailers, schools, non-profits and online at www.ecometro.com.

HULAHUB

RACC supported the creation of a new social networking site and iPhone app for arts and culture. Developed by Portland-based ticketing company Box Office Tickets Inc, HulaHub provides a single consolidated calendar of events, organizations, profiles, reviews, ticketing and blogs. Artists and arts organizations can enter their events into the system for free, and visitors can search for venues by type of performance space, capacity and other parameters. GRANTMAKERS IN THE ARTS

RACC hosted a series of meetings with local foundations and arts organizations in its continuing efforts to advocate for increased private investments in arts and culture. Janet Brown, GIA's executive director, visited Portland on December 8, 2009.

ART SPARK

RACC coordinated 12 Art Spark gatherings in 2009 that were attended by more than 600 artists and arts supporters. These monthly gatherings held at venues throughout the city give artists the opportunity to meet each other and learn more about the local arts community. Online at www.portlandartspark.com.



WORK FOR ART

Work for Art is a collaborative fundraising, advocacy and outreach effort that raises money and awareness for more than 80 regional arts and culture organizations each year, primarily through employee charitable giving campaigns and other unique partnerships with local businesses in the region. The program cultivates new arts donors and educates employees on the vital role that arts and culture organizations play in building strong communities.

Work for Art raised a total of \$665,863 in the annual campaign ending June 30, 2009—a 19% increase from the 2007-08 campaign. This total includes gifts from workplace giving campaigns, corporations, foundations, individuals and a public matching challenge fund.

Work for Art also encourages more citizens to participate in arts and culture by providing affordable access to hundreds of arts and culture events in the region. Donors who give \$60 or more receive an Arts Card, which provides 2-for-1 ticket offers for events and performances at more than 50 different arts organizations.

Two percent of major city and county construction projects is dedicated to public art.

GIFTS

Building and caring for the Public Art Collection is a huge undertaking. Fortunately, RACC, the City of Portland and Multnomah County have generous allies. Individuals, businesses and other groups have made important and varied contributions to our public art collection. This year, we highlight the unique relationship that RACC and the City have with the Oregon Holocaust Resource Center, an organization that was established to maintain Washington Park's Oregon Holocaust Memorial in perpetuity. The Center funds all the maintenance that RACC provides and supports the City and consultants to preserve this important monument for future generations.

MAINTENANCE & RE-SITING

As the steward for the City of Portland and Multnomah County Public Art Collections, RACC devotes substantial resources to maintaining and preserving the region's cultural assets.

A significant amount of work goes into determining the location of all permanently sited public art, but as the urban landscape grows and changes, RACC must occasionally make adjustments and move large pieces. This decision is never made lightly, especially if the piece was commissioned for a particular site, but these moves are made with context and public accessibility foremost in mind.

RACC is currently working with Portland Parks & Recreation to move Manuel Izquierdo's *Silver Dawn* sculpture (1980) in Wallace Park from its current location inside the off-leash dog area to the northeast corner of the park.

PORTLAND TRANSIT MALL

The opening of the new MAX Green Line on Portland's downtown transit mall is the culmination of a four-year management and maintenance collaboration between RACC and TriMet. In consultation with RACC, TriMet commissioned and installed 14 new sculptures by Northwest artists along 5th and 6th Avenues, all of which will become part of the City's Public Art Collection in 2010. Each piece received a thorough review from a professional art conservator before it was fabricated, and individualized maintenance recommendations were developed. RACC also teamed up with TriMet on the reinstallation of 10 existing sculptures sited on the original transit mall in 1977. All of these returning works received conservation before they were re-sited on the mall.

THE RIGHT BRAIN INITIATIVE

The Right Brain Initiative is a partnership of schools, local governments, foundations, businesses and the cultural community working together to ensure that the arts are part of the education of every K-8 student in the Portland tri-county region.

Imagine a world where kids learn geometry through Picasso's cubist period. And walk in the shoes of Thomas Jefferson by penning a school-wide play. And even understand ecosystems by making a neighborhood mosaic. That's The Right Brain Initiative.

From February through May, teachers and artists collaborated on 40 unique, arts-integrated residency projects. More than 9,000 students and 486 teachers from 20 schools across four school districts welcomed artists to their classrooms, selecting their "arts partners" from 50 providers of every discipline.

