Welcome to a new school year! It's hard to believe that we are into October already—and harder still to believe that eight years have passed since WCS was first awarded accreditation status from the Association of Christian Schools International (ACSI) and the North Central Association Commission on School Improvement (NCA). Chartered in 1973 by the Ohio Department of Education, WCS has grown to become one of the largest private schools in the state. In the Ohio River Valley Region of ACSI (OH-KY-WV) only 19 percent (49/263) of schools have earned accreditation status with ACSI, similar to the national percentage of all (3,750) ACSI schools. We are proud that WCS is among this group as we stand committed to continued professional development of our school system.

During the first week of October, our campus hosted the ACSI/NCA accreditation site team who were tasked with the review of our school program in areas such as the instructional program, personnel procedures, student services, facilities,

planning and of course finance. This team of eight educators spent three days on campus interacting with students, parents, employees and other stakeholders of our educational ministry. At the end of the visit, the site team provided words of encouragement regarding our school, as well as ideas for continued improvement.

In recent years, NCA has changed their maximum term award for K–12 schools from seven years down to five years. Later this fall, we will be notified of their recommendation, which means that by 2015 we will be back in "preparation mode" for our next visit. While the accreditation process requires many hours of hard work by our faculty and staff, I have over the years found this type of third-party insight to be invaluable.

I continue to be excited about what God has in store for WCS in the years to come as we continue to hone our vision and seek His leading for the future. Thanks as always for your continued prayers and support on behalf of the faculty, staff, and board.

Each spring the sixth graders spend a few months studying astronomy and space travel, then they head down to the US Space and Rocket Center in Huntsville, Alabama to see the largest collection of space "stuff" in the United States! The US Space and Rocket Center is an interactive museum designed to teach about space travel and includes an amazing IMAX theater, a climbing wall, and an outdoor "Rocket Park" with full-sized rockets from the small Mercury to the giant Saturn V, and a full-sized space shuttle prototype.

The four-day trip begins early on a Tuesday morning in May with a five-hour drive to Mammoth Cave National Park in Kentucky. Although Mammoth Cave doesn't really fit in with our space theme, it's too exciting an attraction to pass by. Mammoth Cave is the largest cave system in the world, and many of it's passages have yet to be explored. As we explore the "mammoth" underground caverns, narrow passages, and


What has become an annual "Reader's Roundtable" was the inaugural event in the newly refurbished Westview Library.

Story of Survival

Recently, Westview students were treated to a visiting speaker for chapel. On Wednesday, September 14, Blake Haxton shared his story of survival and the importance of the Body of Christ coming together in time of need.

Two and a half years ago, when Blake was a senior at Upper Arlington High School, he noticed a bruise on his leg; within mere hours of going to the doctor, Blake found himself in the hospital fighting for his life. That bruise was the onset of necrotizing fasciitis, commonly referred to as flesh-eating bacteria. As his organs began shutting down one by one, his family began to plan his funeral, yet the Body of Christ responded by praying and interceding for Blake. After undergoing surgeries to amputate his legs, enduring other radical surgical interventions, and hours of physical rehab, this young man, who was headed to Harvard on a crew scholarship, was able to share his story with Westview students.

Best wishes to our WCHS Science Teacher of 18 years, Deb Walton, who retired this year. Mrs. Walton brought a wealth of experience into her biology classes. She previously worked for the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, where she composed documents on local land use management for critical areas and then taught land use planning education courses for local officials.

Deb earned her BA from Wittenberg University, her Master's degree from Duke and

The Ohio State University, and completed postgrad work at the University of Wisconsin, Georgia Tech, and The Ohio State University School of Law.

While at WCS, she was known for her love of all God's creatures—especially birds, salamanders, saltwater fish, and her hatching chicks. She led trips to study marine biology on the Roatan Peninsula, contrasting ecosystems in Costa Rica, and wetland studies at Darby Creek. She inspired dozens of future doctors and nurses. Every year she had students accepted into the World Food Prize, which is dedicated to increasing the amount, quantity, and availability of food.

