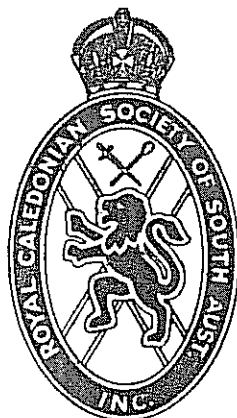
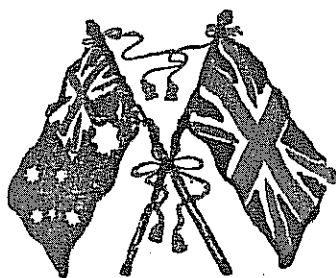

SIXTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

1947-1948

Brither and Sister Scots,

Your Council has much pleasure in submitting this Sixty- Seventh Annual Report, together with the Financial Statement for the year ended 30th June, 1948.

There have been record attendances at most of the activities held during the past year, and the financial aspect is very good indeed.

MEMBERSHIP

Membership has considerably increased during this year. Eighty-one new members were elected, including Associate (Lady) Members. The total number, including Life Members, is now 586, and this only represents a small percentage of those whom we think should link up with us.

Mrs. L. H. Howie, an old and esteemed member, who was known and loved by many, passed away during the year. On your behalf a letter of sympathy was forwarded to her family.

OUR CHIEF

Owing to pressure of business Mr. Small had intended to vacate this office at the Annual Meeting, but on 25th May, at a special meeting of Past Chiefs and representatives of the Council, he was persuaded to carry on for a further twelve months—his fourth year. The Council and Society generally will welcome this extension, as the coming year, owing to the Royal Visit, etc., promises to be one of great activity.

During the past year Mr. Small has welcomed many Scottish families from overseas, whom he has contacted through the Department of Immigration. He has also entertained many Scots from Interstate and Country Societies, including the oldest Past Chief of this Society, Mr. A. J. McLachlan, now residing in Victoria, with whom he recently spent a very pleasant time.

We take this opportunity of thanking Mrs. Small and family for their willing and able support.

THE COUNCIL

At the last Annual Meeting, the retiring Directors were re-elected and the election of the Hon. A. L. McEwin and Mr. C. D. Scott brought the Council up to full strength again. Mr. G. W. McCord was elected Treasurer to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. W. E. L. Hill.

On August 25th Mr. G. R. Cheel was appointed to the office of Chieftain. Director F. R. Forgan kindly offered to carry out any duties during Mr. Cheel's illness.

Nominations have been received from the five retiring Directors and Treasurer (Messrs. D. Fraser, J. G. Duncan-Hughes, J. W. Murrell, L. Niven, C. D. Scott, and G. W. McCord.

These will be elected at the Annual Meeting.

Just as this Report was going on to our printers, the Chief received the resignation of Chieftain G. R. Cheel from our Council. Mr. Cheel wrote his resignation with great reluctance and regret, but on account of his continued ill-health he had no alternative but to accept the advice of his medical adviser.

I feel sure all those members who know Mr. Cheel personally will regret this news and wish him a speedy recovery.

HALLOWE'EN

Hallowe'en, held in the Palais Royal, North Terrace, on Friday, 31st October, 1947, was one of the biggest gatherings of this sort ever held.

As usual the children's programme began at 7.45 p.m. and continued until just after nine o'clock, when they then retired for supper.

Last year we reverted again to the use of a marquee outside of the Hall for the children's supper; and this arrangement was appreciated by everyone.

The Eightsome Reel Competition, a regular feature of the Hallowe'en programme, was held, and competed for by all the bairns.

Mrs. C. M. Taylor, wife of the donor of the Cups, presented them to the winning set, "St. Andrew's," which was led by Misses Catherine Brown and Maxine Severin.

The Council again thank Mr. Taylor for his unfailing interest and generous support of the Bairns' Class.

As the children marched out to supper, the adults took the floor and danced on until eleven o'clock.

Among the Chief's guests were the Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress, and representatives of affiliated and kindred Societies.

