PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Gentlemen,

Twelve months ago I wrote a report based on the 1984 Football activities. The main questions I asked myself at that time were: Was the Club content to be a social club, to have the occasional good year, the occasional good team and was the club concerned that we had actually forfeited a fourth grade game during that season? What about our home at Ashgrove and the unsatisfactory relationship we had had with our Summer tenant, and were we content to look at our fund raising with a 'chook raffle' mentality, or did we really have the commitment to aspire to something more?

INTERESTING OUESTIONS:

It became clear in my view as this season progressed that the club is coming of age, and that the club does want to achieve more tangible results. From the administrative point of view we started the year with a debt of approximately \$4,000.00. We couldn't really afford to buy jerseys or other necessary items without borrowing so the committee took a very conscious decision to borrow the money not using the club as collateral but by each

committee member signing a Personal Guarantee for \$8,000.00

The committee functioned well and when you see the financial results this year you will see that it has been our most successful year in our history, and it started with one word — "commitment"

When we look at our playing activities, particularly the performance of our first fifteen, the word that showed up consistently in newspaper articles was the jeeps' commitment. Consistently our younger, smaller, lighter players, took on much larger opponents and never gave the game away.

There was no question of the commitment given by Chris Carberry and John Brass, and that commitment became contagious. We saw it again when Roy Nerichow took over the reins of fourth grade and guided them to a premiership. A member of that team was John Garde who participated in his sixth premiership winning team, and everyone who knows Gardie, knows that his middle name is commitment.

Some three years ago I attended the Annual General Meeting of the Ashgrove Junior Rugby Club and met Lachie McConville. Lachie was elected President that night, with total attendance at the meeting being six people. Four weeks ago I attended the Ashgrove GPS Annual General Meeting and presentation of pennants at which some 200 boys and at least 150 parents attended. In that three year period Lachie's drive has taken our junior Juniors to one of the major forces of junior rugby in Brisbane. Again that word "commitment" keeps showing up in our language.

Some twelve months ago we began negotiations to establish our own home ground. Ivor Colquhoun has taken on the job of chairing the New Grounds Development Committee and is committed to our relocation where we have our own home and control of our own destiny. To bring that to fruition is going to require every bit of commitment we can muster within the Club and with the outside community. Large dollars are involved and I believe that the club is now ready to handle a project of this magnitude.

Congratulations to the fortified fourths on their premiership win, also to the under 14 GPS team, under 9's and under 11's?

To make the books balance in a Rugby Club these days it is becoming increasingly difficult to do it through traditional method of fund raising. This season saw our first major sponsorship and for us to continue to grow we must attract and support sponsorships. Nundah Mitsubishi supported us to the tune of \$4,000 for which we are most grateful and I again would urge you during the Summer season to channel any interested parties in their direction. Not only will they get a good deal but they will be supporting our club. Just make sure that Nundah Mitsubishi know that the lead came from the GPS fraternity.

Gary King from the Spring Hill Hotel also supported us with a donation of tackle bags and excellent prices and service from the Hotel. Don Jackson from Penfolds Wines provided the 'Player of the Week' awards as well as assisting us with the supply of his product at various functions.

The club had its share of bad news. We lost a fine young man in David "Thumper" Burrows to the dreaded disease of cancer and he will certainly be sadly missed. Tom Hamstead's son had an unfortunate accident but Tom tells us he is slowly but surely working his way back to good health.

We congratulate the many players from junior ranks right through to seniors who were selected in Brisbane, Queensland and Australian Under 21 teams and in particular we are most proud of the contribution that David Codey made to the victorious Grand Slam Wallaby tour. David has only been with our club for a relatively short period but there is no question of the impact that he has had on the playing field, not just from an ability point of view but probably more importantly from an attitude point of view.

From the above comments I believe that the word "commitment" is fast becoming an integral part of the GPS vocabulary, that we have turned the corner and that with the strength of our Junior Club, the attitude of our coaches and playing members and the more professional approach to our administration that we can make the new clubhouse happen, giving ourselves some roots and achieving something worthwhile with the sport we enjoy.

A GRADE

Congratulations to David Codey on his National selection in 1985, and of course on his dominant role with the Grand Slam Eighth Wallabies. It is great to see a class player at the peak of his career enjoying his Club rugby. Such is not always the case and is a tribute to the team.

Murray Phillips is to be congratulated on his State selection and for his courage in coming back after a crippling foot injury.

While fifth in an eight team competition can not be particularly satisfying the younger players in particular can take pride in the fact that they earned for themselves in the tough A Grade Brisbane competition, a reputation for

uncomprising aggression and skill which they should value highly and guard jealously in 1986.

SECOND GRADE

PLAYER APPEARANCES

TREASURER'S REPORT

I present for your consideration and adoption the Club's Audited Balance Sheets and Statements of Income and Expenditure for the twelve months ended 30th September, 1985 which disclose a \$13013 surplus for the financial year.

