#### IMPORTANT EVENTS IN AUSTRALIAN ICE HOCKEY

- 1904, Ice hockey in Australia begins when a notice appeared in an Adelaide ice rink convening a meeting of skaters interested in creating a new form of amusement on ice, similar to ice hockey.
- Opening of the Melbourne Glaciarium the third largest rink in the world with only two rinks in the USA being larger.
   12th July 1906 The first official game was played in Melbourne between sailors from the visiting American Warship the USS Baltimore and a Victorian representative team. The Australian team drew 1 1.
- 1907 The Sydney Glaciarium (Glacci) opened on 25 July 1907. Managed by Dunbar Poole until 1937.
- 1908 The first Hockey Club formed in Victoria. Played three matches against the USA Fleet as part of another Goodwill Tour. The ships in the fleet were the USS Missouri, Vermont, Louisiana, Connecticut, Kentucky, Maine, Kersage and Alabama.
- The first interstate National Senior series, known as the Goodall Cup, involving Victoria and New South Wales was held in Melbourne. Victoria won the first championship.
