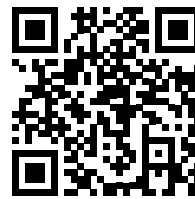

A Great Kentish Celebration A Century Ago

The opening of the rail line through Sheffield a century ago was cause for great celebration, as the area was at last linked with the rest of Tasmania by the most modern transport available. Photos of the time show great crowds gathered around the railway station for the official ceremony.

The railway from the main line at Railton through Sheffield to Roland opened on 6th November 1914, after 35 years of pressure from Kentish residents for a rail link through to Wilmot. A route had already been surveyed through to Rosebery to link with the West Coast, so Roland was only a temporary terminus until a crossing of the Forth River was attempted.

Pending further extension of the line, the current Cromwell Road was constructed to link Roland station with the Forth River bridge (now beneath Lake Barrington) to avoid Wilmot road vehicles having to climb the Tab Hill on their way to the train. Of course, by the time the line opened the First World War had been under way for three months and further work was halted. Motor vehicles soon improved significantly, and following the War the country had access to army-surplus vehicles and returned servicemen with new skills of driving and vehicle maintenance. There was no further talk of an extension beyond Roland!

In 1923 a rail-motor service commenced for passengers, a self-propelled single carriage rail bus. Until then passengers had been accommodated on goods trains. Special passenger trains operated in conjunction with the Latrobe Show, the Devonport Show, and the New Year's Day picnics at the Bluff when a great time was had by all. The line also provided the lifeblood of the Kentish district, carrying farm produce to markets, such as potatoes, grain, butter and livestock, together with timber and quarried minerals from as far as Moina.

Motor vehicles developed fast again during the Second World War, which was followed by easily obtained army surplus vehicles and the return of more servicemen with driving and vehicle maintenance skills. It became easier to transport many goods through to their final destination on improved roads, avoiding transshipment to and from the railway, often at both ends of their journey, and rail traffic declined fast. Closure became inevitable, and the last train left on 5th November, 1957.

This may all have been forgotten if not for the restoration of Sheffield station and the return of steam trains in 1994, thanks to the Redwater Creek Railway group. A full history of the line is available for purchase from the original station during their regular steam days.

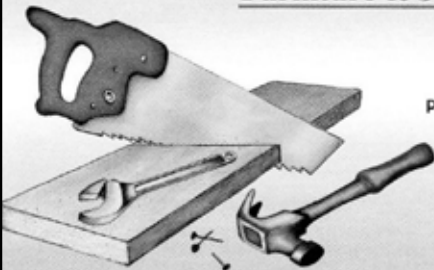

GARDENING WITH TODD MILES

November- The Joys of Spring.

This is the month when you can admire the result of all your planning and hard work!

Everything is blooming and practically growing overnight. As you wander around your garden you can recognise where you might be able to add another shrub, another tree, or add some colour by planting some annuals. As you drive around you will have seen a beautiful shrub or flowering tree in somebody's garden, and thought that you could plant one in your garden, so now is the time to seek those plants out in the nursery, while they are flowering.

Here are some beautiful shrubs you might consider that are available now:

Pieris Katsura- A new variety of what many people call the Lilly of the Valley Tree because of the beautiful sprays of white or pink bell shaped flowers. This variety has the most stunning dark red new foliage.

Cercis Canadensis- Forest Pansy. If you have a space for a small beautifully shaped tree with dark red foliage, then this is the tree for you.

Cotinus purpureus- Smoke Bush- Another hardy deciduous shrub with bright dark red leaves that will light up a corner of your garden.

Viburnum Plicatum- If you want an amazing brilliant white flowering shrub then this should be your choice. Easy to grow, the shrub always maintains a lovely shape with its blooms sitting out in flat sprays.

This is the time to choose your clematis and wisteria, while they are out in flower and looking stunning. Think about planting one of the Japanese variety of wisteria with the double flowers and long racemes.

Now is the time to consider adding some new ceramic pots to add colour and variety to your garden, there are some great new colours and shapes available ranging in price from \$20 - \$100 and don't forget now is the time to replant your hanging baskets, filling them with trailing colour such as Lobelia, nasturtiums, fuchsia, and geraniums.

You are now feeding and mulching those vegetables that you planted last month with liquid fertilisers such as Maxi Crop or Power Feed. Once a week, should bring them along nicely. Sugar cane mulch is great for the vegetable garden as it is easier to spread amongst the rows rather than pea straw.

