G.P.S. OLD BOYS' RUGBY UNION CLUB PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I wish to thank the Committee, the Coaches and Managers, the Club's sponsors and supporters, the Ladies Committee, Dr Leah Phillips, and the sports trainers for all the work they have done for the Club this year.

Your Committee met every third Thursday evening throughout the season, and functioned as a very effective unit. Special thanks should go to Robin Thomson, the Senior Vice-President, who played in and assisted with coaching the 4th Grade team, edited the Club's Newsletter, and was a very effective member of the Committee.

As with most committees, the bulk of the work falls on the Secretary and the Treasurer, and Gerry Herbert and Brian Downs responded to these tasks splendidly.

The Committee has enjoyed a good working relationship with Ashgrove G.P.S. Club, mainly because their President, Paul Reid, attended our Committee meetings. Paul's presence and input assisted the Committee in many ways, and I congratulate Paul on his re-election as President of Ashgrove G.P.S. for another year.

Because of the general shortage of officials, members of the Committee had dual roles - Rod Torkington was also the 2nd Grade Manager, Frank Jensen was the Club Registrar, and Brogan Melit, in the absence of a Junior Vice-President, liaised with the Colts throughout the year.

The Club's Articles also provide for two Club Selectors. Paul Green did a great job in this role last year, but we have no selectors this year, and I feel it is very important that these positions be filled next year.

On behalf of the Club, I would like to congratulate Anthony Herbert on his selection for the Wallaby Tour to Canada and France. Anthony has been an inspiration to all the Club's players. He is naturally a good footballer, but has always believed that to get to the top you also need to work hard. When Anthony rejoined the team after his representative commitments, he lifted the team's performance tremendously.

G.P.S. Colts

We were unable to attract a Junior Vice-President to the Committee, and whilst the junior coaches and Brogan Melit did a great job in organising these teams during the year, the Colts lacked the support of parents to form a Colts Committee.

The Colts' finances, including subscriptions and expenses, were operated through the Club's main bank account. Whilst this gave us greater control of the Colts' finances, the Colts lacked any incentive to earn money for themselves or the Club. My feeling is that the general lack of support and enthusiasm from the Colts, which was reflected on the field, has cost the Club dearly.

It is important in 1990 that a strong Colts sub-committee be formed, and the Colts become a vibrant part of the G.P.S. Club.

Playing Facilities

In September we paid the final instalment to Valleys Cricket Club under the arrangements entered into when the Club came to Ashgrove. The head lease that Valleys have with the Council is under review by the Council; Valleys' lease expires on 31/12/89, as does our sub-lease. Valleys have indicated that they will give us a sublease under similar terms to the existing sub-lease on the renewal of their head lease.

Whilst we have been using the new oval and sheds for two seasons, this lease with the Council has not been forwarded to the Club for signature. I understand that this is to do with a resurvey of the area and a review by the Council of all their sporting club leases.

It has been suggested that a joint committee be formed to manage the playing areas. It would be appropriate that whilst the sub-leases of the main Valleys area and the head lease of the new oval be in the name of the G.P.S. Club, a formal sub-lease should be entered into with Ashgrove G.P.S. Club.

It would also be realistic that the management body have representatives from G.P.S., G.P.S. Colts, and Ashgrove G.P.S., and that the cost of maintaining the fields be on a 3/6ths G.P.S. : 2/6ths Ashgrove : 1/6th G.P.S. Colts basis. These are matters to be addressed by the incoming committee, but the concept has already been canvassed by the committees of both Clubs.

The priorities of work on these grounds as established by the outgoing committee were to get adequate lighting on the new oval as soon as possible, to drain the new field (probably at the end of next season), and to realign the existing drain to enable the small field to be extended to a field of near full-size dimension.

It should be remembered by both Clubs that the total area and facilities are available to both Clubs, and because both Clubs need to use all the facilities at various times during the year it is not appropriate to designate one area to one Club. Some more thought should be given by a joint management committee to using (on a predetermined hourly rate) the full-time Groundsman that Valleys Cricket Club are planning to employ during the next season.

"A" GRADE REPORT

Season 1989 began with high expectation; strained our player resources to breaking point midway through the year; reached a high towards the finish when we made our first Cup Final since 1986, and finished in disappointment at the hands of Easts who proved to be our nemesis on four occasions.

