
# BFSB – What's in an Acronym?

# Origins of the BFSB



- DoD Transformation Initiatives
  - Army Modularity
  - NOT an Army of Excellence MI Brigade
  - NOT an Armored Calvary Regiment
  - Army Military Intelligence Rebalancing
- Afghanistan and Iraq: GWOT
  - Gap: tactical ISR at brigade level and operational/strategic above division
  - Evolving Operational Environment
  - Evolving Threat



# **BFSB Operational Principles**




- Primary purpose: ISR to satisfy Division,
  Corps, JTF Priority Intelligence Requirements
- Lightly armed organization
- Modular: designed to accept augmentation
- Dual focus: ISR and collection capability reinforcement
- Will perform the same mission set across the spectrum of conflict

#### **Wartime Mission:**

On order, conducts multi-disciplined intelligence, surveillance, reconnaissance (ISR), target acquisition, and analysis operations to answer Division, Corps, or JTF headquarters priority intelligence requirements and focus combat power to achieve desired effects.



## (What Else We Do)




#### **Civil Support Mission:**

On order, JTF-North, provides military assistance to State, County, and Municipal Agencies within the boundaries of assigned AOR, to mitigate, and alleviate the effects of natural or man-made disasters. JTF-North will function as a force and resource provider to other JTFs operating either inside or outside Alabama.





# Reconnaissance Squadron










#### **BFSB Location Break-out**

#### **Bottom Line**




- BFSB construct continually evolving

#### BFSB 101: A Brief Introduction to the Battlefield Surveillance Brigade

Although the battlefield surveillance bri-gade (BFSB) has been in the force since September 2006, its mission, organiza-tion, and capabilities are not fully under-stood across the Army. Additionally, with stood across the -lmy. Additionally, with the impending decisions on military in-telligence (MI) rebalance and the emer-gence of new Army concepts, the future role of this organization is not clearly de-fined. The BFSB is an established modular support brigade. Currently, there are three Active Component (AC) and seven Re-serve Component (RC) BFSBs in the Army. All three AC BFSBs have served, or are serving, in Iraq. Two BFSBs (one AC and one RC) deployed this summer in support of Operation Enduring Free-

dom (OEF) and Operation New Dawn, respectively. These units have successfully answered division, corps, and joint task force (JTF) commander a priority intelligence requirements (PEF) and they will continue to do so for the foresceable fluent. Bhe Army has committed resources for more than 6 years to BFSD development.