But, beware of a late frost, so listen to the weather forecast and be ready to protect those tender new shoots in your vegetable garden with some frost cloth (\$3.50 metre) that you have standing by – just in case!

KENTISH GARDEN CLUB NEWS

What a wonderful Spring we are having. Beautiful sunny days and the start of daylight savings have been perfect partners to encourage us to get out in the garden. Mulching and weeding is a priority at the moment, particularly as the weather is warming up and we have not had much spring rain as yet. To finish off a very busy month in September a working bee was held to mulch all the garden beds at Hopes Mill Corner. Follow that Dream

As a small boy of four years I would often sit up with the baker and amble down the road on his run, the old horse so calm and gentle. The loaves of bread we called Bum loaves, shaped like a predominant bum, easily broken in half if ordered by the customer. No sliced bread in our small suburb of Brisbane in the early 50s. The man across the road would plough up a small paddock with a draught horse to grow watermelons, and would often swear at his horse when it wouldn't stop.

I would watch silently just in case I might cop a barrage as well.

No horse people in our family of nine, plenty of tucker, lots of hand-me downs, no shoes, and a new shirt for Christmas usually with cowboys and horses on it. TV came along and all our entertainment seemed to involve horses, Flicka, Fury, The Cisco Kid, National Velvet, just to name a few. So as you can see one can still love horses and not own one. Yet.

I met Sharon when we were both 16 and we married at 22, had two great kids and did the normal family things. We would be out in the car driving and my eyes would fix upon some horses in a paddock. Sharon would say, "Keep your eyes on the road" and I would quip, "Did you see that lovely horse?"

After 30 years in the one home we decided it was time, our time. Our daughter and son were now adults with good jobs and partners. Twelve months prior to this point in our lives we discovered Tasmania and gave the kids time to accept that Mum and Dad were leaving home. A little lead balloonish for a while, but they soon recovered.

Whilst still in Brisbane I stopped to talk to a young man at a lovely park with his horse and carriage. He had driven the Bride and groom to the park for photos, with a nice bay Standardbred gelding named Beau. Not long after I answered an ad for a jog cart training vehicle for sale, which I bought. The gentleman said he had done Weddings for 18 years and was retiring. "Have you got a horse?" he enquired. "Not yet" says I and he led us

out to the paddock and there is Beau.

The young man doing the Wedding at the park was under his employ.

At the age of 54 I owned my first horse.

Sharon and I attended an introduction to harness day at Jimboomba and bought a nice maroon sulky with a cane basket on the back. I discovered Horse Deals Magazine and found that only five minutes from our home in Brisbane was a shed full of beautiful carriages imported from Poland. We bought a Landau with pole, shafts, carriage lamps and spares.



The next thing on the list was a truck, an Isuzu with beaver tail and ramps and after fitting an electric winch we had the ideal set up. Off to Tassie to our 40 acre farm in Sheffield, "The Town of Murals," a small rural town in the north-west part of the State. Good average rainfall and plenty of feed. Continued on page 17

Recipe:

Swede, Carrot and Bacon Frittata

Serves 4

Ingredients

2 large Tassie swedes, peeled
2 large Tassie carrots, scraped
2/3 cup thinly sliced Tassie leeks, rinsed
1/3 cup chopped bacon
2/3 cup Tassie Birds Eye frozen peas
1/2 cup grated gruyère cheese
4 eggs
1 cup whipping cream

1 tablespoon chopped parsley
Salt flakes and freshly ground pepper
Preheat oven to 180°C (fan 160°C).

Method:

Cut the swedes and carrots into 1cm dice. Put into a pan of boiling salted water with the leeks and cook for 1 minute. Drain and put into a bowl. Add bacon, peas and cheese. Whisk eggs, cream and parsley together with salt and pepper to taste. Add to bowl and mix well. Spoon into greased large muffin cups. Bake for about 30 minutes or until puffed and golden brown. Garnish with herbs.

Junior Cattle Handlers Show of Tasmania



The Sheffield Junior Cattle Handlers had another extremely successful show season last year with some excellent team and individual performances, most notably grade 10 Student Chelsea Rayner winning the State Junior Judging final and former student, Madalan Page taking out the Handling State Final. These two went on to Brisbane to compete in the National Finals where Chelsea was Runner-up in the judging and Madalan won the National Cattle Handling title! An unbelievable result.