ST. ANDREW'S SOCIAL

On November 28th, 1947, a St. Andrew's Social was held in conjunction with a Quarterly Meeting.

Mr. Eric Millhouse, the guest speaker for the evening, gave an address on "His Recent Visit to the Old Country."

This was of more than usual interest, as Mr. Millhouse had travelled by flying boat, and as well as telling of his time in England, he mentioned several interesting incidents which happened in foreign countries.

Mr. Millhouse also stressed that in all his travels, he found Australia, despite its shortages and restrictions, still the best place to live in, and we should be very proud of our Country.

A programme consisting of items by Mrs. C. Fischer, Master Lennox Pawson, members of the Bairns' Class and the Pipe Band was much appreciated.

Director J. G. Duncan-Hughes proposed a vote of thanks to the speaker, and all who had helped make the evening a success.

ST. ANDREW'S DINNER

St. Andrew's Dinner, at which there was a record attendance, was held in John Martin's Dining Hall on Friday, 5th December, 1947. The programme was opened with the Loyal Toast to "His Majesty the King" by our Chief, Mr. Andrew Small.

The Toast, "The Land o' Cakes," was proposed by the Hon. Sir Walter G. Duncan, M.L.C., and responded to by Director F. R. Forgan (in the absence of Chieftain G. R. Cheel), whilst that to the "Royal Caledonian Society of the South Australia and Its Chief" was proposed by the Hon. the Premier, Thomas Playford, M.P. The response was made by the Chief.

"Our Kindred Societies" was proposed by Chieftain Duncan Fraser. Mr. Gordon Cameron, Chief of Millicent Caledonian Society, responded.

Appropriate songs by Messrs. Gerald Moyse, Sandy McDougall, and Ansbert Campbell, with Mr. Fred Smith at the piano, and selections by the Pipe Band were all thoroughly enjoyed.

ROYAL CALEDONIAN SOCIETY PIPE BAND

Annual report presented at the Annual Meeting, held at Caledonian Hall on June 17th, 1948:

The Band has had a very busy twelve months, attending thirty-two engagements, i.e., Port Adelaide, Eastern Star, York Theatre, Soccer Association, Brighton R.S.L.,

South African War Memorial, 5CL, Girl Guides, Flinders Park R.S.L., Scotch College, Legacy Club, Glen Ewin, Golden Grove, John Martin's Pageant, Church of England Centenary Hallowe'en Woodlands Park, Government House Levee, Black Forest Presbyterian Church, E.T.S.A. Picnic, St. Andrew's Service City and Port Adelaide, Henley Beach, Elder Park, Bairns' Night, Henley and Grange Carnival, D. Niven's Concert, Port Town Hall, Unley Oval, Grange Oval Carnival, Port Lincoln, Limbless Soldiers, Tanunda.

There was only one resignation during this period, that of Doug. Wilson, who also was one of our new members, the other new members being Pipers R. Ross, N. Miles, F. Miller, and G. Filgeg, Drummer R. Earle. The band has now a nominal roll of twenty-six players.

The Band held its second annual picnic at Port Noarlunga on February 19th, 1948. Two buses were engaged, and a very enjoyable time was spent. The members were very sorry that the Chief, President, and Patron were unable to attend owing to pressure of business. The girls and members of the Band gave a display of Highland dancing on the foreshore.

4. The second Highland Ball since the war was held on May 14th, and it was one of the best that we have ever held. Our worthy Chief welcomed the Vice-regal party between a guard of honour formed by members of the Band. The Chief, his Councillors, and Mrs. N. Tansell are to be complimented on their efforts towards making the Ball the success that it was.

The Band has been honoured with a visit of Drum-Major Sandy King, of the Cameran Highlanders, also Messrs. Bruce Macaulay and Alan Althorpe, of the Geelong Pipe Band.

