

A view from the Chair



Firstly, I need to apologise for my statement in the last edition where I stated that I would enclose a form to be returned. This was sent out with your affiliation renewal fees

instead. I thank all who have sent theirs back. There is a copy on the website in case of loss. John Walden will follow up those yet to be returned. He needs the information for the next directory – the sooner the better. Also if you wish to be on the Speakers' List please notify John Walden (see p.54) as soon as possible. We extend to John our best wishes for his marriage to Alison in April this year.

It is always sad to receive notifications of deaths. There have been three recently: George Barker, an RDP and an editor for the London Philatelist and many other publications. Geoff Longbottom, who served on the ABPS Executive for a number of years and was responsible for the Directory and Speakers' Lists, and Ian MacPherson, a well-respected member of the Scottish philatelic community and the Federation representative for many years up to 2013. They were close philatelic friends and will be missed. Condolences have gone to their respective families.

In addition to the RDP ceremony at Ypres the congress committee have

arranged a shorter UK congress this year at Market Harborough (see p.6). It will include an EGM to assist in determining the future of the ABPS. The EGM will focus on the proposed constitution. All society and federation secretaries should have received a copy. I am willing to discuss the proposals with anybody prior to the EGM if required. Since the original constitution was written Company Law has changed, incorporated into the proposed document. When I took over as Chairman I recognised that ABPS needed updating. Colin Hoffman and I have produced a document which we expect will provide us all with opportunities. One area that I am looking to develop is the role of the federation. The Midlands Federation has been very active in producing a questionnaire to be discussed at their AGM at Worpex in May. Subject to my pending house move, I intend to represent ABPS there. The results will be analysed and recommendations considered. If I can identify a coordinator I would like to roll out that questionnaire to all societies so that we can find out what needs to be done to improve our service to members and to regain some of the societies who have left ABPS.

It appears that some societies and federations are experiencing difficulties from members dominating committees, not allowing the members to take an active part. We need to remember why we are part of this wonderful hobby and allow everyone to participate fully.

I visited Spring Stampex, as I expect that many of you did. I was very pleased to have the chance to chat to a few people—most of whom were very kind in their comments about the

News. Thanks for your encouragement then and by email and letter.

I was both delighted and ashamed when I viewed the displays. My first visit was to the displays by young philatelists, where I was fascinated to see the depth of understanding and the excellent presentations. I spent far longer there than I intended. Then I went down to see the Thematic Displays and Competition Entries. I was completely blown over by many of these. I wanted to read some of them in detail and I am sure that there wasn't one in which I didn't see something that caught both my eye and my imagination. I particularly liked the very humorous one on our relationships with our neighbours— 1000 Years of Annoying the French by Janet Nelson. That was one that I read and studied in its entirety. Shamefully acting like one of the paparazzi, I overheard one of the judges commenting that she wished that she had the time to read that in full too. Madam-it was worth the time and effort. It does show that building up a display can be fun—you just have to have the time, the material and the imagination. So where was the sense of being ashamed that I referred to earlier? That is my own personal

shame that I have not prepared my own collection and displays to the same standard. It is easy to claim that I don't have the time now—doing this job does take a bit of effort, but I could have got further in the past if only I hadn't put off doing the task. Perhaps that is the problem—I see it as a task rather than a delight. I must do better—those youngsters in particular will be my inspiration.

I hope that you have noticed that I have decided to include the names of societies that have closed (always regrettable) or have withdrawn from ABPS. I decided to include the first category so that other societies in their vicinity might be able to make welcoming contact with the former members. Perhaps two or three very small societies might be able to make one active and outgoing body. Sometimes we do not know why a society withdraws from ABPSperhaps it is something that I have written! I hope that we can always find a way to discuss any problems and I live in hope that the leavers will return.

Linked to both of these possibly is the increasing age profile of stamp collectors. I now receive a number of notifications of the deaths of society members. I am sure that you realise that I cannot include all of these in an issue, but where it relates to the death of a founder member or a very active participant in Federation, National or International circles I will do my best. If a photograph can be included I am sure that readers might recognise the person by face if not by name.

ABPS services to Societies

We are often asked "What does the ABPS do?" in return for the affiliation fee. The ABPS takes responsibility for the well-being of philately in the UK, and represents UK philately internationally. The services it provides to clubs and societies in the United Kingdom include:

Handbooks and Speakers Lists: These guides are invaluable aids to club organisers in putting together club programmes and advising members. They are updated and circulated to affiliated societies every few years. Much of the information is also regularly updated on the ABPS website.

Publications: The ABPS News is published four times a year, giving forthcoming events, hints & tips, and reports from affiliated societies. A range of leaflets on philately is issued, updated and extended every few years.