The record books will show that we played 22 games, won 11, lost 11, topped the table in the Winfield State Challenge, lost the final and finished 6th in the Premiership. What they won't show is that 42 players played "A" Grade, of whom 19 made their "A" Grade debut, and the majority of these debutantes came through

the GPS Colts ranks. Whilst this process was accelerated due to a significantly high injury toll, it is nonetheless encouraging because the future of the Club is considerably dependent on the successful development of junior talent. I am certain that players such as Chris O'Reilly, Tim Lucy, Chris Wigan, Rowan Lawrence, Rod Clarke, David Sawyer, Mark Harris, Damien Peppin, Brad Kerin, Clinton Busteed, and Luke Patterson have all grown as a result of their "A" Grade experience and, providing they have the personal discipline and drive to pay the price required for success, will make important contributions to future GPS victories.

There were a number of matches that provided satisfying wins but none more memorable than our first round victory over University, when, with a depeleted but committed team, we came from behind to win 24-12 and, for sheer spirited performance, our second round match against the old enemy Brothers provided the sweetest victory with GPS finishing too strongly and winning 19-11.

Anthony Herbert, Isei Siganiyaui, Illie Tabua, David Greene and Chris Wigan achieved varying degrees of Representative honours whilst David Phillips, Brendan Keirnan and Luigi Diclemente should have. It is particularly gratifying to see the dedication and commitment that Herby gives to rugby, rewarded with a Wallaby jersey and tour of France. He is the best example this club has of someone who sets his sights on a goal and perseveres until he achieves it. To those who do the work, all things are possible.

My personal thanks go to skipper David Phillips for his enthusiasm, commitment and leadership — he was a credit to himself, his team, and his Club, both on and off the field and his award as best back is entirely appropriate. Illie Tabua was our best forward and equally with David Phillips deserves congratulations.

Peter Neilsen was almost the highest "A" Grade point scorer in Brisbane and had we won more ball probably would have been. Thanks, too, to George Lock and Brad Taylor for their behind the scenes assistance and also Ken Bolton who was a great help to me and who did an excellent job with 2nd Grade under very trying conditions.

SECOND GRADE REPORT

Paul Green.

The 1989 Season for the Second Grade could best be described as frustrating. The side was a very young one who largely, because of their high error and penalty rates, failed to show the very obvious potential they possessed. It has to be said that a number of the players need to show a greater degree of commitment to the game in general, and to the training paddock in particular, if they are to develop themselves further as rugby players. They may also find that in the process they enjoy the game a great deal more which, after all, is essentially what rugby is all about, being an amateur sport.

One player to whom these criticisms do not apply is Frank Austin whose commitment and enthusiasm, on and off the field, was exemplary, particularly considering his late start to the season due to injury. Also pleasing was the progress made by players such as Chris Wigan, David Sawyer, Tim Lucy, Chris O'Reilly and Rohan Lawrence in their first year out of Colts. All of these guys have a bright future with the right approach to the game. Also players such as Doug McGibbon, Tony Mee and Luke Brown again demonstrated their very obvious ability without really playing to their full potential for a variety of reasons.

My sincere thanks to go my co-coach Trevor Jesser who was a great help to me with his input as far as the backs were concerned. Trevor, despite having work and family commitments, made the time to be involved this year with Second Grade and a number of the players could well take a leaf out of his book. Also my thanks to the two gentlemen who performed perhaps the most onerous task in rugby, that of Manager. I refer, of course, to Rod Torkington and George Bickerstaff. Ken Bolton

THIRD GRADE REPORT

The 1989 season for Third Grade began with a bang with the side winning the first five games. The rest of the season failed to reach such dizzy heights, with only a handful of wins sprinkled throughout the rest of the season.

There are many reasons for this dramatic turnaround, two of which I will briefly outline while attempting not to step on too many toes:

-- The playing strength of the Club is nowhere near what it should be and this was highlighted when all grade sides were hit by a plague of injuries. The turnover of players to the higher grades was constant and the problem was further aggravated when players decided not to return from injury. As a result it was a constant battle to turn out a team with the full complement of 15 players. There were too many players dropping out mid-season, or playing when it suited them.

- Except for early in the season, the side contained only about half a dozen players at any one time who were committed enough to train the two nights a week consistently. For a team to perform well for a season, fifteen such players are needed.

Congratulations to Luke Patterson who took out the team's Best and Fairest, and Best Forward awards. Luke will be competing with Paul Wigan for the "A" Grade Hooking spot for years to come. Congratulations are also in order to Tim Power as he was the team's Best Back.

Thanks to those Fourth Grade players who sat on the line or doubled up for Third Grade when required.

Special thanks to Doug Trotter who contributed strongly both on and off the field throughout the season.

If Third Grade, or the Club for that matter, is to be a force next season we need more players who are committed for the whole season from the beginning of preseason to season end. These players should have a single-mindedness about playing to the best of their ability. Let's hope the new decade heralds a new commitment and dedication to the Club. The season produced the usual conviviality, except for a small turn-up at the annual dinner. Results were mixed with good wins during the season against all teams, particularly Easts and Brothers. Souths, eventual Premiers, remained our nemesis.