Port Lincoln: The party arrived at Port Lincoln on Friday, December 26, at 7 a.m., then proceeded to various hotels and billets allotted for breakfast and lunch, then the Band and party met at 2.15 p.m. to go to Tumby Bay for the afternoon's and evening's entertainment. On arrival the Band did a street march, then played a few selections on the foreshore, and the dancers did the Reel and Fling, and the Band was dismissed after a memorial service at 4.30 p.m.

We had a lovely spread at the Institute and then put on a show in the evening and returned to Port Lincoln after the show.

December 27: The Band and party left Lincoln at 10.30 a.m. and proceeded to Cummins for the local sports in the afternoon, and concert in the evening.

The Band and party were billeted out for lunch to various houses and farms around the township, then we returned to Port Lincoln after the concert.

December 28th: The Band paraded at 2.30 p.m., then marched to Port Lincoln Memorial Oval for pleasant Sunday afternoon concert, at which the Band played a few selections, then marched back to Port Lincoln Hotel and were dismissed till evening, when the Band was entertained at Mr. Brad Lowe's house, where we had a most wonderful night. The sumptuous supper and hospitality was amazing, our President moved a vote of thanks, seconded by Vice-President C. Ferguson, and carried with enthusiasm.

December 29: The Band paraded at 2.30 p.m. and proceeded to Kirton Point, where the children's playground was officially opened, after which the Band and party went to a Civic Reception, held in the R.S.L. Clubrooms, then in the evening opened Highland Ball in Civic Hall.

December 30th: The Band had a free day and in the evening gave a Concert in the Civic Hall, which was a great success.

December 31st: The Band had a free day and left at 7 p.m. for Adelaide. We had great pleasure in meeting Captain Sutherland and Chief Engineer of the "Aldington Court" at Brad Lowe's farm, and they kindly invited the Band and concert party to have a look over the ship, which was very enjoyable.

January 1: Arrived at Port Adelaide after a very enjoyable but very busy trip.

The Chief, Andrew Small, and Chieftain Duncan Fraser accompanied the Band on its Port Lincoln trip, and their presence was much appreciated.

In conclusion, thanks are due to our President, Mr. R. J. McDougall, Vice-Presidents, Officers, and members of the Band for their assistance to me during my term of office.

BURNS'S NIGHT

Burns's Night, held on Friday, 23rd January, 1948, in conjunction with a quarterly meeting, was the 189th anniversary of the birth of Robert Burns.

Our old friend, Mr. T. Scott Bryce, who was the guest speaker of the evening, gave an extremely well-thought-out and concise talk, entitled "Burns's Message." He brought to our notice new facets in the character of our National Poet. This message was of great interest to us all.

A programme was arranged of dancing by senior bairns and members of the Band, selections by the Pipe Band, and community singing led by Miss Cath Watson.

During the evening the Chief, on behalf of the members, presented a dressing case to Miss Watson, who was then on the eve of her departure to Scotland.

Mr. Small expressed the sincere thanks of this Society, for the many occasions on which she had so unselfishly helped us, and wished her a happy holiday and "bon voyage."

A comprehensive vote of thanks to the speaker, artists, Pipe Band, and accompaniste was given by Director F. R. Forgan.

This was a debutante Ball, and His Excellency, Sir Willough Norrie, and Lady Norrie and Government House party, who were piped in through a kilted guard of honour, received the twenty debutantes, presented to them by the matron of honour, Mrs. John Ogg.

The Pipe Band, under Pipe-Major Niven, played excellently as usual and maintained the Scottish festival air, so necessary for this Ball.

COUNCIL OF EMPIRE SOCIETIES

Our Society, which is affiliated with the Council of Empire Societies, took part in the Welcome Home Celebration at the Town Hall to Sir Willoughby and Lady Norrie on their return from a trip to England.

As an Empire Day gesture, a food parcel was sent to the Scottish Youth Hostels Association, Edinburgh. In the absence of the Chief, Chieftain D. Fraser officiated at the ceremony, which, owing to the inclement weather, was held in the Town Hall instead of at the Queen's Statue.

KINDRED SOCIETIES

Visits have been made to functions held by kindred societies, whilst representatives from other societies have also been welcomed to our celebrations.