Regional and National Exhibitions: These events include the organisation of the national stamp competitions which take place around the country, bringing philately to a wider audience. ABPS is now totally responsible for the organisation of national competitions. Without ABPS they would cease and possibly undermine the future of Stampex.

International Competition: ABPS is responsible for the coordination of entries to international competitions, including membership of FIP.

Although a relatively small part of the hobby, the strength of competitive philately is a key driver in stimulating the hobby at all levels.

Workshops and Seminars: Another specific responsibility of the ABPS is the training and accreditation of judges for formal competitions.

Support for the Stamp Active Network: The financial and direct support from ABPS is one of the few sources of basic funding which enables SAN to continue to promote the hobby at Stampex (Kids Corner) and other events.

Philatelic Congress of Great Britain: Run by ABPS, this social event is held annually around the country. It is open to all collectors at any level.

Small Grants Scheme: Grants are available to societies with limited resources to need help for events or special projects.

Annual Awards: ABPS awards recognise and encourage the organisers of philately. ABPS promotes both the Award of Merit and Congress Medal.

Visits to Federations: Members of the Executive are willing to attend federation and other regional events to talk about the role of ABPS.

Three Notable and Active Philatelists – RIP

George E Barker (Bradford)

With great sadness I report George's death on Sunday 16th March. George was the Editor of *The London Philatelist* from 1983 to 2001. He was elected a Fellow of The Royal Philatelic Society London in 1983, was a signatory of the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists and an Associate member of the Academy of Philately, Paris and of the Belgium Academy of Philately. George was a founding member, indeed an Honorary Member, of the European Academy of Philately (AEP) and holder of its European Award for Philatelic Merit. His philatelic interests were France and its Colonies.

He was one of the great gentlemen of philately always pleased to help and encourage others. His care and dedication to the editing of *The London Philatelist* for The Royal Philatelic Society London was internationally recognised and respected. He had amassed a large philatelic library having purchased the house next door in which to keep it. George was one of the main organisers, with the late John D Hayhurst and the late John H Levett, of the 56th Philatelic Congress of Great Britain held in 1974 at Enghien-les-Bains, Paris, which is where I first met him. He was kind enough to introduce me to the European Academy of Philately and I remember with much pleasure a visit we made with John Levett to its annual meeting in Paris .

Geoff Longbottom (Norfolk)

On behalf of the ABPS I wish to record the enormous contribution that Geoff has made to the local and national philatelic scene.

After retiring as an international marketing consultant in 1996 Geoff took on voluntary work in his hobby of philately and was the editor of the Norfolk & Norwich Society quarterly magazine as well as dealing with the twice yearly Stamp Fair publicity.

In 2001 he was given a prestigious ABPS Annual Award for involvement in local, regional and national philatelic work, having started work with ABPS in year 2000 as Publicity Officer and subsequently as Publicity and Publications Officer. Geoff retired from ABPS in July 2009 at which time he was made an ABPS Life Vice-President.

For the N&NPS, Geoff contributed an interesting historical perspective on Postage Stamp Security, featuring a short account of the various methods of stamp security using embossing, reverse printing in red and then perforating within the stamps with government and major commercial companies logos or identification patterns. These are called perfins – 'perforated initials'. The

article was a contribution for the Centenary book titled 'Norfolk Posts and Personalities' published to coincide with the society 1911-2011 year of celebrations.

'Thank You' Geoff, you were my friend and I respect you enormously and so do a great number of your philatelic friends locally and nationally.

Extracted from the funeral address by *The Reverend John Walden*

lan A. MacPherson (Ayrshire) 1939-2014

Ian MacPherson died suddenly on 2nd March 2014. He was a very well known face in Scottish and British Philately being the president of the Association of Scottish Philatelic Societies in 2011 and was their delegate to ABPS for many years attending all recent ABPS AGMs. He and his wife Emslie were present at many PCGB meetings and London exhibitions as well as every Midpex since these were inaugurated where he represented the Alba Stamp Group and the Scottish Postal History Society.

lan was treasurer to both the Glasgow 2000 and Perth 2012 National Exhibitions – both being a financial success. He was honoured (jointly with Roy Erskine) with the Rowland Hill award by Royal Mail for innovation in 2002 – lan had arranged that Glasgow 2000 received a lottery grant. Ian was also awarded the McConnell Medal in 2008 for services to Scottish Philately.

lan joined Lanarkshire PS in 1982 and was treasurer for 16 years and president in 1988-9. Ian and Emslie were founder members of the Strathclyde Postcard Club in 1984 and they attended the Dundee Philatelic Weekends from 1987 until 2011. He was president of Ayrshire PS in 2008-09 and exhibited at a members' evening a week before he died. He also visited Largs Stamp Club during that last week and, with Emslie, attended the Alba Stamp Group AGM on the day before his untimely death.

