### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The John L. Lewis house is a two and a half story vernacular structure with a hipped roof pierced by a single dormer window. The facade has a slightly projecting porch with doric columns. Original clapboard siding has been covered on the second floor with aluminum siding.

The main entrance to the Lewis house faces north on Lawrence Avenue and opens into a main hall. Directly east of the hall is Lewis' personal library which contains original bookshelves enclosed with glass. The kitchen, which is located behind the library, was enlarged and modernized in 1970. A side entrance is located in the kitchen.

Directly west of the main hall is the living room which has an original fireplace located in an alcove with side benches and windows. Behind the living room is a sun porch (now used as a music room) which contains a third entrance. A large dining room with a built-in buffet and ceiling high china cabinet is located directly south of the main hall. The buffet and china cabinet are walnut as is most of the interior woodwork.

The staircase in the main hall opens onto a balcony on the second floor. This level consists of four bedrooms and two original baths.

The attic originally served as a storage area but was remodeled as two bedrooms in 1973. No other structural alterations have been made since Lewis lived in the house.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

John L. Lewis lived in the house at 1132 West Lawrence Avenue in Springfield from 1917 until 1965, a period spanning his career as renown labor union leader.

Lewis was born of Welsh immigrant parents. He grew up in Lucas, Iowa, a coalmining district surrounded by the turmoil of the early period of United States labor organization. (His father was blacklisted for union activities.) He left school at the age of 15 and headed for the mines. He first became noticed in Panama, Illinois, as president of the local United Mine Workers. He then became the Illinois lobbyist for the union. In 1911, he became general field agent for the AFL.

John L. Lewis had one dream in life, to become President of United Mine Worker's national organization. He achieved this goal in 1920, and held this position for the next forty years. "In February 1924, President Coolidge, Commerce Secretary Hoover, and the nation's press and especially financial journals, hailed John L. Lewis a labor statesman." (1)

As quoted in his biography, "By the mid 1930's John L. Lewis had become the most powerful labor leader in American history - the first trade unionist to be considered as potential presidential candidate." (2) In 1935, he formed the CIO. As national president of CIO, he presided over the often violent struggles to introduce unionism to various industries, particularly the steel and automobile industries. These were the Years of the Little Steel strike, the Republic Steel Massacre in Chicago, and the great sit-down strike against General Motors.

As quoted in Websters American Biographies, "A series of miner's strikes during World War II won wage increases but alienated large segments of the public and the strikes were responsible in part for the passage of the Smith-Connally Antistrike Act and the Taft-Hartley Act, both of which placed new restrictions on labor unions." (3)

As quoted in the <u>Columbia-Viking Desk Dictionary</u>, "His aggressive strike tactics led to conflicts with courts and government but greatly benefited the union." (4) Carol Lewis, his daugher-in-law, wife of John L. Lewis, Jr., writes in <u>The New York Times</u>, "He was an angry man, he was a powerful actor. He used tough means to get things done - but he got things done, and on the health and welfare

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issues he was right. Today's miners are telling us that they think he was right." (5)

Lewis worked with nine presidents of the United States. He served as President of the United Mine Workers for forty years, retiring in 1960. But, still staying on as president emeritus, he served as chairman, in Washington, D. C., of the board of directors. He died June 11, 1969 and was buried in Springfield.