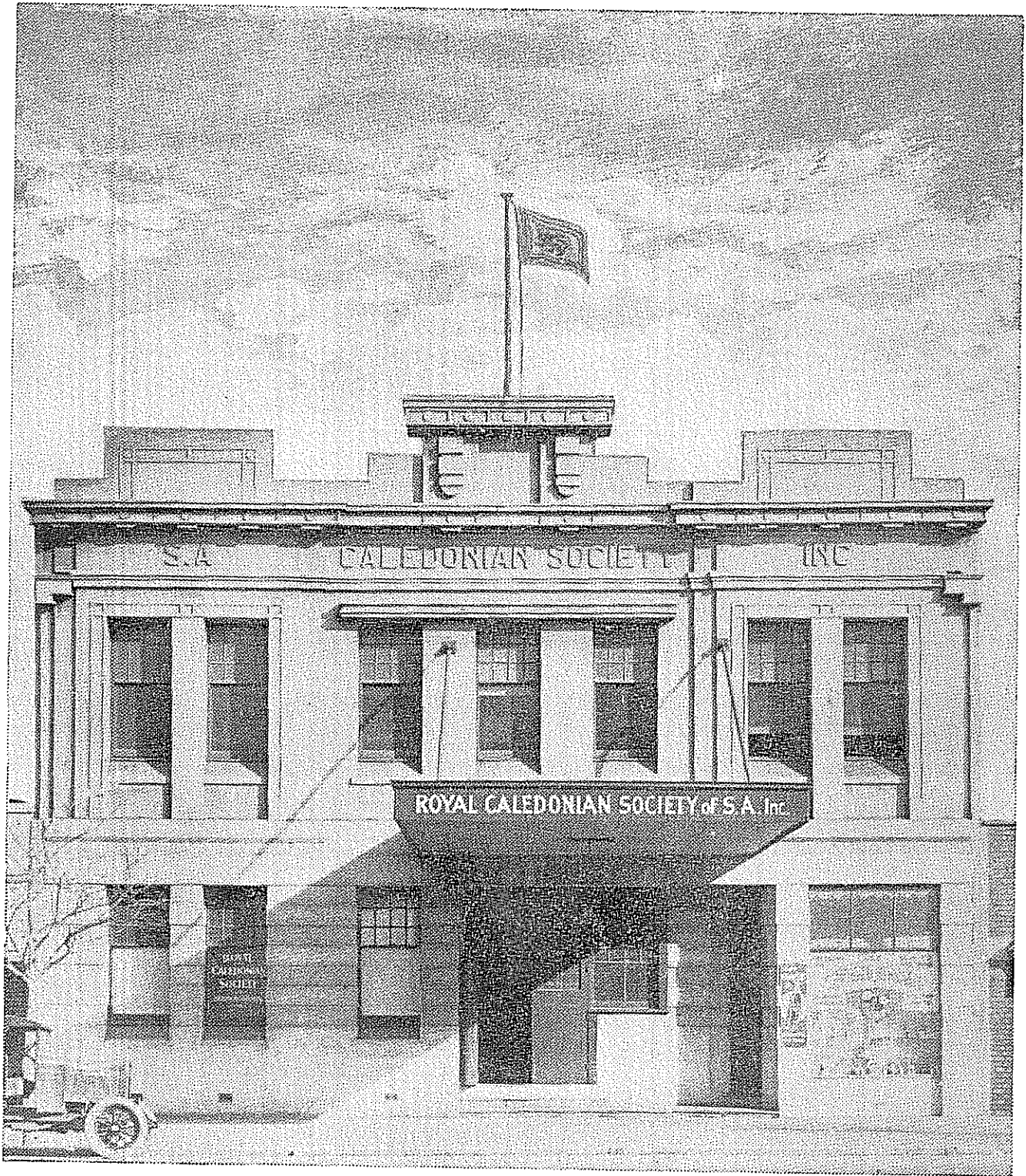