One of Mr Barber's highlight of the season was when the grade 7 team triumphed over the more fancied grade 10 team in the Team of Three at the Devonport Show, proving that there is still a lot of talent coming through the ranks.

It's not all about competing in the handlers competition though, the students spend a huge amount of time with their heifers to show the animal off for their breeder. They treat each show as if a potential buyer for the cattle is watching. From the 14th September to 18th September the Cattle Handling team undertake breaking in week. They get to know their animal, how to lead them and prepare them for showing as well as learning how to select good cattle.

Our kids do an amazing job explaining to the judge and to the crowd why they have placed the cattle where they have in Junior Judging. To see the amount of confidence they get from public speaking from refusing to use the microphone in grade 7 to talking and explaining as good as the judges is brilliant to see.

This year the Junior Cattle Handlers Show of Tasmania will be held on Friday November 7th at the Sheffield School Farm. There is again over \$6000 prize money up for grabs in the Hoof & Hook competition. In the Hoof & Hook competition the cattle are presented on the hoof and are then judged at JBS Swift in Devonport on their carcase attributes. Anybody can enter the Hoof & Hook competition as the cattle do not need to be pure breeds and the students from Sheffield School are able to break the cattle in during their breaking in week program and show the cattle also. Entries only cost \$10 and are available through the school office. It is a great way for producers to receive relevant feedback on the performance of their breeding programs and helps the students to understand the time and effort that our Tasmanian beef producers need to undertake to provide the public with a world renowned product.

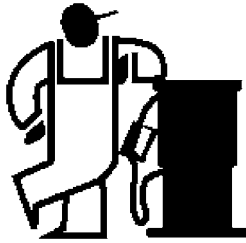

Fuel Freddy's petrol saving tips

*"More haste,
more fuel"*



Everyone seems to lead busy lives these days with a constant juggle to fit it all in. So, it is no wonder that we're all racing around at full speed to get to appointments, pick the kids up from school or just to get to work on time. But, what is all this "haste" costing?

Apart from frazzled nerves, near misses or a head of steam when others don't get out of your way quickly enough, it will be costing you financially.

The difference between driving at 90km per hour and 100km per hour is a saving of about 10% fuel. On a tank of petrol (say a 40litre tank), that represents 4litres of fuel that you could save on each tankful by driving at a more relaxed pace. Roughly, you could be saving around \$6-\$7 on each tank of fuel.

Simply by giving yourself a few minutes more to get to wherever you're going and easing back on the accelerator – you will arrive more relaxed, and ultimately with more money in your pocket.

If you do a lot of highway driving, you might like to know that the difference between driving at 90km per hour and 110km per hour is 23% savings on fuel! So, out of that 40litre tank you just saved 9.2litres (approx. \$14-\$15) by taking your time. OK, you'll have to allow a little longer for the journey, but your savings on a long road trip could pay for your lunch on the way. Something to chew over, next time you're hammering it down the highway!

Fuel For The Future

Biogas expert explains how to turn Waste into Energy

Dr Jayant Keskar, from CRC CARE was in Tasmania recently to present a workshop explaining the basics of bio-gas production and how it can turn waste into energy. Members of KEENER Inc., plus a cross section of the general public, was there to learn about the technology, its application in Tasmania and the benefits from turning waste streams into energy and fertiliser.

Bio-gas systems can use a wide variety of organic wastes, including food wastes, manures, fats and oils, crop residues, reed grasses, distillery wastes, to name a few. Through a digestion process using anaerobic bacteria, methane is produced (bio-gas) as well as residues that can then be used for fertiliser.

Case studies from around the world show how different variations of this technology are being used to generate gas for cooking, for transport fuel, or for combined heat and power (CHP) plants generating electricity and heating. So, all of this from a process that still leaves you with compost or liquid fertiliser at the end of it! Systems range from household sized plants (similar to a septic tank) to large scale municipal waste treatment or industrial scale plants.

As an example of the benefits that can be derived from waste - one cow produces 4tonnes of solid waste/year and 14tonnes of liquid waste which is estimated to be worth \$230/year after digestion and transformation into energy, fertiliser and other products. With 28.5 million cattle in Australia, even if only 20% of that waste was captured, the value of the bio-gas and products created from it would be worth \$1.3billion. Now, add in all the other types of livestock waste, food waste, human waste, crop residues, etc

and it gives an idea of the potential energy possibilities from this technology.