The Club's finances were boosted during the year with the receipt of donations from business houses without these donations the club would have suffered a loss of \$1407 which is a decrease on the loss incurred in 1984 (i.e. \$4333). Increases in football expenses, joint ground costs and the continuation of the clubs support for representative players have caused the further drain on club funds. Many internal controls were implemented during the year especially in the trading areas but further controls need to be implemented to safeguard Club Funds and secure Club assets more club members are required to accept the responsibility of organising and controlling various functions of the club, so that the maximum return to the club is achieved. The Committee will continue to seek donations in the future but the availability of these funds is limited and it is very important for the club to secure further fund raising activities to cover the ever increasing costs of maintaining club services.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS AT SEPTEMBER 30, 1985

- 1. The accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention and are not adjusted to take account of the current costs of specific assets and the effect of those costs on the income and expenditure for the year.
- 2. It is practically impossible for the club to establish full commercial controls over most types of income prior to the initial entries in the accounting records. The systems established by the Committee ensures that all material items of income are brought to account, however it is the responsibility of each and every member to ensure that club assets and funds are secured for the benefit of all club members both present and future.
- 3. During the year ended 30th September, 1985, club members' funds have increased by \$13013 due in part to the large increase in donations received from business houses. The benefit of these donations was eroded by the ever increasing costs of maintaining the jointly owned Ashgrove complex, increasing football expenses and the club's support for representative players.
- 4. The club since moving to Ashgrove has always maintained that it owns 50% of the Ashgrove leasehold improvements. However the financial accounts of Valley District Cricket Club at April 30 1984 state:—
 "The club has entered into a Joint Venture with G.P.S. Old Boys Football Club on a 50% equity basis to purchase, maintain and operate the leasehold improvements, building and plant situated at Ashgrove previously owned by the club were sold to the Joint Venture at valuations in accordance with an independant valuation prepared by Sharp and Musgrave Pty. Ltd. date June 21, 1976. This arrangement is presently being altered and under the new agreement ownership of leasehold improvements, building and plant will revert to the Club and a lease is being prepared".

Your committee totally disagrees with the last sentance of this note to these accounts. The financial accounts of G.P.S. Old Boys Rugby Union Club have, as previously been prepared on the basis that interest and principal payments on the loan from Valley District Cricket Club have been made in accordance with the Joint Venture Agreement with both clubs owning 50% of the Ashgrove Complex.

At September 30, 1985, ten half yearly repayments of \$2571.70 by this club plus interest totalling \$31,867.36 were invested by agreement in interest bearing deposits in both clubs' names, with equal participation in the interest earned.

5. The profit on bar trading represents 35% on the bar trading turnover of \$54192 (1094% on \$46055). Last years report allocated entertainment costs and other costs to the Bar Trading Account. Even after

notionally allocating such costs this year the gross profit percentage still increased to 30%. The controls mentioned in last year's report regarding clothing have taken effect.

- 8. The balance sheet does not include several of the Club's assets including a weight machine, goal posts and the G.P.S. Junior (Colts) Fund Raising Account.
- 9. Under the present arragement both Valleys District Cricket Club and this club contribute equally to the cost of insurance, rates, repairs and cleaning, however G.P.S. contribute 70% of the cost of electricity die to the requirements of the floodlights. In this year the total cost of electricity increased to \$3187 (1984 \$2600) this cost represented approximately \$140 per week in a total cost of approximately \$1050 per week for the period of use of the clubhouse and ground. There appeared a large increase in joint ground costs which was caused by the increase in electricity, installation of security grills at the club and the fact that certain expenses were not included in last year's report due to the shorter accounting period. It should be noted that such costs totalled \$9388 in 1983.

AUDITORS REPORT

RICHARD BERNAYS - HONORARY AUDITOR

DAVID LACY JONES

1912 - 1985

David Lacy Jones was a grand gentleman, President and latterly Patron of G.P.S. Old Boys Rugby Club. Although due to illness not in the last year as active as in the past he maintained a keen interest in rugby, particularly G.P.S. "his club" and the Q.J.R.U. of which he was Patron until his death.

David was introduced to rugby as a student at Ipswich Grammar School in the 1920's. From this beginning grew a life long love of the game in all its many aspects both on and off the field.

From school David went on to qualify as an Industrial Chemist and joined the Shell Company. After spending many years in southern climes particularly South Australia, he returned to Queensland as State Manager of Shell Chemical. Through his corporate association David became involved with the Q.J.R.U. and thence through this connection with G.P.S. Old Boys a club which, as Past Grammars, he had followed in his youth. He became Senior Vice President in 1970 and thence President in 1973 a position he held unopposed and with great distinction until he "retired" in 1978. He understood well how to run a football club by the proper use of knowledge, character and bearing all of which qualities he properly possessed and used to the advantage and enhancement of his many associations, particularly G.P.S.

As a Chairman of committee meetings he kept meticulous notes and urged his committeemen to follow a similar course. He had the great ability to get to the centre of a matter and make decisions without fear or favour, woe betide the committeeman who did not have his facts or had not done his job.

David made his committee very conscious of the fact that they were there to promote, to build and to work for G.P.S. Old Boys Rugby Club.

He presided over the club during a period of success and great change. The Club went from Greater Public School Old Boys Rugby Union Club to G.P.S. Old Boys a name change indicative of the change of players from largely Public School Old Boys to a more ecumenical blend of players, a move greatly encouraged by David Lacy Jones.

In many ways an understanding foil for the exhuberance of younger and some older players. His attitude and love for "his boys" is well exemplified in his comments to an angry Finsbury resident missing a fence and remonstrating with "El Presidente" regarding the loss. "Madame, I can assure you nine of my boys would have done such a thing", said poker faced as he nudged a piece of burnt pailing with his foot under the Finsbury landing. The perpetrators however were later subject to his avancular wrath.

In 1973 the Club toured South East Asia where once again his gentlemanly character and bearing saw the tourists through many a difficulty not the least of which enabled them to continue their flights with a particular airline. Those who went on that great trip will all remember with affection D.L.J.'s "talks" serious, admonitory, congratulatory and jocular but always with the best interests of the club and player in mind.

Whilst being a gentleman and ascribing to the attributes thereof may, in this day and age, seem somewhat antediluvian we, the remainder of the "Club" community and the far wider community are all the richer for having known and had David among us.

Our condolances to his wife Beryl, his daughters and also his grandchildren through some of whom his connection with the club will continue.