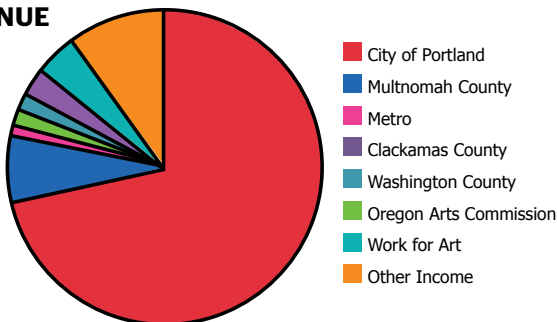

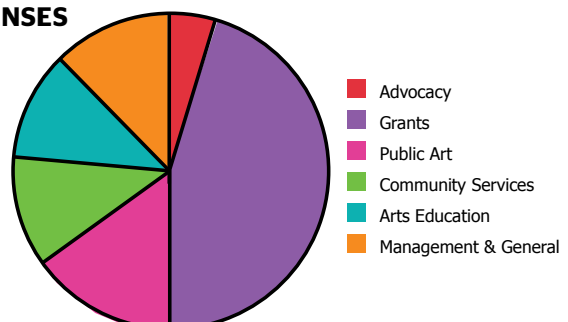

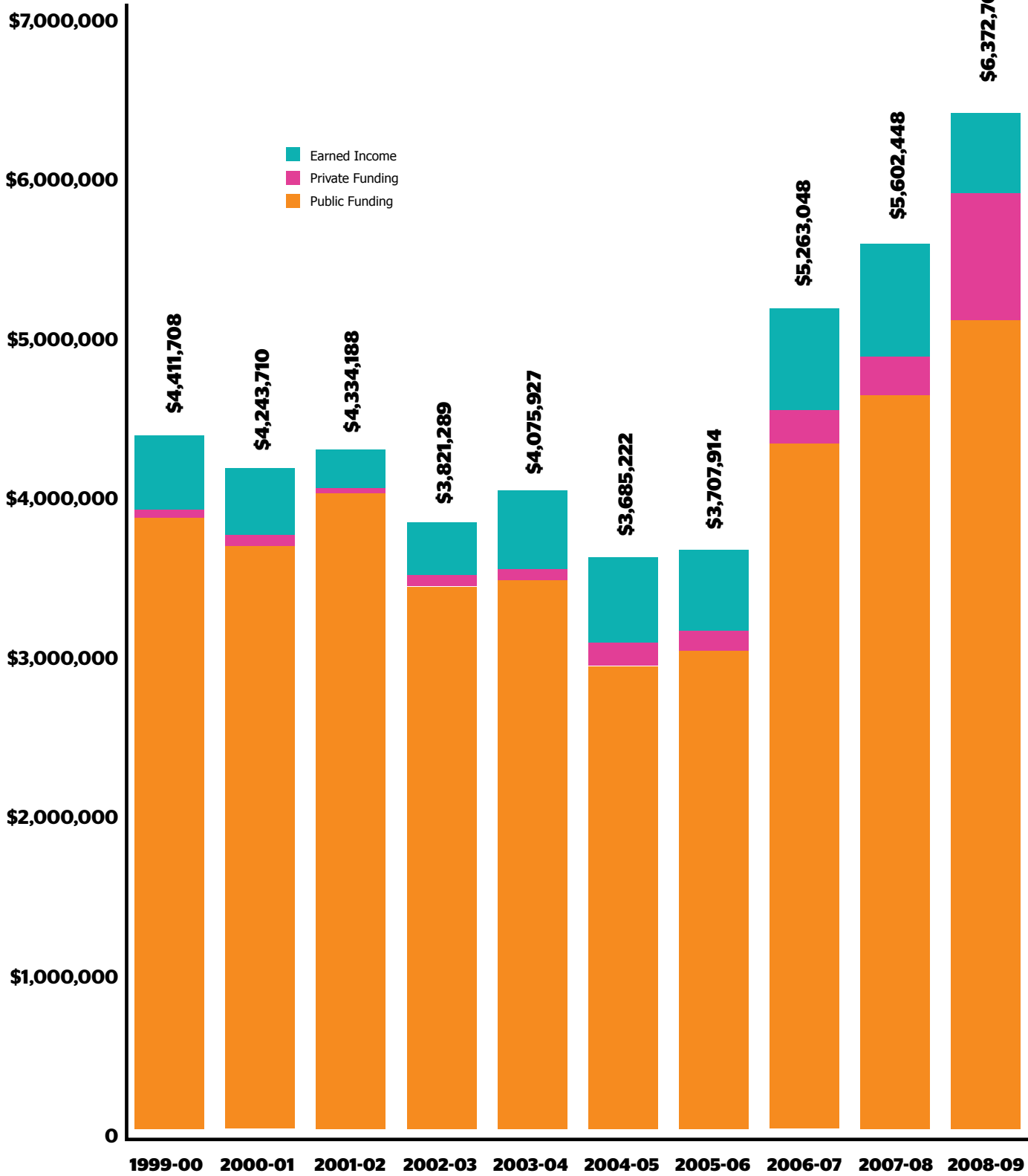