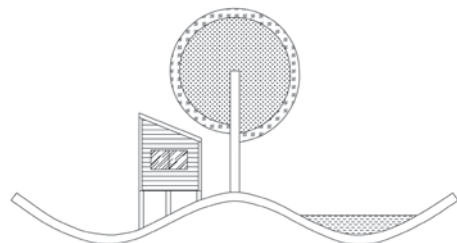

BEYOND OUR BARRIERS

Editor: Recently I was made aware of a community newsletter called Beyond Our Barriers which “seeks to reflect goodwill toward all others – one word at a time”. The publishers rely on the generosity of the storytellers to share with others their life experiences for the sake of others. We ARE all in this together and made stronger by our willingness to share with others.

Beyond Our Barriers is for those in care and community who wanted to hear and share how they make the very best of life, and the important last lap of it, so to strengthen each other and community understanding.

The first newsletter that I have seen contained a sharing from one of our own Sheffield residents. He has kindly allowed me to reproduce his story.

DAVID INNES (83) has been president of Sheffield RSL for 9 years. He shared: “I was in the Navy for 23 years. I have a lung condition now that is likely linked to asbestos exposure in the ships 60 plus years ago. Asbestos fell into our food and at Christmas, we made our white beards out of it. However, this is the first symptom I’ve had.

Childhood in the depression was the simple life. We relied on each other and we made the best of that. We never wore shoes till high school – we were too poor. My father, a market gardener, was away at war for 3 years. He never spoke of it – although I asked -he said he had to let it go.

I have had 2 happy marriages, both to widows. My first wife – a young widow with a 9 y.o. son, was “restless” – her doctor telling her company was important and asking if he could mention her to a minister he knew. She was happy with his suggestion to have a penfriend. The minister was a friend of my Navy ship chaplain. There were 1250 men on board. The chaplain – a friend – called me aside when he received the request and asked if I’d be interested to write. I was and we went from there.

We lost our 13 y.o daughter. She was murdered by a schoolmate. It was the hardest thing to deal with. If I did not have the values and faith I have, I’d have been in the gutter. Others were very supportive. I think of her every day.

It changes how you think – your perspective on what’s important in life. You notice others spending a lot of energy making mountains out of molehills. You want to say something like “get real” but you don’t.

Soon after we came to Sheffield, my wife was diagnosed with a brain tumour, so I became her carer for those last 9 weeks that she had.

When I retired from my business, I joined Legacy. Focussing on the well-being of others is satisfying. It’s just doing something worthwhile that needs to be done. I used to help with pension applications, but now it’s just the people connection. I keep

in touch with a lot of the fellows I served with. There is an understanding between us – one can’t easily speak to others – they might think you were skiting.

I had bred canaries as a child and decided in retirement to breed pheasants. There was a sign “GOLDEN PHEASANTS” I’d seen passing by in the train in Woollongong. I drove there and knocked on the door asking to see JOSIE’s husband about the business. “He died 3 years ago” she said ,”but I can help you with golden pheasants.”



Now his wife of 12 years, Josie says “It was meant to be”. She loves embroidery, and knits and crochets beanies to give away. (Her mother always knitted socks for the troops.) They happily restored their little cottage and find Sheffield to be the best community they’ve ever come across. Josie believes: “Love and understanding of others is the most important thing in life”.

Like the words from that Elvis song, “You gotta follow that dream wherever that dream may lead.”

I like to attend all the training days our State holds, and learn

something new at every one. I am now a trained EA Carriage driving coach and teach newcomers especially young people and encourage them to join a carriage club. Good talented young people have the time to develop into the Champions of Tomorrow.

Today is a Saturday morning and I am waiting for my groomsmen to arrive, we have a Wedding to perform at a beautiful resort. The Landau, pair, show harness, top hats, boots and livery are all polished and ready to go. This is what I call “The Romance of Carriage Driving”

Once horses get into your blood, there isn’t much you can do about it.

The Sheffield Mount Roland Cable Car Proposal

A Message from the Guiding Group

A sound plan has been formulated as to design, position (mountain top and ground station), expected costs and a belief that the newly identified location will be sympathetic to the environment, surroundings and residents.

Feasibility

The group is in consultation with an engineering firm that has been constructing cable cars and aerial carriage ways for 150 years worldwide, including Australia. Indications are the project will be viable with existing visitor numbers.

