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California's unemployment rate decreases to 8.1 percent

NOTE TO EDITORS: This release incorporates revised historical labor force numbers and industry employment data. Each year our labor force and employment data are updated to reflect additional data inputs and estimation techniques. These data are produced in cooperation with the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, based on the same methodology used by all states.

SACRAMENTO – California's unemployment rate decreased to 8.1 percent in January, and nonfarm payroll jobs decreased by 31,600 during the month for a total gain of 1,171,000 jobs since the recovery began in February 2010, according to data released today by the California Employment Development Department (EDD) from two separate surveys.

The U.S. unemployment rate decreased to 6.6 percent in January.

In December, the state's unemployment rate was 8.3 percent, and in January 2013, the unemployment rate was 9.5 percent. The unemployment rate is derived from a federal survey of 5,500 California households.

Nonfarm jobs in California totaled 15,292,000 in January, a decrease of 31,600 jobs over the month, according to a survey of businesses that is larger and less variable statistically. The survey of 42,000 California businesses measures jobs in the economy. The year-over-year change, January 2013 to January 2014, shows an increase of 319,500 jobs (up 2.1 percent).

EMPLOYMENT AND UNEMPLOYMENT IN CALIFORNIA

The federal survey of households, done with a smaller sample than the survey of employers, shows an increase in the number of employed people. It estimates the number of Californians holding jobs in January was 17,068,000, an increase of 50,000 from December 2013, and up 219,000 from the employment total in January of last year.

The number of people unemployed in California was 1,503,000 – down by 29,000 over the month, and down by 268,000 compared with January of last year.

PAYROLL EMPLOYMENT DETAIL (SEASONALLY ADJUSTED)

EDD's report on payroll employment (wage and salary jobs) in the nonfarm industries of California totaled 15,292,000 in January, a net loss of 31,600 jobs since the December survey. This followed a gain of 17,200 jobs (as revised) in December.

Five categories (manufacturing; financial activities; professional and business services; educational and health services; and other services) added jobs over the month, gaining 14,900 jobs. Professional and business services posted the largest increase over the month, adding 8,300 jobs. One category, mining and logging, was unchanged over the month.

Five categories (construction; trade, transportation and utilities; information; leisure and hospitality; and government) reported job declines over the month, down 46,500 jobs. Trade, transportation and utilities posted the largest decrease over the month, down 13,900 jobs.

In a year-over-year comparison (January 2013 to January 2014), nonfarm payroll employment in California increased by 319,500 jobs (up 2.1 percent).

Nine categories (construction; manufacturing; trade, transportation and utilities; information; professional and business services; educational and health services; leisure and hospitality; other services; and government) posted job gains over the year, adding 321,200 jobs. Professional and business services posted the largest gains on a numerical basis, adding 90,300 jobs (up 3.9 percent). Construction posted the largest gains on a percentage basis, up 4.4 percent, (adding 27,300 jobs).

Two categories (mining and logging and financial activities) posted job declines over the year, down 1,700 jobs. Financial activities posted the largest decline on a numerical basis, down by 1,600 jobs (a 0.2 percent decrease). Mining and logging posted the largest decline on a percentage basis, decreasing by 0.3 percent (down 100 jobs).

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE CLAIMS (NOT SEASONALLY ADJUSTED)

In related data, the EDD reported that there were 495,273 people receiving regular Unemployment Insurance benefits during the January 2014 survey week. This compares with 504,558 last month and 519,632 last year. At the same time, new claims for unemployment insurance were 73,040 in January 2014, compared with 73,458 in December and 68,907 in January of last year.