Ian is survived by his wife of 50 years Emslie, sons Malcolm and Sandy and granddaughters Iona, Ffyona and Mari. The family produced a postcard as a memoriam to Ian and this was presented to the large number of mourners who attended the funeral in Ayr. The mourners included more than ten past presidents of the Association of Scottish Philatelic Societies. *Willie King*

Ten years since the end of the Travelling Post Office

In January we commemorated the tenth anniversary of the final journey of the Royal Mail's Travelling Post Offices (TPO). An integral part of the process of sorting and delivering mail for over 160 years, they operated

across the length and breadth of the country.

Introduced in 1838, the TPO revolutionised the transportation of mail, providing the means to move vast volumes of letters and packets across the country efficiently in an age before automobiles and aircraft. However, they also encountered various disasters over their long history. The most famous of these was the Great Train Robbery of 8 August 1963. On this date the TPO travelling from Glasgow to London was held up by a 15 strong gang who made away with over £2.6 million. The incident triggered a number of conspiracy theories that continue to this day.

In 2000, following the Hatfield rail disaster in Hertfordshire, the TPO service suffered considerable restriction including implementation of speed limits on some stretches of track and cancellation of a number of routes. With delays of up to six hours for some TPOs, efficiency was lost. Coupled with concerns over health and safety of those working on TPOs - conditions were cramped and basic and workers were continually being thrown into walls and counters - Royal Mail was forced to reconsider its dependence on the railway. Opting to transfer much of its transportation to air and road, the TPOs ran for the last time on 9 January 2004.

From 29 March the BPMA's exhibition commemorating the Great Train Robbery fifty years on, will be displayed at Grampian Transport Museum, Aberdeen. *The Great Train Robbery, the aftermath and the Investigations: A Story from the Archive* will run until 27 October.

In March Islington Borough Council approved the BPMA's planning application to develop a stretch of the old Post Office Underground Railway – Mail Rail – into a unique subterranean ride. This means that visitors to the newly created Postal Museum, due to open in central London in 2016, will be given the opportunity to explore the hidden world of this railway under Mount Pleasant through an engaging exhibition and interactive ride. In total, visitors will be taken through 1km of the original tunnels, following the same route that much of the nation's mail took for nearly 80 years from 1927-2003.

The Mail Rail ride is part of a much larger project that the BPMA is undertaking to reveal the extraordinary stories of British social, communications and design history through the universally iconic postal service. By opening up almost 400

years of records and objects from the reign of King Charles I to the present day. The Museum will reveal unusual and exciting episodes from British history: curious items including a first edition of James Joyce's Ulysses, original evidence from the Great Train Robbery trial, a Victoria Cross, and flintlock pistols used to defend Mail Coaches in the 19th Century.

Adrian Steel, Director of the BPMA, commented, "It is fantastic that Islington Borough Council has given us the green light to open up these unique tunnels to the public and reveal the captivating story of Mail Rail. Making this exciting project a reality still requires a further £0.5m, but this is a major boost to our plans and for Islington's, Camden's and London's heritage offer. We hope to launch a public appeal later this year, both in the local community and further afield, and look forward to welcoming our first visitors in 2016."

The BPMA is currently awaiting the outcome of an application for £4.5 million from the Heritage Lottery Fund. A decision is expected in May this year.

THE CONGRESS MEDAL 2014

The ABPS Awards Committee is delighted to announce the award to Christopher E. Oliver

having been nominated by the South African Collectors Society.

Christopher has held many offices in local societies, but his major contributions have been in four fields: the National Philatelic Society, Middlesex Philatelic Federation, ABPS, and the South African Collectors Society.

He is Vice President and publicity officer for the Kingston & District PS and secretary of the West London PS – recently formed by the amalgamation of two Societies, having served as Secretary, Treasurer and President of one of them.

Christopher served as President of the National Philatelic Society from 2007-13, and has organised periodic seminars, workshops and displays. He joined the council in 2004 and now represents the NPS on the ABPS Committee.

Christopher first served as chairman of the Middlesex Philatelic Federation in 1999 and he chaired their Diamond Jubilee stamp day at Amersham in September 2010. Another Stamp Day is to be held in October 2014 and Christopher has been co-opted to help with the organisation of this event.

In 2010 Christopher became the ABPS UK communications coordinator and has instigated the publication of nine leaflets on various aspects of our hobby.