Funding

We believe that local control and ownership will provide the best outcome. We are confident this can be achieved to the very great advantage the North West Coast without funding from Government or Big Business. We have selected the proposed Sheffield Railton Community Bank as our preferred bank, as they are in alignment with our philosophy of contributing to the community in which they operate.

Economy

Sadly, the last 2 years has seen the North West Coast's economy plummet to the extent that we are at the very bottom of all the regions in the Commonwealth. We cannot depend on other regions, State or the Federal Government for help. They at best may provide a safety net. Ultimately, we're responsible for feeding, housing and clothing ourselves. The reality is that if we don't work, we don't eat. We must stand on our own feet. And this is an outstanding opportunity to do so, showing other States and regions what we're made of. We know it's not a silver bullet solution for every problem in the North West, we won't pretend it is. But it is a start. And one from which we hope many other opportunities to develop livelihoods will seed. We are a clever, diverse and resilient community and together can be the envy of the Commonwealth.

As a community project, the wider community needs to have a clear view of what is proposed and will quite possibly have suggestions which will enhance the outcome.

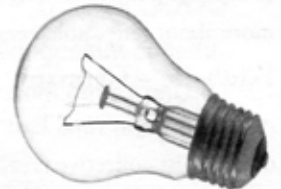

Prepare NOW to survive bushfire

Tasmanian residents are being urged to prepare now to minimise the risk of stress and poor decisions when bushfire strikes.

Tasmania Fire Service Chief Officer Mike Brown said, "The devastating bushfire events of the 2013 summer are still fresh in the minds of a many Tasmanians and I am urging all Tasmanians to learn from those experiences to reduce the effects of future disasters."

Whether you live in the city, the urban fringe or in rural or regional Tasmania, survival during a bushfire is highly dependent on how well prepared you and your property are before the event.

"It is essential for everyone living in or travelling to bushfire prone areas to have a Bushfire Survival Plan detailing exactly what action you will take if threatened by a bushfire," Mr Brown said.

"A Bushfire Survival Plan will increase your chance of survival."

Mr Brown said the plan must be in writing, practiced regularly and take into consideration the ages and physical capabilities of everyone in the household, including children and the elderly.

Once a Bushfire Survival Plan has been prepared it is important for people to know what action to take when a bushfire approaches.

This can include: monitoring ABC Local Radio for updates; locating your bushfire kit (which you should have prepared earlier); putting on protective clothing; drinking plenty of water; and putting all loose outdoor furniture and cars into secure undercover locations where possible.

"On a severe, extreme or catastrophic fire weather day the safest option for survival is to leave well in advance of any fire," Mr Brown said.

"Vulnerable members of the community, including the young and elderly, are advised to leave well before bushfire strikes and not be part of any plan to stay and defend a home."

MILITARY FLAVOUR TO MURALS

NORTHERN Tasmania's town of murals will soon add another special, public, commemorative mural to its collection, thanks in part to Federal Government Anzac Centenary Local Grants funding.

Federal Lyons MP Eric Hutchinson was at Sheffield recently to announce the \$8850 grant which the Sheffield RSL and Citizens' Club will use to install the commemorative World War I mural, roll of honour and memorial garden.

The Sheffield project is one of the first in Lyons to be confirmed as a recipient of the Anzac Centenary Local Grants Program which will see \$125,000 go to every Federal Government electorate for communities to commemorate next year's centenary of Anzac in their chosen way.

Ian Porter has headed up the Sheffield RSL sub-committee which planned and brought the project to fruition.

He said that the committee had worked hard on the project for many months and was looking forward to the November 8 official opening of the mural to be installed on the eastern wall of the RSL and Citizens Club, in Sheffield's Main Street.

Burnie artist Damian Rossiter has been produced the giant mural which will be unveiled at an official ceremony on November 8, starting at 2pm.

Robert Gower will do the landscaping and garden for the art work which will bring it to life as a three dimensional project.

Mr Porter said that there was a real buzz in the community about the new military mural which will feature local people.

Mr Hutchinson congratulated the local RSL and Citizens' Club and the Sheffield community for the hard work that has already gone into the successful application for Anzac Centenary commemorative funding.

"This will provide a lasting and meaningful Anzac memorial for the region in a very Sheffield kind of way," Mr Hutchinson said.

While Mr Hutchinson was at Sheffield he also presented Federal Government Certificates of Appreciation to Ron Davies and his sister-in-law Robyn Davies.

