New Volunteers Are Sought By Planned Parenthood

Volunteers serve on the Speaker's Bureau, going into the community to present the Planned Parenthood philosophy. They serve as receptionists, nurse's aides, physician's aides or as fund raisers in the several clinics. All volunteers are given orientation before proceeding to on-the-job training with staff members.

Although Planned Parenthood receives both state and federal government grants, it also raises money from private sources, enabling the agency to serve all those who seek its services, whether or not they can pay the full fee. Volunteers help keep the traditional method of private fund-raising held through a local mail campaign which this year will be held in early fall. To augment this, Planned Parenthood will have its first fund-raising Renaissance Day, on March 29. Experts will demonstrate and advise the audience in the proper use of hair coloring, hair styling and cosmetics. Demonstrations and consultations will be followed by a lunch and fashion show given by a local boutique.

The demands for Planned Parenthood's services have increased more than ten percent each year. For many women, visits to Planned Parenthood clinics are their only way to obtain proper health care. Much of the work of Planned Parenthood clinics is referral of patients to other social and medical services.

Most recently, Planned Parenthood of Union County has pioneered in opening clinics to serve teenage patients, and training its clinic supervisors to serve as Family Planning Nurse Practitioners. The Nurse Practitioners relieve physicians of much routine work in the clinics. This is a new concept in medical practice and one particularly useful in a family planning setting.

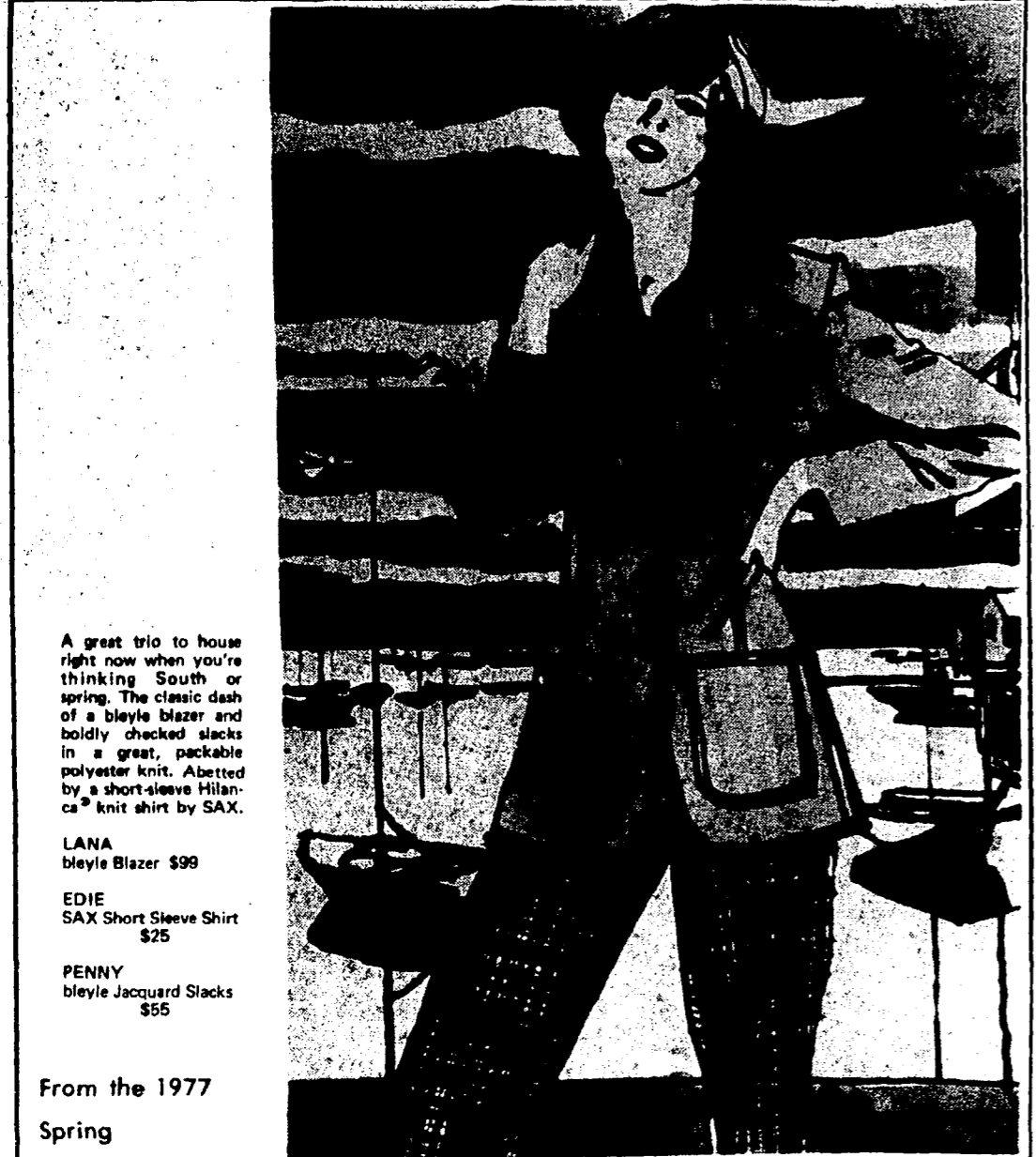

EVE Workshop

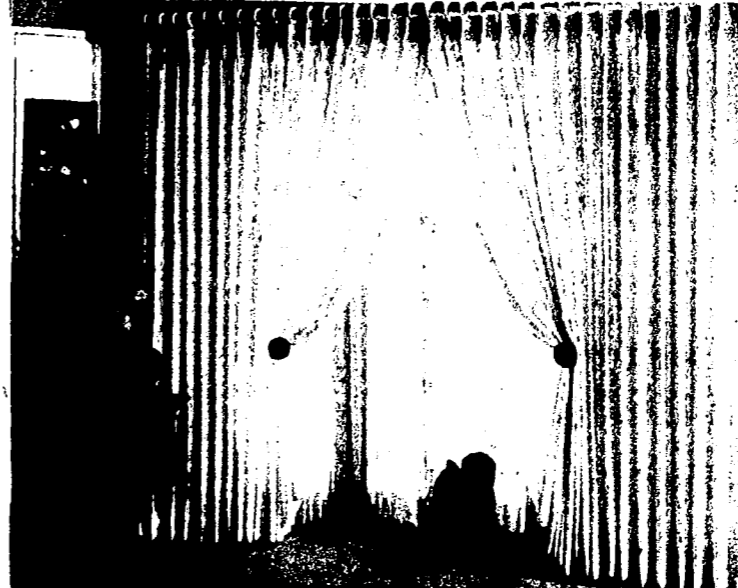

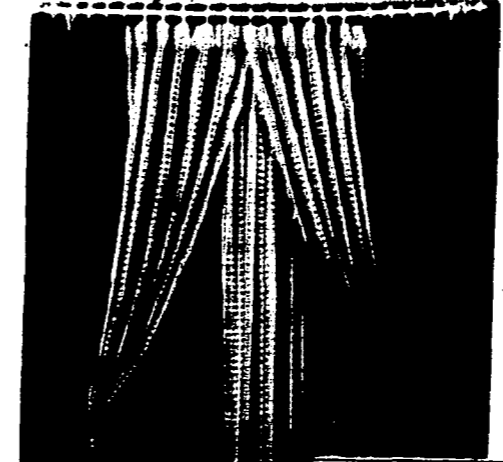