After thrashing Wests 8-7 in the minor semi-final, we were indeed unfortunate to succumb to our own pressure against Brothers in the major semi-final 9-6.

Once again the mixture of youth and experience had the ability to carry the day but did not capitalise sufficiently on advantages presented.

COLTS I REPORT

Back in March, many people asked me what the Club's chances were with the Colts this year. At the time I said that I thought we had every chance of getting all three teams into their Grand Finals. Unfortunately, the remainder of the season was one of inconsistency, at times producing rugby of a standard that couldn't be matched, at others producing efforts which would be better forgotten, except for lessons that can be learned. It is these lessons that I believe will make better players of our Colts as they take our Club into the future.

At this point I would like to make two recommendations for the 1990 season and beyond:

1 - That the QRU should make every effort to ensure that the farcical situation in which we played Brothers and University four times and all other clubs twice never recurs, even if it means a re-draw after the start of the season.

2 - Should Grades and Colts play their homes games on the same day, Colts games are played at such times as to allow everyone to watch First Grade. This may call for some co-ordination with the QJRU and Ashgrove GPS, but it seems to be imperative if the aim of getting Colts and Grades players to accept each other as part of the one Club is to be achieved.

I would like to extend my thanks to all those who supported the team throughout the season. I hope that your support for the players, and the Club in general, will continue.

To Sal Vitelli, Andrew Potts, Greg Mee and Brogan Melit – thanks for the work you did in making players available to Colts I when you needed them equally as much in the II's and III's. Thanks to David Newstead who worked with our forwards

and taught me more about forward play this year than I'd learnt previously. Special thanks to our Team Manager, Ben Greenhill, whose advice and work for the team made my job a lot easier.

Finally, I'd like to thank all Colts players, but particularly those who played in Colts I this year. I hope you enjoyed this season as much as I did, and learnt as much as I did. We need to remember these lessons next year - in this way our Club can only improve.

Enjoy your off-season, and I'll look forward to working with you in the 1990 Rugby Season.

ASHGROVE GPS JUNIORS REPORT

Ashgrove GPS celebrated the 21st year of junior rugby in the Ashgrove district with one of the Club's most successful seasons in recent memory. For the first time, the Ashgrove GPS Juniors fielded teams in all age groups in the one season -16 teams from U7 through to U17. A total of 302 players were registered.

Representative jerseys were worn by 51 Ashrove GPS players (including one Australian representative, Ben Cumming) and the Club won the QJRU Brisbane Division President's Trophy (highest number of teams in grand finals) for the first time in 17 years.

Five teams were the premiers in their competition (U10, U12, U13 (shared), U15 and U16) and a sixth (U14) won minor premier. These successes were attributed, in part, to a club development effort begun in the early 1980's and the good fortune of having many skilled and dedicated coaches.

It is hoped that 1990 will see the installation of improved flood lighting on the club playing fields and the refurbishment of the former Aussie Rules field to improve the playing surface and minimise the damage caused during wet weather. Improved lighting would also facilitate the use of different areas for such things as lineout training, to avoid hammering the same areas of the playing field each training night.

It is also hoped that 1990 will see the beginning of a more co-ordinated program of skills development, with the assistance of our "big brothers" in the senior club.

On behalf of Ashgrove GPS I would like to thank Alan Taylor and the GPS committee for offering us the use of the former Aussie Rules clubhouse during the season, in recognition of our partnership in that expansion. Our aim is to be productive partners in development of those assets.

Special thanks are also due to a number of other members of the GPS Club, notably Anthony Herbert for speaking at our teenage end-of-season function and then backing up to present the pennants to our youngest players at their presentation day, and to Colts players Scott Reinke and Nick Thorne for their dedicated work in taking a squad of 28 Under 12's and moulding them into a premiership winning team — all the while ensuring that each boy had a turn on the field each week.

Finally, it was suggested during the season that the time could be right to amalgamate our two clubs under one central administration. This was discussed at length by the Ashgrove GPS Committee and eventually deferred because of caution about the junior club's interests being submerged over time as has been the case with other clubs. However, it was felt that while the interests of the senior and junior clubs are divergent, their objectives should be the same — to increase the standard and standing of rugby in our district. To that end we will continue to work in close partnership with GPS to develop our facilities and foster good rugby. After all, our juniors are tomorrow's seniors.

Highlights of 1989.

Anthony Herbert joined a long and distinguished list of GPS Old Boys Rugby Union international players to receive the Club's official cap in September following his selection in the Wallaby side to tour France.

Herbert, 23, received a standing ovation from club supporters as he accepted the cap from club patron Ron Park at the Club's Annual Dinner.