Deb continues to do adjunct teaching at Mount Vernon Nazarene University and is involved with Licking County Soil and Water District, where she has been elected chairman of the board.

Blake humbly explained that God is the one who spared his life and how important it was for him that the Body held him up in prayer during that hard season almost three years ago. The students listened to Blake share his story of God's faithfulness in what appeared to be a hopeless situation. Blake encouraged the students to develop and nurture their Christian friendships while at WCS. Currently, Blake is a junior at The Ohio State University and helps coach Upper Arlington's crew team.

How We Stack Up

The Guidance Department of Worthington Christian High School is pleased to announce the following academic achievements for the 2010–11 school year.

Eighty of our high school students took the ACT (College Entrance Exam), earning a median score of 24.7. Our "core score," meaning students taking four or more years of English and three or more years of math, social studies, and natural sciences, scored a median of 25.7.

This is a one-point increase, which is equivalent to a four percent overall increase compared to a perfect score of 36. SAT results are pending as of this printing.

AP Test results:

WCHS had our highest number of Advanced Placement tests taken in May—61 AP tests were taken by 43 students in the areas of Calculus, English Language and Composition, English Literature and Composition, US History, Biology, Chemistry, Spanish, and Studio Art. Following is a breakdown of the results:

6 Tests—earned "5"

12 tests—earned "4"

20 tests—earned "3"

38/63 = 60% earned a passing grade and possible college credit. The following students scored a 5 on their AP Literature tests:

Ohio Graduation Test in March:

Eighty-two students took the OGTs during our testing in March of this year. WCHS is proud to announce that nearly 93 percent of all test-takers have passed ALL five of the tests. Following is a breakdown of those results:

95% of our students were above proficient in Reading 96% of our students were above proficient in Math 95% of our students were above proficient in Writing 87% of our students were above proficient in Science 91% of our students were above proficient in Social Studies

This results in a WCS **92.8 percent passing rate.** This compares us quite favorably with Olentangy High School **(91),** Upper Arlington City School District **(90.5),** Dublin City School District **(88.2),** Worthington City School District **(86.1),**

Westerville City School District (80.8), Big Walnut High School (80.2), Buckeye Valley High School (80.1), and Columbus City School District (41.0).

The State passing rate is **75 percent** (with 69.5 percent in all five categories compared to our **93 percent**).

Beyond high school:

Generally speaking, 95 percent of our students go to fouryear institutions with three to four percent community college, and one percent military or working. This compares favorably with a March 9, 2011 report from *US News* which found that 75 percent of middle and high school students plan on going to college.

ParentsWeb Tech Tips

As a WCS parent, have you successfully logged into the WCS ParentsWeb system this year? ParentsWeb is a key web site resource that parents should use to monitor the academic progress for every class their students take at WCS, especially in WCS Grades 6 through 12. The link to the WCS ParentsWeb login screen is: https://www.renweb.com/rwlogin/ParentsWebLogin.aspx?District=wcs-oh

- Returning WCS parents who used ParentsWeb last year should note that this year each WCS parent and student needs to use a unique ParentsWeb 'username' and password to log in to ParentsWeb. We recommend that parents set their ParentsWeb username to be the same as their 'primary' email address that is in their ParentsWeb account.
- Did you know each WCS parent can have two different email addresses defined in their ParentsWeb account? One email address is known as the 'primary' email address. In most cases this primary email address is the same as a parent's ParentsWeb login username. Whenever a Renweb email is sent by someone at WCS to parents, the email will be sent to both the primary and secondary email addresses for each parent recipient. To define a secondary email address in ParentsWeb: Login to ParentsWeb, click on SCHOOL INFORMATION, then WEBFORMS, then FAMILY DEMOGRAPHIC FORMS, then CUSTODIAL PARENT button, then type in an email address in the 'Email Address 2' data field.

• Some parents have reported issues when trying to view Homework information for their students on ParentsWeb.