Mr Davies' certificate was for his service to Australia during the Vietnam War.

Mrs Davies received a certificate of behalf of her father William Appleby who served in the Australian

Armed Forces during World War II but died a number of years ago.

Staying Safe with Dogs in Our Community



Last month we looked at what a scared, angry and happy dog looks like and some situations where it is safer to completely avoid the dog. This month we are going to talk about 2 things – what to do if an angry dog comes up to you, and what to do if an angry dog chases you on your bicycle.

What to do if you are approached by an angry dog



1 Stand still.

1. The first thing you do is **STOP** and **STAND STILL**. It is never safe to run away because the dog's instinct will be to chase you.



2 Hands down.

2. Put your **HANDS DOWN** by your side. If you flap your hands around the dog will get excited. It will run and jump on you and may try to bite you.

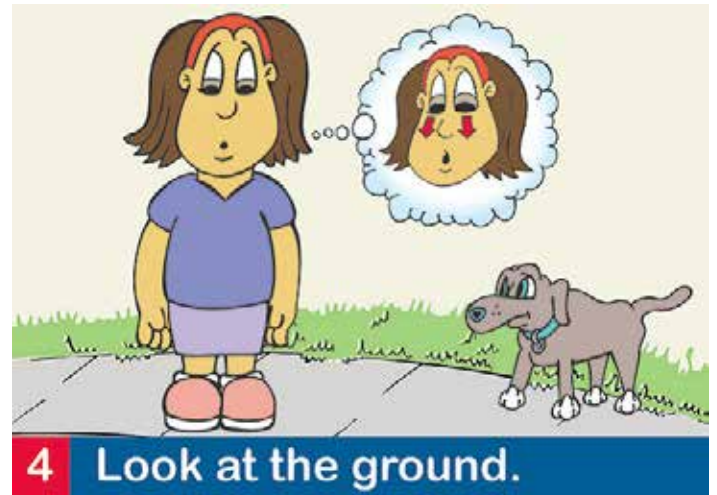
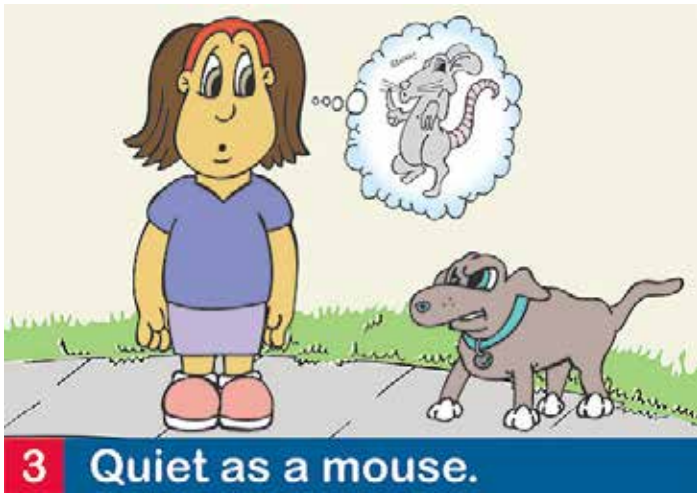

3. STAY QUIET. Loud noises and speaking in a high pitched voice will make the dog even angrier.

4. LOOK AT THE GROUND. Dogs don't like it when we stare at them. In dog language, staring means confrontation and that you want to fight with it.

If you follow the above 4 points, you are saying to the dog in dog language that you are not going to hurt him and you do not want to be a threat. The dog will soon walk away. When it does, you can take a few small steps backwards while still having the dog in the corner of your eye sight (in case the dog changes its mind and you can quickly stop again). Don't look at the dog and don't talk to it. Look at the ground and walk away very, very slowly and quietly.

**What would you do if a dog chases you on your bicycle?
Would you;**

- (a) pedal faster to get away?
- (b) wave your hands around and yell at the dog?
- (c) stop the bike and stand still beside the bike looking at the ground?

If you keep pedalling, the dog will want to keep chasing you (dogs love playing chasey games).
If you wave your hands around and shout at the dog, the dog may get angrier and you may fall off your bike.

Correct Answer - The safest thing to do is stop, get off your bike and ignore the dog. Don't look at him and don't try talking to him either. Be still, be quiet, keep your hands by your side and look at the ground. Again, the dog will think the game is over and he will walk away.

