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Introduction

- TASO is the pioneer civil society organization and the largest indigenous HIV/AIDS service provider in Sub-Saharan Africa.
- The organization has over twenty years experience supporting people living with HIV/AIDS and encouraging them to live positively.
- TASO exists to contribute to a process of Preventing HIV infection, restoring hope and improving the quality of life of persons families and communities affected by HIV infection and disease.

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Background



- TASO Experiential Attachment To Combat HIV/AIDS Program was initiated in 2005 as a result of need and demand to share TASO's best practices in HIV/AIDS management with other organizations within Uganda and other African countries affected by HIV/AIDS.
- The aim of TEACH progaramme is to build the capacity of public and private African organizations involved in the provision of HIV/AIDS care and support services.

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
With support from Swedish development agency SIDA the first phase was implemented from 2005-2008 and renewed in 2009 for another three years.

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Methodology

- TEACH 's objective is to improve HIV/AIDS service provider competence in Sub-Saharan Africa through an experiential one- month in-service apprenticeship
- Attaches are selected from Uganda and other African countries
- They are oriented and placed within TASO service centre's, spread across 11 districts in Uganda, Regional offices and the Headquarters; where they are mentored

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TEACH Achievements

In the first phase of the programme (2005-2008) TEACH trained 687 HIV/AIDS practitioners from Sub-Saharan Africa in HIV/AIDS best practices in service provision.

TEACH Phase II, TASO hosted 179 attaches (89 males and 90 females). 2010 was the second year of the TEACH II project and 189 attaches (96 males and 93 females) were hosted in the various TASO Centers.

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
Achievements cont

These include

Uganda, Tanzania, Sudan, Nigeria, Ethiopia, Swaziland, Kenya, Zimbabwe, Burkina Faso, Burundi, Democratic Republics of Congo, Sierra Leone and Liberia.

Attaches had varying backgrounds ranging from medical personnel, administrators financial personnel, public relations officers, IT specialists, youth mobilizers, military personnel and legislators.

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ACHIEVEMENTS CONT

Skills attained by TEACH attachés

- Community mobilization
- Memory book writing
- ART case conferencing
- Data management
- Counseling and listening, including child counseling
- Lobbying and advocacy
- Public relations and customer care skills

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Challenges and counter – strategies

- Partner organizations are not able to sponsor attaches,
- high numbers of applicants
- full scholarship is given to successful participants

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Lessons Learnt

- TASO models were replicated in many attaches organizations. (evaluation report)
- Experiential learning is very effective in transferring knowledge and skills causing fundamental transformation within the individual affective domain
- Cross country sharing of experiences improves HIV programming- improvement made continuously
- Others lessons include:
 - Community mobilization and sensitization through drama

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Lesson learnt cont

- The community ART and service delivery model
 - The counseling model, in particular couples, community and family counseling
 - The "positive living" model
 - Memory book and will making
 - Client appointment system
 - Information management system
 - HIV/AIDS integrated service delivery model