It is through his work as Membership Secretary and General Secretary of the South African Collectors Society that we know Christopher best. He also helps at the Children's Corner at Stampex when that group is short staffed. He stands out as an exemplar of selfless and top quality service to our hobby and is thoroughly deserving of this award.

Essex Celebrates 70 Years of Organised Philately.

On 3 June 2014, the Association of Essex Philatelic Societies will have been serving collectors and societies for seventy years. In 1944, World War Two was still in full swing, but official circles were already looking to post-war development. Reflecting this new optimism, the representatives of the Essex societies that had survived the war, Colchester, Forest, Ilford, Leytonstone and Southend, met at Leytonstone to form an Association that would promote the advance of philately within the county by:

- Holding a philatelic event at least annually
- Encouraging the exchange of visits and displays between societies
- Providing and maintaining a register of philatelists willing to display or judge within the county
- Assisting in the formation of new societies within the county
- Promoting annual competition between member societies

 Doing such other things as may benefit member societies and other philatelists within the County

These remain the objectives of the Association, which has grown over the ensuing years to encompass twenty-four societies in Essex and the surrounding areas of London, Hertfordshire and Suffolk. Many of the Executive committee are long-serving, but new blood is always being sought to spread the load and ensure new ideas are brought to bear. An annual educational Seminar is held in January; this year's theme was Traditional Collecting and Displaying, with excellent tuition being given by **Chris Harman**. Having been an early user of the World Wide Web, it is hoped to launch a completely new website this year.

Stratford upon Avon Philatelic Society 25th anniversary

The Stratford upon Avon PS was launched in 1988, by means of an advert, placed by Kurt Mannaberg in the Stratford Herald on 23 March, inviting expressions of interest. There was sufficient response to get the club going in a very active way, not least in persuading the GPO to open a philatelic counter at Stratford post office. For quite a while it also produced its own newsletter "Avon Mail", edited by Alan Godfrey. Our initial setting up was supported and assisted by Ken Trewhella and other members of the established Coventry PS.

On the evening of 11 December 2013 we therefore celebrated our 25th anniversary. **Graham Jervis** presented a nostalgic display of contemporary press cuttings about the birth of the Society, early photographs, membership forms, Society-run stamp fair programmes, and copies of the newsletter. As a mark of the year of the Society's creation he also displayed all the GB commemorative issues which came out in 1988.

John Holland recounted many anecdotes and stories of the early years, and about Kurt Mannaberg himself, after whom one of the Society's annual trophies is still named.

We are a very active and friendly society, with a regular attendance of about 20 from a total membership of about 30. As well as guest speakers we have a fair sprinkling of members' evenings, auctions, competitions, quizzes and the Christmas social. We are fortunate in having members' competitions in which almost all members participate, regardless of their expertise or specialisation, with an enthusiasm not dampened by any strict internal or external rules or

restrictions, other than that the previous year's winner cannot compete in the same category the following year; the latter rule was introduced to stop those with the "best" collections winning the trophies each year, which can be very dispiriting for other collectors. Our way of deciding the winner in each category is commendably simple - each person present votes for what he/she considers first, second or third (using whatever criteria they choose) in each category (stamps, postal history etc.), and the votes are simply added up; the nice thing about this method is that it never produces contentious results!



French fiscals. Fiume and foreign mail in and out of Norway. GB Overprints Society and Postal Stationery Society

A joint meeting was held at the Royal Philatelic Society in March to celebrate the overlap of interests between our two societies. In the morning Dr Alan Huggins MBE RDP FRPSL gave an extensive display of his collection of postal stationery overprinted for use in British Levant. This included several unique items, affording those present the only chance they might get to see them: a special treat was the only known copy of an overprinted King George V 1d reply-paid postcard. As it has a registration copy in the BPMA it is clearly authentic, but was either withdrawn after issue with only a handful of survivors, or withdrawn before issue with this copy having "escaped". During World War I the British post offices were closed, but the Constantinople office opened shortly after. Alan was able to show scarce registration envelopes bearing the black imprinted stamp introduced for military rates, typically with extra adhesives to cover the postage. In the interval between viewing and the break for lunch members of the Postal Stationery Society put up items for their single-sheet competition. The scope of the entries was very broad! The winner was George King (a member of both societies).

After lunch there was a display by members of both societies, primarily covering overprinted material. This included GB airletters overprinted for the Gulf, postal stationery overprinted for British Bechuanaland, Bechuanaland Protectorate, Gold

Coast, the Oil Rivers and Niger Coast Protectorates, Cyprus, Morocco Agencies, and registration envelopes overprinted for EAF / Somalia. The final displays showed covers posted in various theatres of war, and modern pictorial printed stationery from Ukraine, including provisional overprints to cope with inflation.
