### 7. Description

Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Commissary Building is a two story structure measuring approximately 80'x 60'. Built of Indiana limestone, the overall appearance suggests a castellated fortress.

The rusticated limestone walls are tapered at the foundation for additional structural support. All windows are 4/4 double hung wood sash with smooth limestone heads and sills. Two 12' arched doorways are centered on the north and south facades. Smooth dressed limestone stringcourses separate the foundation, first, and second stories. The use of rusticated limestone, corner turrets and butresses, and cornice add to the fortress like appearance of the building.

The first floor interior is one large storage room, with an office and storage valut in the eastern quarter of the building. The office area was modernized in the 1960's, with the addition of a dropped ceiling and panelling. A hand powered elevator and one set of wooden stairs lead to the second floor. The second floor interior also has one large storage room; however, partitions have been added over the years to provide secured storage space. These changes have been minimal, and the overall character of the interior remains intact.

Alterations to the original exterior design include the addition of a mansarded porch roof over the east entrance.

1903 Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

> The Commissary Building is the oldest permanent building remaining on the grounds in Camp Lincoln, an Illinois National Guard property. It was constructed by the Culver Stone Colmpany, which was responsible for most of the stone construction in central Illinois. James Culver was a General in the Illinois Militia, the predecessor to the National Guard.

> Camp Lincoln was established in 1886 as a training center for the The site selected, 160 acres in northwest Illinois State Militia. Springfield, was chosen over other Illinois communities vying for the camp, due to the subscription raised by the citizens of Springfield to help defray expenses. Of the \$18,100 expended for the Camp, \$3,100 was raised by the City. The Camp was named in honor of Abraham Lincoln by Governor Richard Oglesby.

> During its early years, the Camp was the site of annual encampments of the State Militia. Troops from throughout the state arrived during the summer months to receive their military training. These encampments were also great social events for the city. Dress parades attracted many onlookers, while parties and socials were sponsored by leading Springfield citizens.

> Prior to the construction of the Commissary Building in 1903, Camp activities were confined to tents or temporary wooden barracks. building, the first permanent building on the grounds, was demolished in the 1920's. The Commissary Building is, therefore, the only building remaining with a direct association with the early history of the State Militia and Camp Lincoln. The Commissary has served a number of purposes, including hospital, barracks, quartermaster storage, headquarters, etc.. During World War I it served as a physical examination center. Currently used for storage, plans call for turning the Commissary into a military museum.

> The Commissary is also directly associated with the Culver Stone Company, a prominent Springfield industry of the late 19th/early 20th Centuries. James Culver's position as General in the Militia certainly contributed to his selection as contractor for the Commissary. reputation of his stone works was also a factor. Established in 1887, by 1889 the Culver Stone Company was operating out of a large complex at 9th and Madison in Springfield. Considered to be one of the finest stone companys in the Midwest, Culver was responsible for a number of major public buildings, churches, monuments and private residences in Springfield and around the State.

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Among the major buildings by the Culver Company was the Illinois Arsenal at 2nd and Monroe in Springfield. Like the Comissary, and Culver's own stoneworks building, the Arsenal was built of rusticated limestone, and its fortress appearance was accentuated by battlements, turrets, and crenelation. The Arsenal burned in 1934, and the Culver Stoneworks was demolished in 1983. The Commissary is the only building of this style by Culver remaining in Springfield.

Samuel J. Hanes, a Springfield architect and contractor, was also involved in the construction of the Commissary. Hanes is most noted for supervising the insertion of a new first floor under the Old State Capitol when it was enlarged for the Sangamon County Courthouse in 1899.
