2013 was a wonderful year at Perth Modern School, full of accomplishments, stories, events and achievements with the school consolidating its reputation as the school of choice for academically able students. Members of the school community are very privileged to belong to this incredible institution of learning and opportunity. I agree completely with the Young Australian of the Year, Akram Azimi, who tweeted after visiting with our Senior School students—'Inspired by the generosity, compassion, intelligence and empathy of the Perth Mod students. Our future looks bright in their hands.' What a perfect way to describe the fantastic students at this school.

In 2013, Perth Modern School has reaffirmed that it is more than a successful school for the academically gifted; it is also a kind and giving community of students, staff, alumni and parents that support and care for one another as well as others in the community. Staff are continuously developing new and exciting opportunities to challenge and support individual students as they develop their talents and explore their strengths, passions and interests.

The Class of 2013 certainly lived up to their potential in the West Australian Certification of Education results, with 59 students winning 89 awards, more than any other school. The class achieved the highest median ATAR in the State with 95.4, six General Exhibitions and four Course Exhibitions and 32 students joined the prestigious 99+ Club. I pay tribute to their abilities, work ethic and dedication and I also acknowledge the dedication and commitment of their teachers and support staff who went beyond the call of duty to support students as they strove to be 'their best'.

The school community is continuously striving to implement and improve upon the Key Focus Areas as contained in the school's 2012–2014 Business Plan and we are confident that the significant objectives of the plan are being met. Perth Modern School's vision to nurture a love of learning so as to develop academically gifted and talented students to their full academic, social and physical potential remains at the forefront of everything we do. The school continues to be ably and comprehensively supported by alumni, an involved parent community, partnerships with a variety of institutions including the Telethon Institute for Child Health Research, the Student Council and School Board. Our highly able students are engaged in learning, social justice issues and the community. I am very pleased with how members of the school community consistently share, model and promote the school's core values, helping create a vibrant, challenging and balanced educational environment where students thrive and are accepted as individuals.

I would like to express my appreciation to outgoing School Board Chair, Warren Barbetti, for his commitment in helping to establish the School Board and successfully steering the development of the School Business Plan.

I would also like to acknowledge and thank outgoing P&C President, Julie Pegrum, for her commitment and dedication to achieving many successful outcomes for the school whilst in the role.

The school community can be very proud of Perth Modern School being selected as one of four finalists for WA Secondary School of the Year in the WA Education Awards, a wonderful achievement. SCHOOL BOARD REPORT 2013

I am pleased to take this opportunity to report on the ongoing achievements of the Perth Modern School Board and to reflect on the activities of the Board over the past 12 months.

During the year, the State Government announced significant changes to future education budgets. The Board responded to this by writing to the Minister for Education, the Premier and the School's local member, the Hon. Bill Marmion MLA, expressing concern about the proposed changes and the impacts of this on Perth Modern School. The Board also joined with fourteen other State School Boards in writing to the Premier and Minister for Education requesting for the changes to be reconsidered.

This year, the Board also welcomed Staff representative, Ross Fuhrmann, taking the place of Rick McMahon who resigned following a temporary move to Edith Cowan University. In addition, the Board welcomed the valuable participation and reports from student representatives of this year's School Student Council.

During 2013, the Board successfully achieved a number of objectives.

 At the start of the year, the Board introduced standing items to review the School's performance against its objectives as set out in the Perth Modern School Business Plan 2012–14. At each meeting during the remainder of the year, the Board considered progress made against the six key areas directing the strategic direction of the school. The School is currently well placed to meet its 2014 objectives.

- The Board reviewed and endorsed the 2014 overall school budget prepared by the School Executive. As part of that undertaking, the Board also endorsed the contributions and charges for the upcoming year.
- During the year, the Board endorsed the first school community survey to be undertaken since becoming an Independent Public School. The School community responded well to the call for participation, with the majority of responses being extremely positive/favourable. Areas identified as requiring attention were common across workplaces and not unique to Perth Modern School and centred on communication and coping with change. Survey outcomes will be incorporated in the development of the next business plan. The next survey will be undertaken in 2015.
- Following detailed review processes, the Board endorsed Perth Modern School's Drug Policy, Complaints Management Policy, Anti-Bullying and School Uniform Policies. The School Uniform Policy was changed to include provision for out-ofstate tour wear for which the wet weather jacket has been included as an optional item for normal school day wear.

During the year, the Board formed a partnership with Boards of other public secondary schools in the North Metropolitan District to work collaboratively for better outcomes for their students, their schools, their staff and public education in general. The Joint Board of Chairs, North Metropolitan Secondary Schools Group, has already met on a number of occasions to address common issues of concern and looks forward to continuing this collaborative relationship.

