Nashville CARES

Written on the many banners that hang in the hallway of the Nashville CARES office are the names of those clients who lost their battle with HIV. These names- fathers, brothers, mothers, and friends- serve as a daily reminder from where we have come as an agency, and inspire the important work yet to be done.

Since 1985, Nashville CARES has been serving Middle Tennessee by providing a variety of no-cost programs and services to address the growing and evolving challenges of the local HIV/AIDS epidemic.

Last year, CARES provided targeted HIV prevention education to 45,000 adults and youth, HIV testing/screening to 13,000 individuals, and an individually tailored combination of supportive services to more than 2,500 men, women and children with HIV/AIDS and their families.

Research has now proven conclusively that HIV treatment is also HIV prevention: reducing HIV viral load in an individual to an "undetectable" level reduces the risk of HIV transmission nearly to zero.

from early detection and treatment. To address this problem, Nashville CARES is working to integrate, expand and enhance our services to identify persons living with HIV/AIDS who are not in care, link them to care and support, increase their retention in care, and improve their management of HIV.

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
