### CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

➤ Drafted by the Packers with the No. 21 overall selection in the first round. Became just the second safety ever drafted by Green Bay in the first round, joining Alabama S George Teague (No. 29 overall in 1993).

➤ Appeared in 38 games with 20 starts in his three seasons at Alabama and registered 100 tackles (58 solo), including four tackles for a loss, seven interceptions, a forced fumble and 17 passes defended.

➤ Was a consensus All-America selection in 2013 as a junior, earning first-team recognition from *The Associated Press*, the Football Writers Association of America and *Sporting News*.

➤ Appeared in 11 games with 10 starts in '13 and registered a career-best 52 tackles (30 solo), including a career-high 3½ tackles for a loss, two INTs and six passes defended.

➤ Earned first-team All-Southeastern Conference honors from the coaches and second-team recognition from AP.

➤ Tied for the SEC lead with a career-high five INTs as a sophomore in 2012 on his way to earning third-team All-American and first-team All-SEC honors from *The NFL Draft Report*.

➤ Intercepted his fifth pass of the season and his third in as many games in Alabama's win over Notre Dame in the 2013 BCS National Championship Game.

➤ Appeared in all 13 games in 2011, one of seven true freshmen to earn playing time for Alabama's BCS National Championship team.

➤ Was rated the No. 1 safety in the nation by *Rivals.com* and *Scout.com* as a senior in 2010 at Dr. Phillips High School in Orlando, Fla.

➤ Selected as an Under Armour All-American and as a Super-Prep All-American as a senior. Was ranked as the top player in the state of Florida by *Rivals.com*.

➤ Registered 112 tackles, including 10 tackles for a loss, six sacks, four forced fumbles, two interceptions and 10 passes defended as a senior. On offense, carried the ball 23 times for 244 yards (10.6 avg.) and three TDs.



### CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

- Drafted by the Packers with the No. 53 overall selection in the second round, joining Henry Ellard (L.A. Rams, second round, No. 32 overall, 1983) as the only Fresno State wide receivers ever to be picked in the first two rounds of the draft.
- Set Fresno State career records for receptions (233) and TD catches (38), despite playing just two seasons for the Bulldogs.
- Started all 26 games he appeared in for the Bulldogs and caught 233 passes for 3,030 yards (13.0 avg.) and 38 TDs.
- Caught at least one TD pass in 22 of 26 career games, highlighted by a streak of 11 straight games with a TD grab (school and Mountain West records).
- Posted 13 games with 100-plus receiving yards during his career, a school record.
- Led the nation in receptions (131) and receptions per game (10.1), while ranking second in the country in receiving yards (1,718) and receiving yards per game (132.2) as a sophomore in 2013.
- Caught 24 TD passes in '13, eight more than any player in the country and the most in school and Mountain West Conference history. Ranks No. 4 in single-season FBS history with the 24 TD grabs.
- Set a school record with 1,718 receiving yards in '13, ranking No. 2 in the nation behind only Oregon State's Brandin Cooks (1,730).
- Won the Paul Warfield Award in 2013, which is presented annually to the nation's best receiver by the Touchdown Club of Columbus.
- Was named second-team All-America by The Associated Press in '13 and was a first-team All-Mountain West Conference selection. Was named a Biletnikoff Award semifinalist.
- Posted three 200-yard receiving games in 2013, becoming only the third player this century to post three in the same season.
- Registered two games with 200 yards receiving and four TDs, becoming just the second player this century to record that feat.
- Was a unanimous first-team All-Mountain West selection as a redshirt freshman in 2012, becoming the first freshman and the second WR in conference history to be a unanimous first-team choice.
- Was named the 2012 Mountain West Conference Freshman of the Year, becoming just the third player in school history to earn the honor.
- Led the Mountain West in every receiving category in '12, catching 102 passes for 1,312 yards (12.9 avg.) and 14 TDs. All three of the totals were conference records by a freshman and led all FBS freshmen in 2012.
- Helped lead Palo Alto (Calif.) High School to a CIF state championship as a senior in 2010, catching 64 passes for 1,094 yards (17.1 avg.) and 12 TDs. Added 44 tackles, two forced fumbles and an INT that season as a CB.
- Majored in communications at Fresno State.

All of his TD grabs were from 39 yards and out, highlighted by a 57-yarder in the first quarter and a 59-yard catch in the third...**At San Jose State (Nov. 29):** Registered a career-high 264 receiving yards on 13 catches (20.3 avg.) along with three TDs. The 264-yard effort was the fifth-best total by an FBS player in 2013...**Vs. Utah State (Mountain West Championship, Dec. 7):** Hauled in nine passes for 168 yards (18.7 avg.) and a TD in the inaugural conference championship game, one the Bulldogs won, 24-17...**Vs. ### CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

➤ Was selected by Green Bay with the No. 85 overall pick, the first of two selections by the Packers in the third round, making him the highest-drafted defensive end from Southern Mississippi since Richard Byrd was picked in the second round (No. 36 overall) by the Houston Oilers in 1985.

➤ Played in 50 games with 28 starts for the Golden Eagles and registered 116 tackles (58 solo), including 30 tackles for a loss, 5½ sacks, two forced fumbles, a fumble recovery, an interception and three passes defended.

➤ Earned second-team All-Conference USA honors and was a finalist for the Conerly Trophy, which is given to the state's top collegiate player, as a senior in 2013.

➤ Was voted a team captain for the 2013 season, one that saw him register 39 tackles (23 solo), including 6½ tackles for a loss, and a half-sack.

➤ Played in the National Football League Players Association (NFLPA) Collegiate Bowl following the '13 season.

➤ Appeared in 12 games with 10 starts as a junior in 2012 and registered 36 tackles (23 solo), including a career-best 9½ tackles for a loss, a sack, an interception, a forced fumble and two passes defended.

➤ Played in 14 games with seven starts as a sophomore in '11 and posted 24 tackles (12 solo), including nine tackles for a loss, 1½ sacks, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery.

## ROOKIES VS. FIRST-YEAR PLAYERS

Rookies are players in their first year of pro football who have not been on another pro football team's roster for any regular-season or postseason games. First-year players are those who have played in other pro sports leagues (Arena Football League, etc.), have participated in previous NFL training camps, or have been on an NFL team's active, inactive or reserve list fewer than six games.

The rule originated when Lawrence McCutcheon, drafted by the Los Angeles Rams in 1972, played only three games his "rookie" season, then rushed for 1,097 yards in 1973. Today, due to McCutcheon and because rosters began expanding around the 1970 NFL-AFL merger (reserve lists formalized, etc.), that year is considered the beginning of the rookie rule. So today, for records purposes, the Packers use 1970 as a separator. From 1921-69, anyone who had yet to play three league games was generally considered a rookie.





Thereafter, a player is credited with an additional year of experience for each season in which he accumulates six games on the Active List or Inactive List, or on Reserve/Injured or Reserve/Physically Unable to Perform.