Herbert, whose toil and dedication was rewarded by the Australian selectors, said he was privileged to receive the cap. It will take pride of place in the Herbert household.

A number of other people were recognised at the Annual Dinner. Ken Bolton (200 games) and Mick Arnold (100 games) received cups to commemorate their achievements, while Robin "Buff" Thomson also received a cup after playing his 500th match for the Club earlier in the season.

Brogan Melit, the flying fourth grade utility back and Colts II Coach was awarded the Walter H. Boyd Memorial trophy for Best Club Man while Scott Reinke was presented with the Ashgrove GPS Trophy for contribution to the juniors.

Illie Tabua capped a magnificent season by taking the Club's Best Forward in First Grade award while David Phillips won the Best Back award.

Chris Wigan (2nd grade), Luke Patterson (3rd grade) and Russell Jones (4th grade) won the respective Best Forward awards while Frank Austin (2nd grade), Tim Power (3rd grade) and Mick Arnold (4th grade) collected the Best Back awards.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The Club's financial results for the year under review (11 months) are somewhat disappointing. Of significance and requiring explanation is the relatively poor profit from canteen trading resulting from a reduced turnover of around \$27,000.00 as against \$60,000 for the previous year, which included extraordinary sales and profit from conduct of the Golden Oldies Week. The turnover for this year was detrimentally affected by the abandonment of several home games due to weather conditions with loss of perishable goods. Generally attendance at all home games was well below that of previous years.

In respect of the high net expenditure on clothing sales the following aspects are drawn to your attention:

- (a) Club Jerseys cost \$950.
- (b) Shorts given to new Colts members were estimated to cost over \$900.
- (c) Non-payment of the cost of many articles of clothing provided to members.
- (d) Cost of a large quantity of ties and scarves which are not selling well and were included in stock at 31.10.88 had been written off.

Some tightening in the control of clothing distribution and the need to recover costs thereof is essential, and in this regard it is suggested that a specific committee member be placed in charge henceforth.

On the income side, the Club is very appreciative of the sponsorship obtained from the following:

Les Pullos of Normanby & Hamilton Hotels	\$5000
Nundah Mitsubishi	\$5000
Discovery Corner - Jill Phillips	\$1000

An amount of \$6500 was also obtained from the QRU as part of an overall sponsorship by Castlemaine Perkins' XXXX Brewery.

Although a number of smaller fund-raising functions (e.g. Trivia Night, Fashion Parade, Black Tie Dinner and Games Doubles) produced reasonable returns, the major function of the Ball lost over \$400 although it is usually very profitable. The manner of conduct of this function should be reviewed, with the idea of maximising return, limiting expenses on alcohol provided in the cost of the ticket and changed location designed to attract greater patronage.

While membership fees collected were approximately the same as last year, despite an increase in the fee by \$5.00 to \$40.00, many players did not pay this very reasonable levy. It is pointed out the fee barely covers the players' mandatory insurance premium and Club affiliation costs charged by the QRU. In addition it must be remembered the Club provides jerseys (\$950 per set) and other training aids used by players. The implementation of a stricter attitude to the payment of this fee by players is recommended to the incoming committee.

It is pointed out that the Club now maintains two grounds with the acquisition of the QAFL field and clubhouse last year, and natural inflation has also increased the operating costs as reflected in statements. Interest-free loans totalling \$40,000 were received from many generous members with further donations of \$2100. Loans totalling \$2000 have been repaid in terms of conditions and it is proposed to have a further draw at the AGM. An amount of \$5500 included in sundry credited figures is still owing to the QAFL and the lease from the BCC is still to be completed.

The Club is appreciative of the Ashgrove G.P.S. Junior Rugby Union Club who agreed to make (and has subsequently made) a payment of \$1720 to us based on shared costs of the new clubhouse and grounds maintenance.

All outstanding accounts have been paid or brought into accounts of the books at balancing date with the exception of a Solicitor's account for \$1868.50 relating to legal costs of Fijian player, Ili Tabua, in respect of defending an action taken by the Department of Immigration and Ethnic Affairs. A recommendation relative to meeting this cost will be made to the incoming committee. The Club has met other costs to date of \$1543.20 in this regard included an item "General Expenses".

I take this opportunity to point out the increasingly demanded nature of the position of Treasurer and suggest consideration be given to the creation of an assistant's post.

In conclusion 1 extend to the incoming committee and players every success in respect of their various roles in the Club. I thank all members of the committee who have assisted me in my duties during my year as treasurer. In particular I sincerely thank the previous treasurer for the assistance afforded me in completing the books, and Roger Dent, without whom the Canteen could not have operated.