Here are some techie browser specific tips: parents who use the browser Internet Explorer 9 (IE9) should try to clear their Temp Internet files and cache if they experience problems viewing homework or other info on ParentsWeb. Parents who use IE7 with Windows XP should try to upgrade their IE7 to IE8 if they are having issues viewing homework. Parents with MAC computers need to use the Firefox 2.0 browser or higher on their MACs, instead of using the Safari browser that comes standard on MACs.

- Did you know that parents can set preferences in their ParentsWeb account that can cause Progress Reports for each of their students to be automatically emailed to the parents on a daily or weekly basis? Login to ParentsWeb, click on SCHOOL INFORMATION, then WEBFORMS, then FAMILY DEMOGRAPHIC FORMS, then CUSTODIAL PARENT button, then review the settings under the AUTO EMAIL settings in the PREFERENCES section.
- Many parents like to print monthly lunch calendars for their students, but this is currently not easy for parents to do in ParentsWeb. As a workaround for this issue, it is our intent to email a one page lunch calendar to parents at the beginning of each month that would be easy to print.



Could we persuade students and alumni to play a benefit





concert, donating the money raised to help provide clean drinking water and food in the Dominican Republic? Even if we planned it, would enough people show up to justify the event?

The response was overwhelming! On March 5, just a few weeks after the inception of the idea, Twentyone Pilots and LUX played in front of hundreds of students and fans in our own chapel. Those \$5 admissions began to stack up until the total raised was more than \$2,000! This effort was one of many that put the fundraising total for the trip well over the goal and eventually beyond \$10,000!

Special thanks to **Tyler Joseph** and **Nick Thomas** (class of '08) and Chris Salih from Twentyone Pilots, as well as **Jessie Johnson**, **Tucker Rochte** ('09), **Alex Johnson** ('11) and Cameron Rochte from LUX for their willingness to play the show without compensation. The concert was a lot of fun, and the many students and music fans walked away not only having had a good time but also participating in something much larger than themselves. These young men testify to the work of God in their lives continuing to serve through the talents with which God has blessed them.

WCS Football Program Takes Momentum

Worthington Christian has announced it will start a football program. The fall of 2012 will see a middle school team take the field. In 2013, a JV team will be added, and in 2014 the Warriors will field its first varsity team.

Since the announcement was made last December, a steering

committee has formed to help give feedback during the process. In addition, WCS has hired its first head football coach, Brian Stier. Coach Stier will coach the middle school team next fall and move up with the program, becoming the school's first varsity coach in 2014. The announcement has also opened the door to potential league opportunities in the future.

Beyond the obvious "how can you live in Ohio and not do football?" there are several other reasons why WCS is committed to adding football as the school's 15th varsity sport. Adding a football program is consistent with the school mission statement in that it will provide more outreach and discipleship opportunities. Adding football also provides more opportunities for students (in addition to football, cheerleading, marching band, student events, etc). Football builds on the tradition of excellence set forth by so many past students and families at WCS. In addition, football can help increase enrollment, expand funding opportunities, increase school spirit, build community, and provide more options for league membership.



At this time we are also exploring the possibility of renovating our outdoor sports complex. Potential additions would include artificial field turf, a bleacher and press box system and an all-in-one building. The R. Fred Hogue Center is a state-of-the-art indoor athletic and recreation facility. Our vision involves creating an outdoor sports complex that matches the welcoming atmosphere and overall quality of our indoor facilities.

Field turf would benefit our soccer and football programs as well as baseball and softball teams. Currently, the stadium field is used only as a competition field. Field turf would allow for year-round use, and essentially add two acres of land to our grounds, allowing teams to not only compete on the field, but practice as well.

Our current bleachers will not support a large crowd. The proposed system includes a 1,500 seat capacity that would be wheel-chair accessible. A press box customized with WCS red and gold would sit at the top. The all-in-one building would centralize all outdoor activities, housing concessions, restrooms, and locker rooms.

These upgrades would enhance the overall experience for current students and families and build on the long history of excellence at WCS, raising the level of school spirit throughout the year, and create the energy needed as we build momentum in the future.