In the closing months of the year, nominations were called and elections held for three new Board Members from the School Parent community. It is my pleasure to inform you that the new Board Members for 2014 are Simon Davies, Paula Munt and Mark Ogden. As I step down from my roles as Board Member and Chairman, I take this opportunity on behalf of the Board and School community, to express appreciation to the other outgoing members of the Board—Julie Pegrum, Alicia Brown and Narayana Seethepalli, who have generously contributed their time and experience.

Finally, on behalf of the Board I would like to congratulate the graduating year of 2013 and acknowledge the ongoing dedication and efforts of the School Executive, the teaching staff and the administrative support team. I would also like to acknowledge the enthusiasm and contributions of my fellow Board members who along with the School community have assisted and supported the Board during the year.

QUALITY TEACHING AND LEARNING PRACTICE

Student learning is at the core of school planning. Perth Modern School, utilising Gifted and Talented best practice, aims to ensure academic rigour and meet the needs of individual students through teaching and learning in and beyond the classroom.

WEST AUSTRALIAN CERTIFICATE OF EDUCATION RESULTS 2013

In 2013 the school has successfully met its targets for Year 12 West Australian Certificate of Education (WACE) results. The tradition of high academic performance was upheld by the class of 2013. The school was ranked first in the State for Median ATAR with 95.4 and third in the State for percentage of students with a course score of 75+. Perth Modern School was the Top Public School in the State.

Perth Modern School students earned 89 School Curriculum and Standards Authority awards, the highest of any secondary school in the State. 32.22 per cent of students enrolled in a Stage 3 course achieved a score of 75 or above and 32 students achieved an Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank of 99 or higher.

Additionally, the Class of 2013 achieved six General Exhibitions against a target of four and four Course Exhibitions against the target of three. 14.9 per cent of students achieved a Certificate of Distinction compared with 14.4 per cent in 2012, continuing the trend of improvement that began in 2011. The Graduation target of 100 per cent was not reached due to one student opting to redo Year 12 in 2014.

NAPLAN


The National Assessment Program Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is conducted annually and tests all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 in the areas of Literacy (Grammar and Punctuation, Spelling, Reading, and Writing) and Numeracy.

The data from these tests allow comparison of our students' achievements with national standards and student achievement in Western Australia and other States/Territories.

Year 9 Perth Modern School students continue to achieve exceptional results in comparison to State and National averages. The school has successfully met its target of achieving higher than the National and WA Government School average in each area for like schools in NAPLAN testing.

Perth Modern School students continue to display exceptional achievement. Year 9 students in 2013 demonstrated improved results in the majority of areas when compared with previous years, and outstanding results when compared with State or Australian standards.



Average numeracy score 2008–2013





PRIORITY AREA HIGHLIGHT

THINKING APPRENTICESHIP PROJECT

The rationale behind the project is to develop students with the skills and disposition for structured, visible thinking. There was a significant expansion of the Thinking Apprenticeship at Perth Modern School in 2013. The Year 9 Thinking Project was in its second year of implementation and the Year 8 Thinking Project was implemented for the first time after a year of consultation and development.




STUDENTS


STUDENT ENROLMENT TREND




ATTENDANCE RATE (%)



ATTENDANCE RATE BY YEAR (%)





STAFF DEVELOPMENT AND LEADERSHIP

Perth Modern School staff members are highly qualified, enthusiastic and hold high expectations of themselves and their students. In 2013, staff continued to demonstrate a commitment to the ethos of the school. Leadership and staff development focus on effective pedagogy and data analysis.

STAFF

More than 130 dedicated teaching and school support staff worked together to create a learning environment where each student could strive for personal excellence.

All teaching staff met the professional requirements to teach in Western Australia and are listed on the public register of teachers of the Western Australian College of Teaching.

Teachers at Perth Modern School are merit selected and the school recruits and trains the best available teaching staff who possess specialist skills and experience in teaching gifted and talented students. Teaching staff are highly qualified with an array of academic qualifications including those specific to Gifted and Talented education. Two staff have been awarded a PhD and seven staff have completed a Master's degree. Many staff members are in the process of obtaining a Masters.

Teaching staff undertook a variety of professional development opportunities during 2013, including Thinking Skills, Information and Communication Technology (ICT), Gifted and Talented Education (GATE), Ethical Decision Making and the new Australian Curriculum, amongst others. In 2013 teaching staff included 14 Level 3 classroom teachers and 16 teachers with Senior Teacher status. Teaching experience ranged from one year to 40 years.

Six teaching staff left the school in 2013, with two retiring and four coming to the end of their contract period.

Perth Modern School maintained a stable and experienced team of school support staff.





CURRENT YEAR ACTUAL CONTINGENCIES REVENUE SOURCES








\rightarrow Contingencies Expenditure – Budget vs Actual