21st century farming

Tasmania's north-west coast is renowned as prime farming land. But since the early 2000s, the coast has been home to a different kind of farming.

Tasmania has a world-class wind energy resource. Our island lies directly in the path of the Roaring Forties, strong westerly winds found generally between the latitudes of 40 and 50 degrees south. This band has some of the strongest sustained winds on the planet.

When these winds reach the west coast of Tasmania, they have blown across the cooling Southern Ocean for thousands of kilometres, gathering momentum and speed.

In 2002, Bluff Point wind farm was commissioned, followed a few years later by Studland Bay wind farm. Together they're known as Woolnorth Wind Farm and have a generating capacity of 140 megawatts.

Along with Musselroe Wind Farm in north-east Tasmania, these farms are operated under a joint venture between Shenhua Clean Energy and Hydro Tasmania, an entity known as Woolnorth Wind Farm Holding Pty Ltd; Shenhua Clean Energy owns a 75 per cent share and Hydro Tasmania retains 25 per cent.

As well, Hydro Tasmania operates Huxley Hill Wind Farm on King Island – and that wind farm is playing an important part in a renewable energy breakthrough of international significance...

Showcasing Tasmanian expertise to the world

King Island, wild and remote, is heavily reliant on diesel fuel for its energy supply – as are thousands of isolated or off-grid communities around the world.

An ambitious project undertaken by Hydro Tasmania on this tiny island is reaping big success.

Over the past several years, progressive enhancements have been made to the power station resulting in a hybrid system that integrates renewable and non-renewable energy sources with enabling and storage technologies.

Wind and solar are combined with large-scale battery storage, flywheels, dynamic resistor technology, dynamic load control and biofuels in addition to traditional diesel generation.

SmartGrid technology matches demand to the available supply by actively managing demand. This can involve remotely turning off appliances for very small periods of time – not noticed by residents.

In 2013 the system achieved a world first; the ability to run for sustained periods on renewable energy alone. It was the first time 'zero diesel' operation had been achieved on a megawatt scale in an off-grid system anywhere in the world, bringing King Island international recognition for embracing renewable technology. Using this integrated solution, it is expected to reduce the annual diesel fuel use by more than 65 per cent.

The King Island hybrid power system gives a glimpse of a possible future of energy generation – a way renewable energy can work with non-renewable energy sources and enabling and storage technologies. It also demonstrates the important role that renewable energy can play in displacing high-cost, emissions intensive fossil fuels from remote and isolated power systems across the globe.

An eye on the future

Predicting the future is always a challenge, but one thing is for sure, Hydro Tasmania is intent on being around for its 200th birthday.

There is no doubt the next few years will be challenging as a range of external factors converge to reduce profitability from the record levels of recent times. However, the business is responding in the only way it knows how. It has shown over the past 100 years that a key part of its DNA has been the capacity to adapt to various challenges and changing circumstances. This will be crucial as it sets its sights on the next 100 years.

The electricity market is changing dramatically and Hydro Tasmania is responding to these changes. Technological advances and customers taking greater control of the way they manage their energy needs has resulted in a growing 'revolution' which forever will alter the way power is generated, delivered and sold in Australia. Failure to keep up with the needs of customers will threaten the survival of many operators in the Australian electricity market.

The Tasmanian Government believes Hydro Tasmania is a significant long-term strategic asset for the State that will help grow the economy and attract new investment. The business continues to invest strongly in upgrading infrastructure to lengthen the life of its assets and increase their efficiency. This will ensure hydro assets continue to serve the Tasmanian community for a long time to come.

At the same time Hydro Tasmania is looking further ahead at emerging opportunities in the renewable energy sector, such as displacing expensive diesel fuel with innovative hybrid power systems in off-grid and remote locations.

The business is also investigating ways to increase the benefits of 100 years of investment in hydro generation through projects such as a second interconnector across Bass Strait.

Nobody can predict what life will look like in 2114. But one thing is for sure: renewable energy will be more important over the next one hundred years than it has ever been.

Tasmania's unique lifestyle and landscape, coupled with our natural renewable energy resources provide us with a competitive advantage. As we grapple with managing the challenges presented by climate change, and our society makes decisions about how best to use the resources available to us, fully exploring the potential of renewable energy must be at the fore of our thinking.

It's a big world and Hydro Tasmania is contributing to sustainable energy in a big way, through shaping approaches to sourcing and using energy that will continue to matter for decades to come.
